

The Church Choir under their conductor, Clive Watts, added to the evening's entertainment with their singing of "I Saw Three Ships" and "Silent Night". John Goodfellow and his Recorder Group, with the addition of a flute and trumpet, completed the Programme with a polished performance of three well known carols. A vote of thanks was proposed by Geoff Wright who also presented Peggy & Valentine DuBuisson with a gift on behalf of the P.T.A.

A bound volume of Harbury News - 40 yrs. ago - has been shown to me by Mr. Harris. This was a wholly church and not a Village Magazine - it ran for six years until 1937 and was written by the Vicar, Rev. Capps......1974 was a busy year for Harbury with the usual parties, fairs, concerts, drama productions and outings, but on top of these there were many other events and changes in the village, amongst which was the birth of Harbury News, our first issue appearing in May! Winter 1973 saw the completion of the tennis courts but it was in 1974 that we really began to enjoy them, and not content with tennis, we turned to swimming with the new School Pool being conceived and finished within the year! There was the Wheelbarrow Race in June and of course the

Carnival, and in August we won a Certificate of Merit in "The Best Kept Village" competition. In June Mr. Bamford opened his "Harbury Handicrafts" emporium; the Harbury Society, formed in October 1973, enjoyed increasing interest; Mr. Oliver and his family arrived in the late summer and he has already made his presence felt in the village. The Village Hall extension was also begun in the summer and whilst not yet completed has been in use for several functions already.
