

FROM THE RECTOR

In 1963, there was a little book of prayers publishe here for the first time. It was acclaimed at once, I had been written by a French priest quite unknown i this country, whose name was Michel Quoist. He had one very well academically and received a doctoratin Social and Political Science. He served for a time in a busy city parish in Le Havre, the place of his birth and he took a particular interest in your people and in the poor. The prayers he offered in the book, entitled 'Prayers of Life', were quite unusual and encouraged people to approach prayer mornaturally and with great simplicity. In one section of very brief prayers on such things as a telephone, wire-fence, posters, the underground, he introduce his prayers with this comment:

'If we knew how to look at life through God's eyes, we shou see innumerable tokens of the love of the Creator seeking to love of his creatures. The Father has put us into the world not to walk through it with lowered eyes, but to search for Hothough things events, people. Everything must reveal God us. Long prayers are not needed in order to smile at Christ the smallest details of daily life!'

This method he pursues in all his prayers and makes i clear that in praying, we are not just telling Go what is on our mind and what we require him to do abou it. Instead he observes life, every day, ordinar things and people, and listens to what God has to sa - and often realises that there is some word (scripture to reinforce what has been discovered this dialogue with God. It is quite amazing what 1 manages to use and turn into prayer - the sight of man's bald head, a football match at night, a fix pound note. Or he thinks about Jesus rebuking h: disciples, for trying to push away the children ar makes of it a prayer on how 'I love youngsters'. (again how we should learn to say 'Yes' to God, as Maj said 'Yes' to the birth of Jesus. I found this way prayer, all those years ago, extremely helpful and have long treasured my copy of 'Prayers of Life' In 1989, Michel Quoist compiled another such set 6 prayers - this time entitled 'Pathways of Prayer' published by Gill and Macmillan, priced £3.99 i paperback. I commend it to you enthusiastically

Some of the prayers begin, with the sort of complaints many of us tend to make at times - then, if we are prepared to listen, what God's comment is - and finally an apt Gospel parable. Here are a few snatches of one of them.

'Lord, why do we always have to make an effort - I don't feel like it.

I don't feel like getting up and I don't feel like going to hed.

I don't feel like going to work or like going to college. I don't feel like keeping quiet or like talking. I don't feel like giving the help I've been asked for - I don't want to commit myself.

Lord why do we always have to make an effort to live each day as you want us to live it?

Lord is it true that we must always make an effort even when we don't feel a bit like it?.....

person, I know. I didn't want to spend thirty years climbing the steps to Calvary, but it was my Father's will that my whole life should be offered to you. And I loved you, my brothers and sisters, and I made the effort to go up on the cross, so that all your efforts might, one day, be crowned with life. Go little one, don't ask yourself how you feel about doing this or that. Ask if it is what the Father wants for you, for your brothers and sisters.'

The prayer is then concluded with this quote from the Gospel according to Matthew.

'Now what do you think? There was once a man who had two sons. He went to the elder one and said, "Son, go and work in the vineyard today." "I don't want to", he answered, but later he changed his mind and went. Then the father went to the other son and said the same thing. "Yes sir", he answered, but he did not go. Which one of the two did what his father wanted? "The elder one", they answered'.

In the introduction to his latest book, Michel Quoist says he offers a few 'pathways' to help us on our pilgrimage to God who has come into the very centre of our lives in the person of Jesus Christ -he concludes 'Good journey, my friends. And let's not be so busy looking for Him that we fail to notice Him as he passes by. May we always be linked to Him, through our own lives, through the lives of our brothers and sisters and the life of the world. Then indeed will human history become prayer in all of Christ.

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

STAY CALM ADVISES RECTOR

The sensitive issue of future clergy levels and lay involvement in ministry was aired by the Rector when the Parochial Church Council met on July 7. He however cautioned against panic reaction, saying that he did not see any need for it. Instead there should be calm and reasoned discussion over a long period. Meanwhile normal procedures for filling every parish clergy vacancy would continue to be carried out throughout the diocese, and in any case lay involvement was something Harbury had been taking seriously for several years. It was decided that it was a suitable subject for a PCC conference in the autumn.

A small group will attend all future baptisms conducted outside the context of the Eucharist for the purpose of extending a welcome on behalf of the congregation. Members of the group will afterwards endeavour to maintain contact with the family, and there will be baptism anniversary cards for the child until it is old enough to join the Crusaders. Additional members are needed for the baptism group, especially men who are not so far represented.

Southam Deanery is continuing its campaign for economies with a resolution to the Diocesan Board of Finance urging the use of all possible means to reduce the demand on parishes in 1993.

Approval of the Diocesan Advisory Committee for the Care of Churches for replacement of the central heating boiler has been received.

The Tom Hauley Room Trustees' report revealed that last year the room was used 131 times by church-based groups and 181 times by other organisations, including the regular Saturday coffee mornings. The financial situation will be kept under review by the trustees with a view to reducing the annual deficit which last year was £1,164.00.

As the number of older people experiencing difficulty in getting to church growns the need for a transport co-ordinator becomes increasingly urgent. The Rector hopes that a volunteer will telephone him on Harbury 612377.

HARBURY PARISH COUNCIL MEETING FOR JULY 1992

Ken Stephenson's right in it! The PC can't resolve the Pound Sewer Easement until he returns from France. However, they managed to decide where to put the Dovehouse Lane Lamp!! Chairman Bill Middleton said they had bent over

backwards to try to accommodate everyone, but now they wer putting it where it would do most good. Guess where it' going!

