THE VICAR'S LETTER

My dear friends,

The month of August and the first part of September are a holiday period when many people are away. By the middle of September, however, the many organisations and the parish as a whole should be settling down into routine.

The Harbury Adventurers (our "Sunday School with a difference" which meets at 11.30 am in the Village Hall) starts again on September 13th. Ken and Jeanne Clarke, who have been such keen and enthusiastic leaders, are now having to give it up for family reasons. Actually Ken has been a Bible Class leader in some organisation or another (mainly Crusaders) for no less than 34 years. What a wonderful record! We do thank them both for what they have done in this way particularly in Harbury. The other leaders of the Adventurers at present are Mrs. Shirley Keir, Mrs. Catt and Mrs. Coupe, but we do need two others (of whom one at least should if possible be a man) to replace Ken and Jeanne. Any volunteers?

Another Meditation Workshop was held in Church on August 3rd and seems to have been appreciated. From the Churchwardens

Some months ago, a friend of the Vicar's, Father Keith Benzies, asked for prayer for a young man called Eugene Ralengo.

Father Benzies is a missionary in Northern Madagascar and has, for some time, been obtaining support to bring Eugene to England for surgery. We have prayed for Eugene at our own prayer group and it is a great joy to hear that after six months in hospital in Salisbury, Eugene has returned to his little Mallagass village able to hold his head up and face people with confidence - for he has a new face.

Eugene was terribly disfigured by a scything accident as a result of which he lost his left eye, his entire nose and cheek and part of his palate. He was totally rejected and even stoned by children in his village. Then Father Benzies found him and set about the long hard task of raising money for air fare and hospital fees. The surgeons gave their services free and the series of operations gave Eugene a new nose and a scarred but acceptable face. Before he went home, Eugene spoke of the thrill it was to walk into a Salisbury department store and have the assistant look at him and say "Can I help you sir?" without flinching. The Church Times of 28th August has a photo of Eugene. Please continue to pray for him as he settles down to a new life at home.

Mention of the Church Times brings us to the consideration of Christian reading and listening. There are many excellent Christian publications and programmes. We have a wide range of books on loan from the Church library and some on sale from the bookstall. Of radio and TV programmes we would mention just two, both of them on Sunday morning on radio. The radio 4 programme "Sunday" which follows "Church bells on Sunday" (7.45) and the 8 o'clock news keeps one up to date with news and views on a wide range of Christian matters. The Mercia Sound programme at 7 am on Sunday includes news of local Church events.

"VICTORIAN" HARVEST SUPPER

Entertainment at the Church Harvest Supper this year (on Saturday 3rd October) will be a Magic Lantern Show and Entertainment with a Victorian flavour - a superb event not to be missed. These initials stand for the somewhat formal title "Parochial Church Council". But, take my word for it, our meetings are far from formal! Whilst we are aware of the great responsibility we have in running the business side of the Church and maintaining the building and its fixtures and fittings, we nevertheless find a great deal to laugh about as we work our way through our long Agendas!

Last month, among other things, we discussed the celebrations for the Vicar's 25th anniversary in Harbury, the Harvest Supper, the Youth Service on 1st November, our Annual Bonfire Party on 7th Nov., and the Parish Breakfast on 29th Nov. And then it's Christmas!

The Church costs a great deal to run (expenditure was about £3000 last year) so fund raising has to loom large in our discussions - we're planning another Spring Fair next year - but we know that our function is far wider than that. All the members try to bring ideas to meetings for ways in which the Church can serve the community, and we welcome suggestions on how we can do this.

CHURCH BELLS

Our latest fund raising efforts, together with a number of donations, have increased the amount subscribed or promised to some £2,400. This leaves about £800 to be raised (mainly to cover the cost of V.A.T.!) It is proposed to erect a plaque outlining the project and recording the principal subscribers, in the Ringing Chamber, so if any other subscribers wish to share an interest in the work, it is not too late.

The two new bells have been cast, and we are now waiting for the fittings to be completed. It is hoped to arrange for a small group to visit the Bell Foundry at Loughborough to see our bells in the tuning shop, and look round the Foundry early in October. This will be on a Wednesday morning, so perhaps those interested would contact either the Vicar or Churchwardens, to arrange the most convenient date.

