THE VICAR'S LETTER

My dear friends,

Easter Day was a bright and happy time, with big congregations, a beautifully decorated Church, and an increase over previous Easters in the number of Communicants. I would like to take this opportunity of thanking you for your very generous Easter offerings.

On Sunday evening, 6th May, members of the congregation of Coventry Cathedral will be visiting us, and attending our Evensong at 6.30 p.m. I hope that a good number of you will come to welcome them once more.

On the following Sunday, 13th May, at 6.30 p.m., we shall be having a 'Songs of Praise' service, to which the Windmill Singers (numbering about 40) will be coming, in addition to our Church Choir. Nearly all of the hymns will be well-known ones for the whole congregation to sing, though our own Church Choir will be singing one special one on their own. The office of Evensong will be said on this day at 4 p.m.

Sunday, 27th May, we shall be keeping as our 'Additional Curates' Society Sunday'. We are fortunate in having the Diocesan Secretary of this Society, Canon Churchill, living in this Parish, and he will be preaching for ACS at our 10a. m. Parish Eucharist. As, however, he is at present engaged in helping parishes which are without a parish priest, he will not be able to be with us until nearly the end of the service, so on this Sunday morning the sermon will be at the end of the service instead of immediately after the Gospel.

I would also like to draw your attention to the ACS May Festival which will take the form of a Solemn Eucharist (with a sermon by the Bishop of Aston) in St. John the Baptist's Church, Coventry, at 7.30 p.m. on Wednesday, 9th May. It will be followed by a Cheese and Wine Party for which tickets (60p) may be obtained from Mrs. Anne Moore, Canon Churchill or myself.

Ascension Day (Thursday, 24th May) is of course a Holy Day of Obligation, and there will be three celebrations of the Holy Eucharist, at 7 a.m., 10.15 a.m., and 7.30 p.m. (Sung with Procession). The evening one will, we hope, be followed by a Social and Supper in the Crown Inn, as it was last year.

June 3rd will be Pentecost, or Whit Sunday, when we shall have the Family Eucharist at 9 a.m., followed by the Parish Breakfast in the Village Hall.

May I ask your prayers for the young man whom I hope to present for Confirmation at the Confirmation Service by Bishop McKie in Cubbington Church on Thursday, 10th May, at 7.30 p.m.?

From the Churchwardens

By the time you read this, we shall have had our Annual Church Vestry (at which the current Churchwardens may or may not have been re-elected), and our Annual Church Meeting. The past year has seen a steady growth in the number of communicants, and the fellowship of having coffee together after the 10 o'clock service has become an established and appreciated part of Church life.

We look forward to welcoming members of the Cathedral congregation to Evensong on 6th May. During the summer months a small group of them visit village churches, and share in their worship. We have enjoyed meeting them in past years, and hope they enjoy their visits to us. We are, in this parish, great believers in eating together as well as worshipping together! Two opportunities for doing both are rapidly approaching. On Ascension Day, 24th May, we celebrate the fact that our Lord is risen, ascended and glorified, with an evening Eucharist, followed by a Social gathering at the Crown. On Whitsunday, 3rd June, we have our 9 o'clock Eucharist, at which members of both the 8 a.m. and 10 a.m. congregations join in fellowship at the service, and at breakfast in the Village Hall afterwards. Every parish needs a strong core of prayer and Bible study,

and we are indeed fortunate in having daily worship in Church and monthly gatherings for Bible study and prayer, and we would warmly invite others to join us. The dates are in the diary, and don't feel that because the groups meet in private houses you should wait for an invitation. This is your invitation. Please do come.

NO JUMBLE PLEASE! A 'FIFTY-FIFTY' AUCTION If All Saints' Church - your Parish Church - hadn't held three fund-raising events last year which together raised nearly £800, then it would have been in a very serious position indeed. Costs are rising all the time; light and heat alone will be up by an estimated one-third this year.

So, as an unusual money-raiser this year, the Church is holding a 'Fifty-Fifty Auction', to help meet its ever-increasing bills. And you can help - you may benefit in cash - you may get a 'bargain' - whether you are a Church member or not. The idea is simple. Throughout the month of June, you can bring items for auction to collection points around the village. After viewing through the morning, we shall auction the goods in the village hall on the afternoon of Saturday, 30th June, starting at 2.30 p.m. An experienced, professional auctioneer will be giving his services, to ensure that we get a fair price for your 'lots'. And that price will be split fifty-fifty between you, the vendor, and the Church funds. Of course, with really valuable items you could put a reserve price on your lot if you really wanted to; and you could simply donate an item to be auctioned entirely for Church funds if you chose.

