

## FROM THE RECTOR

This is my last opportunity to tell you something about Quest '87. We have invited the Church Army to send a team of officers to our parishes on Wednesday 1st July for twelve days. The purpose is to help us to be more alert and responsive to the teaching of our Lord and to convince our friends and neighbours that in Harbury and in Ladbroke the church is not complacent nor inward looking. It is a very suitable time to engage upon such a quest, first as we have

just celebrated the Ascension, when especially the Kingdom of Jesus is stressed and we pray that he ma reign in our hearts and minds always and secondly as we enter to season of Pentecost. At Pentecost (Whitsun, if you are more accustomed to that title) we read in the beginning of Acts, those timid, fear ful and frightened disciples, having received the gift of the Holy Spirit, were changed people and we willing to go out and face the world, friend or foe and were bold enough to speak of their faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. The Church from that time onwar has been bidden, not only to gather together regula to celebrate and to rehearse the faith, but also to declare it openly that Christ's Kingdom can be extended. The Christian quest is to come to know more and more of the truth as revealed in Jesus Chr and the searching and the seeking for that go on ceaselessly. But occasionally it is beneficial to have a very special effort and to make the time, in our busy and hectic lives to allow ourselves seriou to reconsider those things which some believe in with all their hearts, others only vaguely and othe perhaps not at all.

Our intention is not to try to pressurise anyone to commit themselves, but to genuinely invite your interest in what we think important to all of us in confused and bewildered world and to ask you generously to come and meet the Church Army and list to what they say, as they will, in turn, listen generously to you.



## LADBROKE PARISH COUNCIL - Wednesday 20th May

This was the first meeting of the new Parish Council and all the councillors were present. Mr Francis Badman was once again elected as Chairman and Mr Geoff Timms has taken over the post of vice-chairma The council has had it confirmed in writing that th footpath across Windmill Lane is definitely to be re-routed to provide a gated access across the

Bypass. Mr Timms agreed to buy the bulbs to be planted around the village at the end of the summer and Mr Hagard volunteered the services of his Youther Club members to do the planting. Considerable dismay and concern was felt at the felling of all trees on the plot of land opposite "Whiteways" and "Old Well House" in Bridge Lane and it was decided

This meeting took place directly after the Parish Council meeting and as the Chairman said all the season ticket holders were there! In fact about forty members of the public were present, which meant that a fair proportion of households were represented.

The meeting opened with a short talk from Mrs Bradshaw a representative of the Keep Britain Tidy Campaign. She spoke about all that her group were doing, particularly in Stratford, where apparently they hand tourists plastic bags in which to put their litter as they get off the coaches! Mr Alan Gould questioned the speaker about Ladbroke's dreadful plastic rubbish sacks and Mrs Bradshaw said tha she was well aware of the problems they caused.

It was reported that the swimming pool in Southam would be ready for action by October this year and money was to be spent to advertise this new facilit to the surrounding areas. The results of the Villa survey would not be published for a least another year. Ladbroke was in the Best Kept Village compet tion and the meeting was advised by our District Councillor Ken Graham, that the first thing the judlooked at was the state of the Telephone Box! Our local Police Constable Tim Percival reported that the Neighbourhood Watch Scheme was working well, but he did say that people who lived in houses with large

gardens tended to become complacent in summer montl He advised everyone to lock the house whilst out gardening and not to discuss holiday arrangements in public places such as pubs.

Parish Chairman's Report - Mr Francis Badman gave the annual report of the Ladbroke Parish Council and mentioned all the main topics that had occupied the Council during the past year, such as the problems with the waste disposal depot at Ufton, the suggestion of the closure of Fenny Compton Fire Station, the obstruction of the footpath at the far end of Windmill Lane and several road repairing problems.

It had been decided to purchase a copy of the Domesday plaque to be displayed in the village. Mr Badman commented that the Ladbroke Festival was an outstanding success, the envy of many larger villages. He thanked the village for giving it their support. He closed his report by thanking th three retiring Parish Councillors for all their years of support and advice and welcomed the new members of the Parish Council.

Report on Church and P.C.C. Activities

The Rector said that the festival had been a very happy occasion and he hoped to build on this in the future. He had been very sad to lose the Garner family from the village as they had taken such an active part in Parish affairs. Mr Rowe was pleased to report, however, that Mrs Betty Winkfield had been appointed as church warden in Mr Garner's place. The Rector was looking forward to the Church Army's Parish Mission in July. An inspection survey had been carried out on the fabric of the church is likely to be faced with some large bills, but the exact amount was not yet known.

