FROM THE RECTOR

By chance, just before I went on holiday, I came across a book which had been given to my mother for a birthday present in 1920. As it was Thomas Hardy's 'A Pair of Blue Eyes', which I had not read, I took it with me. Although usually a little melancholy I always enjoy reading Hardy's novels. One of the main characters in this novel, ill at ease about whether he should marry the girl he had become engaged to or not, wanders off on a rather haphazard continental tour visiting many beautiful and well known places of particular architectural interest. In France, he visited amongst other places Laon, and climbed 'the strange towers' there. This immediately took my attention, for I had certainly never been there myself or knew anything about it, and I was to stay there on my way home in the next few days. Unfortunately it was no more than an overnight stop, arriving late in the evening and having to set off again early the next morning. As we approached Laon, the towers stood majestically and impressively against the evening sky. We were staying in the lower part of the town, but we felt we must get a closer look at this magnificent structure. Then we saw the way, which led there - a flight of stone steps, which went up and up and up. We were determined to climb them and we did just about, all 301 of them, but the effort was well worth it. Laon Cathedral is one of the oldest Gothic cathedrals in France and around it on top of the hill is the old town, quite unspoilt, with narrow cobbled streets tightly packed about the enormous church. Of course it was all locked up at that time of night, but the towers were indeed strange. There were seven of them, open-traceried from each are stone effigies of horses and oxen out. Apparently they are there to honour

the humble beasts of burden, who hauled the blocks of stone up the steep hillside and having hauled only ourselves up hundreds of stone steps, we appreciated the tribute paid to those hard-working animals.

It is always amazing to me, when I look over ancient buildings, and try to imagine how they managed to construct them in those by-gone days, without the help of the sophisticated machinery we have today. tremendous effort and determination was put into the work by both men and beasts. Obviously nothing was too good, no labour too much, to assure that a building was finished to give glory to God. No doubt they were pleased when it was all completed, but the pleasure was first and foremost in honouring God's name and providing a glorious and splendid place in which worship and praise could be offered. Seeing such wonderful and beautiful churches, fills me with determination that the two churches for which I am responsible at the present, built and cared for over many generations with great love and devotion, should be maintained to the very best possible state of repair and made as beautiful as possible, not just for my own satisfaction, but in due honour to God, for which they were built and to make them acceptable and worthy places of worship for future generations. 

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

NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

The scheme in Harbury was initiated over two years ago by Keith Thompson who asked me to take over last year when he became Chairman of the Parish Council.

We have 23 section co-ordinators but could do with about 6 more, partly to replace those who leave the village, and partly to extend our coverage. Any volunteers please ring 612703 - failing this I shall knock on a few doors.

The duties of section co-ordinators are not arduous the distribution of local bulletins to adjacent houses
about every three months, and attendance once or twice
a year if possible with local police crime officers in
the village hall to be updated so as to be able to
give information and advice on house security.

Weighbourhood Watch is not a vigilante system and annot be expected to prevent determined break-ins, but it can keep members advised of crime trends in

this district and the best ways of guarding against them. Also it costs nothing to be a member.

In the last year housebreaking has decreased nationally by 5% perhaps due to these schemes but car thefts have increased by 12%. The police say that most of these crimes are committed by the 12-20 year old group.

It has been stated in the Press that council houses are three times more likely to be broken into than more expensive houses because they are just as likely to contain video recorders, music centres, portable televisions or microwave ovens, and because their security is usually less. Raids are often made by small groups in stolen cars from adjacent cities and proximity to motorways adds to the risk. Two such incidents have occurred in Harbury during the last eight months involving three or four houses in each case.

Patio doors are a favourite means of entry. House-holders alone in the house should also beware of diversionary thefts. Someone calls at the front door posing as a council official or a contractor asked to give an estimate which requires viewing the back of the house. If the householder goes cound to the back with the caller without locking the front door, a second accomplice nips in and takes what he can.

Harbury has a very low crime record and it is understandable that some people should think that no action is needed, but the risks are increasing and security locks for doors and windows are cheap compared with the loss of a video recorder or other expensive equipment. Also in some cases membership of a Neighbourhood Watch scheme qualifies for an insurance discount.

Finally my thanks to our section co-ordinators who deal impartially with the convinced and the sceptical and I hope that we can add to their number.

And a last word to everyone. If you see anything that makes you uneasy, phone the police. They would much rather look into false alarms than miss out on important information.

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

PARISH COUNCIL REPORT - JUNE, 1988

Lack of space caused the report of the June meeting to be held over and OAPs did not get news of the Parish Council's moves to provide concessionary fares. The Council had received information about setting up

a scheme and samples of tokens, and were assessing the costs to Harbury. Concessionary schemes are normally the province of the District Councils but Stratford has never funded one because, District Councillors tell us, it is unfair for all to pay when only (OAPs in villages with a bus) benefit.

