



FROM THE RECTOR

Many of us, when we go away on holiday, wander into the local church and have a look round. Nowadays churches are usually well-cared-for and it is a delight to see everything clean and bright and shining, and abundantly clear that there are people in that place who cherish their church as the House of God, worthy of honour and devotion. When we visit other churches, we find out all sorts of interesting facts about the building and sometimes are intrigued by the windows and the carvings and the memorials. Many signs and symbols are to be found, which remind us of various aspects of our faith and the Christian story. However when it comes to our own church, I suspect that it may be so familiar to us that we miss noticing things, which in another church would seize

our attention. I may be wrong of course, but could = be that we just come to church, sit in our usual sea go up to make our communion and after the service, w a word to one or two here and there, go off home.

A few months ago, I think most of us at Harbury hardly gave a second glance at the reredos behing the altar. But, when it had been cleaned, the detail reealed in the stonework was quite amazing. It is well worth a closer examination, because it is abounding in signs and symbols. Behind the Cross, in the centa panel is one of the commonest of signs seen in church on stone and wooden carvings, embroidered on vestment and altar furnishings, and in stained glass. It is a monogram for the name of Jesus or sometimes it is ex plained as the initials of separate words 'Iesus Hominum Salvator' - 'Jesus Saviour of Man' - so central to our faith is Jesus. On either side are emblem of the Blessed Virgin Mary - the Mystic Rose and the Madonna Lily. Then two panels giving the sacramental signs of the ears of wheat and clusters of grapes. Four panels from left to right give the four living creatures referred to in Revelations Chapter 4, verse 7 and 8 like a man, a lion, an ox and a flying eagle. and at the base of the reredos appropriately appear the words 'Alleluia, Alleluia, Alleluia'. These part icular symbols also represent the four Evangelists, St. Matthew because his Gospel with the figure of the Divine Man stresses the human nature of Christ, St. Mark with the lion, the royal dignity of Christ, St. Luke with the ox, the sacrificial aspect of Christ's life and St. John with the flying eagle, piercing with his perception far into the mysteries of God. have mentioned only some of the symbols and emblems which appear, but if you take the trouble to look closely, you can discover many more.

Perhaps it might be worthwhile to provide some sessions in church, both at Harbury and at Ladbroke, when we could examine all the things seens and used in church and discover the meaning of them? If anyone things this would be appreciated, please let me know.



LADBROKE PARISH COUNCIL held its June meeting on the 17th when the main items under discussion were letter from two lady residents. Firstly, Mrs. Peel had read about the problem of vehicles turning into the village end of Windmill Lane, not realising that it is now a dead end. She suggested that as the businesses on the far side of Windmill Lane did indeed require heavy traffic at times, that it would be a good idea to rename the village side of Windmill Lane as it is no longer a lane, more of a 'close'. This would end the confusion for drivers not aware of how the Bypass not cuts this lane into two halves. The Parish Council saw a great deal of merit in Mrs. Peel's suggestion, but felt that before any action could be taken, they would have to consult the residents involved. The second letter was from Mrs. Bennett, who was concern about 'vandalism' on the edge of her property by the village seat. There had been damage to the fence an young trees. The Parish Council decided to ask our new local Policeman, P.C. John Herriott (Tel. 9-612632) to talk to the youngsters who congregate the W.C.C. had submitted a plan to diverthe footpath at the end of Windmill Lane, so providing a means of access across the Bypass. The Parish Council welcomed this alternative solution and decided to request that the Appropriate Access should be identical to that on the village side of Radbourne Lane, as this gate was proving entirely satisfactory.

In record time, $3\frac{1}{2}$ hours, with 'swinging-shovels' a hole some 20 feet by 8 feet was excavated and lined with black butyl rubber. The pool is $2\frac{1}{2}$ feet deep at its maximum depth and shelved to a very shallow 'marsh area'. Parent-volunteers have contoured the area around the pool and laid pavingtiles. The children will complete the landscaping by planting in the newly created surrounds. (By the way, someone left a spade and fork - contact Rick Evans).

It is intended to extend classroom environmental and nature studies with this pool which is not just an ornamental pond, we shall have many plants and reeds and hope to attract or stock with those creatures normally found in such ponds, a fuller report next month! The pond is located close to the school building for safety/supervisory reasons, please make a point of inspecting this latest school asset.

On Saturday, 12th July, the Annual Barbecue and Barn Dance will be held at the school. 'Geoff Hackett and Magic Rantabout' will ensure a usually

excellent evening. Tickets I understand are going very well and will almost certainly be sold out before you read this article! I hope you managed to get one (?).