W.I. Report - Mrs Gladwys Gould gave the annual report of the Ladbroke and Deppers Bridge W.I. It certainly sounded as if they have been having a busy and entertaining year with talks on yoga, postboxes, wine-making etc. Once again the Institute had been able to maintain contact with the patients of Hatton Hospital and money raised from the annual garden party had been donated to the Myton Hospice. Mrs Gould emphasised that new members would be made very welcome.

Women's Fellowship - Mrs Gould also reported on the Ladbroke Fellowship who meet on the second Wednesd of each month. This organisation is open to all

denominations and age groups.

Village Hall Committee - Mr E Hagard reported that the income was considerably down this year as therewere fewer lettings and the Easter Dance had been postponed, due to lack of support. However, the Committee had managed to continue its programme of improving the facilities at the hall (car park, curtains, water-heaters, vacuum cleaner, tables and chairs). The hall is now badly in need of creosotic hedges need cutting and help is badly needed from volunteers to carry out some of this work. Mr Clive Hallum, Mr Chris Gould, Mr Don Northorpe and Mrs Irene Bennett were elected to the new village hall committee. The next event is to be a 1960's Disco with chicken & chips supper on Friday 19th July.

Youth Club - Mr Hagard went on to give a report on the Youth Club's activities. Good attendance and atmosphere had been achieved during the winter session, though attendance had fallen off, probably due to the pressure of school examinations. junior club had been started for younger members of the village. There had been some discussion about allowing young people from other villages to attend the Youth Club and this matter has not yet been resolved. Mr Hagard thanked Mrs Sue Frost, Mrs Rose Allington and Mr Mike Jerome for their regular assistance in running the Youth Clubs. Friends of Ladbroke Church - A report on this newly formed group which had evolved as a result of the spirit engendered by the Festival was given by Mrs Darkes. She reported that they intend to hold seasonal events, such as music, prose and poetry readings, etc. to raise money for the church. had started an ambitious project to replace the coconut matting kneelers with tapestry ones. Anyone who would like to help in this venture please contact Mrs Jill Norgate or Mrs Gwynne Badman.

A.O.B - The Chairman of the Parish Council reported that a serious breach of Conservation Area Regulation had taken place in Bridge Lane. A major woodland site containing fruit, ash, sycamore and pine trees

had been indiscriminately felled. The feeling of the meeting was that these trees must be replaced. This matter had caused considerable concern in the village and it was decided that the Parish Council should write on behalf of the village stating their view to the appropriate authority.

The meeting ended just in time for those who needed liquid refreshment to make it to the Bell before closing time.

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


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resources to South Warwickshire.

#### ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

In his Chairman's Report, Keith Thompson painted a picture of a thriving community with the Youth Club growing in its range of activities and the street lights shining brighter than ever - thanks to the efforts of Dennis Atkins and the Lighting Committee. Dennis Atkins is retiring along with Bob Dunn and Dave Andrews to be replaced by Ken Stephenson, Midge Keen and Mike Coy. Mrs Keen has resigned from the Village Hall Committee and her place as Chairman has been taken by Alan Barr.

Sussex Cottages which for the past few years have been threatened with demolition are still standing and at the urgings of the County Councillor, Mrs Patricia Bidwell, Warwickshire opposed the tipping of asbestos at Ufton Hill Farm.

Mrs Bidwell, Mr Sharp, Mr Turner and Mr Harkell, the District Councillors had opposed the siting of the M40 Service Area at Barn Hill, Chesterton and were congratulated by Keith Thompson on their efforts, although there was some shuffling of feet by Parish Councillors and Iory Davies was heard to say that he was not opposed to the devolopment. Cllr Mrs Bidwell explained that all the Conservatives had supported her in her fight and she had been primed with details of Chesterton's long history. She had denounced those in favour of the siting as Twentieth Century vandals but still she did not prevail.

Mrs Bidwell, as usual, took the opportunity to address the Annual Parish Meeting and report on the committees on which she sits, Planning, Education and Social Services. From her speech it appears that the County is seeking to remove children previously catagorised as Educationally Sub-normal from Special Schools. They will become 'Children with Special Needs' and local schools will be expected to provide for their education with a 'Core' school to which they can be returned from time to time. Mrs Bidwell admitted that Mr Skinner of Southam School had expressed concern that such children would be isolated within a normal school and that staffing

for such children would 'have to be looked at carefully'. The scheme was in its planning stages only.

