

FROM HARBURY CHURCHWARDENS



PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

The meeting took place on the 19th April. The most urgent matter under consideration this year has been the long drawn out affair of the lack of a gat to provide pedestrian access across the Bypass at Windmill Lane. Warwickshire County Council have failed to persuade the landowner involved to agree to a gate and they are now suggesting at last, that the Department of Transport should be asked to acquire the land in dispute, so that a gate can be made. They have suggested that Ladbroke Parish Council should also petition the D.O.T. and that the should ask for the support of the Member of Parliame Mr Alan Howarth. The faulty stiles on the footpath at the side of 'The Cottage' have now been repaired most satisfactorily.

An Application for development of the barns at Manor Farm had been received and the Council could find no objection whatsoever, in fact there was a great deal of praise of the high standard of the submission

Our Local Constable P.C. Percival attended the meeting and spoke of the recent car theft from New Cottage, Banbury Road. He stressed the necessity of locking all vehicles and was rather pessimistic that the M40 would bring an undoubted increase in this type of crime. The next meeting is on the same night as the Annual Parish Meeting. Wednesday 17th May is the date to put in your diaries. HARBURY RUGBY CLUB

By the time this is circulated the long Rugby Season will be over. It has been a momentous eight months which has seen major improvements both on and off the field.

All three sides have enjoyed good seasons with about a 60:40 ratio of win/draws to losses. The 1st XV especially have, between early October and the beginning of March, produced some excellent rugby producing an average of 3 tries a game. But for a couple of close reverses they may well have won promotion to Division 1 in the Warwickshire Section of the Courage League (which, as a matter of interest is the largest league structure in the world with over 1150 clubs participating nationally). Recent games have seen some very close results but the rub of the green has not gone with them. However, they may have been inspired by a visit to Czechoslovakia at the end of April! The 2nd XV after an indifferent start have come good since Christmas and have seen six straight wins in the last games of the season. direct development throughout Stratford District up to the year 2001. They need to know what special aspects of their village and outside environment people value so that they can develop policies to protect them. They are urging Parish Councils to undertake Parish Appraisals which are questionnaires that let the local people give their views on what the future of their village should be. They have asked Parish Councils what need their village has for low-cost housing for locals, where developers could be allowed to build and what land and other features need to be safeguarded.

So that they have some indication of the pressures for development and where the builders would like consent for houses, hotels, industry, etc, they have taken the novel step of inviting them to 'register' an interest in land. This does not mean that they are applying NOW to develop but it has led to some frightening rumours. Some landowners and consortia have come out into the open and are consulting the locals. This has happened recently at Stockton and at Lighthorne. Soon the DRAFT Local Plan will be published and SDC promises that it will show all the registered interests. People will then have a chance to say if any of the sites are suitable or The District is likely to identify in unsuitable. the Satutory Local Plan some of these sites as areas whence development should be directed so if you do not like the ideas in the Draft Plan - OBJECT!

FARMING - South Warwickshire is in a state of flux. The way of life that we have been accustomed to is changing rapidly, accelerated by the difficulties that the farming fraternity is facing.

Neville Ellis demonstrated this at our April meeting when he gave a talk and showed a video explaining the remarkable achievements of Post-War Farming. Thanks to intensification, chemicals, insecticides and fertilizers we are now almost self-sufficient in many staples and have become accustomed to buying cheap an abundant food. Farmers are now being told to cut back and set aside land. They are looking for areas into which to diversify;- tourism, small scale industry; luxury and organic produce.

FIFTY YEARS IN HOLY ORDERS

It was on Trinity Sunday, 4th June, 1939, that I was made a Deacon by the Bishop of Portsmouth in his Cathedral Church at Portsmouth. I hope and pray that God willing, I shall keep this Jubilee on Sunday, 4th June, and by the Rector's permission celebrate the Holy Eucharist at 9am in thanksgiving for this 50 yea in the Sacred Ministry and for all the prayers and support that I have received from my wife and all my friends in the various parishes in which I have serve-

Looking back on these 50 years such a lot has happene in the Church and in the world. War clouds were forming when I began my ministry at the parish Church of SS. Peter & Paul at Fareham midway between Portsmon and Southampton and within 3 months we were plunged in the Second World War. This conflict put a blight on the life and witness of theChurch as it affected so may other walks of life. Memories of the blitz remain ver vivid, all evening activities were affected because of the blackout. I well remember celebrating the Midnig Mass at Christmas by the shaded lights on the altar and the congregation with their own pocket torches. People's lives were severely stretched and so often saddened by the deaths of so many young people by enemy action and memorial services for many young sailors and others took place. Those war years brough people together in all kinds of ways and there was a wonderful spirit of friendliness and readiness to hel out under very difficult conditions and often times were hard.

These 50 years have brought so many changes in the Church and it is questionable how much good some of t changes have done. On the positive side, there has been a great advancement in ecumenical relations. Wh I was ordained, the divisions between different denominations was very noticeable and wounding. Now we see a growing together in combined services, study and worship. New churches are being built in new are where Anglican, Roman Catholic and Free Churches are

sharing the same building. There is still a long way to go before we shall get unity but things are moving. If I was asked to state the duty of a priest in these days, I should say that by pastoral care and administration of the Sacraments he should love people into the Kingdom of God. However, many of us older priests look upon the Church of today with sadness and apprehension for the future. Too many clergy are caught up in administration and the great number of meetings and conferences that they have to attend which leaves far too little time for the pastoral work of the parish which should be of the essence. Then too many Bishops and priests are so trendy that a liberalisation of teaching and practice has caused a lot of anxiety that some of us long for the days when we could go to church and know what to expect in the way of services. The modernisation of the Bible and the Prayer Book has brought precious few people to church while it has done nothing to enhance the meaning of the sacred words. We have lost a lot of the mystery and reverence in worship, attitudes for which the Church of England was renowned.