And what do we want for auction? Antiques, books, bric-abrac, china, glass, domestic and household goods, pots and pans, linen and bedding, small items of furniture, unwanted presents, and 'nearly-new' goods of all kinds. Anything, in fact, that is in good condition, that you have no use for, and that will fetch a reasonable price. No clothes, please, or items of very small value - and NO JUMBLE! Why clutter your house and garage when you could realise 'hard cash' for unwanted items?

The Auction itself will be a lively and enjoyable afternoon, of course. Come along and try your hand at bidding, or relax with a cup of tea while others try to get the better of our lively auctioneer. You might get 'just the thing!' All sales must be cash, though - no cheques please. So raid your bank account and come along on Saturday, 30th June.

Annual Vestry & Parochial General Meeting

This was held on 2nd April in Ladbroke School. There was a splendid turn-out, more that two dozen being present. Messrs. Hedge and Rutherford were re-elected Churchwardens, and Canon Fishley, from the chair, expressed real gratitude to both for their fine help during the year. This concluded the Annual Vestry.

Miss Junod, secretary, read the minutes of the 1978 General Meeting, which were approved. Elected to the Deanery Synod for a five-year term of office, were Mrs. Betty Winkfield, Miss Margaret Banfield and Mr. David Rutherford. There followed the election of the Parochial Church Council - of these ex officio are the two wardens and the three Deanery Synod members. The following 14 were elected: Messrs. Badman, Chapple, Comfort, Griffin, Hudson, Parker, Reeves; and M/s. June Barnett, Flower, Frost, Hedge, Junod, Morgan, Jeanette Teverson. Sidesmen, or sidespersons! -Mrs. J. Barnett and Mrs. Winkfield, Messrs. Darkes, Parker, Hudson and Reeves.

Mrs. Flower, Electoral Roll Officer, stated there were 160 members on the electoral roll. 'The Rector' hoped that members would give support to the Church by attendance and other means. Miss Junod read the Annual Report on the proceedings of the PCC. There had been five meetings. Canon Fishley continued giving us pastoral care as Priest in Charge, and we mourned the passing of his beloved wife, Enid. Permission had been granted for the nave of the Church to be used for meetings as the school was closing. Diocesan Diamond Jubilee was celebrated. Minor Church maintenance was undertaken, and very recently the boiler had to be replaced at a cost of £800. Appreciation of Mrs. Pam Barnett and her family for the care of the Churchyard. Napton PCC kindly gave us choir gowns on permanentloan. With Garry Lawson away at university, a number of organists have given wonderful support for the services throughout the year. Our secretary was praised for her concise report. Discussion ranged on how to tackle the upkeep of the Churchyard this year. A suggestion of dividing the area into four, with different people responsible. Someone is needed to master-mind this, and please, please, all offers of help, however brief, are needed - contact The Rector or Wardens for this. Mr. Hudson stated that he would always loan a mowing machine if required. Miss Junod can be contacted too. Mr. John Comfort presented the annual report of the financial affairs of the parish. Mr. Tim Shaw kindly audited the accounts. Monies from Mrs. Summerton's legacy and two years' income from the Alibone Trust helped the budget, but income from covenants was less, especially so by the loss of Sir David Watherson's substantial one. Comment on the

accuracy of the Harvest Supper Budget was made, and Mr. Comfort was thanked for a fine report.

Sadly, a large brass alms dish was taken from the Church discovered when Miss Hensman and Miss Conlon were doing the brass cleaning. Our superb Duchess Dudley Plate remains in safe keeping at Warwick Museum, except on special occasions when it is put on the altar.

Those organising the flower and cleaning rotas were commended, as were all those who took part in these jobs.

Canon Fishley wished to thank the congregation in general, and those who attended this meeting, for their support. Attendance at the 8.30a.m. Communion had increased and maintained, averaging upper half of teens to 20. Evensong had not maintained well. Mrs. Davies deserved a special mention for her support at the organ.

It was stated at the meeting how much the Rector's presence was appreciated so regularly. Despite the bad weather, he came from Kenilworth to tend so carefully to our needs. PSF.

Village Hall Meeting

A good number attended this lively meeting. Mr. Badman was in the chair, and after a discussion on the tangible assets of the village hall, it was decided to go ahead and form a committee. Chairman, Mr. P. Williamson. Secretary, Mrs. I. Bennett. Treasurer, Mr. M. Tanner. Committee members, Mrs. Mary Fell, Mr. R. Griffin and Mr. G. Tagg. A newsheet and progress report would be delivered with the Banbury Cake.

