



From the Churchwardens

September 1983 is a great month for us. It is the month in which we welcome our new Incumbant, the Re Canon Antony Rowe. We give Canon and Mrs. Rowe and their sons Stephen and Nicholas a very warm welcome and we hope they will be very happy among us.

Details of the times of Sunday and weekday services are on page 4. The change to note particularly is that the Sung Eucharist will be at 10.30 am and not at 10. The time of Evensong will not in future change from 6.30 to 4pm during the winter. Evensong on the first Sunday in the month will be at Ladbroke and not at Harbury (except for 2nd October when there will be a Harvest Evensong at Harbury).

There are also details elsewhere of the Collation and Induction on 23rd September. All are welcome (although space will be limited) and we are particularly anxious that there should be representation of all aspects of village life to give Canon

Rowe a real Harbury welcome.

THE COLLATION OF THE NEW RECTOR

The special service at which the Church and parish are "handed over" to the new Incumbant is called an Institution and Induction or where the Bishop of the Diocese is the Patron (as in our case)

a Collation and Induction.

The Service will be held on Friday evening, 23rd September at 7.30 p.m. in Harbury Church and Canon Rowe will be Collated by the Bishop and Inducted by the Archdeacon. He will be wecomed by representatives of the Deanery, of other churches and of local authority and village organisations and it is a service for everyone. Unfortunately space will be fairly limited as there will be two coaches from St. Mary Magdalene, Coventry and Clergy from the Deaneries of Southam and Coventry South as well as parishioners of Harbury and Ladbroke. However, please don't let that keep you away - do come, but come in good time if you want a seat! The Service will be followed by refreshments in the Village Hall.

RECORAGE OR VICTORY?


The face of Harbury is changing. Visitors always get lost in the village as it is - and now, just to confuse them (and us) further, number 2 Vicarage Lane will henceforth(from 23rd September) be the Rectory not the Vicarage. There must be other places in the country with a Rectory in Vicarage Lane/Road/Street but not, I imagine, all that many.

Why, when we've always had a Vicar, should our new Incumbant be a Rector? The reason is historical and as far as function is concerned there is now no practical difference whatsoever between Vicar and Rector (or Perpetual Curate for that matter - but that's another story). The historical difference is that a Vicar was the Incumbant of a parish in which the tithes were impropriate and a Rector of a parish in which tithes were not impropriate! So now you know. All right! All right! What it really means is that a Vicar was a representative of a Monastery and the greater tithes were paid to the monastery & only the lesser tithes to the Vicar personally whereas a Rector received both greater and lesser tithes. Tithes were payments made to the Church of a proportion of income from various sources in the parish. Nowadays all Incumbants receive the same stipend (or salary) as other Incumbants in the Diocese. When two parishes, one with a Vicar and one with a Rector are joined, the Incumbant is a Rector as in the past he would have received all the tithes.

Then, of course, there's the question of why our new Incumbant is CANON Rowe (please, no cracks about bringing the big guns in). Canon is an honorary title bestowed on clergy with a record of honourable service in the Diocese. In addition to Honorary Canons there are also Canons Residentiary who have special duties in a cathedral and who "live in". Then there are Prebendaries and Provosts, Deans and Rural Deans and.....but maybe we'd better leave that until next month.

FREE CHURCH SERVICE

The Rev. E. Harrison led the worship in July. The Way, the Vine, the Light; Jesus called himself by several names. He said he was the good Shepherd. A stranger can call a flock of sheep and they will disregard him. When the shepherd calls they recognise his voice and follow him. Jesus calls us by name and we can hear his voice and follow him. He is the shepherd who can be trusted to lead us through all life's problems and joys. If we follow him in complete trust we need never fear. The Free Church flock at Harbury is very welcoming to all. Why not join us on September 25th?

Many people in the village have little idea of the interesting life of service led by our Rector before he came to Ladbroke. He was born in Devon where his

father was a station master with the Old Great
Western Railway. Educated at Bodmin County School

and Exeter University College he obtained a B.A.

(London) degree in 1923.

In 1924 he became a master at the Royal School in Wolverhampton and was ordained Deacon in 1929 at Lichfield. Ordained priest in 1930 he became chaplain and second master of the Royal School. Later, in 1938 he became a hospital chaplain and in 1950 Vicar of Hunningham, Wappenbury and Weston. In addition to his parish duties he became Director of Religious Education for Coventry Diocese in 1957.

Canon Fishley came to Ladbroke in 1960 as Rector and again added further duties as Rural Dean of Southam in 1966. He officially "retired" in 1976 but continued as acting Priest-in-Charge, travelling regularly from his retirement home in Kenilworth to

take services and visit his parishioners.

The Churchwardens and PCC wish to record their deep sense of gratitude for Canon Fishley's 23 years of Parochial Care for Ladbroke which will end this month. As Rector and latterly Honorary Priest-in-Charge Canon Fishley has never spared himself in the service of others and has been throughout a wise leader, a kind friend and a Christian example to all his flock. Our sadness at his departure from our midst is offset by the knowledge that he has truly earned his retirement and the hope that it will be long and happy.

