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

THE VICAR'S LETTER

My dear friends,

Our Harvest Thanksgiving this year will be on 25th September, and in the meantime we are praying that all may be safely gathered in, despite the recent storms. Gifts for decorating the Church will be welcomed, and also help in decorating it on Saturday 24th September, though I must mention that there will be a wedding on that day at 2 p.m. Children will have the opportunity of bringing up and presenting gifts during the Offertory at the 10 a.m. Service.

Our Harvest Supper will be on the following Saturday, lst October, in the Village Hall at 7.30 p.m., when we look forward to welcoming as guests the Rev. Peter Buckler, the Bishop's Chaplain at the National Agricultural Centre, and Mrs. Buckler.

I suggest that we observe the following Sunday, 2nd October, as our Dedication Festival. When the date of consecration of a Church is unknown (as presumably ours is) an Order in Convocation of the year 1536 lays it down that the Dedication Festival should be observed on the first Sunday in October. Previously we have not observed a Dedication Festival, although we have sometimes thought about the subject of dedication on our Patronal Festival, All Saints' Day. Really, however, the two festivals are quite separate, and distinct. So we shall observe our Patronal Festival on 1st November (All Saints' Day) and the following Sunday, but our Dedication Festival on the first Sunday in October.

It is hoped that the Bishop will be coming to administer Confirmation on Sunday, 5th February 1978. Although the classes will not be starting just yet, I would be pleased to receive the names of any young people - or older people -

who would like to consider it.

The death of Mrs. Ceney is a great loss, not only to her own relatives but to many other people in the village. The large congregation at the funeral service in Church was an indication of the respect and affection in which she was held. We also mourn the loss of Mrs. Mary Ann Elizabeth Card, who died at a great age and whose funeral was at Combroke. May God grant to the departed an increase of light, peace and refreshment in His nearer Presence, and to those who are bereaved His Comfort and Guidance.



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
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Marm (one of the leaders). The other group built a corracle, which never made its maiden voyage. The next day we struck camp and came home.

PARISH COUNCIL

The meeting on 25th August began with a Secret Session, and then an Open Meeting with five members of the public and all councillors present except District Cllr. Drinkwater, who sent a report that the collection of rates at Stratford had improved. Final notices and summonses were being sent out sooner, and so it was hoped to reach the District Auditor's target of a reduction in the arrears to £900,000 this year. The PC was not satisfied and asked for details of the total rateable value of the District and the proportion of this which is in arrears, for as Cllr. Wright pointed out, £900,000 represented a loss of £9,000 a month in interest.

The Parish Council plans to display details of the proposed definitive map of footpaths when the Footpath Assoc. has vetted them. Mrs. Ridgley's plea that the PC request SDC designate Conservation Areas to protect the village from unsympathetic development and the demolition of old buildings was supported by Cllr. Wright, and will be discussed next month. She agreed to ask the Harbury Society to supply details of buildings in need of protection. Replying to Cllr. Mrs. Hancock the Chairman announced that the old Fox Inn would eventually be totally demolished and the footpath widened.

It was agreed not to object to the Coal Board's request to make exploratory borings near the Fossein Harbury Parish. Mrs. Catterall requested a layby for the Deppers telephone kiosk. A new quote of £150 for tennis court maintenance was accepted with relief, and Vice-Chairman Hancock urged the PC to consider the safety of play equipment.

Concerning the Deppers Bridge Playing Fields, Mrs. Catterall, emboldened by the support of Mr. Garman from Deppers, asked the PC to pay £400 for the replacement of Deppers' broken mower. Intense discussion followed, with

Cllrs. Wright and Atkins insisting that Harbury PC had a duty to Deppers and that Deppers Playing Field should be considered as an extension of Harbury's. Both Cllrs. Wright and Ellis regretted that the PC was unable to afford a replacement this year as it had not been budgetted for, and Cllr. Wilkins emphasised the folly of allowing anyone else the use of the village mower. It was agreed to make temporary arrangements for grass cutting in Deppers for the remainder of the season and to consider the matter during the winter.

Two petitions were submitted to the PC at this meeting, the first from Deppers, urging the PC to alleviate the nuisance caused by OUR sewage which plagues THEM with noxious smells, hoards of flies and noisome sludge tankers, and the

PC readily agreed to take action.

In the second one, Mr. Brant and 60 others petitioned the PC to refuse Harbury Rugby Club permission to build two store-rooms at the Village Hall, one objection being that it would spoil the look of the rear of the hall. The petition included a list of complaints and allegations against the Rugby Club, for example it was said that the new improved shower and changing facilities were not to the liking of other Village Hall users, who for years had themselves had plans for improvements to the shower block. Cllr. Wright declared himself astonished at the tone of the petition and the Chairman pointed out that, as the PC had no request from the Village Hall committee for such an extension it could not comment on the matter. Cllr. Ellis promised that if and when such a request was received it would be given careful consideration. Mr. Brant said that he had not sent a copy of the petition to the Village Hall Committee.

The next meeting was fixed for Thursday, 22nd September, at 7.30 in the Village Hall.

PETITION AGAINST VILLAGE HALL/RUGBY CLUB EXTENSION

Harbury News set out to find out more about this question, as mentioned in the Parish Council report. A petition signed by more than 60 people was presented by Mr. W.B. Brant to the PC, which stated that the signatories were 'opposed to any further intrusion by the Harbury Rugby Football Club into village life, and were opposed to the Rugby Club extending

the Village Hall to store beer etc. for their bar'.

Gerry Birkbeck, secretary of the RFC, tells us that at present they store their bar supplies at someone's home. They have proposed to the Village Hall Committee that they extend the Village Hall by squaring off the eastern corner to provide two storage rooms, one for their own use (field equipment and bar) and the other for use by the Village Hall organisations. They propose to do all the building at their own cost, and are currently drawing up plans to put to the Village Hall Committee at its meeting on 6th September. At its last meeting, the Village Hall Committee did not raise any objection to the principle of the extension.

The petition signatories do feel that the seeming monopoly of the two rooms used by the RFC on a Wednesday and Saturday for their bar does restrict the rooms available at the hall for other meetings, and make life difficult for people using the

rest of the Hall on either of these days.

The Parish Council is unable to comment as no approach has been made to them by the Village Hall Committee as yet.

The Rugby Football Club have offered help to the Church Council in running the Annual Bonfire Party on 5th November.

SEPTEMBER VEGETABLE GARDEN

As I write this the rain is pouring down outside and mid-August resembles November; however, maybe we can look forward to an Indian Summer of suitable gardening weather

in September.

This month sow winter lettuce, winter spinach and turnips for turnip tops. A sowing of lettuce, endive, radish and mustard & cress can be made in an unheated frame. Plant out cabbages for spring cutting from August sowings. Thin turnips for storage, also thin overwintering onions sown last month. Bend down the tops of later spring sown onions and treat as suggested for August. Continue to protect cauliflower curds as they develop. Lift maincrop carrots and beetroot and cover in sand for storage in a frost-free place. Pull up tomato plants at the end of the month, remove any green fruits and, after wrapping them in paper, transfer them to a suitable place for ripening.

Trim the largest leaves off parsley plants in order to

encourage a fresh crop of young leaves for the winter. Hoe between all vegetable crops to keep the weed population down. Watch for cabbage caterpillars and celery leaf maggot, and

control as appropriate.

Cut off the tops of potatoes if infected with disease and continue to lift the roots as required. Towards the end of the month lift potatoes for storage; check that they are free of slugs and store in paper or hessian sacks in a cool, dry, dark, frost-free place. Continue planting out new strawberry beds if not completed in August.

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
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
