

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

FROM THE RECTOR

'Alleluia, the Lord is risen'. That is the message on the card we sent out to all parishioners in Harbury & Ladbroke recently but it is what you would expect at this time of the year. Whether you belong to a church or not, the mention of Easter suggests something happy and joyful. If you probe a little deeper, it seems that the joy is to be explained in the belief amongst Christians in the resurrection of Jesus Christ after death upon the Cross of Calvary. There for some people things begin to become more difficult. They can go along with Jesus as a good, kind, compassionate, friendly person, but rising from the dead does make things rather awkward, rather unnatural, a bit beyond our own experience. Make no mistake, it is a lovely idea and a very attractive proposition; one which most of us want to believe, yet isn't it all rather far fetched in this sophisticated world of today - isn't it all a little too good to be true?

If you are prepared to think further about the matte! a good starting point is the Gospel account of what happened on and after the first Easter Day. Quite clearly the disciples of Jesus after Good Friday were shattered, overwhelmed with grief, brought to a stance still, deeply shocked and full of despair. And then. if we accept what the Gospel tells us, their hopes began to revive and they began to realise that the death of Jesus on the Cross was not the end. made himself known to them and gradually they pieced together all he had taught them and they realised the his promises had been kept. Their grief turned to joy. Yes, says the cynic and the disbeliever, but were they not just explaining away their disillusion ment, putting on a brave face and making the best of a bad job? Well, if that was their intention they could have devised resurrection appearances of great spectacle. Instead, in very simple, natural, unaffei ways, they show how their faith grows in the Risen Christ. They are not deluded, and wish to delude no 'e - little by little they are convinced that Jesus

has risen from death and that he is with them still and will be always.

The Gospel is not just a story with a happy ending it is a story which continues, for it is a record of the life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ and the beginning of a new sort of life, an eternal life, which all who believe and trust in Jesus are able to share to the full.

May Jesus, the Prince of Peace, fill you with all joy and hope in believing this Eastertide. Alleluia, the Lord is risen'.



PARISH COUNCIL REPORT 23rd March

There were several matters arising from the last meeting on which progress had been made. The Rambler Association had withdrawn its objection to the rerouting of the footpath at the end of Windmill Lane but the owner of the adjacent land was now objecting: the Council decided to write and clarify that the changed route would actually take the footpath off the land concerned.

Cllr. Timms was thanked for repairing the Penfold Green charity seat. He had also investigated the lack of tree cover on the Bypass, and the Council decided to contact the Dept of the Environment, expressing their disappointment with the trees' survival rate and progress, and requesting that something quicker-growing be planted. Attempts to preserve the telephone box were underway, and the Electricity Board had explained that the powercuts on 31st January were due to a flashing pylon near Priors Hardwick.

The Councillors decided to request that a particularly rattly manhole cover near the Ladbroke Hall gates should be improved, and also decided to write to Mr Fitchett of the Ramblers Association to ask for his help in tracing and re-opening the footpath which should lead from the Church to Southam: recently two groups of walkers have been defeated in their attempts to find the route, which all maps of the area say is there!

A request had been received to have signposts to Harbury placed on the Bypass at either approach to the village. After some discussion, the Council decided to refuse this because of the probable increase of traffic through the village, along relatively small lanes.

Mr Tom Sheasby is to be re-appointed as the non-ecclesiastical member of the Alibone Trust, and at the Annual General Meeting in May, there will be a short talk on County Emergency Planning by Mr Keith Brailsford from Southam: this is not only Civil

Defence but also how the village should react in the event of some major accident, plane crash or other disaster.

The village shop is progressing well towards its opening, and the next Parish Council meeting will be on Wednesday 27th April at 7.45pm in the Village Hall

PARISH SURVEY

This part of Rural Warwickshire is under threat of great changes - in particular from the M40.

Everyone knows that we need cheaper homes for first time buyers, more bungalows for OAPs, a better bus service and more shops and jobs, but it is difficult to prove this to outsiders.

The Parish Survey which will be distributed with the Harbury News is an attempt by the County and District Councils to collect information on housing employment and services which, when it is analysed will be used in the making of the South Warwickshire Rural Plan - a rule book for planning decisions in this area, ammunition to fight off unsuitable development and a tool for helping communities get what they really need.

There is an explanatory leaflet which comes with the survey that makes it quite clear that the organisers have made sure the forms can not be traced to individuals; the replies will be anonymous. No-one is prying into YOUR life and it is not a sneaky way of collecting data for the POLL TAX!!! You can feel confident that when you fill in the form and post it off in the reply-paid envelope nobody can identify your answers, but your answers will be playing a vital role in helping your community show its needs for the Nineties.

Much time and effort has gone into the project to help us help ourselves and the greater the number of people who complete the survey the more accurate the results will be and the more credibility they will have.

Mrs Waddell says people think I'm knocking her for sitting through the Parish Council meetings. I'm NOT! I admire her perseverance and still hope to be able to report her vigil's been worthwhile.

Having spent insufficient time considering where to draw the boundary for housing, the Parish Council now finds itself in the embarrassing position of not knowing whether it should approve or reject applications for planning permission at the limits of Harbury. On the assumption that it had been excluded from its areas of potential development, the land at Harbury House, the PC has opposed Dave Andrews' application to build 12 homes on the paddock adjoining Butt Lane and Queens Close, and it failed to address itself to the merits or otherwise of the scheme itself!

There was no objection to extension plans for 29 Neales Close, 53 Mill Street, Mr Riman's house in Honiwell Close or Mr Winchester's in South Parade nor for a new house at 'The Barns' Station Road. The Councillors objected, on the grounds that the lane was too narrow and the plans were unwelcome infilling, to Mr Franklin's wish to build another house in the garden of Holland House in Ivy Lane.

Cllrs were annoyed that the District had seen fit to mark as 'Delegated' plans from the new owner Mr Carter, to extend his part of Harbury Hall. The Hall is in the Conservation Area and 'Delegated' plans would not even be discussed by Stratford's Planning Committee. The Parish Council objected to this and will demand a site meeting, for they complained the plans submitted were not adequate for them to make a judgement on the scheme.

The Tennis Club asked for permission to admit members from outside Harbury. They have a gap in the age structure of their membership. There is the old guard-fast approaching middle-age and a thriving youth section but the youngsters do not go on to be the life-blood of the Club for they have to move away to continue their aducation, find work or somewhere to live. The Parish Council agreed the Club could recruit from a wider area with priority still

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for Harbury people. The Club will have to find £400 per year and the Parish Council £250 (both index linked) to service the Sinking Fund for maintaining the Courts.

The Properties Sub-Cttee will research possible improvements to the drainage of the Recreation Grounds, especially the area around the Tennis and Netball Courts alongside Mr Clark's property. Bill Middleton reported the Village Hall had discussed the possible sites for the Surgery and John Drinkwater advised the Village Hall and Parish council to wait for the Doctors to put in for Planning Permission.

Marjorie King complained that the cutting of the Recreation Grounds hedge had left bits of twig scattered everywhere and John Moore who did the job promised to clear it up.

SDC is encouraging the Parish Councils to make Bye-laws prohibiting the fouling of public areas by dogs. Harbury already has them and indeed successfully prosecuted someone for such anti-social behaviour.

Ken Stephenson who is noted for his bright ideas, wanted the School children to undertake a survey of eyesores so that the Parish Council can arrange a tidy-up for both the Best Kept Village Competitio and the Civic Trust's Environment week. National 'SPRING CLEAN' Day is on Saturday 23rd April.

Mrs Bidwell (your County Councillor) and the Parish Council have succeeded in pressuring the County Council to find the money to curb the far side of the B4452 past Peter Mann's TIP. There is also the promise that the road will be surface dressed in the summer and the white lines redrawn. For the County Mr Miller claimed that most of the mud on the carriageway came from the breaking down of the verges and he announced that the owner of the TIP was to surface his access roads and move the wheel scrubbers to the site office where proper monitoring could take place. Litter along the roads was the result of hauliers not sheeting the Cllrs urged everyone to report to the Police the number of any lorry with an unsafe or unsheeted load. Cllr Davies said fines of up to

£400 could be imposed.

SINCE THE MEETING WE HAVE HAD WORD THAT THERE IS AN APPEAL AGAINST THE REFUSAL OF PLANNING PERMISSION TO TIP ASBESTOS AT UFTON HILL FARM SEE HARBURY SOCIETY REPORT FOR DETAILS.

Following up on her successful intervention to the Highways Department Mrs Bidwell was asked to intercede on Harbury's behalf and secure a footpath along Butt Lane where the school children have to brave the the convoys of skip lorries. The Divisional Engineer will be asked to make provision for prams and wheelchairs in the new curbstones being installed along South Parade.

