The Vicar's Letter

My dear friends,

We are looking forward to the Confirmation on February 21st by Bishop Daly. For several years now we have been very fortunate in having a Confirmation in our own Church every year, each time in the course of our 10 a.m. Parish Family Sung Eucharist on the Sunday before Lent (Quinquagesima). It is so again this year. The newly confirmed will also, of course, be making their first Communions at the same service. Please continue to remember them in your prayers, and support them by your presence.

We mourn the loss from the village of Mr: Gerald Sheasby, Mrs. Helena Goodman and Mr. Geoffrey Fuller, and also of Mrs. Rita Cowley who formerly lived in the village. We commend them to God's loving care, and we pray that God will comfort and guide

those who are bereaved.

The season of Lent begins with Ash Wednesday on February 24th. A list of times for Shrovetide Confessions before Lent will be found on the notice board inside Church, and the list of Ash Wednesday services will be found in the "Harbury Diary" section of this magazine. There will, of course, be throughout Lent the daily offices of Mattins and Evensong and a daily Celebration of the Holy Eucharist. There will also be on the Thursdays of Lent (beginning on Feb. 25th) at 6.30 p.m. a "Children's Special" in Church at which everyone will be welcome: Then on

the Wednesdays (excluding Ash Wednesday) there will be a Deanery Lent Service at a different Church each week at which the Revd. Canon Raymond Cyster will preach a course of sermons. The first of these (on March 3rd) will be in Radford Semele Church. The one at Harbury will be on March 24th. I would also like to suggest that some people might consider coming to a second service on the Sundays during Lent. We have a splendinumber coming to the Eucharist, which is as it should be ("The Lord's Own Service on the Lord's Own Day"), but I suggest that Evensong, though it can never take the place of the Lord's Own Service, can be a very goo second Service, and indeed can be regarded as a thanks giving for the morning Gommunion (especially when we sing in the Nunc Dimittis "For mine eyes have seen Thy Salvation").

Weather and other difficulties forced the postponement of the meeting to 26th January. The Treasurer and the Secretary reported on their discussions with Diocesan bodies on the new assessment of potential income and were awaiting a decision. PARISH COUNCIL. The Parish Council met on Tuesday 26th January, when apologies were received for the absence of Mrs. C. Jerome. The meeting opened with a discussion on how to make all parts of the village available to people pushing prams and pushchairs, as both footpaths connecting the main part of the village to Windmill Lane are at the moment inaccessible to anything on four wheels! Nothing has been decided at present, but the Council have shown their concern over this difficulty.

Following considerable objections to the introduction of heavier lorries, Parliament has decided to look at the matter again - so it is obviously worthwhile for local councils to make their opinions known.

Planning permission has been granted to "High House" and "Bridge Cottage", and also retrospective permission has been granted to "Bell View Cottages", though the Parish Council do not really approve of being presented with a "fait accompli".

Mr. Sheasby showed some concern at the meeting at the number of people walking their dogs along the stream in Farmyard Field. He would like to take this opportunity to draw villagers attention to the fact that the public footpath does cross the field, but on the other side, near to the Church. Could anyone using this facility please keep to the paths and if anyone is in doubt as the where local footpaths are - would they like a map displayed on the village Notice Board?

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

Luckily, the Prince finds the owner of the slipper, left behind at the ball, and the two are duly married.

The hard work put in by all the actors, especially the youngsters, must have been exhausting, and in spite of the fact that there were only two stage rehearsals (as the Group can only build its stage the weekend before), the performance was very polished. The Group deserve all the thanks that they receive for managing so well despite the restraints

of time and facilities.

PARISH COUNCIL

The Councillors were full of appreciation for the way in which the post and milk continued to be delivered during the snows. Cllr Sharon Hancock had special praise for Ralph Gurden's work in keeping Treen's Hill open when other routes were impassable. Cllr Gurden repudiated the suggestion that he was only clearing a path for himself to the Rugby Club Bar. Cllr Thompson reported that the Road Safety Cttee had failed to meet because of unsafe roads.

Rupert Kettle will be asked to ensure that the County Council devote more money to the repair of

roads damaged by the frosts.

Derisory hoots of laughter greeted the District reply to Parish Council complaints of delays caused by the Sydenham Traffic lights. In a letter admitting

'a few delays at the junction' the Council said that members of the Highways Department had not experienced long queues on the several occasions they had visited the site. The lights it explained. jad been put in to alleviate delays for those using Sydenham Drive! Bruce Hannay, who claims to have been caught in several jams tailing back as far as the Fosse Roundabout, agreed to log his experiences over the following month and armed with this information the Parish Council will once again berate the Highways Department.

Anyone who objects to the notice prohibiting dogs fouling the Playing Fields should stand up and make his reasons known to all at the Annual Parish Meeting, the Councillors decided. They are to replace the Notice which so mysteriously disappeared and add another forbidding unauthorised vehicles

from the Fields.

A Fair is to be given permission to use the Recreation Grounds from July 1 - 4 as this does not clash with any other events such as the Carnival and Pony Show and the Parish Council believes that it is a facility it should provide for the young. The Fair owners were such exemplary tenants last year that no-one had any objections to their return-

ing in 1982:

The Village Hall Cttee applied for money from the Parish Council's Sinking Fund to repair the rotten doors in the Extension. It listed many other vital works including making the roof weatherproof. Mike Ellis thought it would be better if the Parish Council contributed to Capital works which would have the effect of reducing running costs. He was thinking in particular of the upgrading of the heating and the installation of insulation to make the Hall more thermally efficient and so reducing the horrendous heating bills:

The Councillors were delighted when Ray Carter read out a letter from the Electricity Board announcing a refund of £26.80 on their Lighting Bill, but their joy was short lived for the next item of correspondence was a second letter from the Board warning of increases in the costs of

maintaining the lamps:

Your Council is affronted that its corrections to the Draft Electoral Roll were not all accepted

by the District Council and that it was given only three days to object. Sharon Hancock complained that of the 'Electors' had been dead for three years, but that Stratford had refused to remove the names of deceased parishioners. The year begins to stir a little, but do not be impatient. Even the hardiest germinate only slowly in cold soil, and if it is also wet they will not:

Most people believe the snow does a lot of harm, but if you look round after it has cleared away, you will find the deep snow has actually protected a lot of vegetables such as Jap onions, spinach, spring cabbage and Brussels Sprouts, also broad beans. But if it comes a hard frost and no snow these plants will need protection for at least a month. If you have not ordered your seeds it is advisable to look round the seed shops because you will often find that the particular variety is not in stock and it will give you time to send away for them. If you are buying seed potatoes the best way is to fill a tomato box with a mixture of soil and peat and then place 6 potatoes in each box and water same; then put them in a frost proof room at a temperature not lower than 40 degrees and not in the dark: Rhubarb should now be covered if possible with a thick layer of horse manure and built round with old bricks or boards excluding all light. W.F.L.

Francis Badman has been a member of Ladbroke Parish Council since 1974 and Chairman since 1977. He finds his service to the community deeply satisfying. He also brings to it the same enthusiasm that has run through his whole life and through all his careers, for in fact Francis has had at least four different careers.

He was born, brought up and educated in South Wales. It is hardly surprising that rugby is such an abiding interest, and one of the few topics where he differs from other people in Ladbroke. He is an active Vice President and

former Secretary of Harbury Rugby Club, and actually describes his hobbies as the three Rs - Rugby, Real

Ale and Rough Shooting.

When he left school, Francis took the Civil Service Exam and joined the Board of Trade: It was hardly a desk bound job - he worked for the Mercantile Marine Office Service. At the time of the Munich crisis Francis joined the Monmouthshire Regiment as a Territorial. He went to camp in July 1939, and laughingly suggests that it didn't finish until April 1946. After a brief spell in anti-aircraft units, he found himself working in radar after a mysterious trip to London. He was eventually posted to the Fourteenth Army and was training for the invasion of Singapore when the war ended;

After his territorial camp had finished Francis came home and married Gwynne: They have two sons - David is in management with Shell International and Jonathan is now National Sales Manager for Holiday

Inns:

Francis returned to the Mercantile Marine Office Service but was eventually transferred to the Ministry of Civil Aviation at London Airport: He became officer in charge of passenger handling at Heathrow: During this period he became acquainted with many well known and distinguished people - from the Queen to Diana Dors' he says. His success in

261: this post led to an appointment in the Diplomatic Ser-

vice in 1958:

Most of his postings were in the Far East including Pakistan, Malaya and Sarawak and Brunei: Francis clearly enjoyed this work, and recalls with particular pleasure a private audience with Her Majesty the Queen and Prince Philip in Karachi. Francis had helped to arrange a State Visit and he is very proud of the gifts he was given on that occasion. His final overseas posting was as British Consul in Cyprus for nearly four years, and his reception there seems to have been equally warm - he was shot at impartially by both sides during the Civil War:

When Francis retired from the Diplomatic Service in 1970 he and Gwynne found their dream - a thatched cottage in Ladbroke: He is now National Secretary of the British Junior Chamber - an organisation concerned with management training - which he recommends to all those between the age of 18 and 40 who hold, or are training to hold a position of responsibility. There are local chambers in Leamington, Warwick, Coventry and Rugby. Needless to say he brings the same energy and enthusiasm to this job as he has in his previous four (or five?) careers:

Francis describes himself as a life-long Liberal - he was briefly chairman of the local constituency party. But his political stance shows most clearly in his total commitment to grass-roots

democracy.

In addition to his Parish Council work, Francis is a member of the Management Committee of Southam Community Centre, of the Ladbroke Parochial Church

Council, and a Church sidesman.

Although Ladbroke is a small village it has a lively and campaigning Parish Council: Francis is particularly proud of the recent designation of the village as a conservation area. At the same time he will clearly not be satisfied until Ladbroke has a by-pass. Francis feels that the main road is not only dangerous, but almost splits the life of the village. He is also keen to see Ladbroke detached from Southam with regard to District Council elections, he clearly doubts the identity of interest:

Many villages which have lost their schools,

feel that they have lost their social centre. Ladbroke, on the other hand, seems to have united to meet the challenge to its social life. The village shares with Francis a willingness to fight enthusiastically for its future. When Francis Badman says 'I've had a wonderful life' - you know he means it.

KEEPING IT IN THE FAMILY