At present there is much work taking place to clean and paint the second-hand frame sections, and we should shortly be drilling and mounting the steel joist in the tower. (if anyone has a spare 12" X 5" 32lbs/ft steel joist, please let us know!). We hope to have all ready to receive the bells and fittings in November. Any practical and financial help will be welcome. - and many thanks to all who have helped to make the project successful up to now. H.W.

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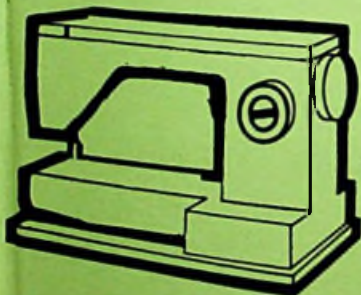

This month's account of the P.C. meeting has been compiled by two substitute reporters, coerced by the regular correspondent in her absence. Perhaps this article will represent 'a pale imitation of the real thing' ?!

The initial discussion related to the fate of the Spinney; since a letter forwarded to the District Council could be open to misinterpretation. The cllrs stressed that their objections to development were based on siting of houses in contravention of the STRUCTURE PLAN and not on any problems which dedication of part of the land to the Parish might incur. It was suggested that an agreed procedure should be laid down for future extra-ordinary meetings of the P.C., so that confusions did not arise.

In contrast to this deliberation, 4 planning applications were readily accepted, while developments at "Hazebrook" and the "Water Tower" were now at appeal with S.R.D.C.

The awareness of the Council for its local environment became apparent as miscellaneous parcels of land (allotments, kerbs, pavements, verges) came under consideration.

Allotments The P.C. recorded their acknowledgement of the considerable effort that many allotment holders put in on their ground. (placings: 1. Mr. Ray Padbury, 2. Mr. 'Curly' Pratt, 3. Mrs. Szolnoki) but had felt it necessary for the Clerk to instruct one tenant to Quit, whilst 3 holders had been requested to make noticeable improvements by Autumn, since the lack of effort by a few was hampering the majority - "a fact of life", observed Cllr. M. Ellis. Cllr. Ellis also suggested that a 2 tier system for rent-payment might be advantageous, with industrious tenants being refunded a portion of their rent, but a decision was deferred until consultation with the Allotment Cttee. The P.C. stated sympathetically that consideration would always be given to tenants unable to tend their patch through ill-health or infirmity.

Kerbs. The P.C. announced its support for Butte Lane residents in their attempts to secure a continuous pavement to their properties, but stressed that the onus was on the property owners to approach the County and Major Kettle, since the situation should have been apparent when the houses were purchased

from the developer. It was further noted that the kerbs in Vicarage Lane need attention and the P.C., with considerable understanding, requested the D.C. to lift and raise the setts when money was available in the next financial year and not replace them hurriedly with modern kerb stones. Similarly, the county budget (or lack of it) had led to an abundance of weeds along the kerbsides and Cllr. M. Ellis eloquently summed up the situation with his succinct "the political situation is in the gutter" - i.e. you can't keep the rates and the weeds down!! it was questioned whether villagers could be persuaded to take an interest in their own adjoining kerb area (especially if we were to improve on this year's placing in the Best Kept Village Competition - 2nd... out of 3, in the larger villages section)?

Verges: Cllr. B. Hannay referred to the 1700 Enclosure Act to elucidate the ownership of grass verges and queried whether regular 'safety' cutting by the Council would be more beneficial than 'amenity' cutting. Finally "with respect", Cllr M. Ellis suggested that the Highways Dept. should "forget the straight bits and do the bends" - to facilitate retention of important vision splays e.g. Bendigo Mitchell crossroads.

Further items brought to the attention of the P.C. by the ever observant Cllr. Hannay related to repairs to Playing Field equipment, necessitated by minor acts of vandalism, and the damage caused by cars which had strayed beyond the allocated parking space. Cllr K. Thompson suggested a WARNING NOTICE might suffice, although like erection of the notice to Dog Owners ("undeniably observed") it might provide yet another fixture "for muck to be thrown at" commented the Clerk.

On a brighter note, the P.C. praised the recent fair owner who had made a determined effort to maintain the site and had not resorted to dumping any waste in the ditch which had caused problems from other sources within the village (quote for improvement £80); nor damaged the hedgerows for which a suitable trimmer was sought.

