FROM THE RECTOR

At one time many people observed Lent very thoroughly. It was recognised as a period of fasting and abstinence, a period of sustained effort in spiritual matters, when prayers, worship and reading were taken more seriously. But in an age when we are constantly tempted to indulge ourselves and forever to be searching for something better and more desirable, more comfortable and easier, the things associated with Lent seem unattractive and rather demanding. Often reference to Lent conjures up the question 'What are you giving up?' and nowadays the quick answer is - 'Well I don't really see there

much point in giving up things'. In fact this rather negative idea of 'giving up' is quite inadequate. It offers us an opportunity, in a few short weeks, to become more positive about our Christian profession. Sensing that fasting and abstinence is beneficial to us as a matter of health, but it has also a spiritual dimension to it. We prove that we are in control of our bodies and are not subject to every little whim and fancy which presents itself and every temptation modern life places before us. Moreover we align ourselves with Our Lord, who frequently thought it necessary to set himself this discipline. Then, surely not one of us is satisfied with the extent to which we come to worship. It is so easy to have a rule of Life, which is never examined or revised. Perhaps the fact that we are there at church every Sunday without fail is insufficient and does not allow adequate spiritual development. The commitment to come to a weekday service indefinitely might be unreasonably difficult but it might be managed for a limited duration and could be tremendously rewarding. Maybe we make sure that Bible reading is not neglected and each day set aside a time to read a section of scripture in an orderly fashion, but religious books abound nowadays and are easily obtainable and to take up some additional reading during Lent is very worthwhile (there are, of course, plenty of paperbacks in Church for anyone to borrow). Apart from what I have mentioned so far there remains the important need for us all during Lent, to be even more faithful about our prayers. Time and time again in the Gospel we read of Jesus at prayer and must realise the importance he placed upon praying. If we would hope to be followers of his, it makes sense to follow whenever we can, his example.

I would not presume to lay down for anyone how they should go about keeping Lent. All I would urge upon you is consider what I have said, note what is listed below and take the opportunities Lent offers to every one to grow in faith and in love for Our Lord.

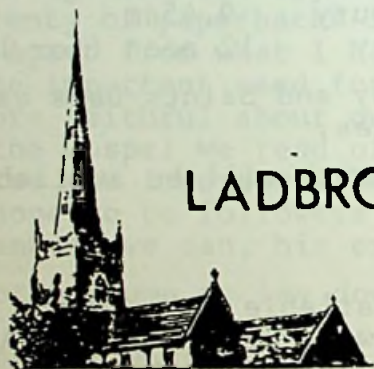

It is thought possible that some at Harbury would also like to have the Communion from this Rite from time to time and to meet this desire, from March, the service at 8am will once a month be from the Book of Common Prayer. To signify which Sunday this is to happen 'B.C.P.' will appear by the service entry in the calendar as is done by Ladbroke.

PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

The campaign for weight restriction limit on the road to Deppers Bridge is underway. In order to put their case forward the Parish Council need to be informed of the type of large vehicles using this road e.g. high sided, tippers etc; the names of firms involved and the loads they are carrying also need to be noted. Please report any sightings except for farm vehicles, as it is feared this road will be even more widely used with the planned expansion of Bishops Itchington.

The Post Office have agreed to re-site the village Post Box outside the new shop and it has been suggested that it would be nice to keep the old box rather than have the latest design.

The Ramblers Association originally objected to the change in the position of the footpath, and the new gate at the junction of Windmill Lane and the Bypass, because they thought that the footpath would not be continued on the far side of the Bypass. They are now satisfied with the proposed arrangement so the procedure to make a gate in the Bypass fence will now go ahead. It was felt that the new footpath to the church had not been finished off satisfactorily as infilling and tidying were needed and it was hoped this would be completed before the end of January.

The Parish Council has been asked to deliver and collect a questionnaire in connection with the South Warwickshire Rural Settlement Policy. This is to be a very important survey and it is hoped that the questionnaires will be taken very seriously. More details will be announced in the near future.

It was felt that the chevron and dangerous bends signs on the bend by the entrance to Ladbroke House are now rather excessive and it was thought that perhaps some of them could be re-sited at the other

exit onto the Bypass by Bell Vue Cottages, where the screeching of brakes is often to be heard.

WHAT DOES JAM & JERUSALEM REALLY MEAN?

The 65 Harbury W.I. members are an active cog in a big National Wheel of 350,000 members, affiliated to the International Countrywomen of the World.

We are sometimes accused of being 'all jam and Jerusalem' and why not? We make excellent jam! and still believe that cooking is a worthwhile art. Proof of this is evident at our W.I. markets, locally held at Wellesbourne and Leamington.

Jerusalem stands for our care and interest in 'England's Green and Pleasant Land'. So what part do we in Harbury play?

