



#### 6. FROM THE RECTOR

One day when Jesus was journeying around and had been speaking to a group of people having cured a dumb man, a woman in the crowd got so excited and carried away with admiration that she cried out 'Oh how marvelous to have a son like you'. Well actually her words were more like 'Happy the womb that carried you and the breasts that suckled you', but nowadays I doubt if she would have expressed herself in quite that way. Jesus modestly replied 'Well - rather how marvelous for those who hear the word of God and keep it'. Today we have plenty of opportunity and every encouragement to hear the word of God and to read it for ourselves. But the critical thing about our faith is really and truly to hear what God has to say to us and to grasp the essential truth, which God wants to convey and having grasped then to hold on to them firmly without flinching. To do that is demanding and may even require the utmost courage, but it is 'marvelous' to hear the word of God and to keep it.

At school, maths was never my strong point and my moth who, as they would say in those days, was good at figures, tried hard to help me understand a little bet But she quite often kept behind her an answer book and I used to think that if only I had the answers, then my problems would be at an end. Of course I was mistaken. What was required was knowing how to arrive at the right answer.

Through turning to the Bible, I may hear the word of God, but woe betide me if I am foolish enough to think that merely in that way, I shall arrive at the answers to all my problems and to life in general. It needs more than that. I need constantly and carefully to approach the Holy Scriptures not just to find signs and answers, but to allow the word of God penetrate my whole being and understanding. There is nothing sacrosanct about the words of the Bible - they are wor such as we use every day of our lives. What is import ant is what those words can convey if we are sufficient by open to God, ready to receive whatever he wishes to know and to understand. When I have mastered that skill or that ability and hear the word of God to fall away from me. It is so easy to misuse the Bible. To search for the answer we wish to find, to satisfy our opinions and our decisions with scriptural references, to prove our point with this and that holy verse, to pick and choose and to dissect the word of God to our convenience until we lose the spirit of the word of God and place our confidence in empty words.

The Church suggests and encourages us to read the Bible constantly and regularly, daily in fact (there are numerous Lectionaries available) and to have no other motive than to listen to God speaking to us through his word - to be receptive and to allow his teaching to flood into our hearts and to cause us to act upon it in our daily lives.



# LADBROKE PARISH COUNCIL

The monthly meeting was held on Monday 28th July. As a result of a letter received from Mrs. Peel and discussed at the last meeting, the residends of Windmill Lane were approached with a view to changing the name of the lower end of Windmill Lane to Windmill Close. The majority of residents were not in favour of this suggestion but were not adverse to having a 'No Through Road' sign placed at the entrance into the Lane. The road sign would not interfere with the efforts going on to establish the right of way which should run between Ladbroke and Priors Marston.

It was decided to send a letter to the council stating that the footpath from the centre of the village to the Church was in places in need of restoration also since the pot holes have been filled up in School Lane & Bridge Lane large amounts of water collect in the hollows between the holes when it rains.

A letter had been received from a resident of Radborne Lane complaining that the shale path at the entrance of the village from the by-pass was unsatisfactory. It was decided that the letter should be sent on to the council.

Many thanks to the Horticultural Society for their most generous donation from the Garden Walkabout. This will be put to good use.







Gwen Miles died on Saturday the 23rd August, thus ending a fight with cancer which had lasted for 24 years. She will be affectionately remembered by Harbury people for many reasons, but mainly, I think, for the great courage and spirit with which she tackled her illness. In all the twenty-one years of our friendship I never once heard her complain. When she was in obvious pain, her attitude was, "I'm not too good today, but I shall be better tomorrow" .....and better she eventually became because she willed it so.

A devout Christian, Gwen was a regular worshipper at our church, and her faith in the goodness and love of God sustained her constantly. She was interested and active in many aspects of village life, being a founder member of the Golden Age Club, playing Badminton, and her work with Cub-Scouts will long be remembered.

Gwen was never behind-hand with any little attention such as flowers and cards to the sick, visits to the housebound and elderly, and those of us who were privileged to have been entertained by her will cherish the memory of her imaginative and delicious meals, always beautifully served.

The death of her husband Frank in 1967 was a tragic blow, but, sustained by their son Stephen she girded up her loins and continued to do battle with the periods of ill-health which beset her every few years. New treatments for cancer became available, and these she was always willing to try, enduring a few weeks of feeling very poorly for the longterm good. How right she was! Stephen's marriage to Jane was a great joy to her, and the delight increased when her grandchildren Frederick and Lucy appeared on the scene.

#### HARBURY PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council met on 21st August 1986 in the Village Hall. Eight Councillors were present and 16 members of the public together with Mr. Turner and Mr. Sharpe (District Councillors)

Matters arising from the meeting held in June were discussed. These included the grant of £2,000 which has been approved by the Sports Council for the Ladies Netball Club, the Tidying up in Mill Lane and the Theatre Group grant. In respect of the Bus Service developments were still awaited from the County Council. Cllr Dunn reported that the Library had been tidied up.