In conclusion, Cllr. D. Winter thanked the Coventry Community Services for improvement of certain stiles in the area (although "some number had

gone astray" - according to Cllr N. Ellis); Cllr. S. Hancock (School Governor) referred to the appreciation of the village for the teaching services of Mrs. A. Hunt who recently retired, and Cllr. M. Ellis remarked on the value of the local school in "holding the Community together" and the contribution made by Southam School for furthering the potential of village children.

As your regular correspondent re-iterates, attendance at a P.C. meeting (although depleted in numbers) is certainly an eye opener and combines seriousness with good humour, and concern tempered with common sense - a "typically British" institution.

IN THE GARDEN

This week I have been taking stock of the season's work; and all in all, despite the climatic problems earlier on, things are looking pretty good. Nature is a great leveller. Most of us find that some of our veg. are at least two weeks late due to having to sow a second time, but better late than never. Now is the time to look ahead, your Japanese Onions should be showing in the rows and if the weather is dry they will need a small amount of watering in the morning preferably; this also applies to your spring cabbage seed. It is not too late to sow all year round lettuce seed; your onions should now be lifted and let dry.

Leeks and celery should be earthed up or, if grown on top of the ground, fix a collar round them so as to give them a blanched look. At the end of the month your main crop potatoes should be dug up and stored in a frost-proof shed or garage.

CORRESPONDENCE

Dear Editors,

To read your Letters Column in the August 'News', one would believe that the recent showing of the War Game was not a successful one. Peter Holt's letter describes a bored and restless audience expressing "very vocal disagreement" (sic) with any idea of nuclear disarmament in Europe while waiting impatiently for what turned out to be a damp squib of a film. In fact the only "very vocal disagreement" was his own, people had clearly come for more than the film itself - the evening was advertised after all as a 'meeting and showing of the War Game'.

and its impact could perhaps best be gauged by the fact that the discussion went on for a full hour afterwards - though your correspondent didn't stay to listen. The film certainly needs updating and one speaker particularly went on for far too long, but the rare opportunity the evening provided to discuss this vital topic only served to convince us of the interest and of the concern felt in our village.

The argument hinges on the question of deterrence. We had sufficient nuclear arms to act as a deterrent 20 years ago. Nevertheless the stock piles have grown and grown. The only conclusion we can possibly draw from this is that both sides are caught up in a race to acquire the ability to strike first. Belief in deterrence through Mutually Assured Destruction may have guided military thinking in the 50's but it plays very little part in NATO strategy in the 80's. The recent decision by President Reagan to deploy the Neutron Bomb is as clear an indication as any of the American preparedness to make use of their nuclear capacity. The point is not that a Neutron Bomb destroy people not property but what it would inevitably lead to (and I know no more powerful argument than this): "Unless an effective form of arms limitation (followed by a progressive reduction in arms) can soon be reached it seems inconceivable that any 'balance of power', or balance of destruction, can remain balanced. The time will come when the foreseen introduction of some new system....will be perceived by the other as a threat sufficient to justify a decision to go for 'the Final Solution' - a surprise First-Strike of sufficient power to destroy most of the launching sites of the other."

(Sir Martin Ryle, Fellow of Trinity College, Cambridge)

I would like to make two final points. It was calimed from a single Daily Telegraph article that the Russians have "infiltrated" E.N.D. Could it just be that the Russians are just as anxious as we are - for economic reasons, if no other - to reverse the relentless proliferation of nuclear weaponry? And I'm sure the readers of Harbury News were as little comforted as I was by Peter Holt's assurance that our present day army would be a lot more efficient in putting down the inevitable civil disorder that would follow a nuclear attack as a result of their recent training experience in Northern Ireland!

He came along and was very taken with the cottages because they are still in the original condition. I thought they were built about 1650, when the last Manor was built, but he says they are at least 100 years older than that.

He took a number of pictures which have to be sent in with any application for listing, and reported to London that they were well worth saving.

On June 6th, the day before we were going on a fortnight's holiday, we received a letter from Mr. Hancock, giving us forty-two days to have the cottages pulled down and the site cleared.

All I could do was to ring Mr. Bucknell and leave it to him. He rang head office, and they rushed it through, so that when we arrived back a letter was waiting to say they were now listed buildings.

I at least, think Mr. Bucknell did a good job, and I have thanked him for his help.
