

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

FROM HARBURY CHURCHWARDENS

FROM THE RECTOR

How blessed are those few weeks at the latter part of July and during August, when there is a general lull in activity, in meetings and events, and many people find a space for holidays. But come September, the furious pace relentlessly returns and we are in the thick of it again. With much personal feeling, I pity especially the School Governors, who are to be pitchforked into the reality of Local Management of Schools, the School Development Plan, a consideration of the mysteries of Opting-Out and the next saga of the Local Education Budget. Whereas for the villages of Harbury & Ladbroke, the traditional Autumn function are almost upon us. Of course as far as the Church is concerned, although the worship proceeds, day by day and week by week lull or no lull, September brings a great burst of enthusiasm with the variou organisations and groups starting up again. Over the next few weeks, the Sundays are of particular

interest.

At Harbury on 8th September, Dr Joanna Watson addresses the congregation explaining what she hopes to do over the next two years in Romania and how she will need all the help and support we can give her in what is sure to be a very demanding and difficult undertaking. Already a 'Joanna Watson Support Group' has been formed and we shall be kept fully informed about all the ways in which we can assist Joanna in this bold enterprise.

The following Sunday, 15th September both at Harbury and Ladbroke, the theme at the Eucharist will be 'Reconciliation'. Since the Consecratio. of the new Coventry Cathedral, and before that since the time of the blitz on Coventry and the destruction of the old Cathedral, all over the world, the short and dramatic text 'Father Forgive' has captured the imagination of people. The Community of the Cross of Nails was formed and has become an international community of individuals and groups, who share a commitment to a practical vision of reconciliation and a genuine intention to live a disciplined Christian life. The Bishop of Coventry has suggested that we should all take a fresh look at this worthy intention and as well as thinking of the need for reconciliation in the troubled and distant parts of the world, think of it in the context of our own surroundings, our own immediate community, our own villages and church. On the same day in the afternoon, the congregation of St Andrew's, Eastern Green is coming from Coventry to join us at Ladbroke for Evensong at 4 o'clock. I hope people from both our villages will make a special offort to come and welcome them. Ladbroke will be making the arrangements for tea afterwards and would be glad of a helping hand from Harbury.

The next Sunday, 22nd September we have been invited by our link parish, St Giles, Bubbenhall to their Flower Festival and they would particularly like us to be at their Evensong at 6.30pm. The usual arrangements for transport will apply and lists will appear in church so that everyone wishing to go can be included.

Songs of Praise at Harbury at 6.30pm. There has been an excellent response from the groups throughout the village and it promises to be a delightful occasion.

I must just mention the first Sunday of October, because that is the Harvest Festival. In recent years, very little produce has been received for the Festival, which rather undermines the intention of Thanksgiving for the Harvest, so please this year, do not forget to bring your offerings to decorate the Church, but more especially to show that we are indeed grateful for the fulness of Harvest time. At Harbury at 6.30pm Evensong will be a special effort, with the joy of an augmented Choir.

Well that is just a taste of what the autumn offers - there is much else going on at church apart from these particular services, so do please keep your eye on the diary dates in the magazine and on the notice-board.

HARBURY PARISH COUNCIL MEETING - AUGUST 1991

of Planning Applications.

Seated in splendour in a Main Hall pervaded with the scents and sounds of Real Ale, this was a relaxed, mellow, responsive Parish Council, concerned at the threats to the Fire and Police Services listening with interest to the results of the Playground Survey, encouraging the formation of an Allotments Association and monitoring a multitude It was, after all, August when, on the Planning front at least, it's all go!

Mr Merriman had applied to demolish garages at Pool Farm, but retain the willow tree, and erect two new stone-built houses, set behind a stone wall. The Council made no representation on this application or two others involving extensions to existing dwellings at 5 Margaret Close and Summerfield Lodge (formerly the Ranch House on Chesterton Road). They did however comment on Dave Andrew's plans for nine detached five bed, two bathroomed houses on land at Harbury House, adjacent to Queens Close, saying that these were out of the reach of local people and that they regretted that the starter homes once included in the development had been replaced.

Stratford District had passed plans for extra accommodation in a converted barn at Sharmer Farm; for a sign and lights at the Shakespeare Inn; for a new house beside the Barns, Station Road; for a detached house in the grounds of Harbury Hall; and had given outline permission for a bungalow next to 11 Constance Drive. They also gave permission for two detached houses in the grounds of Sussex Cottages but only under strict conditions, the principle of which would be that there were never more than three dwellings on that plot. Numbers 22 and 24 would have to be amalgamated or number 20 (the extension) demolished prior to any new building taking place.

To help villagers find their way about the Parish Council will purchase extra sheets of the Definitive Map of the footpaths for the Library (at £10 per sheet!) The Council seized on the new tourism leaflet for Southam, called Welcome to Southam, and wanted to find out if something similar could be done for Harbury. Ed Wilson and Ken Stephenson kindly volunteered the Harbury Society's help!

Your Parish Council is pround of Harbury and particularly its success in coming second in the Best Kept Village Competition. Ken Stephenson reconoitered Welford (the Winner) and reported back that although it was very pretty, in parts, it was a DEAD village compared to Harbury. There was noone about; their Village Hall was very small and

there were only three pubs - he would rather live here!

Ken Stephenson and Richard Wells held a long but productive meeting in the Club with the Allotment holders, as a result of which they hope that an Allotments Association will be formed. It will not be responsible for collecting rents but can provide cheap horticultural goods and advise the PC on better management of the holding. Ken Stephenson explained that as yet there were no plans to build at the top of Pineham Avenue. The Parish Council was still waiting for a response from the Land Agent on the possibility of WCC selling some of the land.

