

"Religion" said the Rabbi quietly, "is just the same"".

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
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



Harbury Village Hall Standing Committee has sent to the Parish Council the following letter which is self explanatory:-

The Standing Committee of the Harbury Village Hall Management Committee notes with regret the continued vandalism at the Village Hall, which the police are unable to prevent⁷.

The Standing Committee, after carefully consilering this matter, has reached the following conclusions:-

The cost of meeting the repair bills due to vandalism cannot be met from normal Village Hall revenue, and it is also not clear as to how much of the other repair bills is indirectly due to the same cause. It is not feasible to increase the rental charges for the Village Hall to cover these costs, otherwise the level of bookings will decrease because of over-pricing, neither is it fair to burden users of the Hall with these costs'.

4. The responsibility for maintaining the Village Hall and its surrounds and fencing, laid upon the Committee by the Trust Deed of the Village Hall, in these circumstances is unbearable.

The Standing Committee therefore considers that the whole Village, through the Parish Council, should immediately assume the responsibility for all outside repairs (excluding painting) of the Village Hall, its surrounds and its fencing. Should the Parish Council feel unable to assume this responsibility, the Standing Committee will feel obliged to recommend to the full Management Committee that the whole Management Committee should resign.

DO YOU WANT TO LOSE YOUR VILLAGE HALL?

It could happend The Management Committee has threatened to resign if the Parish Council doesn't take over responsibility for maintaining the exterior of the Hall which keeps getting vandalised. A sub-committee will meet the Village Hall committee to discuss the problem.

"Tremendous sympathy" - "soul destroying task" "Pillaged and vandalised" said Mike Ellis, blaming our "Wet, liberal society".

The Charity deeds require that a boundary fence be maintained round the Hall, but this, and the doors, and the windows, and the roof are getting damaged more and more frequently. The Village Hall can't pay for these repairs out of its revenue and unless the PC does so, the Management Cttee and possibly the Hall will collapse.

The painting of the Play Equipment was not to Bruce Hannay's satisfaction and world-weary Bruce had no sympathy for the excuse that the children were scraping off the paint as fast as the contractor put it on. He had been warned not to do the job in the school holidays:

DO YOU WANT TO LOSE YOUR SCHOOL AND POOL?

David Winter confirmed Sharon Hancock's contention that the School might have to close if essential equipment broke down, for WCC has announced it will not repair or maintain a long list of items and it does not specify who should. Mr^k Oliver was "to put it mildly CROSS!" when he read the list, Sharon said. If the filtration plant were to break down and the WCC did not repair it the Swimming Pool would be damaged. The County had committed itself to maintaining the Pool which was built and paid for by public effort.

Harbury's ride-on mower blew up and the PC had been looking at replacement ride-on mowers but the best are very expensive and Stratford won't reimburse capital costs, only repairs and running costs.

The PC got more than it bargained for when it queried the audit fees. The Dof E. and Angus Maude sent weighty answers - pages and pages of obtuse text all to prove the rise is in line with inflation.

The WCC used the same argument to justify doubling the Allotments' rents. The PC must pass this increase on this autumn but it makes nothing on the allotments itself.

The PC recommend a rise of 10% in the Tennis Courts fees. The Rugby Club's letter thanking the PC for its support and informing them it would not use the pitch at the Playing Fields this season, highlighted the Football Club's failure to formally request permission to use the fields. Its rent will go up 10%. The PC approved in principle the use of the old Rugby Pitch by the newly formed Harbury Hawks Under 12,'s football team.

DO YOU WANT TO LOSE YOUR BUS SERVICES?

In the latest round of cuts the 7.50 and 8.10am are replaced by one bus at 8.05am. The service is then two hourly with a gap between 2 and 7 when the last bus leaves for Leamington (at 6.52pm)! The PC insist the 8.05 should be a double decker and leave for Leamington by way of the Fosse; they think that

another bus is needed between 2 and 7 and they demanded that Midland Red publicise the timetable well in advance of the changes'.

The Lighting Cttee is to recommend the upgrading of lights in Bush Heath, Pineham, Manor Rd., Frances Rd., and Vicarage Lane. This will give much better lighting at little extra cost. A new lamp may be needed in Mill Street where trees obscure the poor existing lamps. David Winter has made a survey of trees that obstruct the lights and pavements and owners are to be asked to trim them back. Field Footpath SM62a still needs a stile at the end, to allow the walker to escape from 'the Colditz bit' David said.

There's to be a Planning Inquiry about the use of Fosse Farm, Radford for the repair and storage of agricultural machinery'. The company claim 'existing use', as did the airfield developers'.

The PC has told Stratford it does not want a mobile home sited at the quarries to house the Bailiff in charge of the proposed Trout Fishery'. It would prefer a permanent building and it insists that the Quarries should be completely fenced off for safety'.

And Finally, Litter, Rubbish and Sewage! Dick Picken offered to empty a litter bin he wants the PC to put in Chapel Street. Mike Ellis didn't think it would be used, but Sharon said "the other bins get full - someone uses them!" District Cllr Mrs' Bidwell assured the PC Stratford DC would empty such a bin' Sharon then complained that the plastic bags provided by SDC are PATHETIC and rip' David said they were too big for the holder, but they were both treated to a discourse by Mrs' Bidwell on how they should be attached to the stand. Few Cllrs seemed convinced.

The Sewage met Sharon as she returned from holiday. It was flowing down Mill St, and continued to do so for two days before SDC sent a gang out to mend the broken pipe. Harbury wants an explanation for the 36 hr delay!

The PC decided not to complain about the low level of illumination in the Farley Room during the meeting, for with the Village Hall Cttee on the verge of resigning, it did not seem diplomatic.L.R.

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
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
