



In his short address to us, the Bishop centred on God's love for us and, as part of the Partnership in Mission - and of course as part of our Quest 87 mission - our call to absorb His love and transmit it to others.

A stimulating evening which left with me a sense of optimism about the opportunities in front of us. We are grateful to the Bishop for the time he spent in Harbury and Ladbroke, and to Pam Sperling for her hospitality.

A short article from Captain Andrew Smith, regarding Quest 87 appears elsewhere in this issue. Preparations are being made and a list of planned events will shortly be posted in the Church. Church Army are particularly keen on small house groups (8-12 people) which give the opportunity fo. discussion. They have asked us to keep them busy during their 12 days with us and so we do want to take them at their word and have plenty of events. Generally there will be 4 of the Church Army team available in Harbury which means that 4 events can be taking place simultaneously. If you can run an event at a date and time when less than 4 events are listed for Harbury, write your name and the type of event on the list (which will be up-dated from time to time - so don't be reluctant to scribble on it).

The Mothering Sunday service was delightful. The Adventurers came along and the Rector provided daffodil posies for the children to give to all the ladies.

#### FROM THE RECTOR

Gethsemane is of great significance and provides for in the keeping of Holy Week a source of deep spiritual meaning. Gethsemane was a place of peace and quiet, restful and suitable for prayer. Yet for Jesu purposely going to that place to prepare himself for the demands of the next day, it meant a time of great mental agony and conflict, it provided the occasion obetrayal, it brought him the experience of desertion by his friends and a realisation of being left alone to face his captors and enemies. The New Testament implies that it was a place of beauty - a garden, but in it, Jesus found bitterness and came to know that there was no turning back.

'Abba, Father', he prayed, 'all things are possible t thee: take this cup away from me. Yet not what I wil but what thou wilt'.

He has asked his disciples to share with him that tim of prayer.

'My heart is ready to break with grief - stop here and stay awake'.

But again and again they fell asleep.

For many years churches all over the world have been accustomed to keep a vigil on Maundy Thursday night, with people coming a few at a time to spend a period in silent prayer before the altar, meditating upon Our Lord in the Garden of Gethsemane and offering an intention of love and devotion to him. As far as I know this has not been done in Harbury or Ladbroke, at least for some years, but I have been encouraged at Harbury to introduce this practice. Elsewhere very often such a vigil is maintained throughout the night, but for this first year I propose to limit it to the few hours up until midnight from the end of the evening Eucharist on Thursday, 16th April. A chart will be put on the table setting out the times in half-an-hour periods and I hope that quite a number of people will sign up to take a share in the vigil. The church will not be cold and plentyof material for prayer and meditation will be available.

For Christians, there is no other time in the year more important than Holy Week and it is when we try hard to follow through these dramatic events one by one that we come closer to Our Lord and understand a little more of what the Cross is all about. It is the identifying ourselves with the Passion of Christ that eventually enables us to identify with the joy of the Resurrection and makes the 'Alleluias' we sing on Easter Day authentic and heartfelt.

I wish you a very happy and joyful Easter.



PARISH COUNCIL

The Parish Council Meeting was held in the Committee Room of the Village Hall on the 17th March, and as six members of the public were present it was quite a squash. The Council were delighted to report that the lock had at last been removed from the footpath gate at the top of Windmill Lane. This means that this ancient route to Priors Hardwick is now open, but it does need walking to keep the footpath open, and if there are any hindrances to walkers, the council would like to know.

The Parish Councillors would like to know if J.C. Waste lorries are still using the route through our village from the Ufton Tip. Our local Policeman Mr. Percival explained that the Police could not help in this matter, as there is no weight limit on the road, and he also explained the Local Police force's policy about mud on the road. Recently "furniture and house clearance" salesmen have been knocking on local doors, on the look out for an unscrupulous bargain. IF You report any suspicious behaviour to the Police, please let our local Neighbourbood Watch co-ordinator know, as he has to keep a record of local incidents (Mr. F. Badman, Tel.2187).

The Council thought that they should have been notified about the newly updated Listed Building Survey, which took place in the village last year and they decided to write to the architects concerned for a copy of the report.

Ladbroke have been offered (at a price) a Domesdæ Plaque to commemorate all the villages mentioned in the original survey and it was decided to order the plaque, probably to be displayed in the church.

There was some discussion about whether to enter the Best Kept Village Competition this year, Ladbroke has not enjoyed success in this venture in past years but it was decided to have another go and I was instructed to work up enthusiasm amongst my readers! So could everyone tidy up their frontages, cut the grass, trim hedges etc. I am of course, excepted frothis, because I have the bridge building team camping in the front garden and they aren't very scenic!

#### SCOUT SUPPORT COMMITTEE

The Valentine Young Farmers' Club and Orphanage, Cameroon, West Africa.

Col. Leslie Valentine, British and 72, went to Cameroon in 1959, and is still there. Leading a rescue party to a crashed 'plane, in 1963, he fell, breaking his back and losing his sight. His sight was restored, but his back injuries remain an affliction. In 1966 he started this Club, to teach local, under-privileged boys the rudiments of Agriculture and self-sufficiency. He adopted two of them: one now being a local teacher, whilst the other is still with him as his chief assistant. In 1974 he retired from Gov't service, bought the present site, and built a 2 bedroomed house and dormitory block.

