

# FROM THE RECTOR

Glancing through my diary for May, it seems as if it is going to be a busy month and looking further ahead into June and July I doubt if then we shall find time hanging heavily. Details of course will emerge in the Diary Dates as usual, but I want to refer to several events.

Taking them in sequence, I wish to draw your attention first to Sunday 8th May. Last year money was raised in Harbury for a water project in Sierra Leone. A teacher from there, JohannesMallah, is at the present spending a time in Leamington and he has agreed to come to Harbury and address the congregation on that

Sunday at the 10.30am Sung Eucharist. When money has been raised for some good cause in a country far away it is always good to meet someone in person from the actual place and we now have that opportunity. On th same day at 5.30pm the Royal British Legion Group 15 is holding its parade and special service at All Sair Harbury and we shall be very pleased to welcome them -Later that week there is another special and importar day in the Church's Calandar, Ascension Day on Thursc 12th May. The following Sunday 15th May is the Confirmation at Harbury at 6.30pm when the Bishop of Warwick will be confirming 9 young people and 6 adult (2 from Harbury 1 from Deppers Bridge and 3 from Ladbroke). This day is one of the most significant occasions in any year and we should all do our utmost to be present to support the candidates. I know many people generally attend church only in the morning, but I do urge everyone to make a special effort to come that Sunday evening. Not only does it encourage those who are being confirmed, it does give a all a chance to remember the commitment we ourselves have made. After the Bishop has asked the candidate: to declare the Christian faith into which they were baptized and in which they live and grow, he turns to the congregation and says "This is the faith of the Church" and we all reply heartily "This is our faith we believe and trust in one God, Father, Son and Hol; Spirit. Amen". Particularly I appeal to those who have been confirmed in the last year or two, for as you appreciated the love and concern of those presen when you were confirmed, you now have the opportunit of sharing the love and concern for others about to be confirmed.

The next important day is Sunday 22nd May which is <u>Pentecost</u> or <u>Whitsunday</u> the great day when we celebrate the giving of the Holy Spirit. No one fail to regard Christmas Day as special or Easter Day as special, yet the third major festival of the Christi Year is sometimes not noticed as it should be. This year Ladbroke have decided to mark the occasion by inviting all from Ladbroke and from Harbury to tea a Ladbroke Village Hall at 4.30pm to be followed later 'Songs of Praise' at 6pm in Ladbroke Church. I shall e glad to receive requests for this service, in writ lease, giving the first line of the hymn and the name

of the tune. The same week on Wednesday 25th May at 8 o'clock at Ladbroke, members of the City of Coventry Youth Orchestra are giving a concert in its church under the auspices of the Friends of Ladbroke Church entitled 'Music in the Month of May'. The proceeds will be put to the restoration fund.

I mention these particular occasions, so that you will take particular note of them. In conclusion, one of next months highlights will be the return of the Church Army team (Quest '87) from Thursday 9th June until Sunday 12th June - but more of that in next months issue.





# EASTER IN CAPE TOWN

Finishing work at 1pm on Thurs (31st) I threw a few things into a hold-all and set off alone to drive the 700 miles to Cape Town, from Port Elizabeth. The first 2 hours were just wilderness, breaking down would have meant a 50 mile walk to the nearest garage! The sight of the National Park coming into view was quite a relief. I stopped to take pictures of the sunset which was most spectacular. I drove on to Mossel Bay and decided to stay the night in a Motel. The next morning - Good Friday I started off again at 8am to drive the "garden route" and through the wine producing region of Cape Province. The scenery again being quite breathtaking. # CONCESSIONARY BUS FARES FOR THE ELDERLY

Harbury Parish Council have sponsored a resolution on the need for a national scheme for concessionary bus fares which was passed at the A.G.M. of the Warwickshire and West Midlands Association of Parish and Town Councils. It has now been forwarded to the National Association and their Secretary, John Clark comments

'There have been several campaigns to establish a national system of fares for the elderly, but Governments of whichever political party was in control have always declined to take responsibility on the grounds that this ought to be a locally handled matter because of the varying situations in different parts of the country. This argument is probably more defensible now there is total deregulation of public transport outside London which means that systems, fare structures and available transport are much more varied than before.

