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



From the Churchwardens

On Saturday, 8th May, delegates from 18 parishes in this area will meet at Southam with the Bishops and diocesan staff to consider the mission of the church: Each parish has 5 delegates one of which must be the Vicar or Rector and one a churchwarden, and who should be as representative as possible. Our delegates are the Vicar, Vivienne Aggett, Ann Windsor John Algar and Ralph Upton:

Each group of delegates has to prepare a display on two sheets depicting the life of the church and the life of the community of which the church is part. For the past few weeks, the delegates have been meeting at the Vicarage, praying and studying together and crawling round the floor placing photos and drawings on the large display sheets.

These sheets will be on view in Church on Easter Sunday (you'd better come and see if you recognize your church and community!) and the delegates will be commissioned by the congregation to represent them at

the Deanery Congress as it has been entitled.

As part of the preparation of the whole parish we are undertaking studies using the booklet which we mentioned last month "Agenda for Apostles". Details of theforthcoming studies are to be found in the diary. All are welcome at these studies.

Easter is a great festival in the Christian year; we look forward to seeing many of you in church on that day to celebrate the glory and the power of our risen

Lord.

MAJOR RUPERT KETTLE

Major Kettle, who died last month, was elected to the Warwickshire County Council in 1968 as Conservative member first for Fenny Compton and then for Harbury, having served on Southam Rural District Council since 1962. He was High Sheriff of Warwickshire from 1977/8, and became Chairman of the County Council in 1980.

Born in York, Major Kettle began farming at Piper's Hill, Bishops Itchington, on his retirement

from the army in 1955:

He was a kind and gentle man, always ready to listen and to help, fair to those of all parties, whilst remaining true to the Conservative principles for which he strived.

It is said that the clear-thinking, well-organised efficiency he brought to the Chairmanship of the Council stream-lined its dealings considerably, and he

has been described as an outstanding leader;

Those in Harbury who knew Major Kettle, and his wife Kate, held them in the highest esteem. He took a great interest in Harbury's Parish Council, always attending our Annual Parish Meeting and displaying a wide knowledge of local affairs.


His presence on the Council, and in this area generally will be sadly missed, and hard to replace:

JOHN THORNE

Many people in Harbury knew and respected John Thorne, owner of Chesterton Stud, who died tragically last month after a riding accident. Mr. Thorne, a nationally acclaimed rider, trainer and breeder, finished second in the 1980 Grand National on Spartan Missile. His age at the time (54) and the fight he had beforehand to get down to the required weight, made him figure prominently in the national press at the time.

He was one of the Masters of the Warwickshire Hunt, and he and his wife Wendy and their daughters Jane and Diana are well known in the local riding fraternity. His son Nigel was also an amateur jockey before his tragic death at the age of 18.

Tributes and messages of condolence came from many distinguished riders, including Bob Champion, and Terry Biddlecombe, and to Wendy Thorne and her family the Harbury & Ladbroke News adds its deepest sympathy.

WORKING TOGETHER

What should the Church be doing in the Community,

Good DETECTIVE WORK by Tim Percival and the Chairman tracked down Holland House's owner and ensured the wall was made safe's

The UNSIGHTLY HEAP of cars and tyres and the heavy plant using the Harbury Lane Airfield site has provoked the PC into asking the County to investigate the planning legality of the access and the activities taking place there'. Mike Ellis thought the sight lines should be improved and Bruce Hannay queried whether Planning Permission had been obtained for all the units'.

At Bruce Hannay's instigation the PC is to demand an explanation for the UNSEEMLY HASTE with which the By-election caused by Major Kettle's tragic death, was called. The County Election will take place only a fortnight before the District Elections and will adversely affect the Poll for the latter. The PC wants to know the cost of the Election; why it was not held with the District one; whether the

regulations applying to the publication of nominations have been adhered to, and where notice of the coming Election was advertised.