There are now 15 boys, from 6 to 14 years of age, mainly orphaned, abandoned, or from very poor, fatherless homes. There is no piped water, or electricity, on site and during the dry season, the boys have to 'trek' with a handcart some 1½ miles to fetch water.

'Dignity of Labour' is the Colonel's motto, and his boys are in great demand because they are taught to become good, practical, all-rounders. Honesty, loyalty, hygiene, obedience, domestic science, and love of animals and of the land, are his beliefs.

The main project facing them is to either bring in pumped water, or to sink a borehole, at estimated costs of £2000 for either system. We think that this Orphanage is worthy of our support, and want to help in some tangible way, but the water project is too expensive for us to tackle alone. We are, therefore, asking if other Clubs and Youth organisations in this area would care to join us on fund-raising, and would welcome anyone who has suggestions.

#### HARBURY CARNIVAL '87



PLACES TO GO

Shuckburgh Park - a pleasant walk for children and adults. We saw sheep, rabbits, geese, ducks, pheasant and a peacock. Leave the car on the Southam-Daventry road near Shuckburgh church. Cross the main road and a stile, beside the stone cottage leads to a path crosing diagonally over the field. Through 2 gates, past 2 elm-stumps, through 2 kiss-me gates and you reach the gap between two woods. A man-made pond lies on your right and further on, to your left, behind a high hedge

is the private estate church.

Don't miss the view of the house and church before you turn right to follow the edge of the wood, past the pheasant-rearing pens. A triangulation point lies to your left on the top of the rise, but keep to the wood edge and at the angle turn right. Go down to a couple of barns where a stile leads through - yes, through not round a cornfield. Follow the further hedge down to the road, from Priors Marston, turn right down to your starting point at Lower Shuckburgh. More ambitious walkers can follow the way-marked route which lands finally higher up the road to Priors Marston.

This is a variation of a walk from a collection of 6-Counties Walks (20 in all) by local authors Joe Taylor and Chas Cook. Well worthwhile, price £3.50, Thorn-

### Snake Keeping

The Natural habitat of a garter snake is trees and rocks but they like water, so always give them a big dish full so they can drink and bathe in it. They are related to the water snakes. They have to have a certain temperature, it is supposed to be 75°F but it varies. If you want it to be around 75°F use a 60 watt bulb but do not exceed that temperature. They eat chunks of meat, fish and are very fond of frogs and worms. If they are big they should take fledglings and young mice, and they might take toads. Young snakes will take small worms and tadpoles. My snake was pregnant when we bought her and she gave birth to 14 live young, but some were dead at birth. Sadly they died of a disease called blackmouth which is a fungi which grows in the mouth. You should offer food every 2 or 3 days. The shedding means they lose their skins to be able to grow because their skin does not stretch like ours.

### HARBURY PARISH COUNCIL

Ex-lighting Chairman, Mike Ellis had written indignantly that he had not snaffled Parish propert when he departed. There never was a stencil, the EMEB numbered the lamps! Cllrs. were determined a retraction be printed so that his 'good name was no longer in jeopardy'. Dennis also got a gem of a letter from the Planning & Transportation Dept. ref ring to the 30mph limits being enforceable by virtu of the Street Lighting. (It's FOOTWAY Lighting), a claiming that the restriction was illegal in Bush Heath Lane, because the sign was positioned beyond last street light, and to remedy the situation the County would be obliged if the PC would arrange for the erection of a further street light in line with the sign! Sharon Hancock suggested the County be asked to clarify the Law for if the existence of lights created a 30mph limit, then Deppers Bridge should have one, and the County and Police had consistently refused this.

County Councillor Mrs. Bidwell reported that Mr Herbert had furnished her with a plan of the improv ments to the barriers round the Quarries. John Moore complained that sacks put out on the roadway by dustmen were being wrenched open by the turbulence of passing cars and refuse was strewn about. Mr. Harkell agreed to bring this to the attention of the relevant District Council Committee. Marjorie King reported that the stiles on the footpath from Temple End to Beggars Lane had disappeared or were dangerous. Iory Davies will investigate getting them repaired.

Remedial action will be taken on the Manor Orchard Play Area wall. The Cricket Club can remove the netting surrounding the defunct Cricket Practice strip at the Playing Fields. The Pony Show can take place on June 21st. Councillors agreed to allow the Tennis Club to erect a notice board at the Courts and were distressed to learn that a resident who remonstrated with a ghetto-blaster playing child at the Play Area had been subjected to abuse. They agreed to ask the Environmental Health Officer for advice c the abatement of noise nuisance.

Dave Andrews championed the cause of Harbury Ladies Netball Team who are currently building a Court on the Parish's Playing Fields. The court wil be the property of the PC, and it was agreed it would be acceptable for the Council to settle the bill for the tarmacadaming and be reimbursed by the Netball Club when the Grant is paid by the Sports Council, and the loan is granted them by the District Council. Part of the soil will be used to construct an earth mound round the Court to protect it from vehicles and to form a viewing area.

