My dear friends,

The Confirmation on February 21st was a very happy occasion, and it was a great joy to welcome Bishop Daly. His address was greatly appreciated and valued. In most recent years we have had a

large number of candidates, and this largely accounts for the big increase in our number of Communicants. Pray that the newly-confirmed may continue faithful in their prayers, their worship, their use of the sacraments and their witness to Christ in their lives.

March 21st will be Mothering Sunday, and at the 10 a.m. Parish Eucharist Mothering Sunday Cards will be given to the children to present to their mothers. When British Summer Time begins our Sunday

Evensong will again be at 6.30 p.m. instead of 4.0 p.m. The Additional Curates Society evening at Miss

Aggett's on Shrove Tuesday was very enjoyable, and, among other things, suggested ideas for self-denial by which we might fill our A.C.S. Lent boxes. Quite a number of these boxes have been taken.

We have one big money-raising event for the Church each year (not always the same kind of event). This year it will be a Spring Fair and will be on Saturday March 27th in the Village Hall beginning at 2:30 p.m. Preparations are going ahead well, and any further offers of help or gifts will be welcomed by Pam Clarke (612311), 11 Constance Drive - I hope that it will attract a big crowd.

Our C.M.S. Link Missionaries, Richard and Jane Smith, will shortly be coming to England from Nigeria, and will be visiting us from Friday May 28th to Sunday May 30th. We shall be arranging meetings at which you can meet them.

This is the year of the Bishop's Episcopal Visitation, and the dates for our own Deanery (Southam) are Saturday May 8th and Sunday May 9th: From Harbury parish there are 4 delegates (in addition to myself) and preparations are already being made. I hope that as many people as possible will come to the "Agenda for Apostles" Bible Course when this starts.

#### From the churchwardens

On the first Sunday in Lent the Vicar gave us some most helpful thoughts on the keeping of Lent. He reminded us that, while Lent is a time of selfdenial, repentance and of making that little extra effort, it is also an opportunity for THINKING. Self-denial needs thought and planning if it is really going to help us in our Christian lives. Repentance needs thought in remembering our faults and failings, in confessing and in turning away from sin and seeking to follow Christ. In addition to these aspects of Lent, perhaps we can make a special effort to THINK ABOUT GOD daily by prayer, by fellowship with those who love God and by doing things for Him.

These thoughts of the Vicar's set one of us (who has a weakness for acrostics) thinking how we could use LENT. The best we could manage was the following:

Perhaps some of our time in Lent could be spent in:-

> Learning Excercise (or effort) Nurture Thinking

Firstly, LEARNING. How about that extra 20 or 30 minutes a day Bible study? (if necessary getting up that bit earlier in the morning to give us time.) If you feel you don't know how or where to start, There have a look at some of the books in Church. are several in the library which will help with studying God's word. There are also copies of a booklet called "Agenda for Apostle" which is designed for group use and we are hoping to use it in the parish later on but it is also a useful guide for private study. You would also find one of the Bible studies and meditation workshops helpful. There is

also a book on prayer "Be Still and Know" by a former Archbishop of Canterbury, Michael Ramsey: These two books are available from the table at the back of Church.

EXCERCISE. Those who participate in sport are very well aware of the need for continuing effort in excercising the body in order to obtain the greatest enjoyment and least danger of injury. The same is true of our Christian lives. We need to set some time aside each day for spiritual excercises:

NURTURE. (or nourishment?) We need food if we are to grow as Christians. We can obtain this by prayer and Bible study but primarily by fellowship with others in the worship of the church. The liturgy itself feeds us butwe can also gain much from careful attention to the teaching we receive in the Vicar's sermons. We are greatly blessed in Harbury in that our Vicar is a man of God who gives us such wonderful nourishment in his sermons.

THINKING. We refer back to the first paragraph of this letter for consideration of this subject:

#### PARISH COUNCIL

At the meeting on 24th Feb., great interest was shown in the surveyors, who have been pacing the fields in the vicinity of the proposed <u>Bypass</u>. Apparently they are once again determining the line of the road and the next stage will be the negotiations for the purchase of the land: The footpath from the bridge to the church has been cleared, following a complaint about the dead leaves obstructing the path; and on the subject of paths, the Parish Council has been informed that the Green Lane (E 824) to Priors Marston has been blocked and they propose taking immediate action to remedy this situation.

The meeting was informed that <u>Penfold Green</u> (the unclaimed strip of land in Windmill Lane), is being claimed by the Parish Council on behalf of the village and that the Commons Commissioner will be holding an enquiry to decide ownership.

A member of the Parish Council attended the general meeting in Southam about building a <u>Swimming</u> <u>Pool</u> on the land adjoining the High School: The project will obviously cost a great deal of money and the meeting asked that anyone interested in helping to raise funds for this project should contact Councillor Reading in Southam.

Finally, the Parish Council minuted its extreme displeasure that its District Councillors did not support Councillor Turner, who put the case for <u>differen-</u> <u>tial rating</u> at the general meeting of Stratford Council. John Turner had agreed to put forward the case on their behalf - and when it came to the vote no-one supported him! - Such are the machinations of Local Government.