A letter had been received from the District Council asking for suggestions for a name for where the new bungalows are being built off Frances Road. Cllr. Hancock stated that as Cllr Drinkwater had done such a lot for the village over many years, that this new road should be named after him. Cllr. Drinkwater expressed his surprise and said that he would very honoured. It was agreed by all Cllrs present that the Parish Council put forward the name "Drinkwater Close". Cllr. Drinkwater asked about the tenancies of these new bungalows but no applications had yet been received.

Ray Carter announced that the Best Kept Village Awards would be held on 20th September 1986 and asked if anyone wished to attend. Harbury was unplaced this year.

Ray Carter informed the meeting that Mr. Rake of the Association of Parish Councils is leaving at the end of August and Harbury Parish Council have sent a donation of fl5 towards his presentation. This was approved.

Deppers Bridge: Cllr Dunn reported on the proposed play area and Keith Thompson read a letter from the Round Table agreeing to help out with any labour. There is a set of swings and a climbing frame but the Parish Council would like to extend this. Water floods the highway when it rains at Deppers and the County Council have been informed.

The removal of kerbs in the cemetery could now go ahead. Drainage of the playing fields has been completed but there was comment on the unevenness of the ground. It was agreed that a letter should be sent to the Contractors when sending their cheque. The ground on the corner of Queens Close still needs attention and the District Council are now dealing with this problem. A Caretaker for the Playing Fields has been appointed.

Highways: Yellow circles have been painted on the road in Farm Street so presumably these are areas to be repaired. The Mill Street and Frances Road road surfaces have been improved. Flooding by Bull Ring Garage in Church Terrace will be reported. Cllr Atkins mentioned the bad condition of the black and white boarding at the Bendigo crossroads.

The damaged column of the light in Mill Street has been repaired but no account has been received for this and no admission of liability has been mentioned by the Contractors. Cllr Atkins has reviewed all the lights throughout the village.

Cllr Drinkwater reported on Mr. Bastin's proposed garage. Mr. Sharp will be attending the District Council meeting regarding this matter. Planning permission was granted to several applications from villagers for various building extensions to their properties, including demolition of old buildings in Chapel Street and the building of bungalows and a house on this site.

The proposed demolition of the Old Forge in Park Lane and plans for the building of a cottage and garage had been objected to by the Parish Council. Cllr Drinkwater stated that the District Council would be viewing the site. An amended application has been made for a cottage to be built on a smaller area.

An application has been made by Severn Trent for outline planning permission for the erection of tw detached houses on the site of the old pumping station in Mill Street. Cllr Drinkwater and Cllr Hancock felt that only one detached house should be built on this site. The majority of Cllrs were, however, in favour of supporting permission for two detached houses.

An application for 'established use' had been made to the District Planning Authority for 'Burnside' at Deppers Bridge for industrial use. The Deppers Bridge representative was not present and it was decided that this matter should be referred to him.

A letter had been received by the Parish Council from IDC Consultants and a summary of this letter had been printed in the Harbury News. IDC Consultants represent a Mr & Mrs Price who own The Paddock, The Spinney and the Spinney Field in Harbury and the letter informs the Parish Council that they are proposing to seek permission to build on these three plots of land. Copies of this letter were also sent by IDC to the County Council the District Council, the Church and other local oganisations. Keith Thompson asked for Parish Cllrs opinion on the letter and he read out a copy of the reply which the County Council had written to IDC. Ray Carter stated that a letter of acknowledgement had been forwarded to IDC. It was unanimously agreed that a further letter should be

24. sent to IDC stating that the matter had been discussed at the Parish Council Meeting.

Mrs Hayes asked if members of the public could be informed of items of importance which are on the agenda of future Parish Council meetings.

Planning permission for Sussex Cottages: this application was made twelve months ago and it is now proposed to demolish No.20 Vicarage Lane and redevelop the other two cottages and make these into one dwelling. No.20 is still occupied by Mr. Caney and will not be demolished during his tenancy. Cllr Drinkwater said he opposes any development on the rear of the site and the Chairman of the District Planning Committee should inspect the site and that something should be done about these cottages. The Parish Council have no objection to the demolition of No.20 and approve the development of the other two cottages into one residence, but object to plans for 2 new houses on the site.

Cllr Hancock reported on the meeting of School Governors. There was some concern about the environmental pond at the school as this is dangerous. The PTA have put up a temporary fence and will shortly replace it with a permanent one. The Headmaster reported that they would have reduced teaching staff because there is now only one top class, not two as before.

The next meeting is on the 25th September. The Chairman (Keith Thompson) expressed his thanks for the public attendance.

#### PROFILE - KATHLEEN ELLIS

When as youngsters, Kathleen and Roger, both Coventry born and bred, used to make the odd trip to the Shakespeare in that 'not quite authentic village' Harbury, little did they think that they would live here.

