

FROM THE RECTOR

We all know that the Ministry of Jesus was accomplished in only a very few years. There was so much to be done in such a very short time. Yet we hear in the Gospel that again and again, he drew away from the crowds and was still and quiet with God. Those periods of stillness were absolutely essential to him and no busyness prevented him from finding the time that therefore was necessary for Our Lord and Saviour, would seem also necessary for those who would be his followers. Most of us nowadays find that we are exceedingly busy people, rushing here and there and everywhere and giving the impression that we can hardly find time to catch our breath. So what do we do about finding some time to be quiet and still and receptive to God? Do we just ignore the example of Jesus? Do we just shrug our shoulders and say wistfully that the world's a different place today? Yes, I suppose that is what we usually do. Regretfully we fail to make the time available for spiritual things that in our hearts we know we should. That is, unless we are strict with ourselves, take ourselves to task and say instead, that hard as it may be, we will find the time.

Lent is just the right time to make the effort and your desire to be a better Christian than you are if really sincere, Lent presents you with the opportunity and the challenge to do something about it. Moreover it is in the bounds of possibility for this season does not go on and on, but is of a limited duration. For a few weeks we can make the effort, we can make the time just as Our Lord, in the midst of all the demands made upon him, made time to disengage from multitudes, who wanted to see him and hear what he had to say.

Below you can see what is taking place during Lent in addition to all the normal services on Sundays and throughout the week. It is better to decide what you can manage to fit in before Lent even begins, and then having set your mind to what you will do, keep to it in a disciplined manner.

You will have heard the words of Psalm 46 'Be still and know that I am God'. You could have no better watchword to set before you for the season of Lent than that. May you find time, as I hope to do during Lent to be still and to be quiet, occasionally.





The electricity has been re-connected at the 'Dangerous Bend' sign and the Council were delighted to hear that the 30 m.p.h. signs are definitely to be moved to beyond the Church; this is hopefully to slow traffic down outside Ladbroke Hall and around the bend by the Church. No news on the gate across Windmill Lane. I decided to be brave this week and cycle along the Bypass to get access into Windmill Lane, but having been nearly blown over by the heavy lorries, I won't be trying that again. Our Scout/Guide Group caters for well over 100 children in Harbury, and is maintained by a dedicated band of uniformed leaders and helpers, ably funded by a hard-working Support Committee. It goes without saying how important it is to keep up the momentum, for the sake of the young.

We are now going through a Leadership crisis, where the Cub Scout section is in need of new Leaders and Assistants, and this situation will shortly become more serious due to the impending retirement of another Akela, John Small.

I am appealing, therefore, for suitable people who are prepared to take on a commitment as Uniformed Leaders, and accept the responsibility for a group of some 15-20 boys. The enthusiasm that this age group has for Cubs, and the enjoyment that they get from this counter-balances the time and trouble taken by the Leader.

The Cub Pack forms a vital part of any Group, but especially here in Harbury, where we also have a Beaver Unit catering for younger children. Should the Cub Packs close due to lack of Leaders, there will be nowhere for the Beavers to go at the age of 8. Similarly the Scout Troops will be under threat as there will be no Cubs to feed in to them.

With regard to the Scout Troops, we are unable to expand as we are currently at the optimum manageable membership, and need more Assistant Leaders so that we can accept Cubs who are ready, and waiting to move up.

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


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
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

CONCESSIONARY TRAVEL TOKENS

At a public meeting on Friday 25th November at Harbury Village Hall it was agreed that concessionary travel tokens should be made available to all Senior Citizens resident within the Parish of Harbury and Deppers Bridge. This document details the scheme and will be issued to every participant.

Concessionary travel tokens (C.T.T.) will be supplied by the Parish Council for a period of 2 years, from 1st April 1989 to 31st March 1991, after which the scheme will be reviewed. All Senior Citizens resident in Harbury and Deppers Bridge will be eligible, notably men of 65 years of age and above, and women of 60 years of age and above at 31st March 1989; provided that they have registered for the scheme. Persons who have not registered by the closing date will not be eligible for C.T.T.S for the ensuing year. C.T.T.s are for

use by the recipient only, and are not transferable.

C.T.T.s may be used on all local bus and rail service. C.T.T.s to the value of £10 per person will be issued comprising of 50 x 20p tokens, subject to proof of identity and age (pension book No.)