#### A TRIP TO MARLE HALL

On Monday 15th February Class 10 from Harbury School went to Marle Hall which is situated at Llandudno Junction in North Wales.

We had to be at the school gates by 8.0 a:m:, and we set off at 8.15 a:m. We stopped once during the long journey for our lunch, and we arrived at Marle Hall at 1.30 p.m.

We were shown to our bedrooms and around the building when we arrived, and we were also issued with walking boots, ruck-sacks and waterproofs.

About an hour and a half after we arrived we set off to the Great Orme. We travelled to Llandudno in a coach and walked the rest of the way. From the top we had a marvellous view of the sea. We visited two quarries situated on the Great Orme, which contained hundreds of fossils.

The next day we split into two groups. Group A went on a walk (Trefriw Walk) first and Group B went to Trefriw Woollen Mill. We were all driven to Trefriw in a coach:

Trefriw Woollen Mill was very interesting. We were given a guided tour by a lady who gave us all the information we needed to complete a work-sheet we had.

The Trefriw Walk was tiring as we had to climb a lot of hills but the views made it all worthwhile. We also explored a disused lead mine.

Wednesday was an Ecology Day. Again we split into two groups, but we all followed the same route. After climbing Conwy Mountain we went on to Bodlondet Woods where we had lunch. Then we went to visit Conwy Castle which was built by EdwardI and is beautiful and interesting to look at: After looking around the castle we could go into Conwy to do souvenir shopping.

On Thursday we went to Cefn Caves and Benarth Beach: Group A went to Benarth Beach first and Group B went to Cefn Caves. We had great fun playing a war game in Cefn Caves, in which Mr. Stuart didn't do very well! It was in these caves where Mr. Chapman emerged from nowhere!

Benarth Beach was very interesting and we all enjoyed ourselves.

We did a lot on Friday: We went to Caernarvon Castle, Segontium Roman Fort, and North Wales Slate Quarrying Museum: Caernarvon Castle was my favourite visit. It is another Edwardian castle but very different to Conwy. Segontium also had an interesting museum. I also enjoyed myself at the Quarrying Museum

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On Tuesday 23rd February, we went on a field walk with Mr. Chapman, and Mr. Clark and Miss Maclagen from the Warwickshire County Museum; The field we went to is next to Heron's Cabin, up Bush Heath Lane. We left for the field at about 9:15 am; When we had been walking for about 10 minutes, Mr. Chapman suddenly jumped over the fence. After we were all in the field, Miss Maclagen started positioning us, every three paces. Then we started moving forward very slowly. All the flint was smooth and orange. The few people who picked up bones thought that they were quite rough and dirty. We had plastic bags to put the stuff we found in We did this twice which covered about half the field. It was a pity no one shouted "EUREKA!" which meant they had found a lot of things together.

When we got back to school we had a quarter of an hour to clean the things we had found - including coins. 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

#### PARISH COUNCIL - FEB. 1982

A full complement of Councillors at the February Parish Council agreed the new Standing Orders for Extraordinary Meetings drafted by Mike Ellis who, in his new half glasses alternated between the judicial and the Pickwickian.

He volunteered with alacrity to judge the Carnival Floats again this, with the help of Sharon Hancock. It was a job that 'needed continuity'. The Carnival takes place on June 12 with the Children's Sports the previous Sunday (June 6) and the Pony Show the following Sunday (June 20).

He pointed out that one third of the Village Hall running costs came from the Electricity charges and asked for further quotes for the installation of the new heating system.

He proposed that the Parish Council suggest that Midland Red do not totally withdraw the Sunday bus service but continue with one bus each way for hospital visiting. Bruce Hannay's survey had shown that few people used the Sunday buses. Sharon Hancock said that rural services would never make a profit but were a social service for those without cars, however soon these people would not be able to afford the buses. The cost of being buried in Harbury is to rise

by about 10% this year and by a similar amount in 1983. Erecting a headstone of over 3'6" will be considerably more because of the maintenance problems these cause and curbstones have been banned for similar reasons. It is still much cheaper for villagers to be buried here than elsewhere in the District the Councillors emphasise.

The dead are still with us, David Winter pointed out, on the new Electoral Roll. John Drinkwater had received an explanation for this from Stratford District Council who complained that the Registrars were not always as co-operative as they might be and were at present actually involved in an Industrial Dispute. Sharon Hancock thought that the onus should be on the Elector to return his 'card' but why bother, she said, when one's name would appear on the Roll anyway together with the removed and deceased. Sharon agreed to complete a survey for a Register of Sports and Recreational facilities available in the village. John Drinkwater was still trying to find someone in Chesterton to take responsibility for entering the village for the Best Kept Village Competition. Bruce Hannay would deal with a survey on Public and Community Transport.

Bruce's survey of the traffic build up caused by the Sydenham lights had been interrupted by school nolidays and the 'flu, but he intends to continue. Tim Percival affirmed that Leamington Police had received no complaints about the lights, but Mike Ellis thought this was merely an indication of the reasonable attitude to adversity adopted by the average Englishman.

