

FROM THE RECTOR

Christmas willsoon be here again and already things are beginning to happen which swallow up so much tim and can even wear away our patience. There are card to be bought and sent off, presents to be hunted for and what seems like a thousand and one things to be thought of and fitted in, so that we keep Christmas in the accustomed way. For some, there is a sort of pleasure in all this hectic preparation, but not for all and I wonder what joy there is in it, or whether perhaps some feel required to do it rather as a necessity or worse still as an unavoidable chore. What a pity if the preparation becomes so arduous that what we are supposed to be celebrating is most! forgotten and all we want to do at the end of it, is breathe a sigh of relief and recover from the effort Christmas is a celebration and if there is no joy and hope and expectation in what we celebrate, then really it is no celebration at all and we are making a futile and empty gesture.

The celebration, as everyone agrees, is to do with the birth of a child. Usually the birth of a child does bring joy and hope and expectation, but the birth of this child, the child Jesus, promises so much more. For what Christmas is all about is the

birth of God's Son and what calls for the celebration is that the Son of God has entered our situation, to share our human condition with its joys and its sorrows, to live and to die like one of us. He comes to show us the way to the Father, to bring us before his throne and into his very presence. This is very easy to say and it has been said before, over and over again, but when all is said and done, that is the cause of our celebration. No wonder then that the Gospel tells us that Angels sang at his birth and that people of low and high degree came to worship him and to offer gifts. That then is the cause of rejoicing.

For me, if I do not come to worship, in like manner as the Shepherds and the Kings, Christmas is of no significance and a shallow pretence of celebration. Whereas if once again I can be filled with wonder in remembering the birth of Christ, and my heart can be overjoyed with all that his birth means to mankind, then the celebration is a real celebration and I am once again renewed with hope and more able to face the world I live in and not be overcome with despair.

I shall be very pleased to see you at All Saints over Christmas and say I wish you a time of real celebration, of joy and of sharing. May the year ahead be a time of peace and greater understanding in the world.


QUIZ NIGHT

FOR: THE PARISH MAGAZINE

I have been asked by your Rector, Canon Rowe, to write something about my work here in Grenada. Through the Ingrams this parish has been in touch with Harbury for the past few years. The work of the parish is basically similar to that of any English parish but the social, cultural and economic background is totally different.

Grenada is a relatively small, mountainous island, very beautiful, with some magnificent beaches - particularly in the South. It has a lush vegetation with many fruits and vegetables (mangoes, avacados, citrus, bananas). The climate rarely goes below top sixties (Fahrenheit) or above bottom nineties, night and day. There are only two seasons - wet (now) and dry (Dec-May). The population is about 90,000.

Gouyave, on the North West coast, is a town whose life centres on agriculture and fishing. The main crops are bananas and spices (nutmeg, mace, cinnamon and clove - Grenada is known as the 'Spice Island'). The fishing is done by line from boats or by pulling in by hand, enormous nets along the coast line. Anyone can go and help to 'Pull the net' and get a few fish to eat as a reward.

We have a large population of young people, and much

unemployment and underemployment (the odd day's work is available from time to time). The standard of living is low. Wages are low: if you can find work, a labourer may earn the equivalent of £16 per week. At the same time, folk are responsible for providing virtually all books and equipment for their school-children.

All this affects how the Church ministers to people. There is a constant work load with the young, through school (all the schools in Gouyave itself are denominational - Roman Catholic and Anglican); Church sponsored Youth training schemes - one very near to Gouyave; and the usual Youth Groups, Sunday schools and Confirmation classes. There is considerable interest in our Music Ministry, as we try to renew our Liturgy in the context of the local culture.

Apart from the main Church in Gouyave this parish has three mission stations which I cover with the help of a lay reader. There is strong denominational allegiance and, at the same time, the flourishing of various fundamentalist and Pentecostal sects which, at present, are not inclined to work with the older denominations. It is a West Indian feature to see quite small towns with many Churches.

Sadly this does not help to heal the turbulence of recent years with the Marxist Revolution, which, after promoting, not unsuccessfully, its ideals, brought itself violently and chaotically to an end in 1983 when the U.S. intervened at the invitation of regional Island Governments. The revolution left some ideological confusion in its wake, particularly among the young - not least those who had been militarised. The Revolutionary Army was disbanded in 1983 and elections held in 1984.

