

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

Thanks to David and Pam for the 'loan' of their house and also to everyone involved in preparing the lovely tea.


FREE CHURCH FAMILY SERVICE

EASTER VESTRY & Annual Parochial General Meeting. This was held in the Village Hall on Monday April 11th ... and the attendance was sparse ... as usual. Mr. Hedge having indicated that he did not wish to stand again, Messrs. D.C. Rutherford and J. Garner were elected as Churchwardens. Canon Fishley and others paid tribute to the great service Mr. Hedge had rendered over the past fourteen years. The Deanery Synod representatives remain Mrs. Clarke and Mr. Rutherford. The P.C.C. were re-elected en bloc with the addition of Mrs. Todman, Mrs. Badman and Mr. Hedge. The Treasurer presented the year's accounts which were accepted with thanks to Mr. Comfort and to the Auditor, Mr. Clarke. After discussion it was agreed to attempt the replacement of the S. Aisle roof this summer.

Canon Fishley said that he had informed the Archdeacon that, in view of Fr. Mackley's retirement and the union of the two benefices now being largely agreed, he would be prepared to look after Ladbroke services up to the end of September or up to the appointment of a new incumbent of the united beneficewhich ever was the earlier. It was announced that Ladbroke has once again entered the Best Kept Village Competition - it would be nice to get an honourable mention this year!

The Mobile Canteen in the Ladbroke lay-by is to be tolerated for the moment (much to our Parish Council's dismay!) following a site visit by the appropriate authorities. However they have been asked to remove the obtrusive advertisements and for the moment this ruling appears to have been obeyed.

The X59 Sunday bus service, with 3 buses a day between Ladbroke, Coventry and Oxford is to be re-

introduced on 29th May.

I have saved the most interesting news to last! - re the <u>Bypass</u>. At the time of writing there remain two objections to the scheme and if these are not resolved a Public Enquiry is to be held in our Village Hall on 26th and 27th July this year. It is most important that this meeting is supported by all those in favour of the Bypass, as well as by the objectors so try and keep these dates free! It has also been announced that two accesses to the village have been agreed, and not the one southern access that the Parish Council had hoped for.

All these gifts were bought from the money collected from very many people both in Harbury and elsewhere - and there were more presents to come, when the proceedings in the Village Hall got underway! After a charming entertainment by the Adventurers, Iory Davies spoke on behalf of the Parish Council, saying how many changes there had been in Harbury during the Vicar's time here. He said how much he would be missed for his kindness and help to everyone in times of difficulty, and he wished him a long, happy and healthy retirement. Next came Colin Oliver, who pointed out that the Vicar went to Harbury School to talk to the children on four days every week, and had therefore become a very important feature of life at the school. On behalf of the school he presented the Vicar with a stout walking stick, and he too wished him well.

Reg Harris spoke for the Church, and in an emotional speech he recalled his long friendship with the Vicar. He quoted Tom Hauley - "Behind that quiet unhurried manner lies a life devoted to his work..... Harbury is a better place for his ministry among us".

Tape recordings have been made of the Vicar's last few sermons, and of the entire proceedings on that last Sunday, and so that the Vicar will be able to listen to these, a further gift bought for him was a Radio Cassette Player. He was also given a cheque and Miss Mallabone was given a beautiful silk flower arrangement.

This was a moving and emotional occasion, and the great sadness felt by everyone at the Vicar's leaving was obvious throughout. Most of the people in the Hall that day have never known Harbury without Roy Mackley, and find it hard to imagaine it after he has left. All have their own memories of this quiet, kindly man, but everyone who knows him has the greatest respect and affection for his sincere and gentle manner. With the support of Miss Mallabone, he has devoted himself to the service of the Church and the Village, (as Mr. Murray said last month) so obviously informed by devotion to his Lord that his just being there preaches the Gospel.

Both the Vicar and Miss Mallabone will remain in our memories and in our prayers. (more photos overleaf

Sarah Day. Warwickshire Rural Community Council's Field Officer was last month's speaker. She came to explain the work of the Council (which tries to improve life in rural area in practical ways), and in particular the history of the Best Kept Village Competition, showing many slides of the villages which had won the Competition in the past.

Replying to criticism that the Best Kept Churchyard Competition had been responsible for the demise of Harbury's Churchyard daffodils and primroses by encouraging the premature mowing of the grass, for tidyness sake alone, Sarah Day agreed that this was contrary to the aims of the Competition, which were to 22. inspire greater care and awareness of the attractions of the place, and she urged the Society to make this defect clear to the Competition organisers.

