

FROM THE RECTOR

There is no need for me to try to impress upon you the importance of Holy Week and Easter, if the pers of Jesus Christ means anything to you. As the dramatic events of that vital week unfold from the entry into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday to the death of Christ on the Cross of Calvary - from the sealing of the tomb on Good Friday until the dawn of the daof Resurrection at Easter, we are caught up in hear and mind with those first followers of Jesus, feeling their pain and his suffering and his death, and sharing their unbelievable joy at his rising again. How is it possible to let all this pass, without wanting to live again, through the Passion Story of our Lord, the ultimate stages of God's action in opening the way for us into his Kingdom, the Kingdom of Love and Peace, of Forgiveness and Reconciliation This we try to do in various ways throughout the week, all of which are of immense significance, and you will find the details elsewhere in the magazine, but I should like to mention two events especially. Harbury & Ladbroke for the last few years have shared the evening services alternately on Good Friday and on Holy Saturday. This year the Good Friday event will be at Harbury, the Holy Saturday event at Ladbroke. Representatives from the varying Christian traditions meet together on a regular basis the idea emerged some months ago of having an Act of Witness together on Good Friday evening. This will be a very simple and I hope dramatic way of remembering the significance of the Cross. There will be a torchlight procession from the church with four halting stages at the car parks of 'The Dog' and of 'The Old New Inn' in the forecourt of Leycester Close and at Chapel Street by the Supermarket (with the formal consent of proprietors and residents), for a short reading, a hymn and a prayer, returning to church for the conclusion. I hope that many will join us for the whole procession or if you are not able to walk the whole route, to meet us at the halting stages.

The following evening at Ladbroke is the occasion, which only occurs once a year when we prepare ourselves to greet the Risen Lord, with the 'Blessing of the Paschal Candle'. 'The Light of Christ' is Escape to discover the tranquil beauty of the Lake District for a weekend break or full holiday

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


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
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
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the keynote of the whole service and as the great candle is lighted, everyone present takes their own light from it, demonstrating that we receive our own light from Christ. The Easter Proclamation is sung and we remind ourselves of our own baptismal vows. Simple as it is, it expresses most vividly the expectation and the joyfulness of Easter, and evokes in us the raising of our voices in 'Alleluias'.

I hope you will be able to take advantage of all that happens in Holy Week and at Easter. May you receive every spiritual blessing and have the Easter hope firmly established in your lives.

PAROCHIAL CHURCH COUNCIL

At the meeting on February 5 of Harbury Parochial Church Council thanks were expressed to Ken Hughes, the organiser, and his helpers for the remarkable success of the 1990 Christmas Fair in the light of the arctic conditions prevailing on the day. The amount raised was £750 which will go into the gener fund except for £270 to be sent to the Church Urbar Fund to discharge the outstanding balance on the target of £1600 set for Harbury. The 1991 Christma Fair will be on Saturday December 7, with Ken Hughe as the organiser again.

A recorded message accompanied by a letter from Bishop Simon outlined proposals from the Coventry and Warwickshire Ecumenical Council for the setting up of a Cross of Nails Ministry of Reconciliation. Each congregation is free to respond to the invitation in whatever way it chooses. The idea was well received and will be considered further after the stewardship renewal campaign early in March. The membership of 40 children in four groups with seven leaders and 15 or so helpers was reported by Keith Dormer. They still hoped to expand further, especially in the four to six age bracket. The ideal solution to the question of involving the children regularly at some point in the morning service still proves illusive.

An innovation for Good Friday will be a procession starting from the church at 8pm. The procession will halt at four points in the village for a short service consisting of a hymn, a prayer and a reading.

The formal resolution required in connection with a faculty authorising special lighting for the children's corner and the baptistry was carried unanimously.

A register of memorial tablets affixed to the churchyard wall is to be introduced.

Promotion of special services by the use of colour posters is to be introduced for an experimental period.

The 1991 harvest supper will be held in the village hall on October 12.



LADBROKE PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

The meeting took place on Wednesday 20th February. The Appropriate Officer from Stratford District Council had confirmed with the Parish Council that he was actively pursuing an alternative access route across the Bypass at Windmill Lane; there were problems associated with this scheme which were unlikly to be resolved in the near future. A date had been set for Mr Teverson's Appeal concerning engineer ing workings at the Poultry Farm, for the 15th May.

