My dear friends,

SCHOOL

The resumption of the second half of term has seen a return to a more normal situation in school. On Ash Wednesday the Junior classes went to Church for a service largely conducted by the children, and on 5th March the Juniors and top Infants listened to a fascinating talk by Mr. Keeling, a zoologist who lectures to schools and brought a selection of animals with him to show to the children.

On the afternoon of Saturday, 6th March, the school ran a tinned food stall at the Church Fair. Thanks to the generosity of parents, a profit of $\pounds 26$ was made for Church funds.

The school has just taken possession of a photo-copying machine. This acquisition was due entirely to a donation from the Wagstaffe Trust who stipulated that we purchase a piece of equipment for the school which would not normally be provided by the County. We are extremely grateful to the Wagstaffe Trust for enabling us to improve our resources in this way.

Anyone who has visited school lately will have noticed a changing display of interesting material in the school entrance hall. This has been mainly on a 'Wildlife' theme - we have had a badger, a red squirrel, and various specimens of pond life. The main exhibits are obtained through a loan scheme run by the Education Service of the County Museum, and what a splendid and useful idea it is!

The sports side of school life is also reviving after half term. This year it looks as if the girls will be leading the way, echoing the success of last year's football team. On 8th March the netball team entered a tournament for Primary Schools held at Sydenham, Leamington. We were delighted when they returned to school having won a cup as winner of their section. Congratulations to everyone concerned.

Please note - on Wednesday and Thursday, 12th and 13th May, the School will present the musical 'Joseph and the Amazing Technicolour Dreamcoat' - admission 25p.

Lastly, we have been informed that the first sign of economy cuts will take effect from the beginning of the summer term, when our Crossing Patrol warden will not be on duty at lunch times, but we are pleased to say that she will still be on duty both before school in the mornings and after school in the afternoons. PARISH COUNCIL

On 6th May the elections for the new Parish Council will take place. Simultaneously, there will be the elections for the 'next rung' in Local Government, the District Council. Each elector is entitled to 9 votes for the Parish Council and 3 for the District Council.

The following article reports on the Parish Council meeting on 25th March, and then Mr. Drinkwater has written some brief notes on the function of the Parish Council. Following these, we print short notes by those candidates who submitted them by 29th March, which we hope you will find helpful. (There may be further candidates, as nominations do not close until 7th April.)

Parish Council Meeting, 25th March

Present: Cllrs. Gurden, Drinkwater, Watts, Wilkins, Atkins, Davies and Wright.

Apologies: Cllrs. Daniells and Catterall.

Public: Mrs. Ridgley, Mrs. Buckle, Mr. Bamford, Mr. Brant and P. C. Percival.

The meeting was a lively and humourous one. There was an obvious feeling of relief that the long term of office was soon to be over. Few decisions were taken. Many items (the one-way system, Depper's footpath, some of the planning applications, and the decision about whether to relinquish the lighting function - this is to wait until after an Assoc. of Parish Councils meeting on the subject) were deferred until the next meeting and (the Councillors thought) the new Parish Council. It was not until the end of the meeting that this misapprehension was corrected by the Clerk announcing that the next and last meeting of the Parish Council was due to take place on Thursday, 29th April. This will be the electors' last chance to see the present Councillors (most of whom are standing for re-election) at work, and it is a chance not to be missed.

Major items on the agenda of the meeting were: Warks. Structure Plan; Amendments to Transport Policy The policy document is on view in the Library, and this will be the last opportunity for comments to be made before it is sent for approval to the Minister for the Environment. Mr. Wright thought it important that the P. C. studied it and commented upon it. (He turned down the suggestion that he wade through it there and then.) Cllr. Gurden said it had been discussed at District level and the main concern for Harbury was the proposal to cut the bus services in 1977 from about 250 buses per week to about 105. It was resolved to lodge an objection to this cut back.

Planning and Development

Outline permissions for various extensions were noted, but there was some concern over the application for a dwelling house and garage on the land adjacent to Little Troy at the southern end of Farm Street. Further worry was caused by a request for permission for an agricultural store and workshop at Deppers Bridge. It was agreed that small scale light industry was desirable as a source of employment but there was concern lest this development might mushroom. However, subject to Mrs. Catterall's approval, the Parish Council resolved to register no objection.

The Council met a member of the Stratford Planning Dept., and following discussions with him, now believe that the increase in Harbury's population will be limited to only 100 and that land has been earmarked on the B4451 between Harbury and Bishop's Itchington for the Middle School. The Bishop's Itchington Plan is to be discussed at the Annual Parish Meeting.



