

FROM THE RECTOR

I am greatly indebted to the missions to Seamen this month. In the literature they sent out in preparation for Sea Sunday, 14th July, they reminded me of the Book of Jonah.

The story of Jonah - just four short chapters - is well worth reading in its entirety. It is not just of interest on Sea Sunday because it is a seafaring tale, but because it is the story of a missionary and has a great deal to say to us about mission. God's call to mission sets aside all racism, nationalism and exclusiveness. God is the God of all. His mission is one to the whole world, and all have a part. Let us consider Jonah:

Jonah the man - with all his emotions. When God called he responded by going in the opposite direction! He wanted to confine God to where he thought God should be and was angry that God wasn't acting as he felt he should. Jonah 'all at sea' - Jonah is confused - with himself, with society, with God. In fact, he had lost his way. Jonah in the whale seeing himself very honestly, seeing himself very clearly, seeing himself at his lowest point. Jonah on land again - seeking a fresh start. God shows compassion both to Jonah, and the Ninevites (people who, as far as Jonah was concerned, were feared and hated foreigners).

Let us consider the Missions to Seamen: Seafarers come from many different countries, and are of many different faiths. They are all welcome at Missions to Seamen centres as individuals, and they come with their own stories and backgrounds. All of us, and that includes seafarers, can lose our way. Those of us who live on land usually have families, friends or neighbours to support us through the hard times. Seafarers don't. But Mission Chaplains are there ready to meet seafarers' different needs as they arise. One of them writes "A ship can be very much like 'the whale' with times of great isolation and loneliness for the crew. work sometimes involves just being 'an ear' when they come ashore while they get things off their chests. At other times more active help is needed as they work through their concerns and problems".

The Mission aims to demonstrate to all seafarers that no one is beyond the reach on God's love by offering, in the name of Christ, a welcome, help when it is needed and spiritual support.

Do read the story of Jonah and please do remember the work of the Missions to Seamen.



HARBURY PARISH COUNCIL MEETING JUNE 1991

The new Vice Chairman is Councillor Chris Macgowan proposed by John Drinkwater. Councillors were not impressed by the recent efforts of the Youth Club to tidy up the village for Environment Week and they declined to make a contribution to their running costs, despite the eloquent plea of Vikki Holroyd who sought to persuade them that the youngsters had shown commendable community spirit. Cllr Midge Keen stressed her view that the young people had to help

themselves and fund raise in earnest and Chairman Bill Middleton backed her up. Cllr Wells argued in favour of supporting the Youth club and Brian Ingram pointed out that they had held a Jumble Sale but the Parish Council resolved to wait and see.

The Finance Committee recommended increasing the travel tokens for OAPs from £10 to £15 each for 1991, at an approximate cost of £2,250. "A gesture we have been happy to make in the past" said the Chairman. A deadline of 15th July for applications was set, with the distribution of tokens on August 5th & 6th in the Village Hall. Application forms would be available at the Post Office, Drugstore and Newsagents and from Councillors Middleton and Macgowan and the Clerk, Mrs Hodge.

The Councillors accepted Chris Macgowan's other recommendations: - fees for the hire of the Football Pitch to be raised from £110 to £120; Allotments Rents to remain at £8. A decision was also made to spend a further £1,978 on lighting for the Car Park which had been completed under budget. The Car Park lights would be controlled by Photo-electric cells with a time switch to cut them off at 11.30pm and a manual override to give an extra 2 hours lighting when the Hall was in use late at night. The lights would illuminate the Car Park only and not the adjacent houses. The Parish Council would fund the purchase and installation of four bulkhead lights for the Village Hall surrounds to aid safety and security (the Hall to be responsible for running costs and maintenance) and the Chairman was pleased the deferred County Council grant for the Car Park was to be paid this financial year. Keith Thompson was still worried about the sign to advertise the existence of the Car Park. This and the Dog Fouling signs would cost £450 with installation charges. The PC could save £120 by putting the signs up themselves.

