THE VICAR'S LETTER

My dear friends,

Quite a number of people have recently remarked on the large and increasing congregation which we now have at the 10 o'clock Sung Eucharist on Sunday mornings, - a congregation of all ages from toddlers and even babes in arms to the elderly. This is as it should be, and is something for which to be profoundly grateful. Let us hope that still more will come regularly to this service, for indeed the Parish Family Eucharist Sunday by Sunday is, or should be, the heart and centre of our worship.

Sometimes we think we are never going to get to the end of a thing. We may be climbing in a hilly country, and we think that when we get to that hill-top we shall be at the top; but when we get there we find there is yet another peak beyond, and then another and another. We wonder if we are ever going to get to the end of our climb, but there is an end; and, if it is important that we should get to the end, it is necessary that we should be plucky and persevere. We must keep the end in sight, or at any rate in thought, and go on. It may be that what we think is the end is not really the end at all. Success is not the end; prosperity is not the end; victory is not the end. The Lord Jesus knew very well that Calvary was not the end; but He knew that Calvary was the way to the end, and "for the joy that was before Him" He endured the Cross. God Himself is the end, but the Incarnation of our Lord has provided us with a way to the end. Through the Spirit we know the Son, and through the Son we know the Father, Whom to know is everlasting life, and in that knowledge is the end of life. He that sat upon the throne said, "I am Alpha and Omega, the beginning and the end".

On Sunday October 7th we shall be giving thanks for the gift of the harvest. There will be Holy Communion at 8 am,

Procession and the Parish Sung Eucharist (with which will be combined the children's offering of gifts) at 10 a.m., and Evensong and Procession at 6.30 p.m. - with sermon by the Rev. Norman Haigh. We shall welcome gifts of corn, flowers, fruit, vegetables etc. beforehand, and help in decorating the Church on the Saturday morning. On the Saturday evening (October 6th) there will be the Harvest Supper in the Village Hall, when our guest speaker will be the Diocesan Youth Chaplain (the Rev. David Beardshaw) whom we congratulate on having recently completed the sponsored Pennine Walk in aid of a new Mini-bus for old people's outings and diocesan work with handicapped children.

We mourn the loss of Mrs. Winch who for many years has been well known and liked in the village, and also of Mrs. Helena Jackson of 16, Dovehouse Lane who, although a comparative new-comer to the village, had also become well known and popular. We remember them in our prayers and also those who are bereaved.

Fluoridation. Letters are to be sent to the Area Health Authority protesting that advertisements for the public meeting were not put in all the local papers covering the Warwickshire Area, copies sent to Stratford, Rugby, Coventry and Leamington newspapers.

The Cottage, Banbury Road. Complaints have been received about the car repair work carried on on the forecourt. The Enforcement Officer will report to the Council.

Width and/or Weight Restriction on Bridge Lane and Church/Harbury Lane. In reply to the Clerk's enquiry about the possible restriction, she was informed of the procedures necessary and asked if the villagers would be prepared to substantiate the numbers of non-access lorries using these lanes. Mrs. Jerome is organising a team to take a road count over 2 days from approx. 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

PROFILE - ETHEL KENDALL



I suspect that not too many people know that beautiful gold and silver jewellery is produced in a small workshop in Hall Lane. The artist who designs and makes the jewellery is Ethel Kendall, who admits that her interest has somewhat taken her over since she began to learn about jewellery design and manufacture about 8 years ago.

She had never worked with metal or precious stones previously, her working life having been spent first in the millinery trade and later at the Birmingham Children's Hospital and the Birmingham Accident Hospital. With a busy architect husband and two sons, life was pretty full, leaving little time for hobbies. Then the family moved to Harbury in 1971, when her husband retired, and Ethel realised that, with her sons grown up, a new interest would be a good idea.

Almost by chance she decided to go for half a day a week to a jewellery course at the Mid-Warwickshire College in Leamington and went on to win a Diploma in Jewellery Design and Manufacture after a two-year course. Her work is now of such a high standard that five of her pieces were accepted this year for the 'Loot and Superloot' Exhibition at the Goldsmiths' Hall in London. The range of her work is very wide, from simple silver chains (she says ankle chains are IN at the moment!) to a magnificent 18ct. gold box ring, set with diamonds and containing two tiny ivory dice.

She accepts commissions, both to design and make something from scratch or to produce a piece using the customer's own stones. IN THE GARDEN

This is the month when you benefit from your labours, but it is not the time to relax because you must store some of your produce properly. For instance, potatoes should be dry before putting them in a bag to store. Onions must have plenty of air circulation; if you can't string them up, hang them in a net - also your shallots. If you haven't sown your Japanese onion seeds, do so at once. Spring cabbage plants should be planted out. The old raspberry canes should be cut out and the new growth tied up. Blackcurrant bushes should also have the old fruiting branches cut out as low as possible.

Earth up your celery and leeks, and give support to Brussels sprouts if on open ground.
