

My dear friends,

We have had a wonderful Christmas. It was heartening to see the Church filling up for Carol Service after Carol Service and for Eucharist after Eucharist during the season, and there was a record number of Communicants. It is good to see this steady increase in the number of Communicants. The Church was beautifully decorated, and we thank those who gave the lovely flowers and evergreens, did the decorating and set up the Crib and the Christmas tree and arranged the Candles. I would like to thank all those who kindly gave me presents and Christmas cards.

The Christmas Fair was a very happy and successful event and made a profit of a little over £700.

We learn alas! that repair work has to be done to the Church Tower, and an estimate for $\pounds 2600$ has been received for this, of which $\pounds 750$ is for urgent work.

Congratulations to Mr. John Wilson of Victoria House, Farm Street, on being made a Judge. We feel it is an honour to the village too (has a Judge ever resided in Harbury before?).

We mourn the loss of Mrs. Towell who will be greatly missed both by the Church and the village. Although they had lived only some four years in Harbury, she and her husband had quickly won the hearts of many people by their kindness and goodneighbourliness, and the very large congregation in Church at her funeral was an indication of the respect and affection in which she was held. May God grant her peace and rest in His nearer Presence, and may He grant comfort and guidance to her husband and daughter.

Our bellringers have rung the old year out and the new year in (did you hear them at Midnight?). People often talk about making New Year resolutions. I would rather speak of forming good habits. There are two habits which should be aimed for. Never let a day go by without at least a few minutes of quiet, to read about and think about and talk with Jesus Christ; and never let a Sunday go by without joining with others at Church in the worship of God at the Lord's Own Service. And a third little habit - but don't tell anybody. Perhaps once a month to begin with, but it will grow into a habit, do a small act of kindness without anyone finding out. It doesn't matter how small it is, it helps to make the Christian life fun, as well as just good.

New Year is a good time to look back and give thanks for all God's gifts during 1982 and to look forward and to pray for enough to live on during the coming year, particularly when there is so much uncertainty about jobs. 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
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GOODBYE and HELLO

CONGRATULATIONS:

to David Hagan who is now "Midland Under 16 Cricketer of the Year" for 1982. He was selected from a pool of over 900 other young players, gathering 1800 runs in total this season, of which 277 were scored for the county. We wish him continuing success in 1983.

It was good to see Lynne Chick of Wagstaffe Close back home on Christmas Eve after several weeks in hospital. We hope she continues to make a good Take 24... (or was it 25??) footballers, 2 miscellaneous referees, a sprinkling of seasonal goowill and vigorous "stirring" from the assembled crowd and you have the Boxing Day Over 30's v under 30's football match.

The Village Hall Committee has resolved to ask the Parish Council to levy a Supplementary Rate to be used to make essential repairs to the extension roof. (There will be a Public Meeting to discuss this in the New Year).

Quotes for patching the existing flat roof were beyond the means of the Hall Management Cttee. Treasurer Ken Clarke estimated that the Hall would have only £500 spare by the end of the year.


Three possible sources of financial help were the County, District and Parish Concils. The County runs a Grant Aid Scheme but this is over subscribed as is the District Loan Scheme for Village Halls. The Parish Council could levy a Supplementary Rate and have the money available by next year. Advice from the P.C. Finance Chairman Keith

Advice from the P.C. Finance Chairman Keith Thompson was that constructing a pitched roof for the extension would eliminate the problem for the foreseeable future. This could most fairly be financed from the Parish Rate which was lower than that of most surrounding parishes. A penny rate would cost the average Ratepayer £3 - £4 for the year levied. Application could be made to the County and District Schemes for money for other essential repairs to the other flat roofs and the window and door frames.

Ken Clarke pointed out that the Hall was already charging as much as it could for the hire of its facilities'. If it charged more, bookings would drop off. The Village Hall was a non profit making Charity and in its way subsidised village organisations (manily those dealing with children) by charging lower rates for rooms they used.

Sally Townsend has agreed to take on the task of issuing bills for the hire of the Hall and it was agreed that outside organisations would be charged a returnable 50% deposit to cover breakages and extra cleaning costs. LINDA RIDGLEY.

THE TROUBLE WITH THE CHURCH IS IT'S ALWAYS AFTER YOUR MONEY.....

An often voiced complaint, but one which for many years could not be fairly made against Harbury Church. For a long time we held no fund-raising events at all, relying for our income entirely on contributions from our congregation through our Envelope and Covenant Schemes: During that time, however, we did receive donations from others who though not regular attenders at the Church - acknowledged the important place the Church has in the life of the village: You don't have to be a churchgoer to realise that the Church is a symbol of the village the oldest building, and one which we owe it to future generations to protect and preserve:

Year by year, it costs more to maintain the Church, to heat and light it and to carry out repairs, and we are happy to say that the larger congregations have meant we have just about kept pace with things'. But now we have an enormous extra cost to meet - a greatly increased Diocesan Quota'. We (and all Churches) have to pay an amount fixed by the Diocese towards its costs, the biggest part of which goes to pay vicars' salaries. If we want to have a Vicar of Harbury in future years, we <u>must</u> play our part in paying for this privilege.

For this reason, we have started a fund-raising campaign - which began with the letter we sent to you all earlier in 1982. We are sorry to report that with one or two generous exceptions - we received almost no response at all. So we have decided that we must organise events, as other village groups do, to raise these vital funds. We promise to try to make all our events enjoyable, and good value for money. HOLIDAYS IN THE LAKES AT WHICHAM OLD RECTORY.


Older residents will no doubt remember the family who now live at Whicham Old Rectory in the Lake District.
