THE VICAR'S LETTER

My dear friends,

The month of November opens with our Patronal Festival, the first day of the month being All Saints' Day. We shall still be celebrating the Festival on the following Sunday (Nov. 4th) when the Services will be at the usual times and our special preacher at 4pm Evensong will be the Rt. Revd. J.D. McKie. I hope that a good number will come to welcome Bishop McKie and to hear his message.

The following Sunday (Nov. 11th) will be Remembrance Sunday. The official Remembrance Service will be at 10 a.m.

in Church, at the conclusion of which we shall proceed (weather permitting) to the War Memorial in Crown Street for the laying of the wreath, the reading of the names of the fallen, the sounding of the Last Post, the two minutes' silence at ll a.m. and the sounding of the Reveille. There will of course be Holy Communion as usual at 8 a.m., but the Parish Family Sung Eucharist on this Sunday will be at 4p.m. (in place of Evensong, which will be said at 5.15 p.m.).

The first Confirmation Class will be on Tuesday, November 13th at 6.30pm (except for any who find this time impossible and for them a different day or time will be arranged). I would be pleased to receive the names of any other prospective candidates as soon as possible. The Confirmation will be on

Sunday, February 17th, at 10 a.m.

The "Help the Aged" appeal will be on Tuesday, Nov.13th and Wednesday, Nov 14th. On either of these days gifts of good used clothing, blankets etc. or of money may be brought to Church at any time between 6 p.m. and 8 p.m. A leaflet about this will be sent round the village beforehand.

The last day of the month (Nov. 30th) will be the Feast of St. Andrew the Apostle, and St. Andrewstide is a time when we specially pray for, and renew our interest in, the overseas

missions of the Church.

December 2nd will be the First Sunday in Advent - the beginning of a new Church Year. We celebrate it with a 9 a.m. Family Eucharist (which on this day will replace both the 8 a.m. and the 10 a.m. Eucharists) followed by a Parish Breakfast in the Village Hall.

We mourn the loss of Mrs. Dorothy Anne Green and of Mr. Cecil Badger, and also of Mr. Bert Padbury. May God grant them rest, and may He comfort and quide those who are

bereaved.

We therefore feel that we should like to find a way of exchanging news with our link missionaries and their parish and people. There is also a need for some means of passing on information about the various overseas missions supported by the parish. The PCC has therefore decided to

invite a member of the congregation to act as Missionary Secretary in order to stimulate prayer and increase knowledge about God's work in other lands.

The Bible study and prayer group is growing and among those who regularly share in this part of the life of the church are some young people. They and other young people have expressed an interest in an informal group which would meet over coffee and/or coke to discuss the opportunities and problems of life. There will be no rigid age limits but it will be mainly for young people between the ages of 13 and 19. SOUTHAM TOWN JUNIORSPORTS CLUB

Two hundred boys and girls between 7 and 15 from the Southam Area belong to this Club, and through it are able to take part in Football, Gymnastics, Sports Hall activities and cricket. The Club has now embarked on a very ambitious project - that of developing 5 acres of land near Southam F. C. on the Banbury Road as a sports complex. The Club has already spent £2,000 on basic drainage and seeding work, and the planned pavilion and car park will cost £3,000. The next stage will be the provision of an all-weather multi-purpose sports area.

HARBURY SOCIETY M40 WALK

With other members of the Harbury Society I walked along part of one of the proposed routes for the M40. It was a section of the 'Warmington' Route from the Windmill Road to the Gated Road at Chesterton and it illustrated well the conflict of interests caused by Motorway construction. On one hand there is the motorist who wants to get from A to Bquickly, on the other the householder who does not want his property devalued and often between the two is the farmer who loses his land.

There are three possible routes for the M40, but only two in the Harbury area (two routes are amalgamated here). The Harbury Route comes closest to the village and passes within a few yards of Chesterton Windmill. For various reasons it does not appear to be the preferred route, but if it were the Windmill and the village would suffer. The 'Warmington' Route passes to the south of Chesterton village, cuts off the corner of Chesterton Wood and consumes a large acreage of good agricultural land. Some farmers will have their holdings split in two, others will merely lose land which they will find hard to replace. Footpaths will be diverted and wildlife will be disturbed.