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Annual Parish Meeting, 15th April, 7.30p. m, Village Hall Major Kettle and Mr. Walters, the Divisional Road Engineer, will be present. It was thought that as well as discussion of the Bishop's Itchington plan there was bound to be controversy over the Allotments' waiting list.

(My apologies for a mistake last month. The new rent of £50 is for the total holding and not each acre. Sorry.) Mr. Wilkins reported that there was a case of sub-letting, and that the plot-holder was to be given a month's notice to quit. There were at least 12 on the waiting list and it was unforturate that some allotment holders had more than one plot. One has four allotments (2 strips) and the other six (3 strips). Mr. Wilkins explained that these men had taken over plots which had been abandoned when there was no demand for allotments. He sympathised with them, and thought it would be unfair to deprive them of the land which they had tended so well. They were model tenants and could not be given notice until Sept., and then were entitled to 12 months' notice and recompense for crops and manurial rights(!) The Parish Council agreed that, in view of the demand, it must give consideration to the amendment of the Allotment Rules.

The Council expressed the hope that electors would attend the Annual Parish Meeting on 15th April, where they will have an opportunity to air their views.

Chairman of the Parish Council John Drinkwater has provided the following information on the origins and purpose of the Parish Council.

The Parish is the most ancient type of local government unit in Europe, and in England it has been used for some civil purposes since the 8th century. It was not until 1894 however that it commenced to emerge in the form that we know today.

Between 1894 and 1920 there was a gradual division of power in rural areas between the Church and the Parish and since then Parish Councils have operated independently of the Church. In our own village the Parish Council consists of 10 members who meet normally on the last Thursday in the month at the Village Hall.

They are usually elected for a period of 3 years. In addition there is an Annual Parish Meeting held in April when members of the Parish Council through the Chairmen of the various sub-committees report on the past year's activities to the residents of Harbury.

Our Council operates through the following sub-committees: Allotments, Cemetery, Finance, Lighting, Playing Fields. Although the District Council is the Planning Authority, any matter appertaining to Harbury is forwarded for consideration by the Parish Council each month.

In addition to the above Committees, the Parish Council is entitled to two seats on the local School Management Board.

Candidates for the Harbury Parish Council DENNIS ATKINS: Resident, Harbury, 10 years.

Parish Councillor, 5 years.

Chairman Highways Committee, 3 years. Occupation: Manager, Works Engineering Services, Automotive Products Co. Ltd., Leamington. Aims: To retain a village environment and lifestyle, but with improved amenities.

IVY CATTERALL: I have been your Councillor for the past 3 years, and lived in Deppers Bridge for 44 years. I have seen many changes and improvements to property, so if I am chosen again I will try to carry on the good work.

- T. W. I. DAVIES J. P.: Having lived in Harbury for the past 40 years and understanding village life and its needs, I will continue to do my duties in the un-biased manner I have in the past 3 years.
- . B. DRINKWATER: See below among District Council candidates.

MICHAEL ELLIS Aged 41, married, family of four; Chartered Accountant, Chief Executive of small group of companies. Parish Councillor 1969/72 (sub-committee chairman, Finance and Lighting). Unable to stand for re-election 1972 - business pressures. Believes Parish Council should remain non-political.

- NEVILLE ELLIS: Married with son and daughter. Born and lived in Cubbington until 1964 when moved to Sharmer Farm, Fosse Way. Hobby, Local History. Keen for villages to be responsible for their affairs rather than organised by remote government.
- B. R. GURDEN: Parishioners; on 6th May I will be seeking re-election to represent you on the Parish Council, having represented you for 10 years, in which time the Council has improved the amenities of the village and kept the Parish Rate static.

SHARON HANCOCK: Resident in Harbury $6\frac{1}{2}$ years. Married; son and daughter at village school.

Occupation: Doctor. Currently part-time community health work.

Interests: (i) conservation of rural environment and protection of footpaths.

(ii) improvement of amenities for the young, particularly teenagers.

JANET THORNLEY: Resident in Harbury 13 years. Married with 2 children, one at Southam High School and one at village school.

Occupation: Medical Secretary.

Active member of the Drama Group.

Aims: keenly interested in maintaining the rural character of Harbury, and encouraging local talent, particularly in art and drama.

J. GWENDDYDD WATTS: I have been involved in Education in the village for 27 years, 20 as Headmistress, 5 as a Manager. I am interested in the welfare of the children, recreation facilities, the continuance of the Library service and general improvement of conditions. H. R. WILKINS I believe a Councillor should try to improve the lot of every man, woman and child. Protect our environment and retain our village character wherever possible, keep a watchful eye on future planning, and especially on our rates and local expenditure.