The Post Office had visited the village and decided to re-site the village Post-Box between the Bridge and the Bell Inn. Mr G Timms felt that this was too far from the centre of the village and all the Councillors hoped that the Box would still be widely used (if it isn't it will be taken away!).

The Chain of Office for the Chairman of the Parish Council has been ordered.

A highly successful meeting concerning the Footpath Volunteers had been held on the 6th February and John Liverton had agreed to be the contact person (Tel: 813341).

Unbelievably the Council had enquired about errecting signs on the Harbury Lane to Deppers Bridge stating that the lane was unsuitable for Heavy Goods vehicles and this had been immediately agreed to! - with no arguments or fatal statistics required.

A site meeting had been held following an application for Outline Planning Permission in Butchers Close, next to "The Cottage" Garage. The Council did not feel that this was an appropriate position for a new dwelling. The Council had been informed that a similar application would soon be put forward to build in Macklin field next to the "Old Rectory".

The Village is once again to be entered in the Best Kept Village Competition", it would be interest ng to find out exactly what the judges thought last Year!

Local Council Elections will take place on 2nd May 1991, not all the current Councillors are prepared to stand again. Anyone interested in joining the Parish Council should apply to the Parish Clerk for the appropriate forms, which have to be in by April 5th.

The next meeting will be held on Wednesday 20th March at 7.45pm in the Village Hall.

THE GATEWAY INTERPRET BRITAIN AWARDS 1990

The Harbury Society were delighted to be informed that their book of walks "Cross the Stile" had won a commendation in the 1990 Interpret Britain Awards. The nationwide awards have been organised by the Society for the Interpretation of Britain's Heritage for the past 7 years and have been sponsored by Gateway Supermarkets since 1989. Their object is to recognise annually examples of outstanding practice in environmental interpretation of our heritage for community benefit.

This year for the first time they included an opportunity for purely voluntary organisations to be commended. Out of a total of 450 projects submitted there were seven awards and eleven commendations in the open sector and three commendations in the Voluntary sector, two awards for facilities dealing with the disabled and two for interpretative panels and one for innovation.

The award winners ranged from the National Waterways Museum at Gloucester, through County Council guided walks in Sussex, the Yorkshire Mining Museum and eve Inverary Jail in Scotland. The commendations in the voluntary sector were given to our Cross the Stile, the North Devon Maritime Museum and the Ynysafach Engine House, Merthyr Tydfil, so we were in distingu ed company.

The awards were presented at a ceremony in Caerphilly-Castle in South Wales on 25th January and John and Pat Smith journeyed in the early morning to the rendevous carrying a well prepared display for the occasion by Celia Barrett. This presented scenes from the village and a display depicting "Hungry Harbury" and "Cross the Stile" along with the objectives of the Harbury Society.

Arriving at the Castle we drove in stately manner over the two drawbridges into the castle courtyard to the Great Hall where the awards were to take place. Greeted by a friendly and enthusiastic group of likeminded participants. Most people wanted to know where Harbury was and were impressed by our efforts as we explained that we were a bunch of part-timers.



The awards were presented by Sir Wyn Roberts M.P. the Minister of State for Wales and each award was preced by a citation read in Welsh and English. The award takes the form of a framed certificate of which we far be very proud and it is an achievement on behalf of all those people who produced "Cross the Stile" after so much hard work.

After lunch a presentation by the Theatre Education group gave an insight into the history of the castle by depicting a scene between the Lord of the Manor and his wife at the time of crisis with King Edward I. This was followed by a lecture by John Carr, Director of Welsh Historic Monuments on Heritage matters which proved somewhat controversial when he suggested that not all things were worth preserving and that we should be selective in our deliberations to only preserve the very best of our heritage as this progresses with time.

Finally, tea rounded off a most enjoyable day.

Buses leave for Leamington at 7.21 and 8.10am in termtime (8.20am in the holidays), and at 9.47, 1.17 and 4.20pm in the week. On Saturday they run at 8.17 & 9.47am and 1.17pm and return at 10.05am 12.05, 5.17 and 5.47pm Return buses from Leamington in the week run at 8.05, 10.05am and 12.05, 2.05, 4.17, 5.45, 5.17 and 5.47pm

If as seems likely Warwickshire is Poll Tax Capped we are warned that the County will withdraw the subsidy which keeps six of our services going. We are lucky for some villages this will mean the end of all public transport. L.R.

