SECONDARY EDUCATION IN WARWICKSHIRE

Parents of children at Harbury School invited Mr. Beetham (Officer in Charge of Secondary Education in Warwickshire) and County Councillor Major Kettle to a meeting on 4th June, to explain the proposals concerning the Secondary Schools' reorganisation.

Major Kettle said changes are needed because of general dislike of the 11+ selection method, a desire to improve secondary education available, and because present 6th forms

are too small and therefore uneconomic.

The proposed changes, which will only affect children born in 1965 or later, are to be considered by the County Council at the beginning of July. According to the proposals, there will be no 11+ exam from 1976 onwards, and in 1978/9 Harbury School will become a 'combined school', i.e. a first and middle school, catering for children up to the age of 12. (This change has been postponed from 1976 because of shortage of money).

When the children leave Harbury they will go to Southam which will then be the Comprehensive School for this area. In readiness for this change, work has already begun at Southam School to enlarge it to an eventual 8-form entry size,

with approx. 1,080 pupils. The staff will be almost doubled and facilities will be improved to cover a wider syllabus.

including at least one additional language.

At the age of 16 it would be possible for pupils to transfer to the proposed Blackdown/Leamington College federation, in which Leamington Boy's College building will be converted for use as a 6th form college, with a very extensive syllabus.

Several questions were put to Mr. Beetham and Major Kettle, mainly seeking re-assurance on various points in the proposals. Mr. Beetham told the meeting that Mr.Skinner, who will take over as headmaster of Southam School in September, is currently formulating plans for the extended school, and it is intended to invite him to a meeting in the village to outline those plans to parents.

A fortnight after the Harbury School meeting, parents from the whole catchment area! attended a consultative meeting in Southam, at which the panel included the Vice-Chairman of the School Managers, the Headmaster-elect of Southam Comprehensive School and representatives of

the County Council Education Committee.

Mr. Beetham again described the proposal which would shortly be considered by the County Council for secondary education in the area, as outlined above. Several possibilities had been examined by the Council's Working Party, but the proposal now being put forward was selected as being the most feasible and satisfactory within the present financial constraints. An unequivocal assurance was given - endorsed by Mr Skinner, the headmaster-elect - that Southam would be transformed into a comprehensive school at least the equal of any of its size.

From the body of the hall, however, disquiet was voiced on the following counts; the time-scale in which this upgrading could be achieved, bearing in mind that, after t first non-selective intake in1976, Southam would not be conceprehensive in all age-groups until 1981; the restriction of parental choice because neighbouring areas children would go to secondary schools at 12+ while Southam and South Warwickshire stayed at 11+ until about 1980; the possible effect on plans from changes in national policy and financia

allocation.



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
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The panel undertook to ensure that these points would be given full consideration before the County Council put forward its agreed proposals for ratification by the Department of Education and Science.

Among the areas upon which no firm proposals had yet been formulated were: the future relationship with the Roman Catholic Foundations in the area and the policy of the County Council over continuing to take places at the local Direct Grant schools.

THE BISHOP BRIGHT SCHOOL. LEAMINGTON

This is the most modern of our local Grammar Schools, having opened in 1967. The building was provided by the R.C. Archdiocese of Birmingham, and a grant from Westminster. The School has four classes entering each year, of mixed abilities, and there is no streaming in the school. The large catchment area includes Warwick, Leamington, Kenilworth and Stratford. Initially the pupils were predominantly R.C.—this is no longer so. The school has developed a good academic standard, noted for its modern methods, and has obtained its fair share of University places, including Oxbridge.

CHILDREN'S SPONSORED WALK

142 Children walked a total of 1221 miles on June 22nd to raise money for the Swimming Pool Fund. A very good effort by them all, but special mention must be made of Neil Humphries (22miles), Stephen Bell (20 miles) and Gordon Humphries (19 miles). Best Girl - Josie Turner (17 miles). M 40 MOTORWAY

We are threatened by six lane motorway passing within one mile of our village centre. The Department of the Environment are consulting the public in the relatively early stages of planning the Warwick section of the M40. Three alternative routes have been put forward; Warmington, Knightcote and Harbury. The latter puts the six lane highway in a cutting between Harbury Lane and Chesterton Windmill before crossing the Fosse Way and skirting round the north side of Bishop's Tachbrook. The Department held an exhibition of the plans in Leamington spa on June 28th & 29th. The Consultation Document which some of you may have picked up from the Post Office contains a questionnaire which you are invited to complete by August 9th.

The decision by the Secretary of State on which of the three routes he favours will be published by the end of the year. Should the Harbury Route be chosen, a large number of objections by local inhabitants could result in a Public Enquiry. We must await his Statement and be prepared to act swiftly and effectively. The Harbury Society Secretary, Linda Ridgley (612792) is collecting further information.

RATEPAYERS' ASSOCIATION MEETING, 13th JUNE.

The enormous rates bills recently received by Harbury householders prompted the Association to hold a Protest Meeting. About 200 people attended, and the Chairman was Mr. G. Watson. Present to answer questions were Mr. Mc Millan, (County Treasurer), Cllr. Wheeler and Mr. Cox (Chairman & Treasurer, Stratford D. C. Finance Committee), and Major Kettle (County Councillor for this area). A background of the County's present state was detailed, & it was stated that re-organisation in the Warks. area was costing

more as the County was now one of the smallest in England. Estimates at December 1973 showed costs would go up by 45% because of inflation etc. Government rate relief for this area was originally fixed at 21.5p, but after the Election this was reduced to 13p.

Mr. McMillan said that education was a big factor in the increases with the raising of the school leaving age, more spending on nursery schools, pay awards and threshold payments to teachers. Also the council house rents freeze means that ratepayers are now subsidising some council tenants.

The subject was raised about payment to Councillors for attending meetings. At District level payments are only made for meetings called by the Council, not for political meetings. The amount is £5 for a morning or an afternoon. For the County, Major Kettle said the proposal to pay for political meeting attendances was passed by only one vote he and his colleagues voted against it. All Conservative meetings are arranged for the same day as Council meetings, so councillors do not receive double payment.

Cllr. Geoff Wright (Chairman, Harbury P.C. Finance Committee), was told by Mr. Cox that the District Council will be taking over financial responsibility for double-rated items, e.g. some recreation facilities. Cllr. Wright also said Harbury P.C. had reduced their rate by 0.4p, due to greater efficiency - what new efficiency methods were being undertaken by the District Council? He was told that salaries had not been increased as much as in some other counties, although this may lead to staff losses.

Major Kettle put the suggestion of rates being offset against tax, and also said that rate relief, if applied for by all those entitled to it, would put some of the burden on the

Government.

The following resolution was recorded: That this meeting of Ratepayers of Harbury, in the County of Warwickshire, deplores the recent savage increases in rates in this Parish, and further deplores the Government's adjustment of the rate support grant which substantially increased the immediate burden to the Parish Ratepayer, whose rates have increased by 91%. Copies of this resolution are to be sent to The Prime Minister, Messrs. Heath & Maude, Local Councils etc.

THE GREAT WHEELBARROW RACE

There was a touch of the old Windmill Theatre, "we never closed", attitude about the Wheelbarrow Race on Weds. 26th June - despite torrential rain! Entries were down due to the weather but all credit must go to those who did take part, particularly the entries from Daventry and Leicester, who helped to carry on what must now be an annual event in the village.

Winners for the third year running were Dick Picken & Tom Rankin who set a record winning time of 11 minutes 8 seconds! Much praise must go to the village licensees who enter into the spirit! of the event, and to echo someone at

the finish of the race - "see you next year".
