THE VICAR'S LETTER My dear friends, The first Sunday in February will see the Confirmation and First Communion of thirteen of our young people at 10a.m. I

hope that there will be a big congregation to encourage them and welcome them as communicants. Afterwards there will be refreshments in the Village Hall, and an opportunity to meet Bishop McKie socially once again. There will be no 11.15a.m. Service on this Sunday.

The following Wednesday (Feb. 8th) will be Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent. Holy Communion will be celebrated at both 7.30a.m. and 7.30p.m. On all the Wednesdays of Lent there will be a Eucharist at 7.30p.m. which, I hope, will meet the needs of a number of people for an additional Lenten service. On all the other weekdays, of course, the Eucharist is at 7.30a.m., except on Thursdays when it is at 9.45a.m.

The "Children's Special" will be in Church on the Thursdays of Lent at 6.30p.m. beginning on February 9th.

I would like to draw your attention to the A.C.S. boxes which are now on the table inside Church. If you take one for Lent, please write your name and address on the paper provided and return the box to Mrs. Anne Moore, 23 Mill Street, at Easter. Mrs. Moore has now taken over the post of our parish secretary for A.C.S. (Additional Curates Society), and we are fortunate in having Canon Churchill, who is Diocesan Secretary, living in the parish. A.C.S. is a Home Mission, and England is now a missionary field. One thing it does is, by means of grants, to enable populous parishes to have additional assistant curates which they could not otherwise afford, and another is to foster vocations to the Ministry. On the Church door, for example, you can see a notice about a 'Conference on Christian Vocation and Priesthood', for young men aged 15 to 21, from 31st March to 2nd April, at S. Stephen's House, Oxford, organised and subsidised by A.C.S. (further particulars from the parish clergy). We are this year keeping 16th April as an A.C.S. Sunday.

We mourn the passing of Mr. Frank Walton, who for so many years was the standard bearer of the local branch of the Royal British Legion.

The tragic death of Mr. Thomas Holder was a shock to the village. He was a good friend to many, and was particularly active in the Senior Citizens' Benefit Association.

Mr. Taylor, who was living in Warwick, was the father of Mrs. Boardman of Western House, and had reached a remarkable age.

Miss Cleaver, who went to Cumbria $2\frac{1}{2}$ years ago, had lived most of her life in Harbury, and had done a tremendous amount for the Church and the village. She had been our PCC Secretary and a Sidesman, and President of the W.I. A skilled woodworker, she made and gave several articles now in the Church, i ncluding the bookcase for the prayer books and hymn books.

May God grant to them an increase of refreshment, light and peace in His nearer Presence, and to those who are bereaved His comfort and guidance.

From the Churchwardens

Having run a creche on Sunday mornings for three months, it has been decided that there has not been sufficient use made of it to justify continuing this service. However, should further demand arise later, consideration will be given to resuming the creche. We would emphasise that parents are very welcome to bring small children and babies to the 10a.m. (or indeed any other) Service, and we are greatly encouraged that a number of parents regularly do this. From Sunday, we shall be serving coffee in Church after the 12th Feb. 10a.m. service, and hope many will stay for refreshment and a chat. Coffee will not generally be served on the first Sunday in the month, when we have a family service at 11.15. However, there will be no family service on 5th February, the day of the Confirmation (when coffee will be in Village Hall), or on 5th March, when we shall have a Mothering Sunday Family Communion at 10a.m., which will be followed by coffee.

The Church Annual Vestry and Annual Parochial Meeting will take place on Tuesday, 18th April. There will be more details of this in the next issue, but please make a note of the date now. The electoral roll is being revised this year, and all those on the electoral roll already and those wishing to be placed on the roll will have to complete a form. Copies of the form are on the table in Church. One of the items in the report on the previous year's activities will be the encouraging news that the number of communicants increased by 32% last year over the previous year, and was in fact the highest for very many years.

The first meeting of the prayer group proved a stimulating and valuable time of quiet meditation and intercession, and it is hoped that many more of our congregation will share in the next meeting on 6th February. Items for prayer will be welcomed and should be entered in the book in Church or handed to Sara Bennett.