NATIONAL WOMEN'S REGISTER

At the beginning of the Swinging Sixties a housewife (Maureen Nicol) wrote a letter to the Guardian Newspaper identifying a need in her life for something which would keep her brain ticking over, while she was dealing with the physical demands of a young family. She received an avalanche of replies and this led to the setting up of the National Housewives Register. Today this organisation (now called National Women's Register) has 21,000 members in this country and many more abroad. Women of any age and background are welcome

HARBURY PARISH COUNCIL MEETING FOR JANUARY 1989

Parish Councillors could appreciate for themselves the veracity of SDC Cllrs claims that Stratford was being inundated with Planning Applications. There were dozens for them to deal with, the most important being the further extensions planned for Holland House Ivy Lane; the conversion of the Mill which they thought of unsuitable design; rejection by SDC of development on Tom Hauley's land which would erode the open aspect from Mill Street; and the revised plans for the Old Forge site, which after the previous horrors were surprisingly pleasant. The Council regretted the loss of yet another piece of village history but did not object to the modest house and garage.

They accepted arguments from the District Cllrs that splitting SDC Planning Committees into Area Groups would put too great a strain on the already over-worked staff, but they were in heartfelt agreement with another resolution put up by the break-away S. Warks Combined Parishes, that PC's ought to be told why their comments were not accepted on certain planning applications. D. Cllrs explained that the District had to have policies consistent throughout the area otherwise developers could use decisions as a weapon to open up the countryside for speculation.

They reported that the Inspector at the Bishops Inquiry had been very fair and held a special evening meeting to allow those whose work prevented them getting to Southam in the daytime to have their say. Blue Circle had made play of the fact that Harbury had not opposed their scheme and an architect there had revealed that more development was planned in the area, and with the M40 Junction at Gaydon and the decline in farming, the D. Cllrs agreed there were to be great pressures on this area.

On the practical side the Parish Council was to send Sharon Hancock to the County's Rural Housing Conference

in February where half a dozen speakers would explain what could be done to provide low-cost homes for local people. District Councillor Turner advised the Parish to press for weight restrictions on the access roads to the village to ban heavy lorries.

The Parish had taken the initiative in providing some help with travel for OAPs and would give £10 of tokens for the next 2 years (details elsewhere) but did not want to commit a future council to this financial burden. Letters from our MP and Minister Michael Portillo made it clear that the Government believed it to be the responsibility of the County and District who had specific powers to give concessionary travel, but as usual it had fallen to the lowest tier of local government - the Parish Council and they were NOT empowered to raise money for this. Their only flexibility is the Free Twopence which could be used for any emergency or community improvement, but it was only the product of a 2p Rate they could raise and now most of this money was dedicated to providing help for the OAPs their power to respond to future problems was seriously compromised.

Keith Thompson promised to look into the possibility of providing a Community Minibus although this too would be a drain on Parish resources. On a lighter note, he had the new rope for the Tarzan Swing but until the better weather said he would 'hang on to it'. Possibly in recognition of this? his fellow cllrs had put his name forward to be considered for the Guest List of a Royal Garden Party.

Cllrs were appreciative of the County's attempts to improve efficiency in dealing with complaints about field footpaths and were pleased to have been asked to identify land ownership (a particularly perplexing problem). Indeed Cllrs themselves thought they knew who owned what, declaring 'Bonzo' Bloxham owner, then having to defer to the superior intelligence of Cllr John Moore who stated categorically the land was 'Uncle Eric's'.

HARBURY SOCIETY

We are not complacent, but because we have such a wonderful life here we tend to believe that everyone is so blessed. THEY ARE NOT! We are singularly fortunate and unless we take action now we will lose a quality of life that we take for granted.

At the Bishops Itchington Inquiry people complained that if the scheme went ahead so much traffic would be generated that it would not be safe for children to bike along the Gaydon Road. Council for the Applicants looked puzzled - they of course could not conceive of a quiet country road where children WOULD be safe!

Blue Circle made much of the richness of flora and fauna in this locality. To them we have an amazing diversity - to us it seems normal. IT IS NOT. Here, we are one of the last refuges for plants and animals that were common to our parents. I have asked Andy Tasker, the Conservation Officer for WARNACT, to talk to us in February about what is here and what is threatened.