The Harbury Society offered help in a Housing Needs Survey and pressed the Parish Council to take positive action to achieve affordable homes. Cllrs still thought they could do nothing until they had secured suitable land, but Ken Stephenson pointed out that the Housing Survey was now two years old and many of those who needed housing then had found

accommodation. Ed Wilson will liaise with SDC and the Rural Housing Trust.

Cllr Wells reported that the Duke of Edinburgh Award group had completed work on the footpath through Bull Ring Farm and people now needed to walk it regularly to keep it clear of vegetation.

Cllrs were delighted with the outcome of their site meeting with the County Highways Department to improve safety at the junction of the One-Way System and Hall Lane. All their recommendations will be implemented.

The Ivy Lane light had been installed but does not work. Cllr Keen reported that the EMEB had been digging there but Pc Percival said it was still "not illuminated".

The District Council granted Planning Permission for extensions at The Laurels, Hall Lane; 17 & 23 Farm Street; Lower Westfields Farm and Butchers, High St. They granted outline permission for a bungalow next to The Barns, Station Road. The PC had no objections to plans for an extension to the rear of 13 Mill St or Mr Merrimen's conversion to a bungalow of the barns behind Sheen Farm for which he had "a change of use" to industrial use.

The School Governors now knew the full implication of Capping and were planning one off cuts in capitation spending to save having to shed teaching staff. Two lunchtime supervisors jobs had gone and stationer handicrafts materials and office supplies had been cut. Keith Thompson stressed that the School would only be able to do this once and that it was surviving on the very generous parental contributions. Everyone must lobby to ensure that next year funding was restored. The School was considering insurance, opting out and the implications of Local Financial Management which could be in place by the next academic year. They were creating a School Development Plan, promoting themselves to business and inviting villagers to see the school at work.

The Parish Council Account is to stay with the Midland Bank as investigations have proved that they give Harbury a very good deal, and the move was only mooted as a protest at the closure of the Harbury Branch.





PLAYSCHEME '91





WYSTEPY W POLSCE

Can you imagine coca-cola at seven pence a bottle? Or hand carved chess sets at four pounds each?

These were just some of the prices I came across on my trip to Poland with a local youth theatre group called "Playbox". We set off for Poland at 3am on the Friday before half-term. After the drive to Dover, we crossed to Calais by ferry. Then came the main leg - a 36-hour coach journey across Europe. Passing through France, Holland, and the newly united Germany, we reached the Polish border at midnight. We had to wait an hour (which I'm told is a very good time) before we were allowed into Poland. Then we crossed Poland, which is as big as France, to reach the small tourist town of Zakopane.

It was beautiful around Zakopane; on one side were the Tatra mountains - huge snow-capped peaks - and on the other were the smaller tree covered Gubaluwka mountains. After two nights at the Hotel Barbara, we went by coach to the former capital, Krakow.

Our main reason for coming to Poland was to perform two plays - "News" and "The Selfish Giant" (the play I was in).

Krakow is a very polluted, densely-populated city. There were lots of cars, trams and buses. I stayed with a Polish family just outside Krakow. They were quite well-off; they had a house and a Ford Sierra. They were extremely kind to me, but I was a little nervous!

THE GARDEN IN JULY

Feed roses and chrysanthemums. Spray roses - 'Rapid' is harmless to bees and ladybirds but kills greenfly etc. Spray potatoes: keep celery well watered, spray against leafspot and celery fly.

Divide primulas. Remove deadheads regularly from all plants to stimulate further flowering. Fuchsias in tubs need plenty of water. A thick mulch laid on wet ground, not dry, will help to retain moisture round roses and herbaceous plants, also in the vegetable garden. Lawn mowings can be usefully employed for this.

At the end of the month most shrubs can be propagated from half ripened wood, that is wood which is still pliable when bent over. 'Stop' outdoor tomatoes by pinching out the tips.

Beetroot sown now will produce roots ready for pulling in September and October. Late Savoy and Winter Cabbage should be sown also. The end of the month is the last chance to plant broccoli, preceeded by Kale. Any flower heads should be removed from Spring sown parsley. Herbs may be gathered for drying. Always do this in the morning when their pungency is at its strongest.


