

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

THE VICAR'S LETTER

My dear friends,

No, this is not my farewell letter, for, although I shall cease to be your Vicar on April 30th I trust that I shall be allowed to write one more letter for the "Harbury and Ladbroke News". All that I would say now on this subject is to ask you to pray for the Bishop (who is the Patron of the Living) and for any others who may be involved in the choice of a new Vicar, and to ask you to pray for those who will be in charge of the parish during the interregnum.

I am writing this before Holy Week and Easter, and so am unable to give an account of the services of that holy time, but all the rest of April is in that joyful Season which begins on Easter Day and which is called Paschal-time. We rejoice in the Resurrection of Christ both for His sake and because of the new life it has brought us. The consequence of the Resurrection for us is that when we become united with Christ's two fold victory, - over death of the soul (sin) and over death of the body.

The meeting for the election of Churchwardens and the Annual General Meeting will be held in Church on Sunday April 17th after the 10.0 a.m. Sung Eucharist. All who are on the Electoral Roll of the

Church has the right to attend and to vote.

We mourn the loss of a cheery young man of 18, Derek Perry, who was accidently drowned and who will be very much missed. We pray for his parents and the family, and we commend him to God's loving care. We also remember in our prayers Mr. and Mrs. Rigden whose grandson Christopher John Marks died when only a few weeks old. The funeral was in Nottingham. We likewise sympathise with Mr. and Mrs. Oliver in the loss of their grandchild at Whitnash when only a few days old. Finally we sympathise with Mrs. Jennings whose mother, Emma Jane Singleton, has died at the age of 94 and for whom we pray.

THE VICAR

As you will know, Roy Mackley is retiring at the end of this month, after 26 years in Harbury and 52 years in the ministry. He first went to Nuneaton, and Miss Gladys Andrews, who still lives there, sent us these memories of his time there:

Father Mackley came here in 1929, as Curate under the Revd. Frank Taylor until his death. He twice took charge of the Abbey Church for short periods until the Revd. Blamire Sinker from Blackburn was appointed around 1938/39. He left the Abbey to take charge as Vicar of Burton Dassett with Northend in 1948, after 19 years of faithful service. He was at the Abbey during the bombing of Nuneaton when the Church roof was damaged, and went to the scene of houses destroyed nearby.

He also served as Group Scout Master of the Abbey Scout Group for over 15 years, for which he received the Long Service Award and a gift from the Scout Group.

GLADYS ANDREWS (Miss)

Mr. R.T. Murray, former Vicar of Southam, who preached at the service to celebrate the Vicar's 25 years in Harbury, sent us the following:

I first met Father Mac in 1943 when he was curate at Nuneaton Abbey Church. He was already becoming a legend there - a fact emphasised by Nuneaton's Mayor and Corporation turning out in robes for his induction at Burton Dassett - a tribute to a curate which I believe to be unique.

It was a tribute to qualities Harbury has come to know well. A devotion to duty careless of his own convenience, wishes or benefit. An unwillingness to spend time on trivia - when he does say something it's always been worth waiting for. And his wit - deadpan, pawky and never hurtful. All so obviously informed by devotion to his Lord that his just being there preaches the Gospel. I am heartily glad to know him, and wish him joy in his so wellearned retirement.

From his time at Burton Dassett, this appreciation has been sent to us:

It was my privilege to work with Mr. Mackley as warden during the whole of his period as vicar of Burton Dassett.

My first thoughts of him must be that he was a devoted parish priest, known and loved by all, old and young alike. He showed enthusiasm for all activities in the parish, particularly I believe among the young. He helped in forming a thriving scout group, and took them to camps in Wales and elsewhere. He also strengthened and helped a great deal with the choir.

With his support we practically rebuilt the old wall around our very large churchyard at Burton Dassett. We also cleaned our lovely old church from cellar to eaves, with his and his mother's support. They gave us the run of the vicarage for hot water, refreshments and the like, I may add that this had not been attempted for around 50 years.

Our P.C.C. has already written to Mr. Mackley

wishing him every happiness in his retirement.

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

LADBROKE GENERAL NEWS

There seems to have been a "storm in a teacup" over my last month's paragraph on the subject of the proposed Ladbroke Bypass, and I should like to take this opportunity to put the record straight. Firstly what I write in this magazine is entirely my own point of view and nothing to do with Ladbroke Parish Council. Secondly my contributions, like all others, and subject to the scrutiny of the Editorial board.

The general dismay in the village over the need for a Public Enquiry, is not due to any idea that the scheme would not stand on its merits, but because the money has been allocated for 1984 and any delay may mean that this sum might be allocated elsewhere and it could be some time before sufficient funds are

again available.

In addition to this the need for the Bypass becomes daily more apparent, as the revival of the motor trade has shown a marked increase in convoys of car transporters, and we are only weeks away from the introduction of heavier lorries on British roads.