We speak on resolutions at our County and National Council meetings, which include important subjects affecting national and family life - the fact that every village has a phone box is a direct result of one such resolution.

At the request of Warwick Museum we recently did a survey of tombstones in local church yards. We also compiled a village scrap book which was part of a National W.I. project resulting in a modern Domesday Book; and at present are engaged in a County Competition for a village scrap book.

The level of W.I. Craft work is high, as each year at the Royal Show there is national competition involving several members from the same county contributing the crafts involved in a particular theme. When Warwickshire recently won the cup, 3 out of the 6 members were from Harbury W.I. We have also been first at County level in flower arranging and for having the best programme of speakers.

We are hoping to have a Talk on the documents held by the County Records Office for the end of February so look out for posters.

Tim Millington and I went to a Seminar at Warwick University on 'The Parish Map' which is an initia

by Common Ground to encourage villages to think more carefully about their surroundings and identify the commonplace everyday things that go to make up the character of their area. They say, rightly, that it is often quite small details that we take for granted that make our villages individual and that we only really appreciate when they are gone. So pinpoint these, map them in some way and make sure the authorities know that these are the things you love and will defend.

There were lots of exciting examples of what different groups had achieved in this line: one group of school children had produced a map of their village highlighting a leafy lane along which they had their Nature Walks and they had illustrated this by indicating it on their map with photocopies of the leaves they collected on their walks; another group of children loved their village's slide and gave this prominence on their map; the ladies of Up Lyme have made a delightful watercolour map of their area annotated with historical detail and bordered with natural history illustrations (they got a grant for the printing and have already sold a thousand copies!!); the most beautiful and ambitious map is an exquisite topographic quilt of a village on the borders of the New Forest with different coloured silk for fields and hand embroidered hedge lines and appliqued trees, the whole padded to show the shape of the land - like the Bayeux Tapestry it must become a treasured historical document.

We are fortunate in Harbury to have already Joe Bamford's map which goes some way to showing what our village is and what in it we value, but there is scope for other projects should anyone feel inspired to try. I can give more details and encouragement if you want to have a go. Our village is changing and needs all the help it can get to keep its identity.

The plans for development at the Cement Works have been displayed at the Library and will go on show soon in Bishops. There is to be a public meeting there on 8th February and I would urge everyone to go. An extra three hundred houses, industry and recreational facilities is bound to have an impact on the surrounding villages and needs careful

consideration. If you want to see what can happen to sleepy villages when a motorway comes through go to the east of Reading where whole farms disappear daily and villages become swamped with suburban housing.

'THE BUSINESS OF GOOD GOVERNMENT'

A Nativity play revolving round Herod the King and called somewhat clumsily, 'The Business of Good Government', with the continuity in the hands of an Angel imbued with human feelings as well as the gift of prophecy - this is what John Arden's play turns out to be.

Presented in Harbury Parish Church on January 8th, time-honoured scenes, angled here to comment on the internal and external affairs of an occupied country, unrolled in a way which more than justified producer Mary Shelley's choice. There was no doubt of the audience's enthralled involvement; the time passed all too quickly - what more need be said?

Keith Hayes provided a strong focal point as the king juggling desire for approval with neurotic fears. Janet Thornley's beautifully-spoken Angel expressed a wide range of emotions without ever losing authority. Joseph and Mary are not given too many opportunities in this version: all the more credit then to Brian Jones for his down to earth carpenter, and to Jacquie Page for a Mary full of grace indeed, expressing in symbolic poetical phrases her perception of suffering ahead.

The Three Wise Men and their unhurried dignity; the shepherds and their homespun humour, always enjoyed; Samantha Neill's flute; a group of other roles all well differentiate (with a lovely cameo of the farm-girl from Lorna Bedford); imaginative staging for the massacre of the Innocents; the singing of the choir and the use of the organ - these all remain in the memory and do credit to producer and players alike.

The play was preceded by arrangements of appropriate carols sung by Shirley Keir, Isobel Russell, Bryan Harrison and Clive Watts. This did more than provide a prelude: it had a competent professionalism as well as musicality.

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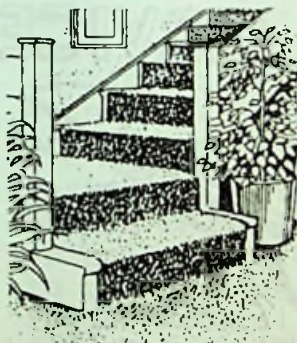

HARBURY PARISH COUNCIL

Your Parish Council postponed making comment on the plans for the development of the Cement Works to give everyone time to study them and attend the exhibition and the public meeting (7.30pm 8th Feb at Bishops Itchington), but they devoted less than 10 minutes to discussion on the confines of the village!