GEOFF WRIGHT: As an active member of our community for 16 years, and a family man with 2 daughters, I have tried to maintain and improve the quality of life in Harbury. I offer myself for re-election and ask for your support.

Candidates for the District Council At the time of going to press, the following candidates are standing for election to the District Council:

- E. G. BUCKLE: As a resident of Harbury for 15 years, I realise many of its problems and hope I can offer a fresh approach to their solution. This will be outlined in forthcoming Liberal Focus Leaflets. Grace Buckle, Candidate for District Council election.
- G. H. BUCKLE (Independent): May I appeal through your magazine to all Electors of Harbury. I am asking for strong support from you on 6th May. I am standing for re-election as an independent member, so I represent you all. I have represented you in the past and hope to in the future.

JOHN B. DRINKWATER: At present Chairman of Parish Council, and member for past 14 years. Retired recently from Local Government service after 42 years with Warks. County Council in the Police and Highways Depts. Seeking election to Parish and District Councils in May.

MOLLY HILL: I have been a District Councillor since 1973, serving on the Finance, Development and Policies Committees. I am standing for re-election as an independent so as to serve all electors. Please support me at the election.

FIELD FOOTPATH No. 6

Unfortunately, Harbury doesn't possess a woodland path of any kind, and as the time for primroses, bluebells and the evening chorus approaches, it is necessary to wander a little further afield to savour these countryside delights. Although the path doesn't actually pass through a wood, the SMI9 shown does take the walker along the fringes of Ufton Wood.

Go down to the main Southam-Leamington road, and move towards Bascote. There is a long gate-stile where the woods impinge on the verge and after climbing over this, the very walkable footpath follows the woodside hedge almost to Ufton. On reaching the clap-gate behind the Rectory, bear left-handed across the diagonal of the long pasture field until the 'donkeypaddock' is reached. After crossing this small enclosure, the stile brings one out into Ufton village, hard by the village stocks!, and opposite the Garage. A short left-handed diversion finds the entrance to a further path which skirts the allotments and then traverses the public part of the Nature Reserve until it emerges on to the back road to Ufton.

From this point, there are three possible routes back home. The first is SM26 which starts 200yds. to the right; a second possibility is to use the road all the way; and the third is to enter SM27 just before Flax Hill is reached. Both SM26 and SM27 emerge on to the 3-arch bridge off Hall Lane.

This is an extremely pleasant and popular walk in early Spring, and well worth the effort of organising oneself. The fields are mainly arable but there is often livestock at either side, and so may I repeat the request to keep dogs on the lead and honour the Country Code, particularly as far as wild flowers are concerned.

JOHN BARNES



John Barnes and his wife Eileen have lived in Harbury for 23 years, first in the Beeches, where their house was among the first to be built in the village after the war, and, since 1961, in their present beautiful home, Church House. Mr. Barnes was trained in Fine Art at the Birmingham College of Art, and his work as a design consultant leads him into many spheres, including

telephone, weighing machine and sanitaryware design. He is a Fellow of the Society of Industrial Artists and Designers, an assessor of industrial design for Polytechnics, and has won 2 Design Council awards for his work.

Soon after they came to the village, a campaign to introduce mains water led to the setting up of the Ratepayers' and Residents' Association, of which Mr. Barnes was Deputy Chairman. He was also Chairman for a time of the local Conservative Branch, and his wife was its Secretary for 13 years. One of his main interests has been the local British Legion Branch, and he has organised the Poppy Day collection in the Harbury district since 1961. In their early days, the village had a population of less than 1,000, and social events took place in the W.I. hut in Crown Street. At that time, the Recreation Ground was just a small area with a few swings, and the Childyke Cottages, erected in Mill Lane for the men working on the railway cutting, were still occupied.

Mr. and Mrs. Barnes have 2 children, Peter, who is a Registrar at University College Hospital, London, and Suzanne who, having gained her B.Sc. in Biology, is now training to be a teacher.

Mr. Barnes, with his artistic training and love of beautiful things (as evidenced by his fascinating collection of objets d'art, some of which can be seen in our photograph), is not entirely happy with the haphazard way Harbury has grown, and feels that better overall planning could have resulted in a much more attractive village. However, he and his wife are pleased with the way the social life of the village has grown over the last 10 years, and Mr. Barnes looks forward to living in Harbury and pursuing his hobby of gardening here for many years to come. 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
