



The Vicar's Letter

My dear friends,

"May the Lord make us truly thankful, and thoughtful for the needs of others" are some of the words in one of the graces sometimes said at meals. This year we have had a bountiful harvest in this country. Our Harvest Supper will be on Saturday October 2nd, our guest speaker will be Mr. Graham Suggett, the Principal of the Warwickshire College of Agriculture, and the entertainment will be "An Old Time Music Hall". Our Harvest Thanksgiving Services will be on the following day (October 3rd) and will be at the usual Sunday times. Children (and any others who wish) are invited to bring up gifts to the Altar rails at the Offertory at the 10 am Parish Eucharist.

November 1st will be All Saints' Day - our Patronal Festival. We shall begin the Festival with Evensong and Procession on Sunday October 31st at 4.0 pm (as the clocks will, by then, have been put back). On the morning of All Saints' Day the Holy Eucharist will be celebrated at 7.30 and 9.45, and in the evening there will be a Procession and Sung Eucharist at 7.30. On the following day (All Souls') there will be a Requiem Eucharist at 7.30 am for the souls of the faithful departed. On the following Sunday (Nov.7th) we shall, of course, be continuing to celebrate our Patronal Festival.

It has now become the custom for us to have a Confirmation in our own Church each year on the Sunday morning before Lent. (Quinquagesima), and we have been granted this privilege again'. In 1983 this will be on February 13th and our own Diocesan Bishop, the Bishop of Coventry, will be coming this time: I would like as soon as possible to receive the names of, and to see, any (young people or adults) who would like to consider Confirmation. The first Confirmation Class will be on Tuesday November 2nd at 6.30 pm in the Vicarage, but if any would-be candidate finds Tuesdays at 6.30 impossible I can always arrange another day or time for anyone who needs it. Before these classes begin, I am arrangin a little "get together" for those who have been confirmed during the last two years: With every blessing,

Three of the 6 new developments have already started - Christian Message, the Contact Group and the growth of the Street Representative system and the fourth, the study group, starts on Wednesday 6th October. Subsequent dates will be fixed at the first meeting.



HARBURY VILLAGE HALL A STATEMENT BY HARBURY PARISH COUNCIL

The Village Hall is the centre of our community. It is used by every age group, from the babies who attend the clinic, to the elderly who go to the Luncheon Club. Now this building that is so important to the village is under threat of closure.

Contrary to what many believe, the Village Hall is not financed from the rates. It was built with money raised by voluntary subscription and fund-raising events and is a charitable trust. It is run by an elected committee though few bother to turn up at the A.G.M. to elect it: For many years the income from letting has not been sufficient to pay for the increasing cost of heating. light and maintenance. The committee has worked very hard to raise funds, but many of the committee have served for several years and it has proved difficult to attract new members'. Now this dedicated committee is threatening to resign and the reason is vandalism'



For many months there has been continual damage to the exterior of the hall, an example of which can be seen in Mike Bloxham's photograph'. Money maised has had to be spent to repair damage that has been intentionally caused. Now there is over £1600 worth of damage and the committee's patience has run out: They have no heart for raising money to repair this senseless damage and have asked the Parish Council to meet the bill.

Money provided by the Parish Council is of course your money raised by rates. The Council has already recognised the ever-increasing cost of running the hall by providing £500 a year for capital improvements and maintenance of the structure. The Council feels that it cannot undertake a further commitment unless the problem of vandalism can be effectively tackled.

The Council are aware that groups of young people are using the back of the hall as a meeting place'. It must assume that some of them are responsible for the damage. The land within the boundary fence is in fact private property and the young people concerned are trespassing'. The Council asks all parents to make themselves aware of where their children are, and to ensure that they are not congregating around the Village Hall. The Council have met with local Police officers and have been assured that particular attention will be given to this problem'. Anyone caught causing damage will be prosecuted and compensation sought.


TENNIS CLUB



SOUTHAM AREA SWIMMING POOL ASSOCIATION (SASPA)

Stratford District Council has started a feasibility study into providing an indoor public

SASAP's aim during this period is to raise public support and bring pressure to bear on the District Council to build the pool at the earliest possible date - 1985/6.

To do this we wish to build a large membership, demonstrate the unquestionable need and riase funds to show the commitment of the people here to use the pool when built.

The need to raise funds locally is vital. Although the District Council will provide the bulk of the finance (estimated at £400,000) it has been made apparent by other council members that before they commit the council, they expect funds to be raised locally.