Major Kettle had replied to the Parish Council that the County was investigating the cost of repairs to frost damaged roads and had hopes of extra financial help from the Department of the Environment. The Divisional Engineer had been made aware of the pot noles that had appeared in Mill Street and the Sutcliffe Pastures Trench. The District Council was to act to ensure that the Old New Inn and Holland House stone walls were made safe. The Temple End seat had been repaired and the Parish Council expressed itself most impressed with the tremendous improvement the conversion of the derelict cottage at Binswood End had made to the whole area.

On the formal Planning front there was no objection to Mr. Cotterill's application for a Carport at Mill View (just as well since it was already built) out there was considerable concern about another 'retrospective' application, that for a 24ft high cadio mast in Farm St. with an antenna 7'10" wide and 10'6" long: Some residents and Councillors thought it intrusive and environmentally damaging:

At school he took a great interest in music and drama, an interest which he still retains:

From Bristol, David went on to Keele University where he studied French and Political

It was soon after starting University Institutions. that he became a Roman Catholic. As part of his degree course, David spent a year teaching in Paris. He gained his degree in 1962 and in that year took up his first teaching post at Hyde Grammar School near Manchester, and it was there that he met his wife Jill who was introduced to him through a school colleague; From there he moved to a post at Stockport School before moving to Harbury in 1967 on his appointment as Head of Modern Languages at the then Bishop Bright Grammar School: In 1975 he was appointed Deputy Head of Dormer School and in 1977, when Trinity School was established, he was appointed to his present post as Head of Dormer Hall. David has retained his interest in French and French Politics and still spends half his week teaching. He keeps abreast of happenings across the channel by listening to French broadcasts and reading French newspapers and magazines and he finds this a great help with his teaching:

David has wide interests and involvement within the village. Soon after his arrival in 1967 he joined in the footpath walks organised by Austin Hill. He has always been interested in hill walking and enjoys taking parties of his pupils and scouts on hikes. #### IN THE GARDEN

March is the first of the three busy months for sowing and planting but for Harbury it will be April before a real start can be made. Should the ground get reasonably dry, plant shallots and onion sets. Spring cabbage will need a small dressing of Nitro Chalk or Growmore but not on the leaves! Strawberry plants and raspberry canes will also benefit from a dressing of Growmore. The broad beans I started in the greenhouse I shall now transfer to the cold frame for 2 weeks to harden off before planting out:

To get the best out of your potatoes, set them up in boxes for sprouting. The best way is to stand them on end with the eyes uppermost in full daylight but with frost free protection. Early peas could be planted at the end of the month, also parsnips and an early carrot, also beetroot: W.F.L.

ACTION RESEARCH FOR THE CRIPPLED CHILD

1981 was the International Year of Disabled People but it also marked the formation of the Harbury branch of ARCC and a very successful first year it turned out to be. During the first 12 months over £4,250 was raised - one of the highest totals for any of the Midland committees. Although the Round Britain Competition accounted for the major part of that sum, almost £450 was raised through other fund-raising events in the village, ranging from coffee mornings to carol singing, Pig Roasts to Pancake Races and Craft Market to 50/50 Toy & Clothes Sales. But it was the tremendous response to the house to house collection in the village - raising over £111 - which gave us the will to organise all the fundraising events and enabled us to donate so much money to help vital research into crippling diseases last year:

We shall be repeating our house to house collection during the week beginning Monday April 5th, and although last year's figure of £111 will be hard to better we would dearly love to .

We would like to thank everyone who made 1981 such a successful year for our group but although the International Year of Disabled People has finished, the problem of disability did not disappear on Dec.31st Please remember that when we call on you at the beginning of April so that we can continue the fight against crippling diseases. #### NATURE NOTES

The end of Feb. and beginning of March signal the start of Spring. The earliest signsare already nearly over; snowdrops and hazel catkins have been out for some time and the alder catkins are at their best. The first of the coltsfoot flowers are about to appear in yellow clumps and the first tinge of green will appear on the trees. Willows are among the first to show green and hawthorn is in leaf towards the end of March. It can be distinguished from blackthorn by remembering that the hawthorn produces leaf before it flowers in May. Blackthorn flowers however, come out before then, and in good years the shrub is dressed in a white gown.

Mammals and birds are aware of the nearness of Spring. In response to the warmer weather and the increase in daylight, the hibernating frogs, toads and newts are on the move, returning to the ponds in which they breed. Frogs in particular are increasingly associated with garden ponds.

From the middle of February onwards birds move into their breeding areas. Rooks have been busy, and the Blue and Great Tits are beginning to pair off and establish territories.

The most obvious birds of the last month have been the Lapwings which have been feeding, sometimes in the company of overwintering gulls:

March is too early for swallows, but by the end of the month Chiff Chaffs, usually one of the first summer migrants, will be calling their repetitive song and the solitary ground-nesting bees will be on the wing: Blackbird and Song Thrush are the earliest garden nesting birds, although their first attempts are often unsuccessful.

Finally, now is the time to look out for the first butterflies. Peacocks, Brimstones and Small

Tortoiseshells will come out of hibernation and they can then be seen flying in warm weather:
