

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



This month I want to mention a number of important events, which I hope you will note firmly in your diaries.

It is good to remember that the Church is much wider than our own parish. Certainly we pray often for Christians in other parts of the world and we make an effort to support overseas missionary work. However it is not so often that we remember we are part of a diocese with many other parishes. In recent years the attempt has been made to make us more aware of one another. The Provost and his staff at Coventry Cathedral would very much like us to look towards the Cathedral as the Mother Church of the Diocese and share its ministry whenever possible. T strengthen our relationship with the Cathedral, Harbury & Ladbroke are to join the Cathedral congregation at their Sung Eucharist on Sunday 16th April. Please try and come on that date and let me know by putting your name on the list in Again to develop a wider understanding of other parishes, this year we are reviving the Links we established in 1987 with Ryton-on-Dunsmore and Bubbenhall, and with New Bilton, Rugby. have accepted our invitation to come to tea in the Village Hall on Sunday 23rd April and to join with us afterwards at a service entitled 'To Praise His Holy Name'.

Taking this idea a little further, I want to tell you of another chance we have of involving ourselves with the activities of other parishes, this time parishes not very far away. In May the people of Radford Semele and Ufton are engaging in a Parish Mission. They have chosen a well-known evangelist, Jim Smith to lead their mission. Jim is a full-time evangelist working for the Church Pastoral Aid Society and travels extensively. His approach is quiet and gentle, but he speaks authoratively, earnestly, and from the heart. In the early plannin stages last year, when this special time was under discussion, during a Bible meditation, thought was

given to a passage from Mark Chapter 1 especially verse 38:

'Jesus replied "Let us go to the nearby villages, so

hat I can preach there also". As a result of

that I can preach there also". As a result of this it was decided to offer nearby villages a share in this mission, if they cared to accept. At Harbury have accepted the invitation and below I give the description with the same of the description.

I do hope we shall take full advantage of these particular opportunities and extend our vision of the Church beyond our own parish church, much as it means to us, for I am sure we shall benefit greatly by so doing.



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

The first item under discussion was the urgent matter of getting a gate to the bypass at Windmill Lane. Warwickshire County Council Planning and Transportat Committee had been in touch and insisted the matter was under control but the Parish Council felt that it they had no action by May, a representative of this Committee whould be asked to attend the Annual Parish Meeting and explain the situation.

Last month the Councillors had discussed complaints about possible contravention of planning conditions at the poultry farm on Banbury Road. They had write to the owner about complying with the imposed regulations. As no reply had been received, it was decided to pass the matter on to the District Council enclosing photographic evidence.

Planning permission had been granted to convert the barn behind Village Farm, though new plans had to be submitted to amend the design.

The Parish Council felt they should monitor any further developments by Stratford District Council to change the ownership of the swimming baths at Southern

Councillor Liverton felt that the inadequate restoration of the road where the new bungalow has been built on the road to Deppers Bridge creates a nuisar and the Parish Council will endeavour to get the redone properly.

The Handicap Tournaments will take place in Coventry on Sunday May 21st. The C team's games are in the morning (they should have a good handicap!) and the

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
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A and B in the afternoon. Jean will be umpiring for the club on this day, as the distant patter of tiny feet mean that her netball playing is over for a few months. Congratulations.

"THE LOCAL JIGSAW" PARISH MAP & VILLAGE APPRAISAL

Things are hotting up round the village. Mr Carter plans to build a mini estate at Harbury Hall and there are rumours that the Telephone Exchange will be developed. More planning applications come in each month for four bedroomed 'executive style' houses, yet what people think are needed are modest family homes and OAPs bungalows.

The Parish Council is being pressed by the District Council and the Warwickshire Rural Community Council to undertake a Parish Appraisal to find out exactly what the people do want. There is not much time left and it will have to be done soon.

To help them and to show just what we care for here in Harbury, the Harbury Society is launching a Parish Map Initiative. Starting on Sunday 9th April (1.45pm from the Old New Inn Green) and continuing for the next two Sundays we will survey Harbury to find out just what it is that makes the village so special and what we want to keep. It will be an opportunity also to think about how we would like the village to develop; where a few modest family houses and OAP's bungalows could fit in, and where it would definitely not be suitable to build big aggressive modern houses.

If you have strong views on this; if you care for your village and especially if you are artistic; we would like to hear from you and would welcome your input on Sunday afternoons.