The splendid clearing of the village hall the previous Saturday left the way clear for a structural estimate of repairs (Mr. Hedge offered to deal with this), and the costing of electrical work (Mr. Griffin will see to this). Mr. Hart and Mr. Faulkner generously offered to undertake the re-wiring work. It was decided to generate a work list with villagers offering their skills. Mrs. Flower suggested there be a signed list of persons present and this was done and will be kept with the records. Mr. Rutherford suggested opening a subscription list to promise to donate money should the village hall succeed. (Already the window repairs are in hand). A catalogue of existing items of equipment belonging to the hall is to be drawn up. Portable heaters will have to be bought for the hall's early use. Mr. Ken Hayward kindly offered to help with ground clearing and tree felling, and suggested a sewer could be installed by the thrust-bore system so the busy A423 would not be disrupted. Hopefully an early by-pass here would solve many problems. The Jumble Sale to raise funds will be held at 10.30 a.m. at Southam Youth Centre (behind the Co-op), and Dorothy Wright and Mary Fell are organising this. PSF.

Ladbroke Parish Council Meeting, March

All councillors were present, and the following points made: Planning Courtesy Letters - a letter from Mr. Standing, Chief Planning Officer, Stratford DC, stated that courtesyletters to near neighbours affected by planning applications would stop on 1st April, 1979. This decision was made by the full council in spite of the unanimous request by the Southam area of Parish Councillors for them to continue. Ladbroke Parish Council deplored the action taken, and have stated that they will personally inform near-neighbours in any local applications. Enforcement Appeal - Poultry Farm. Mr. Trevor Cox, District Solicitor, Stratford RDC, wrote apologising for the delay in replying to their letter, and stating that a new asst. solicitor, Mr. Anderson, had been appointed and would be contacting them in due course.

Rates - the new rate notice is on the notice board. By-Pass - The Clerk to the Council has been requested to write to the Dept. of Transport, asking if it would be possible to hold the Public Enquiry that is statutorily necessary in conjunction with the Annual Parish Meeting on Wednesday, 30th May at 8 p.m.

Parish Council - voting for councillors will take place on 24th May. Anyone wishing to stand for Ladbroke Parish Council may obtain the necessary documents from Mrs. Williamson. 
"THE WIZARDOF OZ"

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
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

All the performers deserve full credit, and especially when you realise how little rehearsal time and space is available, and how polished the production was. Tony Knight is an actor who beguiles his audience into enjoying it all as much as he does, and is effortlessly good. Annette Hughes was a perfect Mrs. Hardcastle, and brought credit to the costume and wig designers who triumphed with her outfit! Steve Checkley's landlord was a cameo I wished had been alonger part, and those with the long and taxing parts - Rev. Mackley, Isobel Russell, Diana Holt, Jim Haines and Keith Hayes - all contributed equally to the audience's enjoyment.

Each of the backstage people were talanted and inventive in their contributions, and Peter Holt's sound effects are establishing a reputation he'll find it hard to live up to! MOTHERS' UNION

The speaker at the March meeting was Mrs. Kate Rogers, a retired district nurse, who gave a very interesting talk on her career spanning 43 years - 29 of which were spent in Coventry. She gave a brief resume of her training period, which covered all aspects of nursing from fever training through to general nursing & midwifery - based in Liverpool, Derby, London, Birmingham and Worcester, before settling as a district nurse in Kenilworth during the biltz, when the regular form of transport for a district nurse was a bicycle.

At that time people were required to pay 2d. a week as a contribution which then entitled them to call on the services of the district nurse. All this changed in 1948 when district nursing was taken under the control of the National Health Service, but continued to provide an invaluable service to the community, visiting the elderly and infirm, and reporting back to the doctor.

Mrs. Rogers feels that, with re-organisation in 1974, much of the personal contact between doctor, nurse and patient was lost. However, there are still many of these wonderful, cheery ladies carrying on their work making the lives of the housebound a little less lonely, whilst attending to their medical needs - and always watching for any changes of condition of which the doctor should be informed.

Another point Mrs. Rogers stressed was that there are many 'back-up' services available to patients and their relatives. For instance, if a bed is not entirely suitable, a more comfortable one can often be obtained from the Dept. of Health and Social Security, but doctors and nurses are not thought-readers, so people must not be afraid to ask for help of any kind. This is something everyone should feel entitled to do.

VILLAGE HALL COMMITTEE A.G.M.