When the issue was last seriously considered by Government this Association was not enthusiastic about supporting a National scheme because of the realisation that whilst such a scheme would cure the problems of those areas where concessionary rates were low, it would have an adverse effect of those areas where concessionary priviliges were high.

The other problem which parish councils have is that the real concern of most parishes is a desperate need for money to prop up any sort of transport system at all.

It is difficult to see what advantage there is for a parish council or its areq from ensuring that some

of its inhabitants can travel at lower prices than others.

I am of course willing to have Harbury Parish Council's resolutions on the agenda of the Council but if we do, I think I must ask you to brief your

representative on our council with reasons why an association of local authorities should take on itse the task of pressing for a national scheme. It would seem to me that any argument based on the fact that the elderly cannot afford the current fares is not b itself a logical justification for us intervening".

It seems unlikely given this attitude that much progress on this important issue is going to be made

# PARISH COUNCIL MEETING - APRIL 1988

laving successfully passed the initiative test to ga= entrance to the Rugby Club, the refugee Councillors were at once beset with problems and complaints from parishioners. Mrs Waddell wanting to know why OAP's don't get bus passes; Olga Hughes complaining about t state of village footpaths and the telegraph pole in the middle of the South Parade pavement; Gladys Hutch problems with the miserly rambler with an out-of-date map, following a path through her garden; me berating them for not even considering the plans for Butt Lane Stratford District pressing them to ban dogs from the Play area at the Recreation Grounds; Tony Ceney agita for a hedge trimmer; the Car-park extenionists champ at the bit, and noises from a frustrated Hot Turkey!

Mr Carter, the new occupier of the lower part of the Hall feels thwarted in his attempts to remodel the entrance there, by the Parish Council's measures to find out just what he does want to do. They complain that the plast what he does want to do. that the plans submitted were too poor for this to be determined. Mr Carter wrote to the PC, on paper head 'Hot Turkey', giving an explanation of his scheme and advising them to withdraw objections. Primly refusi to stray down the path strewn with parsley and thyme they have replied that his comments 'have been noted

Cllrs finally looked at Dave Andrews plans for Butt Lane, which following their objections have been ame to provide only 3 instead of 6 starter homes. Distr Cllr Sharpe pointed out that the line the PC drew on map, which might or might not have excluded Mr Andre land from the 'village confines', still had to be ratified by SDC. (The Sub-Cttee had cudgelled its brains over the line for some time previous to the 1 ?C Meeting and Linda Ridgley apologised for telling world they had spent only five minutes considering where to put it.) Cllrs all agreed that there was a pressing need for starter homes and as there had been no outcry against the development they gave it their blessing.

All the Cllrs are determined to keep the Main Surgery in Harbury, but they felt they could not put off for ever getting quotations for the extension to the car park, just because the Surgery might be going there. Ken Stephenson and Bill Middleton in particular were anxious to get on with the improvements. For his pains in reporting the appearance of a drain from the New Netball Court, Bill Middleton was treated to an expert lesson on the workings of field drains by Iory Davies!

The District Council has suggested that Harbury adopt model Bye-laws to prohibit dogs from specified areas as part of an attempt to stop them fouling public places. Stratford is to enforce District-wide laws making it an offence for owners to allow their dogs to foul footpaths and verges. Harbury Cllrs were reluctant to take such steps and decided to consult the dog lobby first.

Nostalgia took over when complaints were voiced about the state of the paths ditches and verges. Those wit the longest memories reminisced on that paragon, old Jim Finch, the Lengthman. One problem is that Stratford mows its grass areas too infrequently. John Drinkwater said 'The District lets us down'. He was no doubt thinking of the effect the untidiness will have on the village's chance in the Best Kept Village Competition. He was also worried that the village thought the Parish Council could 'wave a magic wand' and solve all these problems, when the maintenance of the paths and verges is the responsibility of the District and County councils.