The PC deferred a decision on whether to grant aid

to the Youth Club until September but listened

courteously to Amanda Randall's presentation of the results of the Playground Survey. The Survey elicited a 25% response (forms were returned from 51 families representing 109 children). Half of the respondents used the play equipment at least once a week, but even those who thought it acceptable qualified that by asking for improvements. 60% wanted safety surfacing and more adventurous and exciting equipment. A third reported accidents in the last year, particularly on the Rocket. Some children did not use the Play Area because they were too old for it. Others were put off by the bad language, the dog fouling, the motor cycles and the lack of safety surfaces. those who answered the survey wanted dogs banned and even the other 10% wanted them on a lead. 16 people wanted the Play Area fenced off to exclude dogs. A third of those who took part in the survey offered to help in fund raising, and Amanda announced that they had already made almost £100. the Council praised this effort and agreed to liaise with the parents to determine what was needed and

how much it would cost. The agreed to replace lost railings on the boundary of the Play Area, to put up a litter bin and a notice advising of the nearest telephone and doctor, in case of emmergency.




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
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view them and possibly contribute to the cost of the remedial work.

John Drinkwater (an ex-policeman himself) was most concerned about the recent changes at the Southam Police Station, which have resulted in its being reasigned to Stratford. Chief Constable Joslyn's message that the force is over-stretched and underfunded seems to have got through and Sharon Hancock made the point that it is all part of the general under-funding of the County. She urged the Council to make this clear to MP Alan Howarth but the PC insisted that the matter be taken up by their Area Association first.

There was similar concern over the reduction in Fire Cover and a letter will be drafted making clear the Council's fears that if Tyso and Fenny go, Southam and Kineton will be the next casualties, leaving the area inadequately covered in times of emergency.

The "Benefits Agency" which seems to be a new tier to the Department of Social Security sent a questionnaire and a covering letter full of jargon about "potential customers" and "feedback" asking what problems people in rural areas had with DSS. As Sharon Hancock said, it was self-evident from the letter; "these people can't produce an intelligible form!" Public transport, the lack of it, the expense and unreliability were the main drawbacks and the PC would welcome the occasional attendance of an officer of the DSS in the Library to give advice.



MINI & JUNIOR RUGBY AT HARBURY RFC

Since 1979 we have been running Mini and Junior Rugby on Sunday mornings at Harbury Rugby Football Club between the months of September and April.

Interest in rugby has blossomed during that period with the development of women's rugby, national leagues and world cup rugby. A significant change of approach has been taken by the Rugby Football Union in recent years who have become aware of the need to actively promote the game and present it to a wider audience. It has been recognised that at an early age physical contact can put children off the game and that the way forward is to develop ball handling skills so that all sizes of child can enjoy the game. Furthermore, girls have neen actively encouraged to play the game.

At Harbury we always try to develop interest by emphasising the fun and enjoyment of participating in a team game. We run five Mini sides - under 8, 9,10,11 and 12 (at September 1st). Between the ages of 8 and 11 the teams comprise of 9 players on each side and at under 12 - 12 players a side. Below the age of 8 the game is non-contact, from 9 upwards contact is introduced. At Junior level the game involves 15 players a side becoming like the senior game. Harbury have 2 junior sides at under 13 and under 15 this coming season.

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

'Rebuilding Health Care in Romania"

Many of you will know I am giving up my job as a Senior Registrar in Public Health Medicine to work in Romania, initially for 2 years. I shall be flying out at the end of the month, with a 15-day entrance visa (which I hope I can extend), very little money and a mustard grain of faith.

I have received an official invitation from Romania's Ministry of Health, inviting me to work as a Specialist in Preventive Medicine in Brasov. However, Romania is unable to offer me a salary or financial support.

I plan to work alongside the Romanians, using my skills in public health medicine to help them to rebuild their system of health care and to promote the health of the people. I am keen to encourage a greater emphasis on long-term planning, self-sufficiency and preventive medicine.

The Nehemiah Trust has been set up "to promote health and prevent disease in Romania". The trust is named after Nehemiah, Cupbearer to King Artaxerxes, who helped re-build the walls of Jerusalem, beginning in 445 BC. As well as facilitating the structural re-building of the city Nehemiah was concerned about the spiritual health of the people.

The Nehemiah Trust is raising money so it can support me in Romania. It is looking for sponsorship from local groups and individuals and is most encouraged by the interest and support shown by people in Harbury. SEPTEMBER IN THE GARDEN

Plant early flowering bulbs. Leave tulips until November. Cut back young wisteria growth to 6". Harvest early apples. Take cuttings of lavender, insert 6" deep outside in a sheltered spot. Gather lovage seeds and dry, use in winter stews.

Gather marrows and store. Sow winter lettuce, also spinach for spring use. Lift carrots, onions and beetroot.

Sow seed on bare lawn patches - scratching the surface to roughen the soil. Cover with wire against birds, keep moist.

Before the end of the month - earlier if frost is threatened - bring inside all indoor plants which have been summering out, clean pots, make sure they are free of slugs and other pests. Spray well with Houseplant insecticide combined with phostrogen. Always carry through any door pot first to protect foliage from possible damage. Pot-grown chrysanthemums should also be brought under cover.

In the past year the 'Harbury News' has contained several references to the Allotments, nearly always in terms deploring "their state". Now we read that the Parish Council is considering using the land for low cost housing.

Competing claims always make for hard decisions but, before this latest idea it too joyfully hailed as a brilliant solution to two problems, may I, as an allotment holder put a different point of view?


