This is the first issue of Harbury News for which a charge - albeit a small one - has had to be made. The number of advance orders has been most encouraging - more than sufficient to justify the continuance of the magazine. Thank you all for your support.

At the time of the inception of Harbury News, a constitution was agreed upon which, in addition to empowering the committee to co-opt new members, provides a means for new members to be elected to the committee at the Annual General Meeting. This meeting will be held on January 30th 1975 and will be your opportunity to take part if you wish. We record the constitution below:-

The Harbury News, sponsored by Harbury Parochial Church Council, shall cover all aspects of Village Life. The Committee shall consist of:

The Vicar and one of the Churchwardens, nominated by him.

10 Villagers elected each year at an annual meeting, open to all residents of the Parish of Harbury, to be called by the Parochial Church Council in the Month of January.

The committee shall be responsible for all aspects of the Harbury News, including the appointment of editors and other officers. It shall have the power to co-opt.

The Committee shall be responsible to the Parochial Church Council for ensuring that so far as possible the Harbury News is self-financing; any likelihood of a deficit in the long term shall be referred to the Parochial Church Council for their decision. These rules can be altered at the annual meeting.

As agreed at the meeting of the Parochial Church Council on 8th May 1974 with the addition of the penultimate paragraph, subsequently settled, at the request of the Council, by Rev. Mackley, Mr. Clarke, Mr. DuBuisson and Mr. Moore.

FROM THE CHURCHWARDENS

"What a happy week-end!" was the phrase heard so often after the Harvest/Open/Sudan weekend at the beginning of October. The Church was truly 'at home' to the village with the exhibition in the Wight School and the Church, with the visits to the tower and with the almost non-stop eating!

It all started on Saturday morning with coffee - of course - in the Wight School where so many people viewed the fascinating pictures of old Harbury, mounted so beautifully by the Harbury Society, the W.I.log book and foot-path walk and the splendid carvings, all produced from wood with local interest including the book rest, now in use in the Church, made from wood from the screen which was removed from the Church last year. We were delighted to have a visit from the press and to see some of our members on the pages of The Courier.

In the Church were the display of the history of the school, so lovingly prepared by Mrs. Watts, former Headmistress of the Infant School, together with a model completed by her son only on the previous evening, an exhibition of vestments and Church plate, including the 16th century chalice and the tours of the tower enthusiastically led by members of our faithful band of ringers.

Among the guests at the splendid Harvest Supper in the Village Hall was the Right Reverend Oliver Allison Who has this year retired as Bishop in the Sudan and the Vicar presented him with a cheque for £100 raised in the parish towards the re-building of a Pastor's house in Southern Sudan. Bishop Oliver thanked those who had contributed and spoke entertainingly. Harbury Singers presented a programme of music and an 'auction' rounded off the evening by adding a further £8 to the Sudan Fund.

On Sunday it was good to see the Church full for the Harvest Family Communion in which a number of members of the congregation participated and Bishop Oliver preached. Afterwards 120 sat down to breakfast in the village hall and we don't know where else you can get 120 perfectly boiled eggs!

2. The boys football team has been entered in the Mid-Warwicks Junior Schools football league. The older girls are becoming very keen on netball and will be playing a number of friendly matches in the future.

A YOUTHFUL BELLRINGERS ACCOUNT.

Bells are rung to bring people to church. At Harbury the tower had a ring of five up to 1959 when they were recast to produce six lighter bells (the heaviest being 12 cwt.) They are rung every Sunday before the services and every Friday evening for practice. When they are rung and set (stopped) they sit the other way up. Ringing a bell is not just a matter of pulling a rope, it needs care and concentration. When a person has learned to ring a bell they will do more advanced things. The ringers ring what they call Changes which are sequences of numbers. They then progress to Method Ringing

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

During the summer months, several members of Harbury Crusaders have attended national Crusader camps or house parties and had a whale of a time in a range of activities and sports. Whether it was trekking across Dartmoor, sailing, canoeing, singing, talking, playing games or putting the world to rights, it was great!