Whilst appreciating that the interests of the objector should be considered, any further delay in building our Bypass, could have serious consequences for the safety of the village children and the passing motorist.

THE GREAT RICE PUDDING RACE

A document came into my possession (why me, I thought) before Christmas giving details of a County Council competition to construct a haybox in which to

cook a rice pudding.

Easy so far, or so Class 9, myself and our Y.O.P. Jon, thought. Off went the entry form, then we realised the implications. Not only did we have to construct an efficient haybox, but also had to carry out experiments on thermometers, insulation, keep a weather record, find out how and at what rate various liquids lose heat, etc. etc. Using the information gained, we had to justify the materials used in the construction of the box.

What is a haybox, you may ask. It is the daddy of the slow-cooker. On a gas or electric ring you bring whatever needs cooking to boiling point, then place it quickly (in it's saucepan obviously) in the box, which is basically like a small tea-chest, packed with hay, polystyrene or any good insulator. Theoretically the food will continue to cook,

without any further use of fuel.

THE BIBLE SOCIETY

Mr. Sharp moved to the village as a small boy and lived here for just a few years but he has vivid memories of the life and the people. and his recollections were fascinating: Winnie Cleaver of Farm Street who tried to teach him the piano; Reg Thornicroft and his bakery; Alcock's slaughter house; wells running dry; the Binswood End murder; the night soil cart; Miss Bird and Miss Bustin the School teachers and the sympathy of the whole village when his father died.

Discussion went on long after the talk had finished with his contemporaries recalling people and places and the rest of us listening in amazement to the primitive conditions described. The true enthusiasts continued the inquisition in the Crown later.

After the Sharp family left the village in 1927 to give the children a better chance of a start in business, they lived in Leamington. Mr. Sharp joined the Fighter Command in the Second World War and became a cartographer, producing top secret maps and charts for the War effort. After the War he continued in the profession and has to date produced 700 maps and town plans. At 72 his work is still in demand and he still lives in the same house in Lillington Road with his 99 year old mother.

IN THE GARDEN

On looking back over the last 50 years it is quite noticeable to see that the seasons have not changed; it is only the gardening methods which have altered. Years ago the bulk of the planting commenced on Good Friday and

as the weather has been in March I think this date will still be a good guide for the main planting. Make a start with sowing a small amount of lettuce, radish and spring onions. Finish sowing broad beans. Should you have enough space, plant main crop potatoes but your early varieties leave until the ground is warmer and less likelihood of frost. Plant a few summer cabbage. Runner Beans and French Dwarf Beans should be left until the end of the month. A reminder to sow Parsnips, Beetroot, Peas, Spring Onions, Onion Sets and Shallots. The Jap Onions no doubt will need weeding and you can soon start to thin same and use as Sprin Onions. It is never too early for thinking about what you are going to put in the Show in September.

Dear Editors,

Land Development (Loxley) has applied for detailed Planning Permission to build twelve detached bungalows on the land off Farm Street which was subject to a Planning Appeal three years ago.

Eleven of these executive bungalows are served by a short extension of Honiwell Close, but the twelfth fronts Farm Street and occupies a position of prominence in the middle of that delightful sweep of grass

which verges the western side.

There may be some opposition to the scheme because it uses small communal access drives to nine of the dwellings and the Farm Street plot is in an important position where insensitive detailing could destroy the still essentially rural character of this

part of Harbury.

In the County Structure Plan it is argued that Harbury should only grow sufficiently to house its own natural increase in population. Many people would argue that expensive Bungalows are the last type of housing to satisfy this need, but the houses will undoubtedly be in great demand. Where will the potential buyers come from and what happens to the young village couples looking for starter homes?

The question poses moral and social problems which seem unanswerable. A Speculator needs to sell expensive houses to recoup the cost of buying expensive land in Harbury because ours is a desirable community in which to live; land is in short supply here and Planning Permission is difficult to obtain. In come the middle aged and out go the young.

Through the Harbury News I would like to thank the many people who have bought 'Tear Fund' tea. I have frequently been asked for more information about the tea estate in Assam that produces the tea marketed by Tear Fund. Around 100 years ago missionaries came to an area of Assam to save the desperately poor Santal tribe. Their plan was to give impoverished Santals the chance to set up as independent farmers. Though potentially fertile, the land first had to be cleared of disease infested jungle. They were so successful that the colony has since become the Mornai Tea Estate employing some 3000 people. Now controlled by the Northern Evangelical Lutheran Church, it supports two hospitals, various schools, a community centre, a crêche, a club house for the young, old age and maternity benefits. A central Church holds Sunday services. I quote from the Tear Fund's own publicity... "the only Christian run tea plantation in India. 'The only tea garden', comments a government report, that gives the workers the maximum of welfare...."

If anyone would like to read 'The Tea Trade' by the World Development Movement, I would be very happy to hand it out. It provides information about all aspects of the tea trade around the world.

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
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
