

My dear friends,

Words fail me to give adequate expression to the thankfulness I feel for all that happened on my last Sunday as your Vicar. I was deeply moved by the great crowd at the Sung Eucharist (chairs had to be brought into Church for extra seating), by the tributes paid to me in Church after the service, by the lunch in the crowded Village Hall and the further tributes and presentations made to me there(including the very generous cheque). These gifts came from money collected from a very large number of people, and I do thank you all. In addition, I express my thanks for other gifts received from a number of individuals and families, and from the following organisations: the Theatre Group, the School Governors, the School, the Cub Scouts, the Scouts, the Venture Scouts, Guides, Brownies, and their adult committee, the Church Men's Group, the Mothers' Union, the Bellringers, the Clergy of the Deanery Chapter, the Roman Catholic community of Harbury, and the Golden Age members. As if they had not already done enough for me, the PCC hired a selfdrive van(driven by Viv Aggett)in which some of them came with my furniture, and some others with me in my car. They loaded and unloaded the furniture, put it in position in my flat and properly 'saw me in'. I am very happy here, and would be very glad to welcome any of you who could manage to come this way.

One of the presents you gave me on my last Sunday morning was a radio cassette recorder and player, and that evening Peter Holt brought me a cassette recording of the service that Sunday, and of the speeches made afterwards in the Village Hall, so that I have been able to listen to it all again. He also brought me a recording of my sermons on the previous three Sunday mornings, so that I can have the unusual experience of hearing my own sermons!

We mourn the loss by death of Miss Beatrice Mary Mallabone. I took her to The Limes home in Stratford on the day before I left Harbury, and I gather she was happy and contented on the few days that she was there, but then she had a stroke and had to be taken to Stratford Hospital. In hospital she was very well looked after, and always seemed contented and relaxed. I am so glad that I was able to be with her only a few hours before she died. Her whole life was one of love, devotion and service to God and to other people. Nearly 23 years ago she gave up her home in Nuneaton to come to Harbury to look after me, and I owe her more than words can tell. For more than a year she has been in failing health, but she has struggled on valiantly, and many of you have been so kind and good in helping her. While she was in hospital someone or other from Harbury journeyed every day to Stratford to visit her, take her what she needed and do things for her. Our last Sunday in Harbury must have been a great joy to her. Presentations were made to her both in Church and in the Village Hall, and she must have realised how she was appreciated in Harbury. Her body was brought into Church in the evening of 26th May, and a Requiem Eucharist was celebrated at 7.30p.m., attended by a large congregation. Her funeral service at 10 a.m. next morning was again attended by a large congregation, and the burial followed in Harbury cemetery.

May God guide and bless us all.

LADBROKE GENERAL NEWS

PARISH COUNCIL MEETING, 17th May. Mr. Francis Badman was elected Chairman, and Mr. Tom Sheasby Vice-Chairman. All members are to serve on the Planning Committee.

A major part of the discussion was the poor electricity supply to the village, which is subject to constant power cuts and poor voltage. As 58% of the parish income goes on electricity bills, it was decided to make inquires about this. The Parish Council had been alerted to the fact that the Poultry Farm was not sticking to regulations laid down in its planning permission, so they unanimously agreed that this should be reported to the Council.

ANNUAL PARISH MEETING, 17th May. Well over 40 members of the public supported this meeting which, considering the size of Ladbroke's population, was a very good turnout indeed!

Mr. Badman gave the <u>Annual Report of the</u> <u>Parish Council</u>, giving details of all the various matters the Council had concerned themselves with over the year. e.g. Penfold Green, the Snack Bus in the layby, planning decisions and of course the

s. The Parish Council had had a busy year, he nd had done their best to protect the s of the village.

Peter Williamson reported on the work of ial Charities, and he concluded by saying ibone Charity had some money in hand 'for the village', so if you have any ideas i them to the non-ecclesiastical trustees . P. Williamson, Mr. F. Badman and Mr. y.

n <u>Mr. Spencer-White</u> gave a brief talk as Councillor, making the point that he was 'at service, anytime!' and only as far away as the nearest telephone. However, he neglected to give his telephone number!

Mr. John Turner, one of our District Councillors, talked about the problems of building a swimming pool in Southam, and about the erroneous report that Stratford Council were spending £75000 on a nuclear shelter.

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Having dispensed with the local politicians, it was interesting to hear the report of the W.I. in their 10th anniversary year. <u>Mrs. Meriel Williamson</u>, their President, told of speakers and demonstrations on such diverse subjects as tombstones and Christmas crackers! They had supported various charities and helped to spring-clean and refurbish the Village Hall.