The NFU is to do battle with STWA over the overflow of sewage into Mr Trice's ditch at Mill Street. Cllrs and Pc Percival have been hard at work relaying complaints about the state of Mill Street. Work by contractors to link up the houses to the new main has given us a series of sleeping policemen and representations from Tim got them flattened (he will call them road humps, I wonder why?). STWA apologised to the Parish Council for the inconvenienc caused by the use of the traffic lights and the noisey generator which ran all night and promised that the road would be reinstated and the work finished before Easter. The Clerk complained people were frightened to cycle down Mill Street and that Binswood End Green had been carved up. Cllr agreed that the workmen had worked very hard and tried not to inconvenience residents. They wanted the County to promise to resurface the road as soon as it gets settled sufficiently.

Chief Superintendent Owen asked for statistics on the cost to the Council of crime and vandalism in Harbury Cllrs thought hard and dredged up from their memory the time the Park Lane seat was broken. It was on the day Coventry won the Cup! They resolved to record any further damage and report to the Chief Super.

Marjorie King was happy to report she had inspected the stiles and there was no damage. The phantom hatchet man of Temple End turns out to have been a damp squib.

MORE FIBRE - LESS FAT - LESS SUGAR Will put a SPRING into your step.

APRIL IN THE GARDEN

Time to mow the lawn again - there's a thrill! Keep the blade high, and first rake the grass over to
remove twigs and other winter rubbish which might
damage the blades. Later in the month scatter lawn
sand evenly over the whole surface to kill moss and
flat weeds.

Finish pruning the roses and give them some fertilise Clematis, flowering shrubs and perenniels will also benefit from a generous sprinkle of growmore. Make an outdoor sowing of sweet peas, and most vegetables including Autumn cabbage. Plant onion sets and shallots. Early potatoes at the end of the month.

Cover early blossom, such as peach, if night frost is forecast. Use nylon netting or old net curtain. House plants can be potted on into larger containers, start to feed them and increase watering.

It is time to start feeding garden fish, and once again if you have more frogspawn than your pond can cope with let me know, as Dr Ellis will find it a good home!

TIPPING OF ASBESTOS AT UFTON HILL FARM

Peter Mann has appealed to the Secretary of State for the Environment against the County's refusal to tip asbestos waste at Ufton Hill Farm.

The Inspector will deal with the Appeal by written representations. This means that if you have already written objecting to the plans to the County or the District Council (but not if you only wrote to the Parish Council) your views will have been passed on to the Inspector and will be taken into account.

TRAFFIC FLOW CONTROL - HARBURY EXPERIMENT

The proximity of the M40 has caused considerable anxiety about traffic in local villages. Harbury and Ladbroke News can report that an experimental control scheme has been operating in Harbury for some months. The whole project has been carefully kept secret. Many towns and cities have traffic management schemes to deal with congestion, but it is almost unique to have a major experiment operating in a village like Harbury.

Many Mill Street residents have been asking for action for a number of years because of two problems. The major difficulty has been speeding vehicles, but traffic jams at the junction with Back Lane are a problem during rush hours (when School is open). However the experimental scheme has exceeded all expectations, and has had a considerable impact on local residents.

The scheme started last year with a system of mobile traffic lights, which gradually moved up Mill Street. The scheme not only slowed down traffic, but also involved the ingenious removal of a street light. The suggestion that this stage of the experiment was concerned with a new sewage pumping station was clearly mistaken, since all the activity has not stopped the overflow of sewage into the fields below.

Early in 1988 the second phase of the traffic management scheme began. This also involved traffic lights to slow down traffic. This was extended back to the top of Treen's Hill and gradually moved up the whole length of Mill Street. The really outstanding success of the latest phase has been the use of ramps. These have been placed across Binswood End and Mill Street at five yard intervals for about 400 yards. The ramps have been tested by the local Constabulary and have dramatically reduced speeding through the village.

The residents of Mill Street have every reason to be grateful for the success of this traffic management experiment. They have been happy to put up with the excessive inconvenience, the noise and dirt, and damage to gas and telephone facilities. They are reported to be looking forward to the next phase

of the scheme. It has been rumoured that this will involve a roundabout at the bottom of Heber Drive taking up most of Dr Hancock's lawn.

Only two things puzzle Mill Street residents. Firstly - why does the scheme seem to involve the digging up and relaying of water and sewage pipes? Secondly - why does the Severn Trent Water Authority seem to be involved in traffic management schemes? Answers - on the back of a water rates demand please - to the Harbury & Ladbroke News Office.

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
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