The Church on the whole has kept a low profile politically (though it was an eventual target of the revolution) and has continued ministering to people in the name of Christ, through all the ups and downs. I have been here sixteen months, having spent six and a half years in the neighbouring island of St. Vincent, which though similar in social and economic terms, has very much its own character. I am the last English Parish Priest in this Diocese - The Windward Islands. The clergy are

now virtually all West Indian.

It has been a great privilege and joy to serve God imthese islands for this time.

CHESTERTON & KINGSTON PARISH MEETING

It is 12 months since the Parish decided to remain independent and the 3rd Parish Meeting was held on 3rd Nov at Lodge Farm, Chesterton. Mrs Noden was in the chair. Cllr J. Turner gave his support and led us gently through the format. For such a small community a lot was discussed: mainly the M40 proposed site of service stations at Barn Hill. More information has to be obtained from Banbury and it is hoped that the special meeting, that will be called in the near future to discuss it will be attended by interested persons outside the village as well as the residents. We have decided against a Parish Rate this year and do not object to the proposals made by Mr Tilley for Chesterton Wood; Woodlands Grant Scheme.

Puffed with pride over our 3rd place in the Best Kept Small Village Competition we were brought to size by comments from the Conservation Architect stating that since 1800 Chesterton had been reduced to a minor rural Hamlet and does not warrant a special conservation area. All relevant buildings are listed.

We have been advised to form a committee for Civil Defence and who blows the whistle or rings the bell has yet to be determined. Mrs Noden, Mrs Ball and Mrs Collis all have an equal chance.

It was nice to be reminded that we are rural and to learn of Badger sets in the Parish. One unfortunate proved their existence by getting run over near the village. The Windmill open days refreshments were appreciated and we hope to 'man' the stall again.

Mrs Noden has been re-elected chairman and Mrs Ball scribe for a further year.

HARBURY SOCIETY - November 1986

David Cox, Severn Trent Water Authority's Water Pollution Control Officer, explained his work at the November meeting. It is the Authority's duty maintain water supplies and ensure that the water fit for human use. Draycote Reservoir stores our water. Recreational interests must also be taken into consideration. It is an offence to pollute rivers, but certain allowances are made to discharge some effluent. For instance over 5 million gallons of effluent a day is discharged from Rugby, this amount is greater than the Natural flow of the Avon and, therefore, must be treated by sewage works. The S.T.W.A. has to deal with the legal discharge of effluent into the water courses and also has to monitor any illegal and accidental emissions.

The Society recently enlisted the help of District Councillor James Turner to try to expedite the designation of Tree Reservation orders in Harbury. A list of trees to be protected was produced two years ago. Forest and Hedgerows which give Harbury its character, will not be planted again, therefore preservation of those trees remaining is important. It is a criminal offence to fell or lop any of the trees in the conservation area without obtaining permission.

The owner of the Hawthorn overhanging the Old New Inn Green has given six weeks notice of his intention to fell the tree. Anyone opposed to the felling has until 12th December to register his views with the District Planning officer at Elizabeth House, Church Street, Stratford upon Avon The plans are also lodged with Ray Carter at Old Forge House, Binswood End.

GARDENING NOTES

Lettuce species 'Kelly' can be sown now indoors or under glass, when big enough prick out and grow on under cloches for early cutting.

Cut back all herbaceous plants and tidy beds & borders. Before the cold weather starts sink a short length of chainpipe in the deepest part of youngel to provide protection for the fish. A large

ball left floating on the water helps keep the pool from freezing over completely, and in a hard frost can be removed and replaced daily which ensures that the fish always have enough oxygen.

This is plant a tree week. If you have no room for a forest tree, what about an amelanchier which has deep pink leaves in spring and autumn and white flowers in early summer. Or a popular candicans which has large white and green splashed leaves and can be trimmed back each spring.

Geraniums should be cut back after flowering to 2" Clean, and pack in a box of clean soil in a frost free place. Keep just moist. Lift and cut back dahlias, sprinkle with flowers of sulphur and hang upside down to drain, also in a frost free place.



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