The committee and officers were all re-elected. In her report the Chairman, Midge Keen, thanked Mrs. Carter and Mrs. Sollis for running the profitable Bingo sessions, and also Sue Andrews (secretary), Ken Clarke (treasurer) and Peter Shawcross (retiring bookings secretary) for all they had done for the Hall over the years. She welcomed Mr. Andrews, the new bookings secretary.

As always, costs were rising, and revenue will decrease when the Rugby Club leaves. Some re-decoration had been completed, and the remainder will be undertaken in 1980. It was a great disappointment that the building of the storage area could not go ahead because grants had been delayed. Mrs. Sollis reminded the committee that documents relating to the early years of the Hall were still being stored in a cupboard in the kitchen, and Ken Clarke said he had discovered that the storage shed (which the committee proposed to replace with a brick-built storage area) had cost only 10/- to erect!

He said in his finance report for the year that income had risen, but so had costs, especially the Rates. The loss of the Rugby Club revenue would have to be made up, and it was vital that people used the Hall and paid for its use. (There was still a considerable sum outstanding from the Wednesday Youth Club hirings).

A complaint was received from the WI that the Youth Club members had disrupted a recent meeting. Mr. Bingham said that the children had tried to keep as quiet as possible, and that he had not felt it fair to cancel the Tuesday meeting as other meetings that week had been postponed to make way for the Theatre Group production. He appealed for more adult help with the Tuesday Youth Club.

It was agreed in principle that the Committee should produce a list of conditions, to be signed by all who booked rooms in the Hall, and that a deposit against damage might have to be paid.

PARISH COUNCIL MEETING, APRIL

Trees were a major problem this month. Local farmers complained that some of the Council's trees, planted by the Scouts, prevented them hedging and ditching properly. It was resolved to ask WCC for advice. A new twist to the tale of the Frances Road maple tree, which residents wanted removing as it blocked light from the street lamp. The PC asked for it to be lopped, but this brought no improvement, so the Lighting Committee proposed that a new lamp be erected in the cul-desac. Now Stratford DC has felled the tree, just as the new light has been fitted! The DC will re-plant, but clairn the PC asked for the tree to be felled. "We asked for it to be trimmed not ANNIHILATED! " said Dennis Atkins.

His humour will be missing from the next meeting, as he is retiring. So are Mrs. Watts, Geoff Wright, and Harold Wilkins who has served the community for <u>32 years</u>. The Parish Council elections will take place on Thursday, 24th May. There are no District Council elections. as only John Drinkwater, John Sharpe and Stuart Macauley were nominated for the <u>3</u> seats.

On Planning, the Council had no objections to the extension of 20 Pineham Avenue, or the alterations to 6, 7 and 8 Church Terrace. There was agreement with the DC's refusal for a bungalow on the site of the Childyke cottages, but surprise at that for a new access into the Dovehouse.

The Chairman agreed to approach the owner of the cars now permanently parked at the Playing Fields, and ask for their removal. Iory Davies would also ensure that the boat and building materials at present on Binswood End Green were removed. Concern was expressed at the damage contractors had inflicted on the Pound and the Pump Green.

Iory Davies reported that the School Managers and staff were anxious that class sizes be reduced. There was no sign of the predicted decrease in admissions, and the School will become 'combined' in September, with a staff of 14. French will begin to be taught then. All children who were 5 by 31st March, 1980, would be admitted in September, and those who are 5 by 31st August, 1980, in January.

The next meeting of the NEW Council is 31st May (7.30p.m. in the Village Hall). Do come along to see the new councillors at work. I shall miss this Council - it worked hard and conscientiously at what is, after all, a thankless task. I appreciated it, but I doubt that's any consolation!! LINDA RIDGLEY.

PARISH COUNCIL ELECTIONS

Following our invitation last month, of the eleven candidates who it is understood will be standing for election to the Parish Council on Thursday, 24th May, election statements have been received from 8, and these are reproduced below:

W. B. Brant (Mick). I have lived in the village for 14 years, served on the Recreation Ground and Carnival Committees, the Annual Bonfire, 'Steptoe Stall', etc. I have only the interests of the village at heart.

John Drinkwater. I should like to take this opportunity, mainly for the benefit of the many newcomers to the village, to introduce myself. For the past 20 years I have been a resident of Harbury, and for the greater part of that time I have been a member of Harbury Parish Council.

My main interest has been in the work of the Planning and Highways Sub-Committees of the Council.

Three years ago I was elected as one of your members to the Stratford on Avon District Council. During that time I have attended every meeting of the various committees on which I serve, and have liaised regularly with the Parish Council on all matters of mutual interest, and will endeavour to continue to do so in the future.

