FROM HARBURY CHURCHWARDENS

The work of restoring the lychgate will start in January, and in addition to the grant of 50% from Stratford District Council which we told you about last month, we have received offers of interest free loans to cover our half of the cost from five kind parishioners. This enables us to go ahead so that the work can be completed within the time allowed by Stratford D.C., but the loans will obviously have to be repaid as soon as possible, and we urge your constant prayers and support.

You will have noticed that the urgent roof repairs are under way and we have asked the contractor to patch up the leaking areas in the south valley gutter, until such time as we can afford to have it repaired properly. This will, we hope, ensure that we can be dry and warm for our worship during the winter months.

Within an hour of the news being confirmed that Terry Waite and Tom Sutherland had been released, the bellringers had been contacted and rushed to church to express the rejoicing felt by so many people around the world. For two more hostages, their long ordeal had come to an end and they had regained their freedom. After those dreadful months and years of fear and uncertainty, they were to be with their loved ones again, who for much of the time had not even been sure whether they were still alive. How thankful we all are that our constant and persistent prayers have been answered and how wonderful it is to receive good news, news which brings happines to so many people and radiating smiles to so many faces. Then the day following to see the safe arrival, back in this country, of Terry Waite and to listen to his amazingly powerful and gracious words, his thanks, his prayers, his continuing concern for those still captive. Surely it was a day for us all to remember, a day to thrill our hearts and to sing praises.

The second ringing was also to pull at our heart strings as the bells throughout Warwickshire rang to remind people of the Children in Need Appeal. 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



In spite of horrible weather, there was a good attendance at the evening meeting, but it came to a rather early end, owing to the non-appearance of our speaker. This was because of a misunderstanding, but she is definitely coming in November 1992!

"Christmas Cross-stitch" is the subject at the afternoon meeting on December 4th, when Mrs Diana Bowen will show us examples of her work and help us to make a Christmas card. There will be no evening meeting in December.

Some members will be helping to lead the church Family Service on December 1st.

DIOCESE BLAMES RECESSION

Blame the effect of the recession on the Church Commissioners' investments, Harbury Parochial Church Council has been told as it faces a $12\frac{1}{2}\%$ increase in its parish quota demand from Coventry Diocese next year.

The quota will go up by £1,121 to £10,092. This comes on top of the £13,000 cost of urgent roof repairs and restoration of the Lychgate at a cost of £5,707.

At the PCC meeting on November 5 members heard that at Southam Deanery Synod on September 12 the chairman of the Diocesan Board of Finance, Mr Barry Gillitt, explained that the situation had arisen because of intensive investment by the Church Commissioners in the commercial and industrial sectors during the property boom 'in the mistaken belief that the good times would last for ever'. Consequently the Commissioners had cut their 1992 contribution to the diocese by £136,000, and cuts of a similar order could be expected for a further two years before the Commissioners experienced the anticipated recovery in investment income.

The options open to the Diocese for reducing the parish share were, he believed, limited to a) imposing a freeze on parish vacancies for, say nine months:

b) reducing the number of diocesan officers by one or more:

c) closing down the Retreat House and investing the proceeds.

The Archdeacon of Warwick had told Synod that if parishes found they could not pay, then the parish share would have to be pitched at a lower level by a reduction in the number of clergy, 'which may become an option that won't go away'. The Bishop's Council would very much like to know what the parishes felt about this specific option.

Tom Smith's steering committee has begun work on the setting up of a Friends of Harbury Church group, and is to accept gratefully Michael Lambert's offer to undertake research into Friends organisations in other parishes. Repairs to the roof have begun, and the encouraging news from the builders is that so far the condition of the roof timbers is not as bad as expected. But the Rector reminded members that the work was at too early a stage to conclude that all the timber would be found equally sound.

Peter Pryke (Deanery Synod Secretary) regretted that training courses in the deanery had halted with the departure of Rod Clarke, and stressed that the volunteer successor as training officer whom they hoped to find need not necessarily be a Deanery Synod representative. Deanery Synod had reaffirmed its commitment to the Mothers' Union.

Ken Hughes, the organiser, reported 19 stalls booked for the Christmas Fair on Saturday December 7. All other arrangements were progressing satisfactorily. It was resolved to split the proceeds equally between the Nehemiah Trust (set up to support Dr Joanna Watson's work in preventive medicine in Romania) and the church roof repairs.