We look forward with confidence to the arrival of Canon Rowe. We wish him and Mrs. Rowe happiness and fulfilment in all that lies ahead for them in Harbury and Ladbroke.

LADBROKE BYPASS: By now most villagers will have heard a full report of the Public Enquiry into our proposed Bypass. It was certainly very gratifying to see that over eighty villagers turned up wearing their badges to indicate support for the scheme and I am sure that all the vocal support everyone gave will have made an impression on the Inspector. We now will have to wait patiently for the Inspector to make his report and just hope that this delay will not put the proposed starting date back by too many months. In the meantime the Bypass Action Cttee intends to make sure that the Department of Transport and the Member of Parliament are kept fully informed of the latest accident statistics. It is ironic that in less than a fortnight since the Enquiry there have been three separate accidents with varying consequences in the centre of our village.

TEARFUND & TRAIDCRAFT TEA

Tearfund tea is still for sale at 19 Farm Street. The present price of 78 pence per 250 grams, will soon rise to 90 pence - but is still good value for quality tea. Several people have asked me about tea bags. Tearfund are now producing these, but at the moment they are unavailable locally. I have,

therefore, got some Traidcraft tea bags. It is pure Ceylon tea and comes in bags of 80 for 95 pence. The profit from this tea goes largely towards the tea workers' wages, but 10% also supports development work for the Third World. If you are concerned about the people of the Third World, then purchasing goods from an alternative trading group like Traidcraft or Tearfund, helps to promote greater justice in trade between rich and poor countries. Traidcraft also produce ground and instant coffee and if there is enough interest I would be happy to get some stocks in.

The World Development Movement campaigns for changing the conditions that perpetuate poverty. Literature and goods marketed by the W.D.M. are available from 'Juteronomy' in Kenilworth (which also keeps the full range of Tearcraft goods) and also from Oxfam and the Third World Information Centre above Oxfam, Bath Street. Leamington.

'THE DILLEN'

The often vivid memories of the elderly are a rich source of social history. Angela Hewins not only listened to the recollections of her husband's 98 year old grandfather, she recorded them on tape. After he died in 1977, Angela, who lives in Knightlow Way, wrote a book based on the recordings, called 'The Dillen'. (Dillen is an old Warwickshire word, meaning the runt of the litter). The book is a marvellous portrait of George Hewins' struggle against poverty and deprivation, not in one of our great cities, but in Stratford-on-Avon, where he was born, and spent his life. The book (now available in paperback) has been a tremendous success. The Coventry playwright, Ron Hutchinson was commissioned by the Royal Shakespeare Company to adapt the book for the stage, and it is currently being staged at the 'Other ?lace' in Stratford.

The director Barry Kyle, boldly decided to take the production out of the theatre and into the streets of Stratford. He recruited 200 local people to take part. The result is a triumphant, and often very moving evocation of our recent past. The audience follows the cast, including a band, through the streets, down to the river, along the old railway line. At one point it is crowded into an army marquee, to watch in the gathering dusk, what it was like for George Hewins in the trenches of the First World War. Finally a torchlit procession of cast and audience

returns to the theatre.

I took my children (14 and 12) to see 'The Dillen'. Despite the length of the evening (3½ hrs) they were enthralled throughout, and thanks to the incredible organisation we had no problems seeing & hearing it all. Not surprisingly, the production has been a sell-out, but there are occasional returns, and hundreds of people watch parts of the play from vantage points along the way. If you have a chance to go, don't miss it - I promise you an evening to remember.

PARISH COUNCIL

Parish Councils are truly representative and democratic. Parish Councils are conservative and traditional. They maintain and defend a rural way of life. They have their successes and they have their setbacks.

When the kamikazi pilot flew over Harbury on August 15th, Sharon Hancock's phone rang for over an hour with complaints about the near miss. It was suggested that Harbury ought to be represented at the meeting with the MoD to be convened by Dudley Smith in Leamington, as the increasing frequency of the flights was causing concern about the safety of

the village and in particular the School.

The democratic process has been hampering Harbury's attempts to gain representation for Deppers Bridge. Having at last found people willing to stand for the Ward, minor mistakes in the nomination papers have caused elections to be postponed again, but several parishioners from Deppers were in attendance at the August meeting to question Bishops Itchington's claim to their part of Harbury and to persuade the Council that a site nearer the Ladbroke turn was the better position for the proposed lay-by. They lobbied the Council for the provision of a Speed Limit. Mr. Fletcher and others explained that nothing stops traffic speeding through the hamlet at 70 mph. The Parish Council agreed to try to gain the support of the Chief Constable in this matter.

The cost of equipment for Deppers Bridge Playing Field caused great despondency and residents had to be convinced that the more expensive commercial type was essential both for its durability and in order to satisfy the Insurance Company's require22.

ments.