Some people see the problems coming. Your District Councillors are urging Parish Councils to understand the underlying Planning Policies that at times look anomalous. They cry out for consistency that will hold the line against the developers. We think we are safe from over-development here, but we are not. The Parish Council has opposed building on Tom Hauley's delightful cottage garden in Mill Street but their own insistence that the new Surgery be built on the Pumping Station land has punched a hole in the dike that held back development there. The Telephone Exchange land will be up for grabs soon and the Paddock and the Spinney, both important 'green lungs' for that part of the village are not in public ownership. And all the time the cheap houses for young people that we do need fail to be provided.

In the Spring the Society will be surveying the village with a view to producing a Parish Map to show what we hold dear and to illustrate our history and concerns. If there is enough interest we could go on to undertake a Village Appraisal which would provide statistics to show what the village needs in the way of housing and facilities and where they could be put.

Simple things are threatened. Occasionally I ask myself how a letter addressed only to L Ridgley, Holly Cottage, Leamington arrived, but mostly I take the postal services for granted. The letter probably found its way here because Brian 'Sherlock' Taylor had a hand. Our Post Office is an asset but rural Post Offices in general are threatened with down grading to Community status where they are open less frequently and the Sub-Postmaster is paid less. 'Use it or lose it' is a maxim we need to keep in mind. Look what happened to the Co-op Hardware Store. Now there are plans to transfer the sorting of post from the villages to Southam. That will mean Postmen and women have to go there to sort then come back and deliver. Several of our auxiliaries will quit if this happens. Will the Post Office be able to replace them? Will the new employees know the village half well? If you are concerned write to Mr Dewhurst, PO Coventry Chamber of Commerce, St Nicholas St, Coventry.

We live a good and peaceful life here. When the Motorway comes that could all change. How much crime do we suffer now and how much nuisance do we get from

traffic? Very little - so little that when something does happen we complain - it is so rare. Cllr Turner sees the danger and he has urged the Parish Council to press for weight restrictions on our access roads to keep the heavy lorries out. There is not much we can do to protect our way of life, but the time for keeping our heads down and hoping it will all go away has past. Now we must fight to keep what we have.

Do come and listen to Andy Tasker at the Wight School on Tuesday 28th February and volunteer to help with the Parish Map.

PROFILE - JOYCE WADDELL



Mrs Joyce Waddell - one of three children was born in Oxford two months after her father was killed.

The family left Oxford when her mother remarried. Joyce was seven years old at the time and they moved to Coventry. She left school when she was fourteen eventually becoming a cost clerk at Courtaulds.

She married in Sept 1940 and she and her husband were bombed out on 14th November. They left Coventry taking with them their two cats and very little else. Although in the early stages of pregnancy they walked most of the way from Foleshill Road to the top of Leamington Spa. Her husband was recalled to the Merchant Navy the day after the baby was born, and was reported missing almost immediately. He landed up in Trinidad twelve months later. Joyce was billeted in Bishops Tachbrook and remained there for 32 years.

She well remembers that her husband's allowance was stopped from the day he was missing until he was located twelve months later, but she was helped greatly by the older people of Tachbrook.

After her husband's return they were allocated one of the pre fab houses which were for Servicemen who had had a rough time during the war.

FEBRUARY IN THE GARDEN

Finish clearing all herbaceous beds, cutting down dead stems to ground level. Weed thoroughly, the mild weather has meant that a number have never died back, and are already raring to go! Finally mulch deeply with compost, peat or stacked leaves.

Sow geranium seeds indoors, feed bulbs in bowls, give flowering houseplants plenty of light.

If you have large clumps of outdoor cyclamen thin out some of the small seedlings. Plant in peaty potting compost and sink the pot in the ground in a shady spot, this thinning will benefit the colony and give the seedlings a better chance of maturing.

Some delphiniums are already through the ground and must immediately be protected from slugs also tulips both in beds and tubs.

Spray fruit trees with a tar oil wash, and now is the last chance to use Dithane on peaches and nectarines to check leaf curl. Repeat 14 days later.

Force outdoor rhubarb by covering with straw and a wooden box. Set out seed potatoes, eyes uppermost. Sow broad beans under cover.



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
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
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