THEATRE WEEKEND WORKSHOP



LADBROKE PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

The meeting took place on Wednesday 20th November. Only one letter had been received concerning additional street lighting in the village, and this was a request for a light near the seat between Bridge Lane and the Hall. It was agreed that this is a very dark spot, but as the cost of new lights have to be met by all Poll Tax subscribers, it was decided that this was a matter for general discussion at the A.G.M. in May and the matter deferred.

Upper Windmill Lane road subsidence had been inspected and the well known yellow paint marks had been spotted, which means the matter will be dealt with in the fullness of time.

The village had received some Conservation booklets, explaining just what you are allowed to do, or not do, as the case may be, in your own conserved patch. The leaflets are bright green and if you don't find one through your letter box by 1992 it will be my fault!

The Registration Office in Southam has had a reprieve and is to remain open.

Inadequate Police Cover in this area is a matter under discussion at the moment. Following several complaints, there is to be a public meeting on this matter on Friday 10th January at 6.30pm in Southam Community Centre. The meeting will be attended by the Chief Constable and Alan Howarth M.P.

Mrs Elsa Greenway, Parish Clerk, reported that she was no longer able to obtain the use of a cheap photocopier for Parish Business. Does anyone in the village have access to such a facility?

A Stratford-on-Avon District Local Plan is about to be published with details of future planning policies. It shows a map of Ladbroke with the field behind Village Farm as a development area; and no other possible sites. Obviously this will be a matter for consultation, and the Parish Clerk has no further 18.

to impart on this subject, so please don't ring her up.

Mr Jenkins had been given permission to fell a line of trees.

Geoff Timms was to be nominated as a Non-Ecclesiastical trustee for the Alibone Charity, following the resignation of Mr Tom Sheasby. The Footpath volunteers were continuing their valiant efforts. The footpath to Bishops Itchington was now completed and the next clearance project was to begin on Saturday 30th November.

The Parish Council had been concerned that the public rights of way continuing Radbourne Lane and Windmill Lane, were not shown on a recent footpath map. Enquiries have found out that this is because they are not footpaths, but are public roads, and therefore to be found on the public Highway Map! The public have every right to walk, drive or ride along the E2413RL and the E2412WL roads! and if anyone actually manages it, I'd like to know, so that a Medal presentation ceremony can be arranged!

Next meeting will be Wednesday 15th January 1992, let's hope it's a bit warmer in the Village Hall than it was for the November meeting, I'm not sure I've thawed out yet!

Once again I must thank, on Joanna's behalf, all those who are providing such splendid support for her, both practical and spiritual.



John Wright, Manor Orchard

John & Enid Wright have lived in Harbury for the past 16 years moving here from the North East. It was John's appointment as Biology teacher at Kineton High School, his first teaching post, which brought him to the area. For it was only at the age of 37 that he embarked on a three year teacher's training course.

A native of Middlesborough, he was brought up by his grandmother after both his parents were killed by wartime bombing. At sixteen John left school to work in the local steelworks, but a year later he moved on to

work for Taylor Brothers in Stockton on Tees making specialist racing bicycles. Twelve months later he was called for National Service in the R.A.F. serving as an electrician.

After five years in the Air Force he then trained as a State Registered Mental Nurse and followed this career for seven years. John's next change took him to ICI at Billingham working in the Laboratories as a Quality Control Analyst. It was whilst working here that John gained a number of 'O' and 'A' levels all by correspondence courses, and so after seven years at ICI he commenced his teacher training course. A brave step to become a student with three young children.

It was during his time a Kineton School that John developed his enthusiasm for sport, eventually taking charge of the Athletic and Cross Country teams. Following his son David joining Leamington Athletic Club in 1980. John began to coach at the club and from 1982 onwards took a number of examinations. This eventually led to him being appointed Assistant Staff Coach in 1988. DECEMBER IN THE GARDEN

Terracotta pots left outside all winter are very vulnerable to hard frost and continued cold and may well shatter. So now is the time to raise them clear of the ground, preferably on wooden blocks, but a couple of bricks will do.

Prune back tall roses by half to prevent wind rock, finish pruning in March. Bind thin twine around upright conifers to prevent possible snow weighting the branches and distorting their shape.

Do not move or rotate Christmas Cacti once they are in bud as for some reason this often causes the buds to fall off.

Bring stems of budding winter jasmine indoors and put them in water, they should soon flower.

Put slug pellets around plants of hellebories and Iris stylosa.

Protect root vegetables still in the ground from frost. Water house and greenhouse plants very sparingly.