Development continues apace. Extensions have been granted for 28 Binswood End, 22 Constance Drive, 26 Manor Orchard, and Navron, Hall Lane. Cllrs were dubious about plans for a VERY large house at Bishops Bowl and vigorously opposed Dave Dick's plans for a house overlooking the Burial Grounds. They would prefer to see the old Forge retained. The Church's plans came in for some stick too. Two houses on Tom Hauley's land were on a dangerous narrow bend and the Cllrs were not happy about the lack of parking for the Church Room, but, because they were keen to keep the Surgery in Harbury, they did not oppose its siting on the Old Pumping Station even though they did not think parking there was adequate.

Because the Surgery will not be on the Playing Fields now, the Car Park extension can go ahead and Ken Stephenson flashed about aerial photos to show the ease of access from there to the countryside. What they did show vividly was how much 'open' land there is still within the village envelope - enough for 50 to 100 extra houses, but only at the expense of trees and open spaces. It is a sobering demonstration of what the future may hold for Harbury.

PARISH COUNCIL MEETING - AUGUST

August found a beleaguered Parish Council struggling with the Yuppie invasion AND revolting pensioners.

Joyce Waddell had marshalled a Dad's Army of supporters big enough to outnumber the Councillors (harvesting and holidays having taken their toll). They sat nodding silent support for her letter urging the Council not to spend Harbury's money on improving the Car Park but on providing subsidised transport for pensioners. She argued that it would fair to allocate funds for facilities for

already had transport; instead the PC

should help the elderly who now had to pay £2 to get to Leamington.

Cllrs replied that the Car Park improvement was to be funded from THIS YEAR'S money and that they were looking into the costs of running a 'tokens' scheme for next year. Mike Coy had devised a questionnaire for OAPs which should help the PC discover how much the ratepayers would need to contribute. There were however fears expressed that such a scheme would use all the 'Free Twopence' every year. (The Free Twopence is the money the Council is allowed to raise on the Rates for any project which they have not already specific powers to undertake. For instance: they are empowered to raise money for lighting and mowing but when the Village Hall roof needed urgent repair they had to raise a Special Rate.) Ken Stephenson asked what the PC would do if other special interest groups such as the disabled or unemployed lobbied for financial help.

As for the Yuppies - well they can't take the blame for all the changes and planning applications that have been pouring in, for some are from long-established residents. The PC did not object to extension: and changes at Marshall's old shop; Hillcrest, Binswood End; Pheonix House; Chellow Dene; Sharmer Farm; 2 Bush Heath Lane; 20 Mill Street; 8 Park Lane; Butchers; 10 Farley Ave or 28 Manor Road. They were not too happy to hear that the Rugby Club's application to build a second storey on the Clubhouse will be considered on 20 September (!) by which time the roof should be on!!! Mr Gilkes' application to build a bungalow in the garden of the old Bakery has gone to Appeal and there is to be a site visit to study the Old Forge site where Dave Dick's plans for a house still do not meet with the PC's approval. Then there are Mr. Nakkar's ambitions for a Water Sports Centre at Bishop's Bowl and news that Blue Circle's Avebury Projects Plan for a huge development at Bishops Itchington has gone to Appeal.

Even worse, there was strong condemnation of Mr. Carter's plans for Harbury Hall where he is trying to convert part of the Stable Block and demolish other stables - to build speculative bungalows. He does He does not live here; there were access problems and it was over-development, the PC said. His part

of the Hall was said to be fast deteriorating, although Cllrs stressed that Mr Green, the other partowner kept his hous and garden immaculately (as visitors to the Open Gardens will know). Cllrs have snitched to SDC that Mr Carter has a mobile home in his garden and no planning permission.

Mrs. McKenzie of 47 Farm Street wrote complaining that her front garden fence, erected to keep her children in, only marginally broke the reules, and was not worth the PC bothering itself about, but she wanted to be present if they did discuss it. Unfortunately she chose to be on holiday for the August meeting and so did not hear the PC's comments on the 'eyesore'. Both she, and the neighbour who sought to have the stockade removed, will receive the courtes of a reply from the PC.

It's not just the 'Yuppie' threat that the PC is watching with horror. There's Nirex who are looking at a 500 acre site somewhere in South Warwickshire as a possible dump for nuclear waste, Sharon Hancock revealed. She was appalled that Britain had contracted to take the world's nuclear waste without having anywhere other than Windscale to store it. Mrs. Bidwell promised it would be dumped here over her dead body and that of Leslie Rendell the County Planning Officer (even for that spectacle I would not countenance it!)

