

FROM THE RECTOR

Just a few weeks ago, the Gospel reading on Sunday morning was that well-known parable of the wealthy man, who had planned a grand dinner party and sent out invitations. He was amazed and he was angry because of the excuses he received (it does not mention whether anyone was so discourteous as not reply). One of the invited guests had bought some cattle and said he needed to examine them, another had purchased a plot of land and thought he needed view it carefully and a third - well he had recent married and who could expect him to be present? Probably it could be said that they were all plaus

even one might say reasonable, but it did not satisfy the host. He felt his invitations ought not to have been set aside after all the trouble he had gone to and the expense. He had wanted to provide a really happy and joyful occasion with those he regarded as his friends. He was determined that his efforts and his good food should not be wasted and he gave orders to the servants to go out and fetch people from all over the place, even from places where you would not normally invite guests. And the occasion was a success and the people who came were delighted to be Now as you know the story is capable of all sorts of interpretations, but the most common is that the wealthy man was the Lord and the celebration to which he invites his guests, corresponds to the Eucharist. The word Eucharist means thanksgiving, and apart from the fact that each time we meet together in this way, the Joy of the Resurrection is proclaimed there is always the expectation of happiness, and of hope and of blessing - and celebration is implicit as we meet together around the Altar or if you prefer the Lord's Table. Yet nowadays, Sunday is a day when everything under the sun might possibly be fitted in and not always is worship one of these. Some people offer excuses why they are not in church, invariably reasonable ones. Others are so committed with their interests that they do not feel the need to offer an excuse. While naturally there are many who would not give it a second thought. What a pity!

There are two comments I would like to make. First if you are willing to be thought of as a Christian, then that profession requires something of you - a certain amount of commitment and a certain amount of discipline. However, more important is the second point - not that you ought to give some loyalty to your faith, but that without loyalty, your faith will diminish, fade and eventually die. When I miss people from church, I do not keep an account of the times they are not there, I just feel the lack of the benefit of their presence with all the others. Their absence is not their deprivation alone, it is ours. When people console themselves saying 'Ah well, I shall not be missed today - there will be enough of the others there' - they are wrong and they are missed grieviously. And if I can say that and I do, then how does the Lord feel about it when they are not there? ANTONY ROWE



LADBROKE PARISH COUNCIL - 21st June 1989

The meeting nearly took place to the accompaniment of a pracising jazz band but in the event, business proceeded as normal!

There was a detailed discussion about the Windmill Lane/Bypass gate, and it was decided to make a further approach to the owners of the land in question

The Council decided to seek advice from the Warwick-shire branch of the C.P.R.E. over the status of the Farmyard Field fishponds, reputedly among the county's best examples of Mediaeval fishponds. It also decided to press for "No Overtaking" signs at the beginning and end of the chevrons at both the North and South ends of the Bypass, as drivers waiting to turn into the village are often in some danger.

The Council was unhappy that the Parish Clerk did not seem to receive copies of plans of house extensions etc automatically, and so this was to be notified to the secretary of the Southam area committee.

Finally, a County representative had been in the

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

By now you will probably have received your copy of the Parish Survey. DO NOT JUST STICK IT ON THE SIDEBOARD - FILL IT IN!

Someone will be round to collect it or you can return it to 16 Farm Street, 4 Manor Orchard or Old Forge House, Binswood End. No-one will be personally identified in the survey and if you want to be further assured of confidentiality you can put it in an envelope before you hand it back.

WHY ARE WE DOING THE SURVEY? Well everyone else is - even the Archers. No, the REAL REASON is that we need to discover what need there is for affordable houses for locals, and whether people think that building such homes would be A GOOD THING.

You can also let your Parish Council know through this survey exactly what is wrong with the village AND what you do value. There is even a question on extending the ONE WAY SYSTEM.

Stratford District is compiling its LOCAL PLAN. The plan will be used to judge the merits of future developments and we have but a short time to tell them what we want for OUR village. If the results show a need for 'village homes for village people' at low cost AND a willingness to have them built, then the next step will be to try to identify suitable (and cheap) land and to interest a Housing Association in providing them.