In itself this is bad enough but many people are worried by the uncertainty of it all. No start has been made on the

BOOK REVIEW

"The Imitation of Christ" by Thomas a Kempis

Recently we have started a bookstall in our Church, and Mrs. Sara Bennett, who is in charge of it, has suggested I write an occasional book review. Most of the books she has obtained so far have been modern ones, but I have asked for a very old one - "The Imitation of Christ" - written early in the 15th Century yet astonishingly relevant to people in all ages including our own. Next to the Holy Bible itself it is, to my mind, the book of books, and for well over 500 years has been one of the most widely read books in the world. It appeals to, and is suitable for, people of both sexes and of all ages (except, of course, young children), but has perhaps a very special appeal to young men in their late teens and early twenties.

The translation on our bookstall is by Miss Betty Knott of Glasgow University and is published by Collins in Fount Paperbacks at 75p. It seems to me a very good translation, and Miss Knott's Introduction is well worth reading too.

The "Imitation" is composed of four books:

(1) "Some thoughts to help with the spiritual life" (25 chapters); (2) "Some advice on the inner life" (12 chapters); (3) "Spiritual comfort" (59 chapters); (4) "A reverent recommendation to Holy Communion" (18 chapters). It thus contains 114 short chapters. I do not recommend reading much of it at one time. Rather, read one of these short chapters - very slowly and meditatively - every day. After 114 days you will be able to start it again, and it may become one of your daily companions for life!

Let me end by giving you a short quotation from the lst chapter as a specimen: - "What good can it do you to discuss the mystery of God the Trinity in learned terms if you lack humility and so displease that God? Learned arguments do not make a man holy and righteous, whereas a good life makes him dear to God. I would rather feel compunction in my heart than be able to define it. If you knew the whole Bible off by heart and all the expositions of scholars, what good would it do you without the love and grace of God?"

I hope that Mrs. Bennett will receive many orders for further copies of this book.

MRS. HATTIE WINCH

Mrs. Winch, who died recently at the age of 65, had lived in Harbury for many years, and had given valuable service to the community in many ways. She and her husband originally lived in Learnington, and came to live in Learnington House, by the Post Office, about 25 years ago. It was when her husband died that Mrs. Winch moved to Constance Drive.

The Committee which raised funds for the building of the Village Hall was formed in 1953, and Mrs. Winch joinedit two years later. It was largely due to her efforts that the regular fund-raising dances in the Wight School were so successful, particularly the well-rememberd New Year Dances. Along with Mr. Gurden and Mr. Keeling, she was one of the original Trustees of the Village Hall, and she maintained her interest, latterly being particularly involved with the Recreation Ground Committee.

Mrs. Winch ran the Annual Flower Show for many years, and also found time to continue her main interest of poultry

keeping.

Perhaps her main achievement within the community was being the first woman ever to serve on Harbury Parish Council. She was on the Council for 6 years, from 1959 -1965, during which time her hard work and enthusiasm made her a valuable and popular member.

Her daughter Josie lives locally, and Mrs. Winch will be sadly missed by the many friends she had in Harbury.

PARISH COUNCIL OCTOBER 1979

Your Parish Councillors are slowly beginning to show themselves in shades of red and blue, as political decisions, made at national level, filter down to effect Parish matters.

Sharon Hancock reported that Capitation at Harbury School had been cut by 10%; there was an absolute ban on repairs and replacements, and the threat of staff cuts next year. This last was particularly hard because the PTA might make good the money cuts and do repairs, butit could not replace teachers! As a newly established Middle School, Harbury's specialist staffing was barely adequate and now even this is endangered.

David Winter warned that the County intended to charge parents for school transport at possibly £50 per year per child,

but Mrs. Catterall thought parents could easily afford this out of their Family Allowance.

Reporting on the Area Meeting of the Parish Councils, Cllr Winter said that the District Council had rejected accusations of unfair distribution of expenditure on amenities (much of the revenue maintains STRATFORD parks). Spending cuts in all services were, he said, now certain. He was able to give the PC some joy when announcing the acceptance, by the County PC's Association of Harbury's motion requiring developers to provide street lighting. This now goes on to the National Association.