A MEASURE OF DUPLICATION was inevitable in the Electoral Roll, Mr. Foy wrote, as he was prohibited by Law (Representation of the People Act 1949) from compiling it solely from the cards returned, as this would exclude many who were entitled to vote. Mike Ellis agreed Mr. Foy could not be criticised if Parliament decreed he had to work in this way, but he insisted that the PC make a special effort to correct the Roll in the summer, giving Mr. Foy two or three months to investigate the corrections and then if the Roll was still wrong there would be just cause for complaint.

It could cost £800 to defend the Village Hall against ROOF CYCLISTS - hooligans who have damaged the flat roof extension by riding on it. The Parish Council has agreed in principle to pay for the installation of a new heating system for the Hall which should reduce running costs and the Village Hall cttee through its fund raising activities hopes to amass enough money to repair the roof; but there will not be enough for barbed wire barricades on the roof to deter

the climbers and cyclists!

Mrs. Catterall asked for the £80 the PC promised for play equipment and suggested the County Council or Tony Ceney mow the Playing Field that 'Mr. Lakin gave to Deppers'. This last idea got short shrift as Mike Ellis pointed out that the Cement Works sold the land to Harbury Parish Council, that the County Council would not mow the Field and that the Greenkeepers' equipment was not up to it. As for the £80, Deppers could have it but they would have to submit a scheme for PC approval (to make sure the swings or slide were sturdy and safe) and they must agree to inspect the items daily once they were installed as the PC's insurance cover demands this.

Once a week there is a FLASH PEAK and traffic tails back to the Canal Bridge Bruce Hannay reported but he is convinced that the sequence of the Radford Road Lights has been changed. Sharon Hancock was waiting to see how the new set at St. Mary's Road

Harbury is due for a load of HOT CHIPS John Drinkwater reassured the PC, and although repair work on our roads has stopped temporarily the mending will have to completed before the Chip Wagon comes!

We can't hold a meeting on LICENSED PREMISES Bruce Hannay protested when told that the next meeting of the PC was to be at the Rugby Club on 22nd April, but Chairman Iory Davies assured him with gleee that it was allowable, if no other suitable venue was available - and it wasn't!

NATURE NOTES

A research biologist has just sent us details of a paper due to be published in Beekeeper's Monthly (out 1:4:82) that appears to have far-reaching consequences for our community:

It transpires that a very rare sub-species of bee has been observed at Ufton Fields Nature Reserve, a fact that up until this month has been a closelyguarded secret: The major distinguishing feature of this bee is that the abilominal stripes are ordered vellow-black-vellow instead of the much more common black-yellow-black: The difference is not just aesthetic, however: it has been shown in preliminary trials that the Ufton bee (as it has come to be known in the Biology research departments) is capable of collecting twice as much pollen as an ordinary bee: This in turn suggests a possible 75% increase in total honey production per hive, and the few grammes of honey so far produced have been classified as the highest quality: So it appears that Harbury is a village that is about to reap rich rewards through the sale of Harbury Honey - money that could be constructively used to repair Middle Road or provide new swings for the playing fields:

The purpose of this article is to enlist your help in surveying the kind of flowers the Ufton bee prefers. The benefits to the village are obvious, and all you have to do is to note down the type of flower, time of day and the weather when you see an Ufton bee gathering pollen. Then either give the details to any member of the Editorial committee or phone Philip Rail on 061-51-512 after 6pm. Every observation will be of the highest value, so start

watching the bees in your garden!

North or South, April is the most heartening month of the gardening year. In March after a vicious winter, it can be hard to believe that anything will grow again. In April, we can see that it will. Now is the time to plant shallots and onion sets but don't be in too much of a hurry with the small seeds; finish sowing broad beans; time to sow early peas. Parsnips, Beetroot, turnips, swedes, spinach, beet, lettuce, radish, Spring onions, French beans can be sown under cloches and early carrots are worth trying. If you have not already done this, dig and manure the celery trench, also prepare ground for runner beans. By the middle of the month there should be forced rhubarb to pick, and a few Spring cabbage. Main crop potatoes can be planted.

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