HARBURY SOCIETY

First we had the bad news - our Nature Trail did not win the WARNACT Competition; then we had the good -Cross the Stile was Commended in the Heritage Interpretation Awards. Bursting with pride, John Smith gave details of the wonderful day out he and Pat had at the ceremony at Caerphilly Castle, where our efforts were praised by all. Our certificate will be displayed in the Library as a permanent reminder of our success.

Marian Millington, a midwifery tutor, was out in Zanzibar from November 1988 to 1990 with the Save the Children Fund and her talk and slides showed a very very poor country, so backward that it appeared in a time-warp.

Zanzibar is in reality two islands off the coast of Tanzanier. Their east coast beaches are beautiful with the exotic trees and fruits of the plantations of the Sultans. The first settlers were from Persia in the Twelfth Century and the oldest building is a mosque of that period on the south island.

Despite the fact that women are subject to cultural restraints on their behaviour they still undertake much of the heavy work, being involved in construction and agriculture. Marian showed a slide of the women instructing her in the art of carrying a bucket on her head. The secret, she says, .is in the way one folds the cloth that goes between the bucket and the head!!

On Pemba Island the main source of income is from the Clove harvest. Cloves are the unopened flower buds of the Clove tree. People clamber out along the whippy branches of these tall trees to pluck off the cloves which are then sun dried. Clove oil is distilled in small factories but the world market for Cloves has collapsed and it was Pemba's main occupation.

Coconuts provide a wealth of products. As well as the nuts themselves the people collect the husks; bury them on the shore to be softened by the sea, dig them up, pound them and roll the fibres into strings which are then plaited up into string. The outriggers for the dugout canoes are bound on with coconut fibre. The leaves are tied into strips for use as roofing material. The oil is used for cooking and burned and the clear fluid from inside the nut is a refreshing drink.

Education and health care are free, but spartan. The equipment in the Nursing School is poor and the conditions in the Maternity Unit austere. There are frequent power cuts, and whilst Marian insists that she never had to assist at a birth without water there were times when that was all she had!

30% of the deaths are through Malaria and mothers and their babies die at birth because they are weakened by anaemia it induces. Marian showed examples of the complications, the handicaps and the conditions that were common. On Tumbarta island she estimates that 70% of children are malnourished. Many young people are crippled by Polio because the immunisation program in the past was poor. Many different agencies including Save the Children and Help the Aged are doing what they can to help this very poor country and have put much money into drugs and equipment, but there is so little there to start with that it is an uphill task and the population is increasing rapidly.

There were many searching questions from the audience who were clearly fascinated by the talk and surprised at the backwardness of the country. The Society thanked Marian and agreed to make a donation to the Save the Children Fund as a mark of gratitude.

The next meeting is on Tuesday 26th March at the Village Hall. The AGM will commence at 7.30pm and will be followed at approximately 8pm by a talk by the retired County Land Agent, Colin Birt, on Warwickshire Smallholders. Places for the TREAT on 16th April will be allocated at the AGM.

On Saturday 27th April the Society has another fund raising Coffee Morning at the Tom Hauley Room. We would be grateful for donations of cakes and biscuits for this event and urge everyone to come along to see the progress of the Parish Maps Project.

MARCH IN THE GARDEN

Cut back buddleias as soon as possible, back to 12" from the ground if you don't want them to get away from you! Later in the month cut back by two-thirds winter jasmine which has finished flowering.

Plant herbaceous perennials, hardy annuals pansies and violas in that order. Start begonia and gloxinia tubers. "Stop" fuchsias.

Feed winter lettuces and annuals grown in pots. Sow onions, parsnips and broad beans. Feed lawns and all berried fruit. Sow tomatoes, summer and autumn cabbage. Later i the month sow leeks and carrots. Plant potatoes and mint. Prune, spray and feed roses - the weak the bush, the harder you prune it. Plant gladiol corms.

If you want frogs in your pond, protect it from herons! If you have more frog spawn than you can deal with let me know, and I will find it a good home.

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

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


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
