

At the July meeting apologies were received from Mr. Timms: The Council was unanimous in its praise of the seat on Penfold Green, Windmill Lane, given

The Council decided to approve the proposed Kitchen and Bathroom extension at Post Office Cottage, but not the car access and garage. However, it is up to the Stratford Planning Authority to make a final decision.

Mrs. Diana Buck retires from the teaching staff at the end of term. Mrs. Buck has been a part-time teacher at Harbury for a total of 12 years, taking music and remedial groups. She has accompanied so

many concerts at school, and taught the recorder to so many children, that it would be impossible to list them all, but we owe her a great debt of gratitude for all this work which has brought so much pleasure to so many people. She takes with her our very warmest wishes for the future, as well as our sincere gratitude. Mrs. Buck was presented with two items of

Mike Bloxham's picture shows Mrs. Buck at one of the last School events before her retirement - the Sponsored Walk. Probably for the first time ever, the Walk

had to be postponed because of bad weather, but even when it did take place the heavens opened soon after the start. We are especially grateful to the walkers, many of whom persevered through the rain, to all the helpers, and of course to all who sponsored the children. By the time the last few amounts are in, we should be approaching a total of £450; which is beyond our expectations.

SWIMMING. Every week the top four classes go to Leamington Pool alternately, the main reason being to give them a chance to swim in deep water. As their swimming improves the children try for Amateur Swimming Association Personal Survival Awards. As in many competitions, the top three medals are Bronze, Silver and Gold, and - in these very difficult tests - it used to be quite unusual for children of Primary School age to obtain Golds. The following list will show how the standard has obviously improved. After

the Gold there is a more difficult test, the Honours medal. Three children from Harbury School have passed this test this year - James Mayer, Rebecca Burnham and Jayne Archer. James has written a description of what is entailed - I will say no more!

"The Honours Badge entails doing the following: Swimming 3 lengths in $2\frac{1}{2}$ minutes, wearing pumps, socks, jeans or cords, pants, vest, long-sleeved shirt and long-sleeved jumper. After that, take off pumps and tread water for 12 minutes holding one leg, then tread water for 4 minutes normally. Then we swam with all the rest of the clothes on, 15 minutes doing 2 feet-first surface dives and 2 head-first surface dives: Following that we took off our trousers and made a float with them. When the float was made we had to hold the float with both our hands and swim two lengths. After that we trod water for 2 minutes with one hand in the air. The Badge was done in Leamington Swimming Pool and each length was 25 metres long. All the test was done without climbing out of the water and having a rest;"



We have had a varied and enjoyable year. At the Overseas Rally in Leamington, Susan Varah gave an inspiring talk on the work of MU overseas. 110 devoted MU workers in over 30 countries further MU's aims, both spiritual and practical, financed by the Overseas Fund. Over £2,500 was handed to Mrs. Varah from our Diocese. There are also 3 Community Relations workers in this country attached to the Overseas Department.