The Parish Council had provided Insurance cover for the recent Play Scheme on Harbury Fields and the Chairman thought that the Scheme had been such a success and filled such an obvious need that it ought to be encouraged. She asked the Recreation Grounds cttee if it would be willing to provide organisational assistance next year.

Harbury's only bus shelter was squalid and vandalised John Drinkwater reported. The Council is considering demolishing it but must first make sure

it owns the eyesore.

Repairs to the Village Hall roof were in hand and would take six to eight weeks. Unfortunately costs had risen due to the increase in timber prices and the need to use larger timbers than anticipated to construct a storage area within the roof. Not only might an extra £900 have to be found but there was some confusion over whether the work would qualify for the expected Local Authority grant aid!

Queens Close now has both footpaths and a roadway and the PC will pass on a request for a path to join it to Vicarage Lane. The Playing Fields Mound had been reshaped and the surrounding area is to be

rotovated and seeded so that it can be mown.

The Council accepted the Tree Survey commissioned from the Harbury Society which advocates putting Tree Preservation Orders on over sixty trees in private ownership! It also expressed concern over one of its own trees - one of the Farley memorial Chestnuts in front of the Village Hall. Children are climbing the tree, and there are worries that they may fall on to the pointed spikes of the fence. The Council would prefer to make the fence safer than spoil the tree, and the Playing Fields cttee were asked to try and get this done.

Steve Chaplin, the new Chairman of the Recreation Grounds cttee was present to apologise for the non-submission of the Accounts. It had proved impossible in the holiday period to get together with the previous Chairman to try to untangle the Finances, but he hoped to be able to present a Balance Sheet at

the next meeting.

The Parish Council wrestled with two Planning problems concerning building work partly completed.

A cottage conversion in Mill Street where the Enforcement Officer had already been involved was still causing concern. Mr. Saunders of the Beeches recently received permission to erect stables on land behind his house, but neighbours complained to Dist. Cllr. John Drinkwater that the footings were being dug in the wrong place: nearer their property. Cllr Drinkwater pointed out to the builder that they were in the wrong place and he visited the site with Stratford's Enforcement Officer and ordered work to stop. However, the footings were later filled with concrete and Stratford had to institute Legal proceedings. There has now been an application for retrospective Planning Permission for the stables and the Parish Council is vigorously opposed to this both on the grounds of principle and because of the nuisance caused to the neighbours.

In their role of defenders of tradition the Parish Councillors are to send a representative to the Wroth Silver ceremony on 11 November. This ancient rite has been observed on Dunsmore Heath in an unbroken tradition for over 700 years. In it various villages pay due to the Duke of Buccleuch and Harbury has the honour of having to pay the most!

IN THE GARDEN

There is nothing much to sow or plant, but plenty to harvest in September. Transplant seedlings of Spring Cabbage, earth up celery and leeks, cut out the old raspberry canes also the cultivated blackberry canes. Towards the end of the month lift main crop potatoes.

Keep your Jap onions free from weeds. Onions should be lifted and dried off and stored for winter. Put grease bands on apple and pear trees to trap or deter various pests in winter and spring. Don't harp on what has failed but cherish what has done well.

When Father Antony Rowe decided that the time was right for him to leave the large city parish where he's been for the past 24 years, he wanted a complete contrast and he felt that Harbury & Ladbroke would provide exactly that.

There are similarities: in the parish of St. Mary Magdalen, Chapelfields, Coventry, he found a very strong sense



of community, and great warmth and friendship, and his first impressions here are of friendly co-operation within and between the two parishes.

Father Antony was born in Coventry, went to St. John's College, Durham, served in the Armed Forces for four years (2½ in India), and then taught for 5 years before entering the Ministry. He was Curate at St. Luke's, Holbrooks, Coventry, before becoming Vicar of St. Mary Magdalen's in 1959. He met his wife, Jean, at a Youth Club at St. John's (the parish where Canon Churchill was Curate), and they have three children, Anne, the eldest, who is married, Stephen (24) who has been in Mombassa with 'Missions to Seamen' and will go to Theological College this autumn, and Nicholas, the youngest, who is 21.

Father Antony lists music and the theatre as his interests, but insists the latter is as a member of the audience, not the cast!

The details of services in Harbury and Ladbroke have yet to be worked out, but obviously Father Antony is aware of the advantages, as well as the problems, which can result from this United Benefice. He is very anxious that Ladbroke will not be 'swallowed up' by the

far larger parish of Harbury, and that it retains its own identity. At the same time he hopes the two parishes will, in time, draw closer together and explore all the exciting opportunities this new grouping can provide, and he is aware of the desire of both parishes to make the union work - and work well.

He feels strongly that the Church should be the centre of the community it serves. He hopes all the residents of both villages will think of the Church as their Parish Church, and of him as their

Parish Priest.

Father Antony says that - despite the sadness they will obviously feel at leaving behind the many friends they made in Coventry - he and his family are looking forward eagerly to coming here, and they have the support and prayers of us all as we welcome them into our community.