Mr. Dave Wilson gave the Annual Report of the Village Hall Committee, saying that they had consolidated the progress of previous years. Some fundraising events had been more successful than others, and so the committee was keeping this situation constantly under review. He stated that it cost fl a day to run the Hall, and that they were looking for ideas to keep it used and to increase income. Money for the roof repairs was now ready and the next major job was to draughtproof the walls. Mrs. Irene Bennett, Mr. Andrew Pearson, Mr. Alan Stubbs and Mr. Ron Smith were newly elected to the committee, and will no doult be helping to spread the gospel "if you want a Village Hall, come and support it!"

Finally came the discussion everyone was waiting for - the Bypass. Unless the objections are withdrawn at the last minute, the Public Inquiry will be in the Village Hall on 26th and 27th July. Everyone at the meeting was obviously grateful that the Parish Council had been able to push matters so far, and were eager to give their total support in this, hopefully the final stage of a long battle. With this aim in mind, a 'Ladbroke Bypass Action Committee' was elected consisting of Mr. Neil Justice, Mr. Peter West, Mrs. Kate Liverton and Mr. Alan Gould. If anyone has any positive ideas which may help at the Inquiry, please contact one of the above. Let us hope that when we all gather in the Village Hall for our next Annual Parish Meeting, work on our Bypass will already have begun!



HARBURY ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

Cty. Cllr. Mrs. Bidwell got such a rough ride at this meeting that Ralph Gurden was moved to remind the audience that she was only a 'new girl'. She had been quizzed by the audience on a wide variety of topics, and by far the most contentious was that of housing. Members of the public were indignant that the latest estate planned for Harbury would provide executive bungalows when it was strongly felt that there was a need for inexpensive 'starter' homes for the young of the village who, Mrs. Middleton complained, had 'no hope of ever buying a house here'. Peter Holt agreed that f50,000 luxury homes were not what was wanted.

Cllr. Mrs. Hancock pointed out that the chances of the young and not so well off being able to stay in Harbury were further depleted by the policy of selling off and not replacing family-sized council houses.

Chairman Iory Davies complained of the excuses used by the authorities for their tardiness in repairing roads footpaths and lights. Lack of funds and shortage of labour were the usual ones. Neville Ellis reported that allotment rents were to rise to £6 because the Cty Council had put them up. There was no waiting list.

Mike Ellis reminded the assembly that improvements to the level of illumination in the village must be decided 'in the light of' current needs and economies. David Winter announced that Neales Close is next in line for the new pavement patching called 'Pave-seal' and he reported dismally that SM62a, although improved, was still only for the adventurous. Mrs. Ethel Sollis asked that a footpath be made on the western side of Farm Street, and residents of Queens Close suggested that Butt Lane should also have a path.

John Drinkwater reminded parishioners that development on the land at Farm Street/Honiwell Close would start soon but that the proposed estate at the Spinney had been turned down at Appeal.

Mrs. Middleton was very concerned that the new estate off Sutcliffe Pastures would have to use the exit at the Surgery, and asked what would happen if an accident took place. John Drinkwater explained that both the Parish and District Councils had opposed the plans.

Ted Coupe gave a depressing report for the Recreation Ground Committee, saying that there had been no capital projects, notices had been defaced, and the tennis nets stolen. He was resigning as Chairman, and he apologised for the lack of a Statement of Accounts because there was no treasurer. There had, however, been an encouraging increase in the use of the facilities, notably by Harbury Hawks, and a summer Play Scheme was planned to arrange guided play for children, but the Committee did require new members.

Sue Andrews was able to confirm that the new heaters and the change to Economy 7 had reduced electricity charges for the Village Hall. She explained that the Charity Deeds required the Village Hall Committee to maintain a fence around its property, but that it also served the useful purpose of fending off offending footballs. L. HARBURY PARISH COUNCIL, MAY 1983

It's nice to have Denis Atkins back on the Council! "We know where his bent lies" said John Drinkwater, and promptly elected him to Lighting. But we missed Ralph Gurden, Mike Ellis and the others. Indeed, it was a strangely truncated Council - only 8 members, 3 new, and one absent. The lack of a representative for Deppers was particularly strongly felt. Out of the blue, Bishops has sent a request for boundary

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changes to take over the Quarries and Deppers, but the Council decided it could make no decision until Deppers had representation.