She mentioned Cosira, the Council for Small Industries in Rural areas, which encourages the setting up of small firms in villages as a way of providing employment and preventing settlements becoming mere dormitories.

The loss of its school was often the death knell of a community she said. The village became attractive only to the elderly and lost the active younger element. Ladbroke was currently suffering this syndrome. Shops, and other facilities were vital but the critical size for retaining these services was rising. The WRCC's Shopping Basket Survey had proved that once the cost of transport to the town was taken into account, village shops could compete with the supermarkets and were in some cases cheaper.

To keep a settlement healthy and retain its young people, employment, services, shops, a school and housing were needed. It was sometimes very difficult for young people to afford houses in vil-

lages said Miss Day.

PARISH COUNCIL

Cllr Mike Ellis is getting a big map! The EMEB is providing him with a plan of all the village lights and as his final bow he has volunteered to paint numbers on the standards for easy identification. He and Cllr Sharon Hancock have been out together, (at night?) surveying the lighting times of the lamps and have suggested that some, which stay on all night could be switched off at midnight to save the PC money.

Iory Davies made a plea for the Vicarage Lane light to be one of these for he has received many complaints from 'a certain lady' who claimed it kept her awake at nights, 'when I know for certain she sleeps in the back bedroom' he incautiously added!

All Deppers lights are on all night, except as Cllr Ellis said, 'the one that's off!' That has been out for over a year despite repeated pleas for its repair and the PC is to have a credit note for all

the power it hasn't used.

For the Best Kept Village Competition, Bruce Hannay wants to give Harbury a Super Spruce, so he's been on his annual survey. He's pinpointed the drunken gates of the Village Hall, which are to be removed; the Rose bed is to be tidied and all the redundant tree stakes and ties are to be removed. Neville Ellis will do his usual brutal but effective

26. weed kill and the Scouts have cleared litter from the whole village and will receive a donation of £15 for

Job Week funds from the PC.

Cllr Neville Ellis recommends the removal of the Chapel of Rest Holly trees. Now he is a conservationist, a great tree man and he would not suggest this lightly. It seems its either the trees or the Chapel roof, and the Chapel does serve a useful function it shelters the Parish Mower, which incidentally no longer needs a road fund licence since the Greens are now contract mowed.

Allotment holders are dropping like flies. Parish Clerk, Ray Carter estimates there will be half a dozen plots vacant by the autumn - and presently there is no waiting list. Now is the time for the young and enthusiastic and landless to grab their

opportunity to sample the Good Life.

The Fun Fair planned for April had to be postponed because the Playing Fields were too muddy and the proprietor did not want to spoil his good reputation with the PC by churning up the grass. The

Fair is now booked for 12 - 20 September.

Much activity and concern on the Planning front this month. The PC has approved the re-submission of the Conservation Areas Report and investigation at Stratford by John Drinkwater has elicited the information that the DC is considering the village for Conservation Area designation.

The enforcement officer has been out to look at the building of an extension in Mill Street which the PC thought was not proceeding to plan. He reports that lack of funds has halted work but what appears to be a carport will in fact eventually be a dining

room.

He is to be called out again to look into a possible change of use at the Water Tower site where lory Davies assured the meeting previously the bree-

ding of 'free range pigs' took place!

There is a spate of development at that end of the village. Mr. David Andrews has applied to convert a stable block to housing, Mr. Chris Burnham wants permission for a residential caravan whilst he converts a barn. The PC looked at the site and agreed to the development provided the caravan was temporary and the conversions used one access only,

away from the Station Road junction.

Problems with the roads abound. The mud at the Airfield site is to be reported to the DC and the police. The edging stones in Farm Street have been migrating into the road, but of far greater consequence is the closing of the Fosse. (see article p.19)

Contrary to received opinion, there have been notices displayed about the forthcoming local elections. The one outside the Library's still there and that on the ONI Green Noticeboard stayed for a few

days!

Unfortunately it seems there is little enthusiasm for joining the Council. Harbury is short of 3 members and lory Davies said there was a similar problem throughout the south of Warwickshire. It was likely that those nominated would be elected unopposed and the short-fall made up by nominations at a further date, with election if necessary.

Several long serving members of Harbury Parish Council will not be standing for re-election:Mrs. Catterall who for many years has served Deppers

Bridge;

David Winter and Neville Ellis who have been active on the conservation front;

Mike Ellis who held tight (very tight) to the PC purse strings for 12 years on and off;

and Ralph Gurden who has served Harbury as Parish and sometimes District Councillor for almost twenty years.

The Chairman thanked them all for their devotion and public spirit. We have been lucky to have such selfless people to look after our best interests.