On 13th August in the Village Hall, whilst Harbury is close for the summer, Severn Trent is holding an important exhibition with the Contractor for the Sewer Refurbishment Scheme. The PC will try to discover if work in Constant Drive is to be added to the Scheme. (See Advertisment for details)

Tennis Court resurfacing starts on 14th September, paid for from the Sinking Fund. Chris Macgowan put off approaching the Netball Ladies until the autumn about a similar functor their court.

Wobbling child cyclists, hardly old enough to toddle arcausing concern and Sharon Hancock is enlisting the hel of County Road Safety in keeping death off the roads.

There is a hold-up at Stratford over the lincence for the new bus service and at the County over land for affordable homes. The appropriate representatives WILL TAKE ACTION.

Councillors are angry about the delay in taking Enforcemen action at the Old Bakery. Stratford Planning Cttee ordere it in March! Meanwhile action was taken at Harbury Hal and more is planned to rid the site of dumped vehicles.

Questions were asked about siting Satellite Dishes in Conservation Areas and an application for an HGV Haulage site near Deppers Bridge. SDC refused permission for house at the junction of Sutcliffe and Farm Street and Slurry Store at Chesterton Farm because of the potential nuisance to neighbours.

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HARBURY SOCIETY

Ian Soden led a party of adults and children from the Harbury Society round the Lunt Fort on a beautiful summer's afternoon.

He explained how archeologists had discoverd the site thirty years ago and realised the military significance of the slotted ditches.

A major excavation took place in the 1960s and now the site is scheduled as an Ancient Monument. Much has survived and there is evidence of four Forts super-imposed on one another between the period AD 60-80. The reconstruction of the ramparts and buildings has now been standing for longer than the Roman Fort!!

The Gateway is spectacular with six big post holes identifying the exact position. Illustrations from Trajan's Column in Rome were used to aid the reconstruction.

When the Romans left they pushed the ramparts into the ditches so that there was no fortified site left, but it is still possible to make out where everything was. Baginton was an established village and it managed to survive both the arrival and the departure of the Romans.

The Lunt does not follow the Model Fort design because it uses the 40ft high river cliff to defend the fourth side and so has only three gates. The ramparts curve to accommodate the Gyrus which was used to train cavalry horses.

The Lunt was a garrison fort for the Twentieth Legion, the only one which held out against the Bodicean Revolt. The decisive battle in the campaign was fought outside Mancetter and the captured horses were retrained at the Lunt as cavalry mounts.

The Fort held about 600 men who were estimated to need only one Granary but the site had three, so archeologists believe that it was a supply base for other Forts along the Fosse.

The Sacellum, the building where the standards were kept, was the most important in the Fort. To encourage troops to defend it their pay was also kept there. Parades took place in front of the building.

The troops were probably German because it was Roman policy never to station men in their home country. After 20 years service they were expected to settle where they had been stationed and could be called up from the reserve if needed.

Ian showed the group the magnificent Museum and was warmly thanked for the tour.

The Lunt Fort at Baginton, is open from 12 till 6pm, every day except Monday and Thursday and entrance is £1 for Adults and 50p for Children.

The raffle raised £24.55 for Breakthrough. The next Folk Club is on August 6th and our 8th birthday session is on September 3rd.



SATELLITE DISHES

Not a lot of people know that you need Planning Permission to site a Satellite Dish! Not only that, but if yours is a Listed Building, or one in a Conservation Area your probably won't get permission when you apply!!!

The Department of the Environment even issues a special booklet called "A Householder's Planning Guide for the Installation of Satellite Television Dishes" which stresse that they should not be in public view or even on the sider or rear walls of buildings in visually sensitive areas.

Stratford District Council has included a Policy (ENV 28 in its Local Plan which is intended to "minimise thei impact on the street scene". There is a presumption agains dishes being installed "in public view" in Conservation Areas and for Listed Buildings there is a presumtion agains them being installed "on or within the curtilage of the building", so even the garden is ruled out.



July 11th was not a day for the casually curious to visit the village for the annual Garden Walkabout, but the weather did not deter the intrepid gardeners. All day the village buzzed with activity and we thank everyone who worked so hard to make the day both enjoyable and successful. Joining us for the day was a coach load of enthusiasts from Tatton Park Gardening Club, who now make our Open Gardens day part of a weekend away. We thank them for their support, along with many other people who plodded around with umbrellas.



Now we plan for the Village Show which will be on Saturday 12th September. Schedules are in all the village shops so please pick up a copy and enter at least one class. There must be something for everyone. Do not wait until going round to look at the entries to decide that you could do just as well as the prize winners!

THE GARDEN IN AUGUST

Look at your garden carefully and if you decide that trees and shrubs are overgrown and causing too much shade, let along taking up too much room - now is the time for a good chop, removing old wood at the base and cutting back and pruning out branches to let in light. By doing this in summer you curb their over enthusiasm, and on fruit trees encourage fruit bearing shoots. But always remember, look twice and cut once!

Dead head all annuals regularly particularly plants in containers. Sweetpeas will also benefit from a feed as will roses. Continue to dead head them. Buddleias will flower longer if you remove the dead spikes. Spray dahlias and crysanthemums to protect them from blackfly and earwigs.

Plant out broccoli, winter cabbage and leeks, also brussels sprouts for a later winter crop. Set them with the soil right up to the first leaves, keep well watered.

Continue to take cuttings, including herbs, shrubs and heathers.

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
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
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