PARISH COUNCIL REPORT FOR JUNE 1986

Hard times for the Theatre Group which has petitioned the Parish Council for a grant towards the cost of a new lighting board. Since it has recently made simil grants to other village organisations, and a grant to the Theatre Group from Stratford District Council is dependent upon the PC coughing up the Councillors agreed to donate £200. They have given the promised £500 towards the £20,000 needed for Southam Swimming Pool and Chairman Keith Thompson reported significant progress with the Netball Court. The Sports Council which has been approached for Grant Aid by the Netball Club wants the PC to confirm that the Club will have security of tenure for at least seven years, otherwise the PC will have to refund a proportion of the Grant. Some councillors bridled at this but Sharon Hancock pointed out they were supplying a facility for the Netball Club on land owned by the PC. Councillors were reassured by Dennis Atkins' suggestion that in the event of the Club's demise, the Sinking Fund for repairs (to which the Club have to contribute £200 a year and the PC £125) could be raided to repay the Grant.

The provision of Play Equipment for Deppers recedes further into the distance since Mr. Moore's request for additional funds to buy a more exciting piece was countered by Bob Dunn's suggestion that local charity groups like Southam Lions be invited to build an adventure playground. The PC seized on this offer with alacrity.

No sooner had the fanfare of trumpets for Bill Middleton's announcement that the painting of the Village Hall fence had at last been completed, died down than the Clerk read the Engineer's report that the paint had been applied over the rust which was in consequence flaking off. "It was put on thickly" remarked Dennis Atkins "and that's the way it will come off!"

The gateway to the Playing Fields has been widened and drainage work will start in July. Crown Garden has been completed and the Council pondered the wisdom of re-enforcing the low wall round the old Rose Garden in Chapel Street. Mr. Bristow will replant the dead shrubs there. Notice of the proposal to remove kerbstones from the Burial Grounds have been posted on the Church but officials have still to visit the site.

There were complaints from the Councillors, supported by PC Percival that vision splays at junctions round

the village were not mowed and several accidents resulted. They will protest about this and the length o time taken to clear away the resultant debris, to the County Engineer who will also be reminded of his promise to lay a pavement along Butt Lane.

District Councillor Sharpe sent a report on the tidyi up of the Francis Road OAP's bungalows site. Stratfor District Council blamed the delays on the Severn Trem Water Authority's failure to provide a water supply on time. The householders had been advised that work would be completed by September. Archeological work in the records by the Clerk has resulted in the unearthing of significant documents relating to the status of the unkempt land at Queen's Close and residents of the surrounding properties will be informed of the development and advised that their good work i keeping the site maintained will not prejudice the situation.

When Sackville Properties were granted planning permission there it was on condition that approval was acquired for satisfactory landscaping of the area in contention, and the Parish Council also holds a promi from Morris Housing from 1982 that the 'private land' on the corner of Butt Lane would be grassed over and maintained privately.

Councillors were furious that the District Council had disclaimed responsibility for the damage done in Mill Street during the replacement of the sewerage Pumping Station. Stratford District Council stated that work began on 10th February and that the contractor intended to complete in eight weeks but was delayed by the weather and the Electricity Board's tardiness. The contractor came back on 9th June to demolish the Pumping Station and reinstate the verge and seed it. They deny that the contractor damaged the lamp standard and claim that the trees on the site were dead before work began.

The Councillors are adamant that the site must be properly cleared and reinstated and that the contract or did damage the lamp (eye witnesses please inform Ray Carter) and the trees. A letter from the Harbury

Society on this point urging the PC to press for semi-mature trees to replace those damaged and complaining that the grass verge should be properly replaced with sufficient top soil and turf not aggregate and seed will be passed on to the authority together with the PC's own complaints and those of the District Councillor whose help they will enlist.

The Severn Trent Water Authority plans to sell the redundant Pumping Station land as a house plot. I will personally give a small prize for the most apt name suggested for it.

Permission has been granted for the demolition of Greenhill and its replacement with four dwellings. Also granted were plans to extend Mr. Davies' home in Farm Street and Mr. Brunton's in South Parade. Four homes will be built at the old Engineering works in Chapel Street. Permission was refused by the District Council for the conversion of a barn at Temple House to form a holiday home. The Parish Council registered no objection to the proposed two storey extension to Harbury Cottage in Chapel Street but they did object to Mr. Bastin's plans for a stone garage and store room at Vicarage Lane. PC decided to press Stratford District Council to hold a meeting at the site to discuss the plans as they thought the garage was too big and too close to the adjoining property, whose owner had also objected that the garage would take his light. Cllr. Hancock pointed out that the problem stemmed from Mr. Towell's house having been built sideways on, and Cllr. Atkins recalling former controversies insisted that the plans be properly dimensioned so that if granted the garage would be built only in the approved position.

The Council delegated to its Highways Sub-Committee the important task of examining the proposed revision of the timetables for bus services. Notice has to be given to the County Council of any shortfall in the coverage so that consideration can be given to subsidising important routes.

The Council was gratified to hear that the Sport Aid event held on 25th May successfully raised £527.

The walk gets its name Knightley from the family who use to own the park and hall. The crumbling Dower House in the part is a romantic Elizabethan brick ruin and well worth a detour. fact explore the woods and park at your leisure, they are open the public. In spring the bluebells are a picture and the centride is lined by massive cherry trees. There's lots more to the but I'll leave you to do the exploring, and hope your appetite suitably whetted.


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
