

It has been encouraging to see an increase in congregations at the main Services in the past few months but there may be some older or more frail members of our community who would love to come to Church but are unable to do so because of lack of transport. There will be many opportunities for additional worship, meditation and devotions with the Deanery Lent Services on Wednesdays (see the leaflets in Church for details) and with our own Services but there are other things we can do personally and individually to prepare ourselves for the great festival of Easter. Lent is not just a time for giving something up but a time of training does not refer to the period of training in terms of giving up things but of doing something positive gressive effort - just a little bit further, faster or smoother each time.

Don't forget the Songs of Praise on 25th March, the Rector would welcome suggestions of hymns - choose hymn and come and sing it.

From The Rector

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Lent 1984 is about to begin - Ash Wednesday is

7th March. It is possible that the statement will not be of any major significance to you and even if you are ally major churchperson, you may accept it in a zealous churchperson, you may accept it in rather a negative way. Sometimes people think Lent is a dreary process, when there are no flowers in church and one is urged to give up something. Of course Lent does lead on to Holy Week, with Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday and Good Friday and then there is the glorious and joyful festival of Easter Day, which is so thrilling and happy. But Lent seems less attractive. I prefer to think of it as a time of opportunity and of endeavour. It is not just doing without, it is doing something positive. Striving to know more of what Jesus expects of those who turn to him. Achieving something. Making some situation better because of effort on my part. Lent is a time for all Christians, young, middle-aged or old alike - all who wish their faith to be alive, flourishing and increasing - all who really want to respond with heart and soul and strength and mind. Lent is not dull, but is related to the Spring. We all welcome Spring with its promise and hope. Spring which speaks of the bursting forth of new life and growth - the lengthening of the hours of daylight and the incentive to start our afresh. Let Lent be a new beginning - a time to question the extent and the quality of our response to God. Is our Worship more than the second s worship more than just a regular habit Sunday by Sunday? Is our prayer life as rich and as comprehensive as it should be? Is there more we could offer to Our Lord so that because of us the work of the Church is enhanced and expanded?

The cynics like to wag their wise old heads and tell how the Church fails so often to be relevant and to minister to the real needs of the people. To say that in Harbury and Ladbroke would be far from the truth, but at the same time we know that our worship could be worthier, our prayers could be fuller and our commitment to the Gospel of Christ could be greater. The opportunity to do all these things is constantly in our hands and time and time again we intend to make a start - but

Lent provides the spur to all our good intentions and encourages us to draw nearer to Our Lord and walk more closely with him. The effort of keeping Lent well is not to give us the satisfaction that by doing so, we are better Christians, but to help us to realise what it is to be a disciple, what it means to try to love God and serve him as he deserves.



HARBURY SCHOOL CROSS COUNTRY 1983/84

We have almost reached the end of the school's cross country season. At the moment it is congratulations to Wendy-Kate Ottewill, Dayle Summers and Darren Board who, on Saturday 4th February won selection for the Central Warwickshire team to meet the rest of Warwicks in the County Championship on March 10th at Nuneaton.

The first meeting was last September when we went to Priors Field, Kenilworth where the children had to run through two streams in their cross-country event.

October saw the meeting held at Southam High School when the children had to run against continual driving rain - somehow the weather is always cruel to us at this meeting! Our children didn't do so well here but undeterred they took on the Campion Hills for the third league race. The start and finish of this race was St. Paul's School, Leamington.

During November the children were invited to take part in a race at Kineton High School. The weather was good and the children did very well but the ground was rather muddy! In fact one young lady finished in her socks, having stepped out of her pumps in a muddy field, and one boy left one of his shoes in a stream.

One cold, frosty morning, for the first race after Christmas - but the last of the league meetings everyone headed for Priory Park - a beautiful setting on such a bright day but the races were very, very tough. All was forgotten an hour or so later when the boys were awarded a trophy for finishing in fifth place in the final league placings.