Mrs Bidwell promised improvements in the care of the Elderly and more hostels for the mentally handicapp. The County was to issue a circular on Multi-Cultural Education. She was pleased that the Count Rate had risen only 7.9%.

Sharon Hancock gave a vote of thanks for Mrs Bidwel saying that her attendance at both the Annual and Parish Council meetings was appreciated and that sh was always willing to help the Council.

Keith Thompson thanked his colleagues for all their assistance in the past year.

## HARBURY SOCIETY

For the alert amongst us, the talk given by Mr John Ireson on the Prehistoric Footpath Network, was thought provoking. He had drawn hundreds of lines dozens of maps to show routes he claims to have discovered were used by prehistoric man. Some in the Stonehenge area were quite impressive, others radiating out to the far reaches of Mongolia were rather more speculative. When Swindon Museum dismissed his network as 'Ley-lines' he set out to prove statistically that the geometric shapes on his plans could not have occured by chance.

In the Warwickshire area he 'discovered' a focus of routes on Stockton and one on Meon Hill, togethe with a link up between Meriden Cross and Banbury Cross, but by far the most important point he made was that today in Warwickshire historic rights of way are falling into disuse because of a curious anomaly: 'E' roads, (bridle-ways, Green Lanes etc) are classed as roads and appear not on the footpath map but on the County Road Map which is out of print: the Ordinance Survey shows rights of way that are on the definitive Footpath Map but not unmetalled roads that are rights of way therefore there is no way of knowing of the existence of an 'E' road right of way and these roads decline in use.

The Mystery Tour will begin at 7.30pm on Tuesday 23rd June. Entry will be 70p for adults and 40p for children with food and the answers at the Mystery destination. Clues take you round the village on foot answering questions using some local knowledge but mainly observation. The object is to puzzle, entertain and make you more aware of your surroundings. Do join us. The tour starts at 16 Farm Street.

May Parish Council Meeting, at which Mike Coy requests a Sleeping Policeman; a sleeping policeman awakes to investigate a mysterious decapitation. Ken Stephenson's horticultural expertise is called into question and the Horticultural Society's answer to the Parish Council is Universal Pansies.

New boys, Keen, Stephenson and Coy attended their first meeting as Councillors, together with all the Harbury District Councillors and County Councillor Mrs Bidwell. Keith Thompson was re-elected as Chairman with Bill Middleton as his Vice; Stephenson, Davies and Middleton formed the Properties Committee; Stephenson, Drinkwater and Coy the Highways Cttee; Drinkwater, Hancock, Keen and King the Planning Cttee; Middleton, Davies, Moore and Hancock the Finance Cttee and Mrs King and Mrs Keen made up the Lighting Committee. John Moore became the Deppers representative with 54 of the 69 votes cast for the seat. On the District Council Harbury has representatives on all the Committees; Mr Turner is on Amenities, Environmental Health and Finance; Mr Harkell, Planning Industrial Development and Environmental Health and Mr Sharp on Housing, Finance and Planning where he is Vice-Chairman.

County Councillor Mrs Bidwell reported that the road passing the Tip will be re-constructed and that Blue Circle would be proceeding with repairs to the Barriers round the Quarries. The Council claimed that the opening of the M40 would not generate more traffic on this road and that improvements were not necessary.

Mr Coy asked if a Sleeping Policeman could be built on the part of Dovehouse Lane that leads to the Pound to stop speeding traffic but it was decided not to proceed with this.

The Councillors thought Mrs Drever's offer of a seat at the Library to commemorate her late husband was an excellent idea but they did not know who gives permission, the Church or the County. The seat out—side the School in Park Lane was vandalised on Cup Final night and will be replaced. Vandals also damaged the retaining wall round the garden in Chapel Street.

James Turner gave a vote of thanks for the Harbury Society's persistence which had eventually resulted in the designation of Tree Preservation Orders. It was unfortunate that in the week that householders received notification of the designation Dave Andrews at Harbury House should find contractors for the Bus Company lopping his trees. A Lime in the Cemetry has suffered wind damage and will be felled. Keith Thompson suggested that the PC should introduce a scheme to replant such trees which are past their best.