The Development Commission has set up a Rural Transport Fund to provide up to 50% of the cost of setting up alternative forms of transport in rural areas. Southam Lions hope to purchase a Community Minibus to be stationed at Wattons Lodge for hiring out to local organisations. The Parish council were sceptical about whether Harbury would get much of a look in but thought that the Lions might be persuaded

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to do something similar for the village later. The Clerk drew to their attention the existence of the Helpline.

# VIOLAINE JUNOD - SOCIAL & LIBERAL DOMOCRATIC CANDIDATE

Since I moved to Ladbroke 15 years ago I have become increasingly concerned by the way residents of this area are treated by Stratford District Council. So far I have limited my involvement in politics to Parish Council level but several recent decisions taken in Stratford have convinced me of the need to be more active.



At present S.D. Council is the only Council in Warwickshire (and one of few nationally) not to give pensioners concessionary bus fares. It is a disgrace that it costs at OAP £1.10 to get from Harbury to Leamington or £1.75 a return ticket. Were Stratford to fall into line with the other District Councils in Warks, the County Council has already pledged to co-ordinate a scheme which would mean more bus services being provided for us all.

At a time when many village halls have been threatened by closure (e.g. Stockton) it seems pure madness to penalise them financially - yet this is just what Stratford has decided to do. At a committee meeting (on which my opponent served) it was decided to grant village halls only 50% rate relief. I would fight with other SLD councillors to make this 100%. Time and again we seem to spend ages fighting

Time and again we seem to spend ages fighting planning applications which few support. If elected I would hope to prevent this time-wasting by by making consulting parish councils and local residents a priority.

# YOUR HEALTH IN YOUR HANDS

Hello. Jeanne Newell here, Primary Health Care Manager for Southam & Southam Rural Area. Following on from my first article last month, I wish to introduce you to the Health Visiting Service which is based on Southam Clinic.

Health Visitors are prof essionally qualified as nurses with Midwifery or Obstetric Training. In addition they have completed a course on Health Visiting, obtaining a diploma or degree at a Polytechnic, College or University. Their expertise involves positively promoting health and monitoring health needs through Health Education. Their responsibility for health extends from "womb to tomb" or "cradle to the grave".

They work with the General Practitioners in their areas, their nursing colleagues, Clinical Medical Officers and other services e.g. Speech Therapy, Chiropody, Audiology etc..

On staff for Southam and Southam Rural Area we have 5 full time Health Visitors: Mrs Maureen Goulden and Miss Jackie Dance who work in the Southam area: Mrs Frances Allen works on Lighthorne Heath and also with some families in Southam: Mrs Jo Begg works in the villages surrounding Fenny Compton and also is the Health Visitor for C.A.D.Kineton. She is ably assisted by Mrs Jenny Deeming who is our community Staff Nurse who monitors closely the health of the more senior citizens in that area: Finally Mrs Sylvi Thacker who works in the villages of Harbury and Bishops Itchington and other surrounding villages.

The health Visitors work within the baby clinics and client's homes developmental assessments, giving advice on infant feeding, vaccination and immunisatic programmes, planning Health Care programmes with their families. They have a listening ear, valued by those they reach, both young and elderly and the "in betweens".

# THE GARDEN IN MAY

White fly are extremely active now on any plants kept indoors or under glass. Spray regularly. HEXY is effective and not too costly. All plants kept in containers should be given a dose of general fertili-You should also scrape away the top layer of soil and replace with compost.

Hardy bedding plants can be planted out now, tender ones such as dahlias and fuchsia at the end of the month. Remove all dead blooms from daffodils and hyacinths. Cut back aubretia very firmly after flow ing, this keeps it compact. Trim forsythia lightly. Feed and spray all fruit trees and bushes. Spray roses and broad beans weekly.

Sow french and runner beans, summer spinach and a further sowing of salad crops. Keep the hoe going but remember you may slaughter interesting seedlings in the flower beds. Hand weeding is tedious but more rewarding. Remove suckers from lilacs and fruit trees. Continue to protect the whole garden from slugs.

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
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