The final meeting was the Central Area Championships which were held at Priors Field. You may remember that this is where the children have to run through two streams. At this meeting we almost needed life-savers! The water in the streams was knee-deep - on adults! Imagine what it was like for our third year children, in particular, Dayle Summers, Roy Coupe, Stephen Reid Steven Thompson and Simon Grinnell. All these children did exceptionally well and together with Darren Board, Ian McDonald, Vincent Crossan, Simon Waddell, Philip Mancel and Maxwell Summers managed to gain fourth place for the team in the final placings. It was at this meeting that the three children qualified for the County Championships. Also well done to Adrian Taylor, Shaun Christopher and James Playdon who have taken part in the league races but were unable to take part in the final race.

Children are not chosen for the school team. Anyone from the third and fourth years may take part provided they can run up to $l_2^{\frac{1}{2}}$ miles (girls) and 2½ miles (boys). The first four from the school to finish make up the team.

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

Some of these spaces are Village Greens and are safe from development, but others are not and are very vulnerable. Do you want all the gaps filled in? PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

Planning matters are assuming greater importance at the Council's monthly meetings, and Chairman Sharon Hancock protested that Harbury does not want every space filled in with housing. Cllr Bruce Hannay presented his colleagues with the relevant parts of the Draft Structure Plan. In particular, Cllrs were pleased with the statement that development in villages should contain a 'mix of properties', but they wanted this to have 'teeth' so that it could be enforced to give Harbury more small inexpensive houses.

The application for 4 detached dwellings on Wagstaffe Close was rejected by the Councillors. They queried the ownership of the frontage, felt that the development would be detrimental to the Grade II Listed Manor House, and did not want extra traffic on the narrow cul-de-sac which is a pedestrian access to the School.

Mr Mrs Hodkinson told the Councillors of their horror at hearing of a Planning Application for a fast food outlet at 2 Park Lane. They live at 2 Park Lane! In fact the Application relates to the Old Forge next door, and Councillors reassured them that they were wholeheartedly opposed to the change. There is no parking on the junction. The School Crossing Patrol is sited there and the shop would overlook the Burial Grounds, which would be most undignified. The litter, noise and odours generated would also be offensive.

The cost of burial is to rise as part of 'an ongoing' three year plan to increase rates in line with inflation. The Cemetry mower has been repaired and a new Strimmer purchased.

The Council has decided to defer replacement of the Allotments hedge until it has contacted the Manpower Services Agency, for Cllrs who attended a meeting on the range of work it undertakes are keen to put together a package of jobs around the village.

Not only would the Parish gain free labour for these tasks, but there is also grant aid available for the materials used.

Mr Wilkinson of Field House, drew attention to the damage done to the Pound by cars, either parked there or running onto it when passing other vehicles.

Cllrs complained about mud spread on the highway by vehicles using the entrance to the industrial estate on Harbury Lane, but Whitnash Parish Council was reported to be taking action on this.

Nothing has been done to stop the seepage of water on Temple Hill which on frosty mornings resembles the Cresta Run so the Parish Council has asked the County Highways Department to investigate and decide who is responsible.

The Divisional Engineer is to be asked for the specification for the Deppers Playbus hardstanding because Cllrs feel that by community efforts they may be able to construct it for less than his £840 estimate.

Iory Davies was pleased to report that Mr Smith, the School Crossing Patrolman, is on the mend, and will resume his duties when fully fit.

The School Managers regretted that the Education Committee had decided that Harbury must lose 0.9 of a teacher. It has not said how, yet.

Stratford District Council's new Sponsored Litter Bin Scheme was received with some scepticism. It allows local businesses or individuals to sponsor a bin, which then carries a small plaque with their name or logo on it. But Sharon Hancock did not think it would be of use here for as she said "The ones we've got don't get emptied!".

The Annual Parish Meeting will take place on April 19.

IN THE GARDEN

In the Midlands March is a month which is unpredictable, consequently do not be in a hurry to sow small seeds in the garden, should the ground dry out, weed your Jap. Onions and Spring Cabbage but do not disturb the roots, also lightly fork the ground at least three inches from the roots and apply a small amount of Growmore so as to give the plants a start. Where gentle heat can be provided Chrysanths cuttings can be taken, also pot your Begonia and Gloxinia Corms. Early potatoes should be brought into the light. Shallots can now be planted out on prepared ground. The pruning of your fruit trees should be finished this month. In a sheltered part of the garden early peas and Broad Beans can be soan. Why not start a few lettuce seeds on your window sill ready to plant out under cloches.