The Horticultural Society did not like Ken Stephenson's flower tubs; they are the wrong shape and will take too much watering. They protested they had NOT AGREED to plant up the tubs but did recommend Universal Pansies for the job. Ken has bought the tubs and believes they will need watering only once a week. It is hoped to have them in place in time for the Carnival and Best Kept Village Competition. The Guides will look after the Temple End one and Ken hopes the W.I. will take on another.

Ray Carter reckons the evil smelling chopped bark that he put under the Spaceship on the Playing Fields as a safety surface would make a good garden mulch. It cost £65!

The Council decided to ask the local Constable to have words with youths who annoy others with loud radios at the Playing Fields, rather than undertake ammendments to the Bye-Laws or prosecutions.

Yet another lampost has been decapitated. This time in Vicarage Lane. Tim Percival went out at 2am to inspect it after it had been reported to the Police at 0153. The EMEB made it safe but there was no sign of impact on the post, no broken glass from headlights round the column and no deterioration of the concrete. Sharon Hancock was convinced it did not fall by itself although as Ray Carter said it was 'snapped off like a carrot'. No one knows what happened. A mystery!

Also impenetrable are the workings of the County Council. Mr Riches wanted the PC to erect extra lights to make the Speed Limit legal. The PC suggested the County set the lights up and now a Mr Brodie writes that footway lighting is not the County's responsibility! It has come full circle and Sharon Hancock recommended the PC wastes no more time on the issue. It is TWADDLE!

She was equally dismissive of suggestions that Fox Close, the new development in Chapel Street on the site of the old engineering works, should be called Chapel Mews. There had been good historical reasons why they had chosen Fox Close for the new road.

The imminent opening of a Chemist's at the Co-op was a shock to the Council, but Cllr Hancock recalled that the previous applicant had been granted permission to open such a shop and she explained that the Co-op drapers already has permission for retail use.

Planning permission has been granted for an extension to 37 Deppers Bridge and changes to the Manor House. The Parish Council did not object to extensions to 10 Farley Avenue and Eastbury House on Hall Lane, nor to the ammendments to plans for Greenhill, Deppers Bridge, which has been the subject of at least three planning applications. The Severn Trent Water Authority is appealing against refusal of permission to build on the site of the Sewage Pumping Station in Mill Street so I may have to revive my offer of a prize for the most apt house name.

#### JUNE IN THE GARDEN

It should now be safe to plant out marrows, tomatoes ridge cucumbers. Pinch out the tops of dahlias and stop garden chrysanthemums for the last time.

As soon as the Aubrieta is over, crop it right back to the base, which will soon produce a compact green clump of foliage which will carry next year's flowers

Summer prune red currants and gooseberries. Peg down strawberry runners. Divide daffodils and narcissus when the leaves have yellowed. Winter cyclamen should be stored on their sides against a north wall. Potted Azaleas can be sunk pot deep in a shady place and kept well watered.

Spray roses regularly. Nimrod T. gives the foliage a lovely sheen. A clove of garlic planted beside each bush also helps to reduce greenfly. If you don't let it flower there is no smell.

At the end of the month Clematis can be 'serpentine' layered. Bend down a young shoot and where it touches the ground peg it into a 2" hole well filled with compost. Repeat at intervals along the shoot, leaving the two pairs of leaves at the tip above ground.

#### HARBURY HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY

An excellent talk by Mr Thacker from Knowle concluded the year's programme. Talking about garden design, Mr Thacker was full of ideas and suggestions for all shapes and sizes of gardens. Particularly to illustrate his theme of 'Contrast' he brought along a Landrover full of plants.

A report in last month's H and L News which also appeared in the Courier, stated that the Society was willing to plant out the tubs being provided by the Parish Council for use near the 'Harbury' signs. It may be that the report is inaccurate, but in any case the Society is anxious to avoid misunderstanding.

The Society's Committee met with the representative of the Council for the first time after the publication of the reports. It pointed out that the long, narrow, shallow boxes (not tubs) suspended above ground level as proposed, constitute the most punishing conditions in terms of wet, dry, hot and cold weather.

The Committee was unable to suggest a suitable growing medium or appropriate plants to avoid, for instance, a daily trip (or more) with a watering can in the blistering heat of an English summer or even in last April's weather. Suggestions were made on whom to consult. Since then, Mr Thacker (see above) had a word about it and expressed his agreement with the Committee's anxieties and made some suggestions which are being passed on.

The Society is willing to co-operate with realistic schemes, but is concerned that its efforts should have a reasonable chance of succeeding.