The Councillors were thankful that Stratford DC had rejected the planned development at Honiwell Close/Farm Street as being contrary to the Structure Plan, of unsatisfactory design, and injurious to the general appearance of Farm Street. There was concern that road repairs in Farm Street were not completed and that the carriageway on Sutcliffe Pastures would not be disturbed when meters etc. were removed in October 1980 when the central oil distribution was discontinued. Several Clirs voiced complaints about parked cars, in Binswood End, Church Street and outside the Old New Inn.

Bruce Hannay reported that the Playing Fields Committee had seeded round the cricket strip and would cut the hedges. Plans were completed for the young children's play area. He told the PC that the Tennis Courts needed repair, and requested that it contributed $\frac{1}{3}$ of the cost of the Play equipment for Deppers Recreation Ground.

Mrs. Catterall relayed fears that children using Deppers Playing Field were in danger of being injured by cars speeding through the settlement and the Cllrs sympathised with

her and promised to attempt to alleviate the problem.

Mrs. Catterall also complained that the footpath between Deppers and Bishops had been ploughed up. David Winter had a long list of repairs needed - to stiles, to sign-posts and to bridges on footpaths throughout the Parish and it was agreed to plot these on a map and send it to the County Council for attention. Cllr Winter declared that SM62a was still impassable, but Ray Carter said it had been walked. Next meeting, 29th Nov., 7.30pm, Farley Room, Village Hall.

IN THE GARDEN

Now that autumn has arrived, we must expect weather and working conditions to deteriorate quite rapidly.

It is important that all fruits and vegetables in store should be inspected periodically during the winter months. You can still plant Broad Beans and Peas in a sheltered place if at a later date be prepared to cover same with cloches.

Choose a day when foliage is dry to remove decaying leaves from winter greens, a free circulation of air between

the plants is then assured.

Dig whenever you can if the soil is fit to work.

Dig in farmyard manure or compost where next year's Peas and Beans, Onions and Leeks, Celery and Spinach are to grow.

Lift and store your remaining carrots and beetroot.

CORRESPONDENCE

Dear Editors,

I have kept silent until now in the interests of village harmony and self-preservation, but an item in the October Harbury News mentioning these low-flying aircraft has persuaded me to wade in! Researching old H/News copies, I see these planes were first mentioned in a Harbury Society report in April this year, when the address of the Ministry of Defence was given for individual complaints to be sent. This was followed in the May issue by a letter from J.A. Chapple pointing out that the R.A.F. were hardly an unnecessary luxury and we should be proud to support them. In July the Parish Council Meeting reports that the Air Ministry reply on low-flying aircraft was "absurd" because it stated planes would not "fly lower than the regulations required". In October, from the P.C., we read that the "Nuisance"... "has not abated" and that "they now come in pairs".

Individual complaints are one thing, but on what basis did the P.C. object? Who, apart from the Harbury Society, did they ask? What did their letter say? The Ministry reply may be disappointing to them, but not absurd as it states that safety and noise regulations will be upheld so we've no reason to be anxious or suspicious. Flying in pairs wouldn't seem too ludicrous since planes don't always operate by themselves and if they'd never flown in pairs could conceivably bang into

each other during"the real thing". Can you imagine in an emergency the R.A.F. saying their pilots couldn't fly below enemy radar or more than one at a time because we didn't like them practising?

Unless we feel the R.A.F. should be disbanded, we accept that the pilots have to learn to fly things, to practise and do it over and over again in all conditions, if they're to be effective when needed. So, what makes us so special in Harbury that we have not just country air, no pollution, slums, crowds, factories etc., but we should also object to noise from our own planes, thereby insisting the poor town and city folk should suffer them on top of everything else?

I find it really disturbing that our united approach in letters to Ministries etc. should present us as an insular, selfish lot who have most of life's good things and cannot tolerate what amount to a minor irritation - a small disturbance of our abundant peace and quiet. To doubt the need for low-flying is arrogant since nobody's going to take millions of pounds worth of equipment out for a joy-ride, and if the R.A.F. consider it essential, surely they know more about it than we do?

I don't object to the planes, neither does J.A. Chapple. The Parish Council says that Harbury does. Do you...really? VICTORIA MACGOWAN.