Parents of pre-school children in Deppers wrote to seek assistance in finding a hard standing for the Play Bus. The playing field was suggested, but the Parish Council will try to interest the County in the construction of a layby to serve the school bus, the library van and the telephone kiosk, as well as the play bus. The parents will be told this and reminded that there is a vacancy for someone from Deppers. There is still money waiting to equip the Play Area, but no decision on what Deppers wants.

Strange events happen in these far-flung corners of the empire. The Enforcement Officer has been out to see the 6 St. Bernards of Highfield Terrace, and reports that they do not contravene the Planning Regulations! He has also looked at the tyres stored on the railway banks and says they will be gone in 3 months, but who owns the land?

It's been a month of mysteries. Denis Atkins told of the eerie midnight excavations at the Bendigo Mitchell crossroads. In contrast, the railway bridge repairs were well managed. On the subject of highways, 'Sherlock' Thompson asked whether any top dressing was planned, for he had spotted the tell-tale chalk lines on the road. A resident of Queens Close who wrote demanding the PC put up a street sign there was told it is the County's responsibility.

Sharon Hancock began her Chairmanship of the Council on a thoroughly practical note. When told of the invitation to the opening of the Bishops Bowl Lakes her first question was 'Are they offering any refreshments?'.

It's a great help to have the three District Cllrs. in attendance at PC meetings. Mr. Macaulay was able to give some of the background to Bishops' astonishing suggestion of taking over Deppers and the lakes.

John Drinkwater follows up all planning applications and puts the parish's point of view at the District planning meetings. It has been a bumper month - the Village Hall roof, the conversion of a barn and stables at Harbury House, various extensions to existing properties, and proposals for a house on the Farm Street site and stables at The Beeches. The proposal for a house in Farm Street saw the Parish Council united in implacable opposition.

The Recreation Ground causes many headaches. Will the Pony Show be able to take place? 'It hasn't rained for two days' said Iory Davies optimistically. The mower keeps breaking down and weeds are invading the tennis courts.

There was mutual praise amongst the Councillors as they changed jobs and acknowledged each other's former deeds, but they were all equally generous in their appreciation of Kay Pallott. She deserves a medal, or canonisation, for she has agreed to act as Play Leader for the Summer Play Scheme at the Recreation Ground in August. The idea is to interest and entertain the children during the holiday, and of course to keep them out of mischief. L.RIDGLEY.

.....I was 35 when I was working in Oman as Project Engineer for Wimpey's. I was young, healthy and fit, playing squash, football and rugby, and married to Kathy, with two young children, Debbie and Darren. One night I was feeling off; a few people around, but miles away in the desert. I was going to bed. I fell asleep. Then, early in the morning, I suddenly. woke and found I couldn't speak. I couldn't find the words. Also, I couldn't move my right arm and leg. They drove me back to the doctor in the town. don't remember much after that. My next clear memory is an airport, a tiny plane, and the flight back to Heathrow with another man who had injured his back, and 2 stewardesses. From Heathrow I was taken to St. Mary's Hospital in Paddington, London, where I stayed for 13 weeks having tests, but I still couldn't speak or walk. Then I was moved to my parents' home in Binley Woods, Coventry. Kath and the children came to join us. Darren was at boarding school in Warwick then. I had physiotherapy to help me walk, and Kath spent hours with books to help me speak and copy. By then I could say a few words, but only a few. We stayed for 7 months, and then moved to Bury, Lancs., to our own home. We stayed there for a while, and then heard of a house with a Hairdressing Salon for Kath, for sale in Harbury. We moved in over Christmas 1981. I was still unable to speak much or walk far. I had treatment at Warwick Hospital, and still do. Vicky Macgowan and I met in January 1982. We began to work together and I really had to work hard. Mary Rolfe (the physiotherapist), Denise Fowler(the speech therapist), Fred Hutchins, Beryl Checkley and Wendy Knowles have all helped, and thank you all! Vicky and I realised that it was working, the experiment, but sometimes it was tough going! Now I am able to go for long walks, read the papers and books, shop, go to coffee mornings and to the pubs, talk to people and even write this article! One day I shall go back to work (fingers crossed!) but I would like to thank Harbury for being friendly, and tell other stroke victims to plug away and not to worry about what they can't do yet; one day the nightmare might be over.

