THE VICAR'S LETTER

My Dear Friends,

The season of Lent begins on 12th Feb. (Ash Wednesday). One of the special practices of Lent is self-denial, and in letters from our Bishop recently read in Church suggestions are made of ways in which we might 'give up' things during Lent (mention is made of what is being done at Bishop's House, chiefly in connection with meals). The Bishop suggests that money thus saved should be given to famine relief in those parts of the world where people are dying from lack of food. If any people in the Parish wish me to do so I am willing (at Easter) to forward their savings for them to the Bishop of Coventry's Lenten Appeal for Famine Relief. This will be given to Christian Aid unless you earmark it for some special fund. I would be pleased to lend the Bishop's letters to anyone who wishes to read them.

A new Archbishop of Canterbury has just been enthroned, and what a thrilling message was given us by Dr. Donald Coggan in his sermon on that occasion! Taking as his text St. John 16:33: 'In the world you shall have tribulation. But be of good cheer, I have overcome the world', Dr. Coggan said he believed that the two emphases of Jesus as recorded by St. John are precisely those which are most needed today, as they were needed in the early ages of the Church, viz. Realism and Confidence. Realism. Let the Church face the fact that it is in for a time of tribulation. But also Confidence When the Christian speaks of confidence, said Dr. Coggan, he does not mean a kind of starry-eyed optimism based on a theory of human progress and perfectability. Rather, he means hope based on the Resurrection - victory of Jesus. 'Forth in Thy Name, O Lord, we go',

The Parish Council minutes are available in the Library for anyone to read. Not only the approved minutes, but also the latest unapproved minutes can be consulted. Also, the Parish Council would like to draw your attention to the meeting to be held in the Village Hall on 20th February. This is to discuss methods of raising money for the Hall extensions.

HARBURY SCHOOL

From the beginning of this term we are running a School Bank, under the auspices of the National Savings Movement. The day to day running of the Bank is the responsibility of some of the senior children (with teaching staff oversight), and we have our own Bank Manager, cashiers etc. We have had to restrict the number of savers initially, but we hope to increase numbers as time goes by and our bank staff becomes more expert.

Our football team continues to do us credit. They have yet to lose a league match and must be in with a chance of winning the Small Schools League.

Half-term will be the complete week beginning 17th Feb. as we are adding two occasional days to the usual three.

Many Juniors are enjoying Country Dancing now, and a party is going to London on 15th Feb. for sightseeing and for the Folk Festival ¹⁷⁵, which includes dance and folk groups.

On the evening of Tuesday 18th March we shall be holding a Musical Evening in School. There may well be some audience participation, so be prepared! N. OLIVER.

P.T.A.

The January meeting was a talk by Mr. J. Skinner, headmaster of Southam High School, where most Harbury children will go after leaving the Village school. Mr. Skinner said the the past achievements of the School had not been made widdy known - already they have 17 'O' level courses. 9 'A' level

(potentially 14), a 6th Form of 50 pupils, and 21 graduates out of 48 teachers. When the school goes comprehensive the curriculum will be expanded (modestly in some eyes) to embrace a second modern language and the classics.

Ultimately the school population will be around 1,200, but Mr. Skinner stressed that the division of the school into 4 houses, and well organised pastoral care arrangements should safeguard the children's sense of belonging.

Mr. Skinner, and Mr. Baker, Senior Master, who also attended the meeting, were thanked by Mrs. Megeney, and it was announced that the 1975 Programme is now available from Max Cartwright (43 Mill Street) or any Committee member on payment of the annual membership fee of 20p.

The Training Pool is nearing completion, the next job being to clean out the pool, install handrail and steps, and generally tidy the site, and help is still needed any Sunday.

Since January 1974 £1,950 has been raised for the Pool, and the County Council lent £3,750. To date £3,580 has been paid to the installers, and a further £1,600 spent on building materials etc. The remaining £500 will be needed to pay outstanding bills. Altogether a very satisfactory year.

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

DO YOU CARE?

Have you room in your heart and home for another child? I am sure you are aware of the urgent need for foster parents for babies and children of all ages. Some of these children need foster care for a short time whilst others need to be members of a family for a longer period, and the choice of offering care on a short or long stay basis would be yours. Great care would also be taken in placing a child whose age was the most appropriate for you and your family.

Coventry Social Services Dept. offer training classes for new foster parents, excellent support from the Social Work and a boarding out allowance. Perhaps you feel you could not be a foster parent for 52 weeks of the year, but again the choice is yours; if you can only foster for several more in the year your services will be just as valuable as those who foster for longer periods of time.

MRS. ELEANOR ZONIK

"I am appalled by the general standards of spoken and written English today, by the adulation of the mediocre, by the violence on television which acclimatises our children to it, (I do most of my washing-up to the sound of gunfire), and by the all-round lowering of standards." So says Mrs. Eleanor Zonik, writer, playwright, producer, lecturer, adjudicator of drama - in this village of busy people she must surely be one of the most active!

Mrs. Zonik has 2 daughters and 4 grandchildren. She served on the W.I. County Committee for Music and Drama, and various other W.I. Committees, for 25 years, during which time she worked at her writing in her few spare moments, until about 4 years ago, when she decided to give up her committee work and devote more time to her writing. In fact, it was a W.I. Bursary to a 14-day Drama School, just after the war, which started her serious writing career. She has achieved great success, having had 2 plays produced professionally, 6 more plays and several short stories published, and she has just finished her first novel, which took her about a year to complete. She has been involved with the Loft Theatre in Leamington for about 25 years, where she has had the great satisfaction of producing five of her own plays.

Mrs. Zonik was born in West Didsbury, near Manchester. She was educated at a Public School in York (and proud of it) and in Paris, has lived in Warwickshire since 1931, and for the past 14 years she and her husband have lived in Mill Lane, Harbury. She enjoys gardening, sewing, knitting, cooking, embroidery, decorating, and, incredibly, finds time to hold strong (and fascinating) opinions on almost every subject. An intensely aware and vital person, Mrs. Zonik says that, with so much to do, learn and observe around us, boredom is the only sin. With her successful writing career, her busy family life and her hobbies, and even with her vast command of the English language - I am amazed that Mrs. Zonik even knows what 'boredom' means! ORIENTEERING

This is a national sport in Scandinavia, originating in Sweden in 1918. It started in the U.K. in 1962. It is like a car rally but done on foot with the one individual being the driver, navigator and providing the power output as well. Events are held in wooded countryside; Cannock Chase, Badby Woods (near Daventry) and Wyre Forest have all been used for Midlands competitions.

Armed with map and compass, and suitably dressed for 'bramble-bashing' and mud, competitors set off for the master maps. Here they copy the course on to their own maps. Places to be visited on the route are called controls and are marked in the forest by red and white marks. Each has a coded punch. By stamping this on a control card competitors prove they have visited the spot. Controls are sited at obvious features (e.g. path junction, stream bend, depression, knoll). Controls on the map are joined by straight lines. In practice the straight line route is often the hardest since it may cross a hill, marsh, thicket, ravine or similar obstacle. This is where route finding, pace counting and compass work come in handy.

At any event there are usually various courses arranged by age and sex. A pram pushers' or wayfarers' course is best for a family outing. The nearest club is in Coventry. 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
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