The Pillar Box has been erected on the Old New Inn Green but it's not the traditional type, it looks like an unexploded bomb and there have been numerous complaints about it.

There is to be an appeal on the refusal of permission for two houses at the old Sewerage Pumping station in Mill St. Permission has been granted for extensions at 15 Farm Street, 1 & 2 Church Terrace, and there was no objection to the reconstruction of a garage at 37 Deppers Bridge. Cllr. James Turner sent word explaining how the Courier had mistaken the

amount of money spent on the Drinkwater Close bungalo (£26,000) for the number of houses to be built in

Harbury.

PC Percival reported he had put in a detailed reponent the running of the Tip at Ufton Hill Farm and the state of the B4452. The police sent word that the lafill site had no wheel-cleaning facilities in contraction of the site conditions but wheel scrubbers had been installed. County Councillor Mrs. Bidwell said that when the Planning Sub-Cttee visited the site it appear well run, but some of the lorries were not using the cleaning facilities properly. The police also posed out that the lorries using the Tip were carving up the verge and spreading mud about. They wanted the County Council to enforce the conditions of the Plann Permission, one of which states that tipping should cease in very inclement weather!

District Councillor Harkell had brought to the me ing County Councillor Williams who explained that he belonged to a group of Councillors deliberating on th issuing of a licence to tip Asbestos at Ufton Hill Farm. He was anxious that the County retained contro over what happened on the site, and said there were n good planning grounds for rejecting the application. There would be two new inspectors available and he could guarantee the site would be visited by them at least once a week. He would not be in favour of anything other than 'inert waste' being tipped at the si but 'the floodgates were opened' when the tip was fir allowed. Iory Davies expressed no confidence in the that the tip was functioning at present. Lorries weren't cleaned, and if there was more traffic and noxious wastes the problem could only get worse.

County Cllr. Patricia Bidwell made an impassioned plea for the rejection of the application. If Mr. Ma had asked for asbestos tipping in the first place or even builders rubble the County would have refused his there were not good planning grounds for a refusal 'THERE OUGHT TO BE' she said.

Keith Thompson, Chairman, agreed with her that the whole weight of local opinion was against the tipping

of asbestos. Sharon Hancock said that if the Cllrs. thought it was wrong for asbestos to be tipped there, then they should say so. They should not be intimidated by the fear of an Appeal and Dave Andrews agreed that they should fight right from the start. Cllr. Williams pronounced himself satisfied with the useful airing of views that had resulted from his visit to Harbury.

The Parish Council has ordered a copy of the new Domesday Book for Warwickshire for the village. The Harbury Charities and the PTA will contribute to its cost. The book will be lodged at the School for all to consult and will probably be transferred to the Library for the long summer holiday.

As many readers will recall, the Leamington area is linked with Bo, a province of the very poor Western Africa Country Sierra Leone. Some of us are in contactwith Johannes Mallah, a teacher who is trying to improve facilities in his home village, and money was sent out from a collection made by members of our

Church congregation. I recently received a letter for Johannes (communitions are often difficult and unreliable) and an extract is printed below:

'Please allow me to express my heartfelt thanks and deep appreciation to the Church and the people of Harbury who were so generous to send £86.87 to my people in Marijama. When I got the money I arranged with Peter Pool, the British Council Maths teacher the college here to accompany me to the village so that I could present it and explain its purpose. Unfortunately we couldn't make it for two reasons: the fuel shortage which was acute and a broken culve on the road. Nevertheless I went there with my fam: for Christmas. I made the presentation and they we: quite happy and grateful and asked that I should tal their pictures and send them with a thank you letter but I was quite unable to borrow a camera. The priority areas for the village are toilets, wells, a community hall, and a school. We got estimates for the erection of 3 toilets at strategic points in the village, each with 4 compartments. It came to £600 We also got estimates for 3 wells with pulleys - £4. The pit diggers have been given an advance to start the work.

The people have asked me to write and tell you, and plead with you for more help. They hope to receive visit from one of you. I hope your people will warr up to the link because the expectations of my people are quite high. Please extend my best wishes to all friends in Harbury. Yours, Johannes

### APRIL IN THE GARDEN

Spring is officially here. I hope it's got the message! Cut back winter Jasmine branches by two third lightly shear winter heathers. Protect budding peattrees from frost, by covering them with netting.

Complete sowing of hardy or half-hardy Annuals. Morpreviously sown or pricked out seedlings into cold frame as weather warms up.

Increase watering for houseplants and feed regularly Before giving the lawn its first cut, treat it with Lawn Sand to kill moss and flat weeds. Sow under glass, celery, ridge cucumbers, savoy cabbage and sweetcorn. Sow outside onion sets, leeks, peas, early lettuce. Start feeding your pond fish. If you have unwanted frog spawn in your pool let me know. W.A.R.N.A.C.T. will be delighted to have it. Phone 612365.