James Turner was pleased to announce a painless victory in persuading the EMEB to move the South Parade telegraph post to the rear of the pavement. Mrs. Bidwell promised to press the County to consider work to stop the puddles forming in the roadway at Deppers. Marjorie King asked for postholes by the Car Park to be filled in before someone broke a leg. The Police have been informed that people are not heeding the No Entry sign into Hall Lane and they will be asked to get the resident skip moved from Chapel Street where it has been impeding the traffic for months.


All the Parish, District and County Councillors agreed to support 12 year old Richard Appleton who indicate about the truly abysmal state of Mill and the Parish Council is to write a strongly

worded letter to the Rugby Co-op deploring the highhanded and unfeeling way they closed part of the Coop complex without giving customers, staff, residents or the PC an inkling of what was happening. As Sharon Hancock said, 'It is not in the Spirit of the Co-operative Movement'.

M40 MOTORWAY

The Department of Transport has awarded the Contract for the construction of the "Banbury IV" Section -South from Gaydon to just north of Banbury - to Balfour Beatty Ltd., and work has commenced.

The "Gaydon" section contract - from the Gaydon to Bishops Itchington road, - B4451, north to Longbridge roundabout, Warwick will probably be awarded, to the successful contractor, at about the end of September. Hello. Jeanne Newell here, Primary Health Care Manager, Southam.

Yet another month and the holiday season is almost

over.

As you know, I have been introducing our Nursing Stafi to you. It is now the turn of the varying other disciplines that use the clinic at Southam as a base.

We have a Speech Therapist, Mrs. Carol Leech who works very hard to keep the waiting lists down to a

minimum.

The Chiropody Service has now changed the system for appointments and this is based on self referral, so a telephone call to Holly Walk Clinic, L/Spa 881451 should result in a much quicker appointment being given for Southam Clinic. A new Chiropodist is about to take up her appointment.

A Community Dietician holds clinics on a monthly basis and our Physiotherapist is also available

once a month.

Miss Ann Byrne, Audiologist regularly screens the hearing of the children referred to her. Two Clinical Medical Officers work in the clinics and schools

in conjunction with the Nurses.

Mrs. Maureen Thornton, the Community Psychiatric Nurse is seconded to us from the Psychiatric Unit. Liaison between the Health Visitors and the Community Midwives is of paramount importance and assists the smooth transfer of care from one service, Maternity to the other. Health Visiting.

Two able Clerical Officers help me and the Health Visitors. Mrs. Muriel Wade is my overworked Secretary and Mrs. Valerie Berridge stalwartly types, files and answers the telephone. All disciplines work together in the frame of "Team Work".

Finally our excellent caretaker, Heather, keeps the

clinic in "Ship Shape" condition.

We do hope that we have become household names to you all and should you require advice or assistance you will feel able to contact us at Southam Clinic, Telephone 4319 or 7377.

Remove immediately any green growth which appears on variegated foliage plants and shrubs. If you do not, the whole plant will gradually revert to plain green.

Rosemary plants can die off very suddenly, now is the time to take precautionary cuttings.

Prune rambler roses by cutting away stems which have flowered. Cut to the ground all flowered raspberry stems. Tie in new growth.

Continue to feed chrysanthemums, and plants in tubs with a liquip feed. Continue to spray roses.

Divide and transplant rock plants. Plant daffodil bulbs. Pot up plants for flowering indoors.

Plant out spring cabbage into permanent positions. Spray, lift and store onions, carrots, beetroots and potatoes. Later in the month pull up Tomato plants complete with roots and hang up to ripen on, in a frost free place.

At the end of the month bring inside any indoor plant moved outside for the summer, including late flowering chrysanthemums. E.D.Z.

We believe that at the next Parish Meeting on Thursday 25th August, the Harbury Parish Council will begin the process of determining how to spend the "Free 2 pence" on new Parish schemes (for the 1989 rate precept).

We, as pensioners, are under the impression that your councillors intend to allocate the "2 pence" to provide more car parking space at the Village Hall for car owners. In other words for those who already have transport of their own, yet another car-facility.

We believe that the 2 pence precept available must be directed to assist those of us in the village who really need help in transport by means of bus tokens. The fare to Leamington has increased to £2 Also since last month you will know that the Co-Op hardware store has closed - to buy a tin of paint or a bag of nails we now have to travel to Southam. Is it not ironic that also in the same month our earlier independent hardware store in the village "Marshalls" is now being converted into "Offices"? Yet another local shop site lost for ever.

We, as pensioners, have done the research and provided your Council with exact details of a discounravel-token scheme, already in successful operation assisting other villages like Moreton Morrell, Wellesbourne and Shipston.

We ask you to redirect your energies and start the bus token scheme (which we are prepared to administer) This would be of direct benefit to up to 300 people in the village rather than spending precious resources on a few car parking spaces for those who already have their own transport.

We trust your elected councillors will now allow us pensioners this much needed assistance in the 1989 parish precept and look forward to listening to your discussion on the 25th.