Ladbroke C.E. School

I regret to have to say that the Secretary of State for Education and Science has accepted the scheme put forward by the County last May, and this involves the closure of Ladbroke and Ufton Schools. The Managers had put in an objection, but the Secretary of State has not accepted it. There is nothing more the Managers can do. The scheme put forward by the County involves the building of a new one-form entry Church of England Aided School at Southam for pupils aged 5 to 8. If children in that age group went there they would, I think, get transport provided. The children between 8 and 12 would go to the Southam Middle School or, possibly, to the Harbury Combined School.

Some time before the Ladbroke School closes in July 1979, the County Authorities will consult parents as to the schools to which they wish their children to go. They will only provide transport for children under 8, and only to the school chosen by the majority of parents. I propose to summon a parents' meeting later in the term and to ask the Area Education Officer to attend to answer any questions. Meanwhile, please accept the above explanations as mine and not official from Warwick; though they are the result of past experience of what happens when schools are closed.

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

JANUARY PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

This month Wagstaffe Close, en mass, went to the PC meeting and was impressed. (The seats are very hard.) Cunningly, their item was placed last so they saw deliberations on: <u>Conservation areas</u> - Final report in production. <u>Skateboarding</u>no money for a run, though Denis Howell said it's here to stay., "look at his effect on the drought"(Cllr. Hancock). Fun Fairs an amenity for the young, PC inform Mrs. Keir who complained of 'noise pollution'. They must balance all interests and the June Fair is not yet confirmed.

Electoral Procedure changes incensed Cllr. Ellis. Electing one District Cllr. every year, instead of all three every three years, wasted money. Cllr. Wright proposed discussing changes at the Area PCs Meeting. <u>District Auditor suggested</u> reviewing Burial Charges but Sub-Cttee opposed this. Doubling charges raised little extra income, said Cllr. Hancock, and Cllr. Wilkins argued OAPs would be worst hit.

Vacancy for Cemetry and Greenkeeper is to be 'more aggressively advertised', possibly as 3 separate posts now the PC has examined the tasks. 'The previous standard will probably have to be reduced.' <u>PC nightmare - developers renaging on street</u> light provision - after three reminders the Butt Lane developer indicated he'd only provide two of the seven lamps. A site meeting and legal advice is sought, but as Cllr. Atkins said, 'What can you do - we are faced with a man who uses a Duplicate Book for his letters.'

Upgrading lighting in Farm Street and Deppers is cheaper than adding lamps, and Cllr. Atkins is arranging sample improvement. The PC provides Footway, not Road lighting, though estates are so good the rest seems poor, and Cllr. Hancock wondered if poor lighting contributed to the Mill St. fatality. Wagstaffe Close's petition argued closing the Mill St. entrance of the school to children, and opening a gate in Wagstaffe Cl., merely transferred the danger for residents and users alike, for the Close was long and narrow with only one footpath. The PC was sensible of the dangers. Cllr. Ellis thought absurd the Education Dept. belief that parents won't drive down the Close, when repeated requests from Mr. Oliver failed to prevent motorists using Back Lane. The Chairman said they ignored the advice of the School Managers who foresaw the dangers when the school was built. Cllr. Wright suggested the problem wouldn't be solved until a new vehicular access and car park was created off Park Lane. He proposed a site meeting at 8.45a.m. on a wet morning when Education Officials might more fully appreciate the problem. Next meeting, Thurs. 23rd Feb. at 7.30 in the Village Hall. Annual Parish Meeting, April 13th in the Village Hall. LINDA RIDGLEY.

IN THE GARDEN

Having had two difficult seasons for gardening, I think we should look forward to a better year in 1978. Stop and think; what did I do wrong and also what did I do right.

If you have a greenhouse or cold frame, then you should

wash down all the glass and woodwork with Jeyes Fluid, and also treat the soil with Jeyes Fluid, but only at the strength given in the instructions.

For early rhubarb, cover with an old dustbin or wooden box, as this is one of the earliest fruits.

Broad beans can be planted at the end of the month, weather permitting, and also shallots.

Do not plant when the ground is wet. Raspberry canes should be tied up to prevent wind damage, and roses should be cut down to at least within a foot of the ground.

Spring cabbage require a sprinkling of fertilizer around the plants either Sulphate of Ammonia or Growmore. To produce early potatoes (Pentland Javelin or Arron Pilot) place same in a seed box either in peat or compost and they will form roots and can be transplanted at a later date.

Inspect your dahlia tubers. Purchase onion sets to plant out in March.

If you find you have backache or stiffness after gardening, then relax in a hot bath. W.F.LINES.

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


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
