PARISH COUNCIL, February 1980

Our Parish Councillors are taking life so seriously, worrying themselves about what will happen if the NCB start mining here, protesting at the imposition of School Transport charges, commenting on the Planning Applications and improving Chapel Street's lighting. All very commendable no doubt, but not muchfun! Will you bother to read it?

Let's begin with the Good News. The Pony Show's fixed for May 4th on the Playing Fields. To Mike Ellis's delight the Councillors chose relatively cheap replacement mowers, so now his margin's won't be squeezed so hard! It was brought to the Council's notice that disabled residents who require adaptation of their homes may be eligible for relief on their rates. If you think you may be eligible Pat Taylor of 9 Heber Drive has information about the scheme. The Well on Pump Green has been made safe and sound and the PCwould like to replace the Pump. A Tennis Club, which will bring in extra revenue, is to be formed and the PC will resurface the Courts when absolutely necessary. Burial Grounds fees rise on April lst, and did you know you can no longer have exclusive rights to a plot in perpetuity - only for 100 years? That's the law now.

Harbury's entered for the Best Kept Village Competition again (we were SECOND in the County las year!) Mike Ellis asked was it worth it! The PC would have to be more aggressive in getting black spots like Hall Lane Corner verge cleared up if Harbury was to win.

The seat on the Old New Inn Green had been broken and the wall was in a dangerous condition. The PC seeks to persuade the owner to repair it as soon as possible. The County Land Agent advises that the Ivy Lane Cherry Trees have been badly damaged by residents' pruning attempts and may die. The County will undertake remedial work which must include further pruning.

The problem of refuse being spread about the village on

Wednesdays when the bin bags are put out is exacerbated by by scavanging dogs, so your Councillors ask, 'Please keep your dogs at home, especially on Wednesdays'!

On the Planning front there was great activity. Valley Homes' application to build a new house and garage at Holland House, Ivy Lane was dubbed 'an objectionable development' by David Winter, and the Council duly objected! The application to build a bungalow at Church House, Crown in the centre of the proposed conservation area was passed for as Sharon hancock said, 'there was no objection that could be made, which would hold water'. And on the same theme (holding water) the PC was most concerned at Shaun Neill's application to demolish outbuildings and the privy at Yew Trees, Mill Street. How would he manage in the meanwhile, they asked?

The Councillors were united in their condemnation of the imposition of School Transport charges, which has, of course, now been abandoned. LINDA RIDGLEY.

PROFILE - FRED SPRAWSON

Fred Sprawson is the last of a long line of Sprawsons who have lived in Harbury for centuries. Indeed, Fred himself has lived here for the best part of a century!

Born in 1902, in a little cottage (now demolished) in South Parade. he served in the Royal Artillery during the First World War and in the Home Guard in the Second. He married Hannah Hoxford of Temple End in 1920, when their first home was a small rented cottage at Childvke. He well remembers the severe winters of the 1930's when those cottages were snow-bound for days and he tells the tale of being wished "Good Evening" by what he swear's was the Miller's ghost, as he walked down Mill Lanelate one night on his way home, as he admits, from the old Fox Inn.



Fred and Hannah had three sons, Harry, Joe and William, and a single

daughter, Mary. Harry was killed in the Normandy landings and Bill was unfortunately knocked down by a tram in a Warwick pub in 1947. Mary married Sydney Alcock, Schoolmaster at Ladordke and they later moved to Banbury.

Joe Sprawson followed his father into employment in the Cement Works where eventually Joe was promoted to Deputy Works Manager in 1951. When the works closed he was transferred to a southern quarry, but Fred remained in Harbury, having retired in 1967. Fred's greatest thrill was to have been photographed as one of the team that uncovered the icthyosaur in the quarries in 1928; for a month or so, he says, they were all celebrities.

Both Fred and Hannah were active in village affairs, Fred being prime mover in the St. John's Ambulance Brigade, Harbury Branch, and Hannah a pillar and one time President of the Women's Institute. In his youth Fred took part in Pennyfarthing races round the village and won the leg of lamb from the greasy pole two years running at the village Fête. He was and still is an enthusiastic gardener, at one time cultivating both his cottage garden and two allotments. Now he has given up all but a half plot, but still manages to grow more than enough vegetables for himself.

The family were rehoused in the late thirties into a council house in Pineham Avenue, where they spent many happy years, but on Hannah's death in 1971, Fred was moved into an old people's dwelling. Now that he is almost 78, Fred says that he doesn't get about as much as he used to, but he is out almost every day on his bicycle, he still cultivates his allotment

and he plays a fair game of Crib at the Village Club.

Fred has seen many changes in Harbury in his time, some, he admits for the better, but he thinks it has altered so much that he feels he does not recognise the village and the villagers do not recognise him. Despite this his tallstories are well-known in the Old New Inn, where he goes for the occasional pint, and, as he has threatened to enter this year's Bicycle Race (where he will undoubtably be the oldest contestant) soon no-one will dare to deny his energetic AVRIL PREMIER, 1980 existence.

CORRESPONDENCE

Dear Mrs. Ottewill,

Thank you and the Harbury School Parent/Teacher Association, most sincerely, for the £31,20 donation you made towards setting up a new Boys Town for tribal youngsters at Pannaikadu. Thanks to efforts in your area during the past six months, the target for purchasing an eleven acre site has been realised and we are now set to go ahead with the development.

Dr. and Mrs. Rees have been out here on holiday, recently and spent some of their time with us. It was a good occasion to formally inaugurate the Pannaikadu Boys Town. Unfortunately, I was not able to be present that day, but a stone was unveiled to commemorate the donors and the start of the project.

The ceremonies are now behind us and the hard work has now to be taken up on the site. Already two senior boys from this Boys Town are living at a village near Pannaikadu. Daily, with help from some tribal boys, they are beginning to clear the area and plant it up. Yesterday we sent up 60 guava

fruit tree seedlings which will join the 60 planted earlier to give us an acre of those fruittrees. Another sector is being planted with pineapples another with cardamon.

There is a tribal settlement of just ten families already living alongside the new site and we plan that their development along with that of the Boys Town will be taken up. We shall be able to offer medical facilities and employment and literacy aids right from the start... and this should go a long way towards making them into a prosperous small community.

Thank you once again for your help. You have helped lay the base for a Boys Town of up to 80 boys and many a generation of youngsters will have reason to be grateful to you. On their behalf, a very real Thank you.