Our Fifth Birthday Service was attended by Bishop Oliver Allison who showed slides of places and people in the Sudan. It is interesting to note that of the original 25 members of Harbury Crusaders nine are still in the class and that most of the others have moved away from the village. There are 38 'Knights of Harbury' who have completed 100 Sundays (over 2 years) with the class and have received presentation Bibles - a creditable achievement in five years. After the service, the senior group were most efficient in serving teas. In fact, the clearing of the hall and the setting of the tables was so efficient that some friends who came along at the advertised time found tea nearly over! Our apologies, but we hope that they still enjoyed their tea and cakes.

The best wishes of the class go to Liz Clarke, a founder member, subsequently a class helper, who has done so much for the class, not least in cooking such splendid meals for three class holidays. Liz, having obtained catering qualifications, has now started training as a nurse.

We look forward to welcoming Richard and Jane Smith at Crusaders on Sunday, 1st December when they will sing, speak and show slides of Nigeria.

Last month the 5 Lords of the Manor were listed as in the Domesday Book.

The land held by the Monks of Coventry is not mentioned again and it is reasonable to suppose their land passed to Kenilworth Priory. It is also likely that the 3 virgates held by William BUENTASLETH in 1086 were also passed to the Priory in 1199 and 1227. Thus by 1291 Kenilworth Priory held land to the value of £4.50p in Harbury. Inflation had raised this sum to £7.55 in 1535.

Between 1536 and 1593 all the Monasteries in England were dissolved. The land held by Kenilworth Priory in Harbury were kept by the Crown until 1561.

By that year Elizabeth I was on the throne and land in Harbury was granted as a manor to John Fisher and Thomas Dabridgeant The following year, 1562, the manor was re-granted to Thomas Fisher who had been MP. for Warwick and when he died in 1577 the land reverted to the Crown.

The land held by Henry de Ferrers in 1086 had by 1279 passed to the Abbey of Coombe in Coventry. In 1484 William Catesby was granted by the Convent of Coombe a yearly rent of £1.34p for life, secured on their Harbury Estates. When Coombe Abbey was dissolved in the 1530's their holding in Harbury was valued at £12.03p. In 1582 The Crown sold the land to Edmund Frost and John Walker. The Manor was also sold then into the Wagstaff family. It was Thomas, a London lawyer, who in 1610 purchased land on the north side of the Church and built the lovely old school.

Reverting to the Domesday record - The $4\frac{1}{2}$ hides held by the Count of Meulan in 1086 passed to the Earl of Leicester. It passed later to Geoffrey de Clinton and by the 13th Century had been granted to Kenilworth and Coombe Abbeys, including a dove-cote mentioned in 1291. The land held by Turchills passed to the Earl of Warwick. Henry de Ladbroc is mentioned as chief tenant in 1316.

WINEMAKING - AN ALCHOLIC HOBBY.

Chris Wright remembers ---

Once Harbury boasted its own wine circle, formed in '66 /'67 from a Southam Evening Institute course on winemaking.

It continues to flourish as the Learnington & District Winemaking Circle. The programme was varied and included talks visits and competitions in addition to the sampling of members' bottles.

The making of a good wine is a delicate art. We have all suffered at some time a friend's bad wine whilst secretly looking for a convenient plant pot in which to pour it.

We had an article from Peter Holt on his hobby. -----I have made hock and sauterne from cans of grape concentrate and others from raw materials, my wife and children collecting dandelions, elderberries, elderflowers & blackberries from the hedgerows. I once made half a dozen bottles from some garden wallflowers.

The basic items needed are a large plastic bucket for initial fermentation, a one gallon glass jar with a fitted air lock, bottles & corks and a warm spot (e.g. the airing cupboard) where fermentation can take place.

Cost can be anything from 3p. per bottle for a wine made from - say-blackberries you've gathered yourself (cost here being only for the sugar) to about 25p per bottle when using a high quality concentrate. Perhaps there are sufficient wine makers in the area to restart the circle.