HARBURY PARISH COUNCIL MEETING REPORT - MARCH 1989

Stratford District Council has sent the Parish a digest of the South Warwickshire Study (the results of the Questionnair we all completed last year It has revealed a need for homes for local people the village, but the Planning Applications set before the Parish Council again this month were either extensions to existing houses, (at 14 Mill Street 11 The Beeches, 7 Manor Road, 14 Manor Orchard 5 Mackley Way) or for large detached dwellings.

The Parish Council was not happy to allow access four-bedroomed house to go in at Northfields. They had previously objected to development at the rear of Childyke because access is in Mill Lane and they feared that the new house would create a precedent for development there. Similarly, they strongly resisted Mr Carter's con Harbury Hall. He already had permission to

extra houses there but now wanted five, plus an accessor road (where the neighbours say there is not sufficient room) onto Hall Lane, which his plans showed to be a two way road.

Once again your Parish Council is seeking to make the Hall Lane One Way System a complete circuit and would like your opinions. They believe that once the Churc Room is finished traffic chaos will ensue, unless Crown Street and Church Street are included in the system.

Somewhat shamefacedly they explained to the assembled multitude of eleven people why they had given in to pleas to let the Church Room contractors go in over Pump Green. They had insisted that the Well & Pump, the coping stones and bricks, the turf and trees were protected, but Bill Middleton was incensed that work began so soon; Sharon Hancock was very unhappy about it all; John Drinkwater feared the access might be made permanent and fearless Iory Davies continued to voice his strong objections to the whole thing. He was especially annoyed that no thought had been given to providing access to the Room for emergency vehicles

The County wants to wait until the M40 is completed before it will countenance restricting heavy vehicles passage through the village, but James Turner urged everyone to continue to press for their exclusion and the Parish Council will demand that surveys are undertaken NOW so that useful comparisons can be made. A warning sign is promised for the bad bend at Hurdis Farm on Plough Lane. The work on Queens Close footpawill start soon. The Lighting Committee will see about a lamp for the Pound and a name plate will be puthere. The drainage work at Deppers has been well and truly tested by the recent rains and found to be satisfactory.

Cllrs had a whole series of dates to scribble into their diaries, beginning with the long awaited Tarzan Swing ROPE TRICK performed by the double act of Thompson and Wallington on Sunday 25th March.

The big news for the senior citizens is that travel tokens for the 150 OAP's who requested them will be distributed from the Village Hall between 2 and 5pm of & 5th of April by Mrs Waddle and her helpers.



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

HARBURY TELEPHONE EXCHANGE

Have you ever wondered how Harbury has managed to maintain its identity as a telephone exchange when so many villages have been swallowed up in the anonymity of town and city exchanges? Knowing that Harbury was one of the earliest automatic exchanges in the country I decided to do some research - here is a brief report:

At noon on Saturday 26th February 1929 the Harbury Automatic Exchange was opened serving 13 subscribers. It was one of several types of 'village' automatic exchanges built to gain experience as to the feasibil of employing automatic plant in areas where only a limited amount of attention could be given, i.e. to overcome the difficulty of obtaining caretaker operator and the growing demand for continuous service through the night and weekends as well as weekdays.

The Occasion was reported in the Leamington Spa Courie on 1st March 1929 under the heading AUTOMATIC TELEPHON EXCHANGE - AN IMPORTANT DEVELOPMENT and read 'An important step forward in the provision of telephone facilities has been made at Harbury this week Subscribers at Harbury desiring to converse with each other call by means of a numbered dial on their new telephones the number required and the connection is made automatically. For calls outside Harbury subscribers dial Ol which has the effect of gaining th attention of the telephonist at the 'parent exchange' Leamington Spa, where the desired connection is made and every assistance given. Calls incoming for Harbur subscribers are dialled from Leamington Spa exchanges. It is hoped shortly to provide public call office facilities at the new Harbury exchange by means of a kiosk fitted with the latest form of multi-coin box. Harbury is almost the pioneer in the matter of a rural exchange, the only other place thus far provided with one is on the South Coast.

By March 1963 there were 63 subscribers who were able to dial the speaking clock and contact the emergency services by dialling 999. STD and the international Swas introduced in 1977 and by 1983 Harbury served over) subscribers. No doubt there are a lot more now.