The HARBURY SOCIETY is arranging an open meeting in the early autumn when Gareth Lawes of the NACRT will explain how Housing Associations can help and how the houses they provide can stay low-cost and for locals. It is JUST possible that we may be able to secure low-cost houses in Harbury.

If you need such a home you can give your name and

present address, in confidence, to the Parish Council Clerk, Ray Carter, at Old Forge House, Binswood End, Harbury where copies of the survey for those who have had to move away can also be obtained. We will then be able to keep you informed of any plans to build affordable homes in Harbury.

HARBURY PARISH COUNCIL REPORT - MAY 1989

The meeting opened with the annual elections. Keith Thompson the previous Chairman, thanked all the Cllrs for their support and Bill Middleton was nominated to be his successor, with Michael Coy as Vice-Chairman. There was one vacancy for the position of Parish Councillor and Richard Wells was formally co-opted.

The formal part of the proceedings being completed, the Cllrs thanked Linda Ridgley for all her help in preparing a Village Appraisal. There was to be an additional question about the introduction of a one-way system and when the Questionnaires have been delivered they will be accompanied by an explanatory letter from the Parish Council.

The Councillors fully supported a draft letter prepared by Sharon Hancock, expressing the councils concern over the Government's White Paper on Health Service Reforms. It was felt that the new proposals had been prepared at great speed and without proper consultation with the professional bodies concerned. Copies of this letter would be sent to Alan Howarth M.P., the District Health Authority and to Mrs Bidwell.

It was agreed that the Playing Fields needed further drainage and the Tennis Club were considering the possibility of a new grass court for the summer month Concern was expressed over the number of Allotment currently vacant.

Mr Moore, the Deppers Bridge Councillor, was concerned about the bumpy road, where the sewer connection had been made to Greenhill, and it was thought that this was a matter for the contractors to rectify. A local ditch was becoming congested with grass cuttings and it was hoped that residents would stop this antisocial practice.

A sign was to be erected on the Chesterton Road to direct lorries heading for the landfill site at Ufton, away from the centre of the village. Concern was expressed that the layby outside the cemetery was being used as a general parking area. A notice was to be erected, advising people that this layby is primarily for the use of funeral parties.

Various Planning Applications were viewed and discussed and no objections were raised. The detailed plans for the new Doctors surgery in Mill Street were approved and the Council felt that this surgery was badly needed and the sooner building commenced the better.

PARISH COUNCIL REPORT - JUNE 1989


Two important news items - first Keith Thompson has been invited to represent the Parish Council at a Royal Garden Party and second the Parish Survey is underway.

Sharon Hancock wants to pull down the Bus Shelter unless the Parish Council can tart it up and keep it clean and tidy. There are reports of people still going the wrong way up the one-way system; strangers by accident and locals as a short cut to the Club.

Ken Stephenson is pushing his plant troughs again - please water them. The Greens mowing has not been up to its usual standard and the Parish Council is having it done again. The Council will put a lamp up for the people of the Pound and for Manor Road, but they complain that overhanging trees and hedges stop the lamps illuminating the paths, so please cut back the jungle.

The County promised to count heavy lorries in Harbury and 'sign' TIP wagons away from the village. The Barn Hill Inquiry's postponed until the DoT decides whether the M40 is to be three or four lanes. If it is four the Service Area will have to be moved; to Gaydon Cllr Sharpe hopes.


The PC is thinking about filling in the pot holes in the Playing Fields Car Park and draining the Recreation Grounds but it is not keen for the kids to

build a Skateboard Ramp there for fear the PC would pick up the tab if someone was injured. And doesn't anyone want an Allotment? There are five, and a halmone, going begging.

It seems that no-one needs the £2.85 an hour that the Post Office is offering for getting up with the daws chorus and working six days a week delivering letters in Harbury. See Brian Taylor if you are that rare bird. The Rural Community Council asked for instances of poor service from the Post Office and Telecom and the PC gave them a shocker; important plans that took 14 days to come by Second Class post, from Stratford. If you have other horror stories tell Linda Ridgley (612792).