There seems to be a lack of teaching and so many people do not understand the fundamentals of the Faith. Even simple things connected with the Church and religion are wrongly spoken of by the media: for example, how the word 'vicar' is bandied about to include all clergy of whatever denomination. It seems that any man in a 'dog collar' is a vicar! A small point perhaps but a sign of the little that folks know. How often do we hear the words LOVE, SIN and SALVATION? This is what Jesus came to gave us; this is why He died and rose again; this is why He came into our lives through the Church's teaching and Sacraments. Surely it is time that we got back to the fundamentals of our faith, otherwise we shall end up with a spineless Christianity which is nothing more than 'Churchianity'.

Things are so different from the Church into which I was ordained and for which it has been my privilege and joy to minister for half a century. However, the future is in God's hands and I end this by quoting the words of a wise old priest who wrote to me the other day: "God is God, Jesus is Lord and the Holy Spirit knows what he is doing". 26.

If it be God's will, I hope to keep the Golden Jubil of my priesthood next year which will be on Saturday 19th May. In my day, the main ordinations took plac on Trinity Sunday - that is why the dates differ so much.

Saturday and Sunday 6th & 10am - 5pm Restored garden at Warwick Castle - could be interesting. - Now to work!

Brassicas raised from seed can be planted out and sowings of most plants including beans, sweet corn and winter cabbage can be made in open ground.

Put stakes round tall herbaceous plants now, ready f tying up later. Plant greenhouse tomatoes.

Later in the month deadhead all flowered bulbs and rest indoor cyclamen which can be placed on their s facing north. Lift and divide primulas. Spray app trees. Prepare ground for summer bedding and plants Spray roses regularly. Keep vulnerable plants such hostas and ligularia well protected from slugs.

PUPPIES GALORE!!

Guide Dogs for the Blind Association

Brood bitch Teresa whelped her fifth litter, seven pups, on April 4th. Precisely one week later brood bitch Linda whelped her third litter of (yet again) eleven pups. Both Mums and their pups are doing very well. There is much to be done when rearing a litter of puppies. For the first 2-3 weeks the bitch looks after her own pups, cleaning, feeding and talking to them. Constant observation is necessary to ensure the bitch does not accidently lie on one (particularly when she has a large litter to cope with) and that they have a fair share of the 'milk-bar'. Bedding needs changing, the bitch washed down and a great deal of good nourishing food given to her. Particular attention to hygiene is essential at all times, a tummy-upset would go through the litter like a dose of Epsom salts, requiring vigilant Veterinary attention and maybe loss of

puppies. To minimise the risk of infection no visiting animals are allowed and no bitch is taken from home while she has pups. All guide dog puppies have their dew claws removed between 3rd & 6th days of life and this is done by the Vet on a 'house-call Puppies claws grow at an alarming rate and should be trimmed weekly, to prevent the bitch being scratched and to maintain good foot development. At the momen I trim 288 nails each Tuesday (not counting the check on the bitches)! The puppies eyes open at around 14 days by which time they are walking about in the whelping box rather unsteadily of course. Once they can see their development seems to escalate, they are extremely interesting, very funny and very cuddly too. Between approximately 18-22 days I usually start to wean them, commencing with a very small amount of raw lean beef minced - and given from the hand. This is when the hard work really starts !!

G.D.B.A. puppies leave the nest en bloc at 6 weeks of age; are taken to the Breeding Centre, Tollgate at Bishops Tachbrook, from where they are taken to their puppy walking homes in various parts of the country. These puppies are really ready to be individuals by 6 weeks of age, being fully weaned and on 4-5 meals a day; bold, alert, well handled, happy playful puppies, often partly housetrained to the newspaper and having had considerable experience of household noises e.g. washing machine, vacuum cleaner They settle into their new puppy walking homes very well at this age, sometimes just requiring the companionship of a low radio, or ticking clock and cuddly toy during the first few lonely nights. Each puppy will always be given its very own bed where it will feel safe and secure.

The hard work of rearing these puppies is tremendous rewarding when one considers that the majority of the will qualify as Guide Dogs to befriend and guide their owner through his daily life for hopefully 8-9 years.

One of the 8 pups we have 'walked' was Scamp - and what a character. Scamp is now 4 years old, living in another part of the country, and here is an extra from a letter received this February from his owner: "Scamp has all the qualities of a good Guide Dog and he lives up to everything that Guide Dog owners say o

their dogs. To me he is all of them and something more; he is my friend and someone in whom I have complete trust. For Scamp - thanks a million." This gentleman always thanks us for having "walked" Scamp and he is an official speaker on behalf of G.D.B.A.

Just occasionally a few male puppies are sold to private homes when nature takes the upper hand and bitches produce large litters and far more males than females. This is the case at present and I have been asked to sell 3 male puppies. Of course these puppies bred for excellent temperament and qualities required for training as Guide Dogs should make superb family pets. They are pedigree yellow Labradors.