Stratford District Council gives your Parish Council the opportunity to say where it thought the limit of the built-up area of Harbury should be. The District will produce a development plan for the village showing this line and there will be a presumption against any development outside it. So the Parish Council has had its chance to say where it does and does not want new building.

Fortunately Stratford also intends that everyone should receive a questionnaire which will be used to gauge opinion on this and other matters relating to the proposed Rural Structure Plan, but Harbury Parish Councillors were not happy that they were the intended vehicle for its distribution and collection. So, unless some other way is found to get the forms to the people, Harbury may have lost this chance to have a say in its future.

Pressure on land is already growing and will accelerate as the M40 nears completion. As well as the ambitious plans for 300 homes, an industrial estate, hotel, golf course and recreational facilities on the Cement Works land, we have had an application approved for four houses with TRIPLE

GARAGES at Greenhill! The usual crop of application to extend existing dwellings continues; 16 Honiwell Close, 10 Penelope Close, 17 Manor Orchard, 10/11 Chapel St, 45 Farm St; Mr Thwaites is to build a staff house and make alterations at Roseleigh and Hurdish Farm; Mrs Kelsall can build a house at 7 Vicarage Lane and Harbury Hall Stud can convert an old stable into accommodation. Mr Harrison's proposed new dwelling at Walnut Tree Cottage was refused as too cramped and contrived and the Parish Council objected to plans by Mr Thornicroft's son-in-law to build a bungalow with access off Darkie Lane behind the old Baker's house in Chapel Street.

Severn Trent can't get permission to build at the Pumping Station Site (the PC has told them they pollute and silt up the ditch with the overflow from the Station - they must pipe the ditch), but Dr Wilne wrote to the PC saying that it was one of the sites he was considering for the new Surgery but he insisted the spilling of sewage would have to stop.

The Doctors have been given an ultimatum by the Health Authority. They have to find bigger premises for the Main Surgery and Dr Wilne warned that with the extension of Bishops Itchington it might have to go there if nowhere in Harbury could be found. He suggested four sites including the Pumping Station. The Cllrs rejected the idea of building on Tom Hauley's land at the end of Farm Street because of the dangerous access and were not happy to see the allotments in the Paddock of Hall Lane developed but they were enthusiastic at the prospect of a surgery on the Playing Fields near the Village Hall. It could share the soon to be improved Car Park.

The Parish Council agreed to match Stratford's grant to the Village Hall for heating improvements and congratulated the Committee and Brian Ingram in particular for the professional way they had tackled the problem. Brian explained that electric storage heaters had been chosen in preference to a 'wet' Gas fired system (which was marginally cheaper because it was easier to install and trouble free

to run. Gas would have involved large tanks, the disruptive installation of yards of vulnerable piping and the remote possibility of explosion or fire.

The Parish Council accepted the contractors quote for Green mowing next year and will cut the WCC's grass at Dovehouse Lane/Vicarage Lane too. They will appoint a contractor to undertake remedial work on the trees at the Burial Grounds where the Yews especially have been damaged by the recent snow. Fifty pounds is to be sent to the Fletcher family towards the cost of marking the graves from which Curbstones were removed in accordance with the facility granted by the Diocese. Burial charges will be reviewed for April 1st and the PC re-iterate that it does not buy back burial plots.

The Zig-zags at the School seem to be doing their job but the state of the road after the STWA contractors have finished has incensed the Cllrs. They had a catalogue of complaints (noisy generator pot holes; unprotected materials heaped everywhere, pedestrians forced into the road, and a Dumper constantly driving the wrong way down Church Terrace) The contractors had managed at various times to cut off the water, the electricity and the phones, and the PC well remembered that the last STWA work (on the Mill St sewer) resulted in a lamp standard being decapitated.

There was even greater fury at the state of the road passing the Ufton Tip. Cllr Hancock wanted to know 1) when the other side of the road would be curbed? 2) did WCC really think there had been any improvement? and 3) if the wheel scrubbers at the Tip were being used? The white lines on the road were obliterated and in fog the road was a death trap. Pc Percival urged the Parish to complain to the County and Cllr Middleton said that mud and rubbish from the lorries using the Tip extended along the Southam Road as far as Ufton.

There were complaints about the poor road surface within the village where gravel from the recent top-dressing had collected in the gutters. Water was standing in many places especially along Middle Road, (John Drinkwater put this down to the demise of the lengthmen - one of his hobbyhorses), but at least

pressure from the Parish Council, Mrs Bidwell and 'inaccurate' press reporting had caused the County to change its mind about postponing work to remove water from the roadway in Deppers. Mrs Bidwell was asked to use her influence to get British Rail to repair its broken fence there. Overhanging trees and bushes will be pruned back from the street-lights. The Parish Council is to erect an additional lamp at Leycester Close but Queens Close is deemed more than adequately lit, however it might as some compensation get a footpath to Vicarage Lane.