Kathleen on leaving Coundon Court, was apprenticed by her parents to Mary Hobley, hairdresser, of Broadgate. Apprenticeship was a paid for privilege in those days, and, had it not been for a sense of duty Kathleen would willingly have swopped her £1.94

slavery for the £5 of a Woollies girl. However, she stuck out and is now really grateful to her task-master with her insistance on detail. Life was better when you graduated to customers and she rose to be manageress.

Even after marriage to Roger, after an eight year courtship and a whirlwind engagement she continued to work.

After the birth of Darren in 1968 she continued staff training. Debbie was born in 1970 and the following year Roger's work with Wimpey's took them to Manchester where they settled happily in Bury. In 1976 Roger went to work in Iran on an 8 year contract. In June they went to join him to be met with, "don't unpack your suitcases, we're going home". However they had 8 fantastic weeks fitting in camel trains, Persepolis with shades of Darius and Alexander, Shiraz with the Shah's tented city and its Persian carpets. What price a Wimpey tour?

Roger was soon on a bachelor contract near Muscat in Oman while Kathleen returned with the children to Bury. When a married contract materialised it entitled Kathleen to live in Muscat with Roger 200 miles away in the desert! Hesitant at first Kathleen and the children soon settled in with



Darren later returning as a boarder back home at Warwick. Kathleen went off to acquire secretarial skills at the Polyglot School while Debbie attended the Muscat English speaking school. Muscat was very Westernised, Muslim prohibitions had little effect, the road network was wonderful, the climate dry and hot. Twentieth century and tradition mixed oddly -T.V. aerials perched in wayside trees!

A high spot was the Queen's visit to Nizwa where Roger was stationed, when Debbie, trust her, found her way through barriers and in Brownie Uniform held her own conversation with royalty.

Even while Roger was writing up this visit for the Wimpey magazine he suffered a severe stroke. Brought down to Muscat he just missed the local hospital, floor space and family care and was admitted to the police hospital instead. Kathleen, told he had had an accident, found him unable to speak and with a right side immobilised. After 5 days he was flown back to London to St. Mary's Hospital but the outlook was bleak. It did not much improve on his discharge and the family still marvel at the way in which Roger's retired parents coped with the invasion of a family of 4, one an invalid, for 6 months. This gave Kathleen time to concentrate on therapy.

By Christmas they felt ready for a return to Bury but it could not be a permanent move. More help was needed and Darren was still at Warwick. Kathleen read an advert in the Coventry Evening Telegraph about a hairdressing business with living accomodation in the vaguely remembered Harbury. They came to have a look - Roger retreated back to the car! Kathleen persisted and knew that this was the place that would suit them all perfectly.

Just before Christmas they settled in among snowdrifts - inheriting Wendy as "the girl who helped". March brought Fran (Roger's sister) and the trio work side by side in a very happy atmosphere, indeed the laughter can be heard outside in Chapel Street itself.

Roger was soon being helped by Vicky MacGowan Fred Hutchins and Alison Hunt in best Harbury tradition, moreover as Kathleen says, being in the salon and the

village (a real village) a continuing therapy is the best move they ever made.

Despite the fact that we made no showing in the Best Kept Village Competition this year, the care we take of our surroundings; the facilities we have provided and the services Harbury supports make it a very desirable place to live in.

You will see that the threats to our remaining open spaces were discussed at the last Parish Council Meeting. It is sad that developers are ever on the lookout for land on which to squeeze as many houses as possible and that few of them care whether the homes provided damage the environment they seek to exploit.

Harbury needs to think clearly about the features it wishes to retain and decide how to protect them. There are now two Conservation Areas in the village and all development within these is strictly controlled. The relisting of old buildings should be completed any day so that individual buildings have greater protection, but nevertheless we must remain vigilant. The Harbury Society will produce plans for display in the Library showing the extent of the Conservation Areas.

Perhaps we should also be thinking about the impact that a Service area for the M40 at Chesterton would have. Sherbourne residents are hopping up and down at the possibility of it being sited near them. Are we too complacent?

In the New Year the Society will have an evening talk on the Archeological discoveries at the Avon Dassett dig and news of other rescues along the line of the Motorway.

September 27th & 28th are the dates for the Chesterton Windmill Open Days and more volunteers are needed to marshall cars and assist visitors to climb into the Mill. Even if you can only come for an hour or so your help will be appreciated. Ring me (612792) if you are available.

# IN THE GARDEN

Having grown a reasonable amount of vegetables it is up to you to decide how long they can remain in the ground with safety from frost or grub damage, I store most of mine in peat. Spring cabbage should be planted out and it is not too late to sow radish and lettuce such as Little Gem. Do not store your potatoes in polythene bags as they are apt to sweat. No doubt there are many queries on the planting and sowing of seeds, all these can be best aswered by coming to the Horticultural Society's meetings and don't be afraid to speak up.

To obtain good Geranium plants next Spring, take cuttings now, providing you can store them in a frost free room. In some cases you will find you will have to give some support to your Brussels Sprouts and protection from birds.