Finally as always - Planning. Planning consent had been granted for the demolition of the old granary and the building of two dwellings at the Windmill in Mill Lane. Permission was refused for, a bungalow in Deppers Bridge, an extension at 11 Church Terrace, a house with loose boxes and a large house on land adjacent to the Spiers, Chesterton Road, and a new house at Northfields, Mill Lane. Planning permission had been granted for an extra bedroom at 5 Mackley Way. The PC had no objections to plans to convert the Barn on the Fosseway on Mr Russell's land, or plans for a bungalow for a farm worker at Bull Ring Farm.

The Appeal against refusal for an illuminated sign at the Gamecock had been thrown out. The PC saw no reason why a planning application for one house at land adjacent to Mr Moore's property on Station Rd should succeed when a previous application for two dwellings had been deemed to fall outside the boundaries of the village. There was news that Mr Tudor who had bought the land behind the Beeches wit access off Treens Hill was to submit plans for stabl pens and a 70 foot barn. The Council was concerned about the access to the land for the bend and the hill were considered dangerous and they would need to know what plans were made to dispose of the effluent from the site which would naturally drain onto the hill. Unbelievably the developers at Greenhill asked permission to dispose of treated sewage from the £375,000 houses by dropping it down

an old well. The Parish Council could not believe that such expensive houses would not be supplied with mains drainage, just souped up privies.

TOOLS FOR AFRICAN CRAFTPEOPLE

As many of you know, I recently spent 2 enjoyable years working as a VSO on a Community Development Programme in rural Sierra Leone, West Africa. I was impressed by the ingenuity and hard manual work of my neighbours and colleagues, who were mainly rice farmers and craftspeople. However, many of the skilled workers were desperately short of serviceable tools for their trade. This is where you can help. The Southampton based scheme Tools for Self Reliance' sends out kits of refurbished second-hand tools from local groups in Britain as requested by partner co-operatives in several African countries. 2 groups I knew in Sierra Leone have just received tools: a carpentry kit and several hand sewing machines. Tools are needed for: carpenters, builders, cobblers. blacksmiths, mechanics, bicycle repairers and sheet metal workers. (They are not asking for gardening tools which can be made by their own blacksmiths.)

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
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"IN THE GARDEN" & HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY

This is the month to take cuttings from many trees and shrubs. These should be lateral shoots which are not green but still bendable. Herbaceous cuttings too will root easily.

Cut all dead flower heads off lilac. Cut back some taller stems to above a bud, to contain the height of the bush. Water regularly all shrubs and plants in containers. Feed roses after their first flowering. When cutting or deheading, take as long a stem as possible, severing just above a new point of growth.

Watch out for mildew on Michaelmas daisies, hardy geraniums and golden rod, spray with Benlate. When tomatoes have achieved five trusses pinch out the tips to encourage more fruit. Feed with Tomorite or Bio, after watering, never before. To provide a humid atomosphere spray the greenhouse floor with water first thing in the morning. In hot weather leave doors and vents open.

Stop pulling rhubarb, and remove any flower heads. Pinch out runner beans when they reach the top of their supports. Remove side shoots from outdoor tomatoes except for the bush varieties. Pinch out flower shoots on onions and garlic. Continue sowing lettuce and spring onions.

Now in Brian's absence on to Horticultural Society News. Monthly meetings are finished until October, but we have not been idle. There have been two outings, the first at the invitation of Peggy Hancocks who is secretary of the Hardy Plants Society, and who, with some of her members arranged a full and interesting programme. We started with a plant Bring & Buy in Peggy's attractive and rapidly spreading garden. We then visited more fascinating and varying gardens in Radclive and two other adjacent villages and ended with a visit to a splendid new Nursery in still another village, full of treasures it was. Alas our guide shot off at speed and lost half her convoy of cars, so that not everybody reached the nursery, which had opened especially for us. Otherwise it was a most rewarding day, in perfect Summer weather.

We also visited Brook Cottage Alkerton near Banbury. This was an evening trip, again in perfect weather. There, shape, colour texture and scent blended and contrasted over four undulating acres of plants, shrubs and trees. A garden which will linger long in the memory.

Saturday July 8th is our Harbury Garden Walkabout. Do come and look. This year several gardens are opening for the first time, so don't think you've seen it all before! At £l for 20 gardens (50p for children) we are offering excellent value as well a interesting viewing.

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
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