Tim Percival, with some ceremony, announced that lamp No 82 on the B4451 (in Deppers) had now been 'out' for eighteen months!

John Moore passed on a very worrying report from Whitegates Farm that an axeman had been spotted heading towards the newly refurbished stiles on the footpath from Temple End to Beggars Lane. Marjorie King bravely volunteered to investigate this middle-aged, middle-class vandalism.

There was still no joy for Harbury's one other faithful Parish Council watcher - there was no news on the provision of Bus Passes for the elderly.

THE CEMENT WORKS DEVELOPMENT PLAN

It has always been inevitable that the proximity of the M40 would bring changes to the area, and predictable that plans would eventually be submitted to develop the virtually derelict cement works.

The majority of the site is within Bishops Itchington but some of it is within Harbury Parish. By the time you read this some of you will have seen the exhibits in the Library of Blue Circle's plans for the site. This includes 300 plus houses, a business park and a substantial hotel and leisure complex.

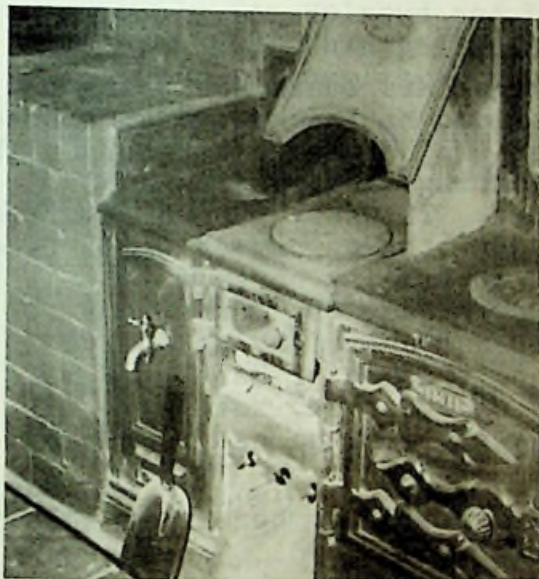
A public meeting with the developers has been arranged by the Parish Councils of Bishops Itchington and Harbury on Monday February 8th at 7.30pm in Bishop Itchinton Combined School. FEBRUARY IN THE GARDEN

The wet open weather has generated a great deal of
lax green growth, especially on the clematis. This
should be pruned back to about two thirds, except
of course Macropetela, alpina and armandii which
are all early flowerers. Buddleia should be chopped
back to almost ground level.

Weeds too have enjoyed the mild weather. An all out attack on them now will save trouble later. Bare soil under roses can be sprayed with a solution of Jeyes fluid to kill off the spores of black spot.

An early sowing of parsley in a sheltered spot is worth risking. Remember to wet the ground with boiling water before sowing the seed, this does quicken germination. Parsley does especially well near roses.

It is not too early to put down slug pellets above dormant lilies and delphiniums. Keel slugs attack them below soil level. Digging of open ground should be continued as long as it is workable. Sow parsnips and summer spinach.

Peach trees should be sprayed with dithane to prevent leaf curl.

Accepted by District Council with proviso that it should be a Starter Service Station. Cricket Club still trying to complete fixtures under Captaincy of Ian Holroyd. Up roar at Parish Council following reports of youths cycling round the top of the Church Tower.

NOVEMBER 1988

Sewage pumping station in Mill Street does not break down. Water board submits plan to build sewage pumping station on sewage pumping station site. Supported by Parish and District Councils but rejected by Whitehall in the national interest. Residents of Ladbroke complain that village is too quiet since construction of bypass - several decide to move to Harbury in view of motorway plans

and presence of 200 rally cars still unable to find their way out of village.

DECEMBER 1988

Harbury and Ladbroke News taken to the High Court by the Government as a result of breaches of National Security in reports on Horticultural Society meeting. Senior Editor accused of being economical with the truth. Extraordinary General Meeting of Cricket Club - Les Sollis elected as Captain of newly formed second team. Crackdown on drink driving causes complaints from Harbury residents who can actually get out of their drives unimpeded by parked cars. Lack of cars on pub car parks produces flurry of planning applications for Executive Starter Homes infilling. Terrace Cottage in Harbury fetches £750,000.

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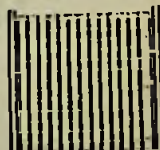


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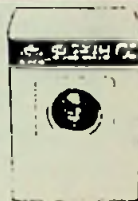
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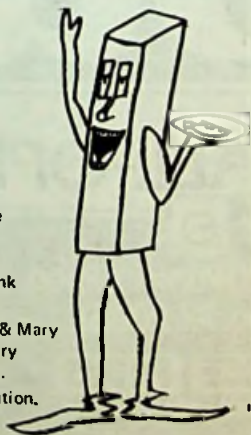
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