I shall be only too happy to assist in any problems concerning either the Parish or District Council.

M. J. I. Ellis. Michael John Irving Ellis, Chartered Accountant, has lived in Harbury since 1965. Married with a family of four. Joint Managing Director and Chief Executive of a small group of companies operating in Coventry and Leamington, employing 130 people, covering the automotive distributive trade, including exports.

Standing for a third term of three years as a member of the Parish Council as an independent. Private voting inclination: Conservative. Believes that as far as possible politics should not directly enter Parish Council affairs. If re-elected, will continue to pursue and try to obtain positive decisions in matters affecting the Parish. Neville Ellis. Aged 47, married with two children. I was born in Cubbington, come from a farming family, and have farmed for the last 15 years at Sharmer Farm, Fosse Way. I am interested in village life, and especially in creating a good relationship between farmers and the community in general. I am chairman of the Warwick branch of the National Farmers' Union.

Having lived on the edge of Warwick and Learnington I understand the pressures which sometimes occur between town and country dwellers. I am sure that most electors realise that access to the countryside has been granted by statute for them to enjoy the amenities, whilst on the other hand, they must appreciate that farms are a place of work. With this in mind, I offer my services to the villagers of Harbury.

Sharon Hancock. I have lived in Harbury for nine years, and have served as a Parish Councillor for the last three years. I ama doctor, working part-time in the Community Health Service. I have two children aged 9 and 8 at the village school, of which I am a Parish Council Representative Governor. If elected to serve a further term on the Council, my main objectives would be (a) to protect the rural character of the village.

(b) to continue to press for concessionary bus fares for pensioners.

(c) to encourage the recent moves to provide better facilities for the village teenagers.

Bruce Hannay. I am 30 years old, a Chartered Civil Engineer, married, with a son aged 11 months, and I have lived at 7 South Parade for the last 9 years.

I am the Honorary Treasurer of the Harbury Carnival Committee and also the Harbury Recreation Grounds Advisory Committee. I offer myself for election to the Parish Council to provide a representative from the younger section of the community. I have no political affiliations, no preconceived theories, my only aim being to represent the users of the various village amenities.

If elected I would consider primarily the views of those Harbury

residents most directly affected by eachissue, and I would hope to provide a positive and responsible contribution to Harbury Parish Council.

James L. Turner. I have had a home in Harbury for the past ten years and now I am able to spend more time here I am looking forward to being more involved in the affairs of the Parish. This is my first bid for the Parish Council. I served previously on the Northampton Borough Council where my special interests were Planning Control, Highways and Conservation Areas.

I am most concerned to ensure that Harbury preserves the character that makes it such an attractive village to live in. I think that the District and County Councils are backpedalling on adopting conservation areas outside Stratford itself because of cost; and if this is delayed much longer the inner core of Harbury could be lost. I would also like to see more concern by Stratford in providing equivalent services for the outer Parishes that provide much of their revenue.

David Winter. I was educated at Bristol Cathedral School and took a Joint Honours Degree in French and Political Institutions at Keele University. At present I am Deputy Headmaster and Head of Hall at Trinity School, Warwick, and have lived in Harbury since 1967.

As a founder member, former Chairman and present Vice-Chairman of the Harbury Society, I take an active interest in the village, especially in conservation and planning. The Parish Council is consulted by the District Council on planning and development and, if elected, I should wish to play my part in carefully considering proposals which might affect the present character of the village.

We live in a very attractive part of England, yet access to the countryside is very limited. I feel strongly that our field footpaths and bridleways should be carefully preserved. As I regularly walk these rights of way I would be able to keep the Council informed about their condition.

IN THE GARDEN

I keep getting asked what's going to happen this year, with everything so late, and my answer is in fact that it may be advantageous if people are forced to sow later. One might as well be patient, because until the soil warms up germination can't take place. Quick growth after germination is far better. The keen vegetable grower may well have young cabbage and cauliflower plants coming along under glass. Now is the time to plant these out, but be sure to put a few strands of black cotton over these to prevent the sparrows destroying them. You can now sow most vegetable seeds in the garden this month, but don't be too early with your runner beans and dwarf french beans.

Sweetcorn seed can now be started on the window sill or in the greenhouse, also melons to plant out in a cold frame later on. If you are growing tomatoes or cucumbers in Growbags, it is advisable to get them in the greenhouse so they can grad-

ually warm up ready for planting. Finish planting broad beans. Parsley is always useful - the best way to sow is to get a fine tilth on the border of your garden, sow the seed on top of the ground and cover with no more than $\frac{1}{4}$ " of fine soil. W.F. LINES.