However favourable the feasibility study is, the pool may depend on the effort put in locally'.

In June we launched our Discussion Report which details the way we expect to proceed and shows the type of pool and the site we are promoting. We are keen that this should be a 25 metre pool, as this would encourage club and competitive swimming: The site on the Southam School grounds, adjacent to the Welsh Road has been offered by the County Council: Being close to the school, this would ensure not only maximum use but also swimming throughout their school years for our school children. Independent access and control by the District Council will make it a public pool in all respects" (We have included squash courts in our Discussion Report Plan to show that the site can be developed further. As squash courts make money, of course, they would assist with the running costs.)

A copy of the report should be in the library or library van if you would like to browse and they are available at cost price - 50p: In the second paragraph I mentioned membership:

PARISH COUNCIL

Police were called to the last Parish Council Meeting'. Not to keep order among the Cllrs, that lory Davies does admirably, but for joint discussions on the vandalism of the Village Hall. It is promised that Pcs will patrol more vigilantly so the PC needn't use vigilantes!

The PC has issued a statement about the violence to the Hall (see page 11) and emphasises it will prosecute and demand compensation. The Finance cttee says it could give short term financial support rather than put the Hall 'on the Rates' permanently, although David Winter reported that many people were surprised to discover it was not a charge on the Rates already!

Bruce Hannay proposed daily inspections of the Hall and he listed urgent repairs including those to rectify damage caused by the installation of the barbed wire. Mike Ellis made noises for a solid steel fence with lockable gates to stockade the Hall and frustrate the vandals but Sharon Hancock asked the Hall Cttee what absolutely had to be done. Answer:- MEND THE FARLEY ROOM ROOF! It leaks like a sieve and water and electricity don't mix! But the Luncheon Club must paddle on for Mike Ellis haunted by vandals vetoed spending any money on the roof until they were stopped.

Hurt, Cllr Hannay felt censured by those who complained the Fair stayed too long. He made strenuous efforts to guage public opinion before giving permission for the extension. The PC assured Cllr Hannay they were happy to receive the £195 the Fair contributed but it was agreed to limit hirings to two Fairs a year.

The Rocking Horse at the Playing Fields is to be refurbished next year and the Slide the year following. Sharon Hancock was opposed to spending any money on the Slide. She thought it ought to be taken down; Tower Slides were dangerous, but Keith Thompson assured the PC ours was one of the safer types. They sidestepped her offer to get Dr. Avery to give his opinion on the safety of the play equipment. Mike Ellis argued that everyone took risks and the PC had only to ensure they were 'responsible risks'.

The PC agreed to upgrade the lighting proposed for improvement last month. It will attach a Litter Bin to the Lamp-post in Chapel Street (it owns that so needs no one else's permission:) Letters have been sent to householders whose trees overhang the pavements and Pc Percival has taken it upon himself to persuade British Rail to cut back the hedge at the Railway Tunnel that obliterates the Bend signs:

Mrs. Catterall's complaint of cars parked ON Depper's Playing Fields will be passed on to the Police for it is contrary to the Bye-Laws (Section 6 Sub-section 1).

The PC endorsed its previous decision to support the Knightcote Route of the M40, conceding that the Gaydon Interchange was controversial and the Warmington Valley campaign justified.

Warmington Valley campaign justified. The PC objected strongly to the application to extend the boundary wall of Holland House by 15 metres. They thought two metres was far too high especially alongside a road as narrow as Ivy Lane

which has no footpath.

The application for a change of use at the Quarries for a Trout and Coarse Fishery was approved with stipulations as to drainage, access and parking

The area has to be fenced to the District Council's satisfaction and although the application for siting a Mobile Home to house the Bailiff was granted there was no Planning Permission implied for any other buildings or works.

The lunacy of the workings of the Double Rating Relief were roundly attacked by the Cllrs. the Parish mows most of the grass areas in the village, although Stratford DC already levies a Rate for this, once in the District and once in the Parish Rate, so the District charges, and re-imburses Harbury PC for the cost or greens maintenance. However, it will not pay capital costs. Harbury's mower had broken and needs to be repaired or replaced. Replacement could cost £4000, a large sum, but still more economical over a few years than contract mowing. Yet Harbury will probably be forced to put the mowing out to contract at great expense to the District because it can claim this money back from Stratford. As Cllr Mike Ellis said 'Do-it-yourself Councils are penalised'.


