THE VICAR'S LETTER

My dear friends,

Congratulations and best wishes to Mr. Harry Windsor and Miss Vivienne Aggett on their re-election as Churchwardens, and to Mrs. Diana Holt and Mr. Ken Clarke on their re-election as P. C. C. Secretary and Treasurer respectively. We owe much to all four of them for their dovoted and efficient work. Likewise our congratulations to all the members of the newly elected P. C. C., and to all the sidesmen.

The Bishop's "Four Questions" have been considered by the Parochial Church Council and others, and, I understand, the answers have been sent to him.

An encouraging feature of recent years is the increased interest taken in the spiritual life by many people. As an example of this I might mention the fact that I have been asked to lead a workshop on Meditation. This will take place in Church on Monday 6th July at 7.30p.m., and all will be welcome. A short article on Meditation will be found on another page.

A Youth Service will be held in Church on Trinity Sunday (14th June) at 6.30p.m., when we hope to have a special preacher.

The Royal Show Service will be on Sunday 5th July in the Grand Ring at Stoneleigh. The preacher will be the Bishop of Carlisle. Our choir has again been invited to take part, and there will be a coach to take those who wish to go too. Corpus Christi (Thanksgiving for the Institution of Holy Communion) is, of course, the Thursday after Trinity Sunday (i.e. 18th June), and it is hoped that everyone will try to be present at one of the three Eucharists on this day.

We mourn the loss of Mr. William Reading Russell, and also of Mr. Horace Markham. May God grant them His peace and rest, and may He comfort those who are bereaved.

We also record the death on April 23rd at the age of 69 of my predecessor, the Revd. Walter Frederick ErnestSmith, who was Vicar of Harbury for a little over a year (1955-56). He died while on holiday in Malta. He had been in ill health for some time, and in recent years had lived in retirement at the Charterhouse in London. His funeral service was in the Church of St. Bartholomew the Less, London, and there will be a Requiem for him in our own Church at 7.30p.m. on Monday June 15th. We thank God for his life and work in England and in Africa, and we pray that God will grant him His eternal rest.

The meeting on 12th May began with Mr. F. Badman's election as Chairman, and Mr. T. Sheasby's election as Vice-Chairman.

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

MEDITATION

Perhaps this word may suggest to some people 'Transcendential Meditation', which they have heard about or seen advertised, so let me say at once that this is certainly not what I am writing about or shall consider in the Meditation Workshop on 6th July. No, the Church has her own traditional methods of Christian meditation, and to those of us who have long been accustomed to 'making our meditation' it seems strange that some Church people seem never to have heard of this exercise. It is true that some forms of meditation, when we read about them in books, seem very difficult and complicated, but this is largely because it is often more difficult to describe how to do something than it is to do it, and in practice meditation should be marked by simplicity. It is by meditating that we learn to meditate.

Meditation has well been described as 'chewing the cud after grazing in the green pastures of God's Word', or as thinking over with God some dogmatic or moral truth, or some passage of Holy Scripture. It will normally lead to effective prayer, and to the making of a resolution. We must allow the Holy Spirit to lead us into that method of meditation which is best suited to us. As a soul advances in the spiritual life, the meditation element in mental prayer usually tends to decrease, and the affective prayer element to increase. Indeed, there are some souls who seem to be called straightway to a higher form of mental prayer - affective prayer or contemplation - without the preliminary meditation.

In the workshop I shall first give a little talk about Meditation and Mental Prayer, then lead a kind of conducted meditation with silences, and finally give an opportunity for questions or discussion. It will not, I think, be too difficult or advanced for the newly confirmed, if they like to attend. The workshop is on Monday, 6th July, at 7.30 p.m. in the Church. F.R. MACKLEY.

2028 (Southam) SQUADRON A. T. C.

Resulting from cuts in defence expenditure, the Southam A.T.C. Squadron is threatened with closure unless more Cadets, aged $13\frac{3}{4}$ and above, join and make up what is considered a viable number. 2028(Southam)Squadron A.T.C. was formed during the Second World War and has operated in Southam ever since - however, should it close the facility will be permanently lost.

The Squadron meets twice a week at Wattons Lane on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 7.30 to 9.30 p.m. Tuesday night is the Parade Night when training is carried out covering drill, principles of flying, radio-telegraphy, mapreading and many other activities which one would associate with the R.A.F. Thursday night is more devoted to hobby activities, such a practising radio-telegraphy, modelmaking, etc.

From time to time, there is an opportunity for cadets to (a) go gliding at Little Rissington, (b) flying at R.A.F. Shorebury, (c) shooting .22 rifles at Kineton, shooting Lee and Enfield .303 rifles at Cosford and (d) attending annual camp at selective R.A.F. stations within the U.K. with the opportunity for a small number of cadets to attend camp in Germany, Cyprus and Gibralter.

Other activities currently covered are model aircraft flying in the summer, all the year round orienteering, and the Squadron is also involved in certain Wing Activities, such as cross-country, five-a-side soccer, etc.; it participates in the Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme, and entered for the first time last year a new activity which was the local Soap Box Derby at Long Itchington where it took first, second and third places in its class, and went on to enter the National

Since they discovered they had not been acting out the letter of the law as regards their Charity Deeds, the Committee has been at pains to do everything by the book, with all the correct village groups being represented on the Committee, which will again be chaired by Midge Keen, with Sue Andrews as secretary, Ken Clarke as treasurer, Mick Bingham as vice-chairman and Dick Picken as bookings secretary.

The Chairman thanked everyone who helped run the Hall, especially Mrs. Robbins who was having to resign as the caretaker. Costs, said Mrs. Keen, were rising, and the Committee was trying hard to keep its head above water. It was pointed out that two-thirds of the hiring fees are immediately swallowed up by the electricity costs. Income was static, but the Committee could improve its position by ensuring that charges for the Hall were paid promptly.

Sue Andrews reported that the Fund-Raising Committee had made about £100, and was to hold a 'Race Night' in the summer. Profits would go into a separate fund to pay for repairs. The Committee is bound by the Trust Deed to be self-sufficient, and so must cover the running costs by the hire charges. Bing Bingham had been investigating ways of improving the efficiency of the heating system, and of reducing the cost, but this would require the investment of capital the Committee did not have. Vivienne Aggett and Harry Windsor were unanimously re-elected Churchwardens at the Annual Meeting, held in a bitterly cold Church on the morning of the power cuts. Because of the Arctic conditions, the meeting was a somewhat hurried affair, but those present heard reports from the many groups affiliated to the Church - the Young Wives, the Mothers' Union, the Men's Group, the Harbury & Ladbroke News, the Bellringers, the Adventurers, the All Sorts. The accounts for last year showed that we had held our own, but rising costs (particularly the quota which we have to pay to the Diocese) will make more and better fund-raising essential in the future.

We were pleased to see that the increase in numbers attending services has been maintained. The Church is involved in the life of the village in very many ways (not least in producing the magazine you are now reading!) and we are pleased that more and more people are beginning to feel its effect in their personal lives too.

The Bishop has recently asked us (and all Parishes) what we are failing to do. We thought of lots of things - maybe you could add to our list. Come on - tell us - what do YOU think the Church in Harbury ought to be doing? DMH.

HARBURY PARISH COUNCIL MEETING, MAY

Ballooning generates a lot of hot air. It is a pre-requisite, and in Harbury a consequence, of a successful flight. Indeed, when the latest balloon took off from the Playing Fields the air turned BLUE. "We were soundly abused", said David Winter.

Seeking to uphold the Parish Council's authority and to safeguard the village's children, three intrepid councillors - Winter, Hancock and Hannay, remonstrated with the enthusiasts. As a result the P. C. received a letter from Warwick Balloons, indignantly complaining that three people claiming to be Parish Councillors tried to prevent the launch, for which permission had been given. For the balloonists, Mrs. Maze denied there had been any danger to the public, and said they had quoted for an appearance at the Carnival but may not perform if permission was withdrawn. The PC hotly (sorry!) deny that they ever gave permission for Hot Air Balloons to use the Playing Fields. The only official launch was at the Jubilee Carnival, and this year's Carnival Committee had decided that the quote of £150 was too expensive. The area round the balloon had not been roped off and injury could have been caused if the balloon had collapsed or moved off suddenly. The enthusiasts' vehicles were driving dangerously on the field, which is not allowed, and the Clerk was instructed to point this out and to reiterate that the Parish Council would not allow balloons on their Field!

Having dealt with the exciting bit, the much depleted Council struggled on with the complexities of the new sub-committee structure introduced by Cllr. Hannay (who was on holiday!). "Where are Village Greens?" "Under Highways". "Do buses come under Highways?" asked David Winter. "No -Unclassified". "You've missed them;" Super! Bruce.

On the topic of Highways, it seems David has counted at least three buses this holiday going the wrong way down Farm St. "It must be confusing for people trying to work out the new route" he complained. Waymarking, he reported, would continue WHEN the rain let up. Wood had been purchased for repairs to 10 stiles and 2 bridges on the field footpaths, and the Parish Council would look into the possibility of making minor diversions to SM63 and SM64 for no-one is sure where they should go.

Planning - the PC will point out to Stratford District Council that the extension at 31 Mill Street, for which permission has just been requested is already built, and in unsuitable materials too. What, they asked, happened to Building Inspections if there was no Planning Permission?

Deppers - Mrs. Catterall was not present to represent the ward.

Finance - the Chairman was pleased with the report at the

Annual Parish Meeting (a report of which follows), but revealed that, if it was translated into County terms, the surplus Mike Ellis had amassed would top the $\pounds l\frac{1}{2}$ million mark! Think what we could do with that!

REPORT ON THE ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

There were few awkward questions for Major Kettle to answer at the Annual Parish Meeting, as there were few members of the public, awkward or otherwise, to ask them. Are you apathetic, or supremely confident in your Council?

Major Kettle praised the layout of the new Rate Demand form, which had the dubious virtue of 'giving the public a much better idea of how the money is spent, and on what'.

Although the Conservatives were not in overall control, he was sure the County Council would function and in a 'responsible caring, efficient and economic way', for it was the prime duty of all the elected members to make sure services were run properly and at a proper cost.

Mike Ellis asked could not WCC's representative on the Severn Trent Water Authority do something to bring 'this monstrous organisation to public accountability', but Major Kettle said there was no 'community of interest' between the elected members. It could only be dealt with by government intervention.

In his report, Iory Davies stressed the heavy expense of re-surfacing the Tennis Courts, and the constant battle against inflation. He praised the efforts of 'our very able Finance Councillor, Mike Ellis', in keeping down the rate rise. He thanked everyone who had helped to make the village neat and tidy in preparation for the Best Kept Village Competition. Vandalism was increasing, although not so much as in other villages, and he urged parishioners to report anyone seen damaging property.

The Allotments Report praised the high standard of husbandry there. Also, efforts were being made to improve the appearance of the neglected graves in the Burial Grounds. Relatives were being contacted so that kerbstones could be removed, and graves levelled, to facilitate maintenance. Charges had been increased this year in line with inflation but were still lower than average. John Drinkwater complained that very little maintenance and repairs of the roads and footways had been done:lack of finance was blamed. Using volunteer labour from Community Industries, the PC was repairing Field Footpaths, and would be reimbursed by WCC. The waymarking scheme would be completed by the Autumn.

The rising cost of electricity meant Footway Lighting was a large slice of the annual expenditure. The one new light in Chapel Street cost £300. Villagers should let the PC know if they noticed a faulty light.

The introduction of fees after April had precipitated the recent flurry of Planning Applications. Two for estates had been submitted, one at Honiwell Close/Farm Street being approved at Appeal by the Dept. of Environment, despite both Parish and District Council objections, and the other at the Spinney had been recently refused by the District on the grounds that it was contrary to the Structure Plan, and a loss of amenity and open space which could cause a progressive erosion of the calibre of the area.

The Finance Chairman, Mike Ellis, admitted funds were too high. He blamed this on his cautious budgetting, the early payment of double rating relief and lower expenditure on repairs. He proposed to carry the surplus forward to 'stabilise the rates'. There was money set aside in 'sinking funds' for tennis court and village hall repairs, and this could be called upon as and when it was needed.

Ted Coupe, new Chairman of the Recreation Ground Cttee, reported a continuing policy of enhancing the appearance of the fields. Trees had been planted and a junior playslide was to be erected. The 'wandering' goalposts had been finally put to rest, and the tennis courts re-surfaced and marked out for use by both tennis and netball players.

The Village Hall was only just making ends meet, and

had yet to find someone to replace Mrs. Robbins as caretaker. Sue Andrews appealed to everyone to support its fund-raising activities.

John Hunt moved a vote of thanks, and made a request that the minutes of the previous meeting be circulated next year, to save the Clerk's voice! LINDA RIDGLEY.

COUNCIL FOR THE DISABLED

June 6th to 13th is Southam and District's special week to mark the International Year of Disabled People. We are running trips for disabled people to the Disabled Drivers' Rally at Silverstone on 7th June, and to the Superstars event at Coventry Sports Centre on the 11th. There will also be a social evening at Wattons Lodge on June 10th, at which entertainment will be provided by Southam Players. Social Services are running a Voluntary Group Convention at Southam Youth Centre on 9th June. This will be a chance for the public to see the work carried on by voluntary organisations.

Our project for this year is the setting up of a transport fund with which we hope eventually to buy a mini-bus. A number of organisations have promised to hold fund-raising events for us, including a Clay Pigeon Shoot on 6th June, run by Dovehouse Autos at Hill Farm, Ufton, from noon to 5 p.m. Harbury Horticultural Society have decided that they will donate a proportion of the proceeds from this year's Open Gardens Day on 18th July, and we have already received a donation as a result of Harbury Mothers' Union coffee morning. In answer to letters distributed throughout the district, we have already had promises of further help, and have received a number of donations. However, we have inevitably missed some businesses and organisations from our list, and we would be glad to hear from them or from any individual who can help us, either with fund-raising or by publicising the achievements and problems of the disabled. For example, Mr. Marshall of the Salvation Army is putting together a collection of slides which will show just how much disabled people are capable of doing. PLACES TO GO

THE ETERNAL TRIANGLE' or ROUND AND ROUND AND ROUND AND ROUND AND ROUND...'

If you've got three weeks to spare, and plentiful supplies of iron rations, why not try the Warwickshire Leisure Drive? There are lots of signs around - all you have to do is follow them, and you'll discover parts the other routes don't reach. (If you go in a clockwise direction, as the Tourist Office leaflet tells you to, you'll find the signs all point the other way.)

Any gamblers in your party will enjoy the trip - many of the signs are so positioned that you've only a 50-50 chance of selecting the correct route, so a fairly profitable 'book' could be run on the back seat. Best not try to involve the driver in this - he'll be totally absorbed in working out the

cost of the extra petrol he's using turning round and going back to see if that last sign really <u>did</u> point into this field.

The complete drive (not counting getting lost) is 68 miles, and takes in Chesterton, Windmill, Stoneleigh Abbey, Kenilworth Castle, Baddesley Clinton, Packwood House, Henley in Arden Guildhall and Bird Gardens, Mary Arden's house at Wilmcote and Charlecote Park. The Tourist Office leaflet tells you a bit about each place, and also about interesting detours you can easily make to see, for example, the Pleck Gardens and Oversley Wood.

Definitely a good idea for a pleasant full or half day's outing, but I wouldn't recommend you to attempt it without the map in the leaflet (as well as the iron rations mentioned ærlier). Because the route passes through Preston Bagot (otherwise known as Warwickshire's own Bermuda Triangle), and there the signs STOP! Rumour has it that on dark nights cars with ghostly drivers can be seen going round and round in circles in a desperate and eternal search for the next sign, with pitiful wails of "When can we go home, Daddy?" emanating from the back seats.

If the pioneering spirit of Livingstone and Blashford-Snell beats within your breast, you may decide to throw caution to the winds and go on the Leisure Drive. If you do, and you find the sign in Preston Bagot, please will you let us know where it points to, so we can go and get our reporter back? D. M. H.