Sharon Hancock showed slides produced by the Medical Campaign against Nuclear Weapons. From past experiences of Hiroshima and Nagasaki, medical experts can only conclude that medical facilities of our present standard would be totally useless in coping with the aftermath of nuclear war. Drugs, doctors and equipment would only be available to a minute proportion of survivors.

Whether to play along with Civil Defence measures is the question the BMA are grappling with at the moment. Gordon Avery explained that this eminent professional body had the responsibility to inform everyone, governments in particular, that nuclear war is neither winnable nor survivable.

His major political interest has been Foreign Affairs and particularly the problems of developing countries He has served on a wide range of Select Committees in the House, not only in Foreign Affairs and Overseas Aid but also in Estimates, Accounts, Procedure and Science and Technology.

Frank also finds time to enjoy the company of his wife, two married daughters and three grandsons, manages a bit of gardening and a holiday now and again in the family touring caravan.

Over the next few days all political Parties will be placing great emphasis on their major manifesto policies so I would like to write a few words about Alliance policy towards rural communities like yours. Of major Parties Liberals - now Alliance - have a special concern for countryside matters.

Jobs & Industry: Agriculture, the basic countryside industry, employs relatively few people, therefore special encouragement should be given to new light industries in rural towns and

villages, especially those using redundant farm buildings.

Transport: High fares discourage use - help should be given, with a move towards Community buses.

<u>Post Offices</u>: The Alliance is pledged to maintain rural Post Offices: yours could be threatened under a Tory government.

Local Bobby: Community policing is vital to the security of young and old alike: village constables with their local knowledge should be retained.

Just a few thoughts about some problems which face us. I look forward to your support on 9th June.

CORRESPONDENCE

Dear Harbury News,

I am working as a 'foreign volunteer' on a farming settlement in the Negev desert, 6 kilometres from the Egyptian border. The settlement is a selfcontained co-operative unit of 25 families, all of whom are of Anglo-Saxon descent. Each farmer has 3 hothouses, acre of orchard crops and about 2acres of free land. They are given a limited choice as to the crops they can grow, and if one has a bad year it is hoped the success of other farmers will keep him The main crops are flowers, tomatoes, pepper: afloat. melons, grapes and mangoes. These are all marketed under the wider auspices of the 'National Workers' Moshar Movement', thus farmers are guaranteed a market for their goods. Intensive agriculture is carried out in the desert sand with the aid of a sophisticated drip feed irrigation system designed and made in Israel. This is the key to success in this arid desert which gets little rain and much sun!

This is a strategically sensitive area, so the Moshar is fitted out to become something of a fortress if the need arose. It is guarded all the time by resident soldiers and armed residents who take turns at guard duty. The military presence in the area is strong but is necessitated by a constant stream of illegal immigrants crossing the border from Egypt and engaged in minor terrorist activity. The nearby 'Gaza Strip', unlike the West Bank, is a 'no go area' for both Israelis and Westerners. You cannot go very far without being reminded that Israel is a country still at war. The people who have seen so much conflict in the last dozen years show signs of war-weariness, and internal tension is accompanying strife in Lebanon. Despite all this, life goes on, and the Government forges ahead with settlement of the desert and to a lesser extent the contentious West Bank. Peace and stability in the region seem further away now than at any other time before 'Oper ation Peace for Galillee' - 'the war to end all wars PETER EDWARDS. - a sad irony.

(Peter, of Temple End, has been working in Israel for 6 months. Since he wrote this letter he has apparently toured Southern Egypt as well as Israel. Eds.)

Dear Sirs,

As a Ladbroke resident of several years' standing, I was rather puzzled to discover from the May edition of Harbury & Ladbroke News (Harbury Society report) that according to Ms. Sarah Day of the Warks. Rural Community Council, I am living in a village whose 'death knell' has sounded, a village 'attractive only to the elderly' which has 'lost the active younger element'.

Whilst I should not claim to be unusually energetic or athletic, at 27 I do feel that I have not yet merited the description 'elderly', and yet 2 years ago my husband and I found Ladbroke sufficiently 'attractive' to move house within the village, considering ourselves very lucky to be able to do so.

Recent years have seen something of a population boom in Ladbroke, to which I have contributed, and as I write the arrival of 2 more babies is imminent! The Southam PPA Playbus is so well attended by children under school age that it now visits Ladbroke twice a week instead of once, and the Village Hall, revivedin 1979, has also firmly established itself as a social centre, one that is 'actively' used by villagers of many ages.

I know that Ms. Day visited Ladbroke for its Parish Meeting last year; perhaps that visit was not long enough for her to gain a true picture.