A GLIMPSE OF THE THIRD WORLD

"Forts and Palaces of Rajputana" they called it and a see them was a breath-taking experience. Desert fort palaces from the great Moghul times, temples and shrines, all with a wealth of decoration. These we saw but cannot describe - our slides, which you can see at the Wight School on 11th April (see separate notice) convey something of the grandeur and the exquisite craftsmanship.

In the sub-continent, when you look at the great monuments, you are always conscious of the surrounding poverty, the result of over-population and millenia of foreign exploitation of this rich and fertile land (the Moghuls and the British were only the last). Ir the urban shanty towns, people were living in indescr able squalor. Look at that woman cleaning her saucer It sparkles. She has spent perhaps a quarter of an hour, squatting in the gutter, scouring it with the sandy soil and dipping it in the water lying there. Children, hers and others, are active, cheerful, slim but not emaciated; they seem to enjoy good relationships with parents. As we go by in our coach with it air-conditioning, they wave at us as do quite a few adults, with a smile. We look for hostility or envy but there is neither. Our feelings of guilt are almost smoothed away. We wonder what the infant mortality rate is.

Critics say that this cheerful acceptance of deprivation results from lethargy, lack of "get-up-and-go". But it is more than that. It is associated, we think with the Hindu notion of dharma, of being successfully what you are, however lowly, rather than striving to be something different. It had dignity. Does it also reduce tension (there is little suicide) and diminish acquisitiveness (the crime rate, we are told, is relatively low)? Listen to this:

When we arrived at the Taj Mahal, tickets had to be bought at another gate. Our guide, a fairly laid-back Hindu, grabbed a nearby urchin, of whom there were many. He stuffed a wad of notes into the grubby twelve-year-old's hand and told him to get our tickets. A few minutes later, the ragamuffin returned, handed over the tickets and the change. He ran off happily with a no doubt modest tip.

Somehow, it seemed, people, in coping, retained their self-respect and a deal of good humour. There were signs too that the daunting national problems were being tackled. (The <u>size</u> of the place!) Remote desert villages often had their water supply. Electricity - often on the blink, it's true - was widely available as was the telephone. Medical services, often in conditions we could not tolerate were there and free to those in need (complimentary medicine our guide called it). Industry showed signs of developing and transport too, judging by the numbers of highly decorated lorries about - even if an alarming number of them lay on their sides by the single-track roads. It was optimistic which, or the evidence, was even more lethal.

The sheer enormity of the problems ensure that poverty remains. What does the tourist do? The good advice is not to give to beggars but, on return to make a contribution to a reputable charity. This can help when you are faced with a healthy looking child for you know that every time you give, you are encouraging the practice of keeping children out of school in order to beg from tourists. It's not so easy when a ragged mother with a sickly child makes her silent appeal. Oxfam won't feed them today. What about the cripple, squatting on deformed legs in the precincts of a temple? The cost of the photographs you have just taken of the carvings would feed him for a week.

For all that, it was an uplifting, not a depressing experience. The impression was of a people who, in

adversity could still retain a sense of worth.

Those we saw were mostly cheerful, tolerant, openhearted and spontaneous: Margaret had a fall and spent most of the time with a large plaster and two spectacular black eyes. Here she would have met averted eyes and surreptitious glances. Not so in India. People stopped and stared. Those (many in fa with English would enquire "Did you fall?", "Are you better?", "Do be careful now." And, on one occasion when we remarked that it could have been worse, a bone could have been broken, "Yes, at your age, the bones are very brittle." There are so many ways in which concern for other people can express itself!

HEALTH MATTERS


Spring is here and with it the chance of a new beginning.

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APRIL IN THE GARDEN

To remove moss and flat weeds from the lawn, spread thinly and evenly with lawn sand. Do not rake out the dead moss until it turns black.

Having flowered so early the Winter Jasmine is ready to be pruned. Cut back by two thirds, but if you want to increase your stock allow some of the lower branches to grow down and when long enough push the tips firmly into the soil, where they will form roots.

When your daffodils have faded feed them with a high potash fertiliser. It is also the time to split up over large groups. Prune forsythia and flowering currant. Cut back winter flowering heathers. Mulch raspberries and blackcurrants while the soil is wet.

Most vegetables can be sown this month, if the ground is not too waterlogged. Thin out any seedlings sown last month. Plant early potatoes at the beginning of the month. Earth up developing shoots to protect them from frost. Onion sets and shallots should be in by now. Hostas and lily shoots are already through and need immediate protection from slugs.
