


FROM THE RECTOR

I always find it interesting when visiting a church to study the plaques and memorials around the walls. More often than not, they tell us something of the person commemorated and usually speak of that person in glowing terms. As you are aware already, there are quite a few in the church at Harbury and at Ladbroke. It is good to learn of the qualities of those of a bygone age, of the love and esteem in which they were of their deeprooted faith and spiritual held. condition, which led them to all sorts of acts of kindliness and consideration for their loved ones and for their neighbours. It is very nice to be thought highly of, but nowadays we do not care to go in for memorial tablets and would not desire, I to be remembered in that fashion. However the lank during June, we remember someone (June 11th) who had the greater honour of being commemorated in the Acts of Apostles. No stone tablet, as far as I know, was set up anywhere giving his epitaph, but instead inscribed for ever for the whole world to read in the pages of Scripture, 'Barnabas was a good man, full of the Holy Spirit and of faith'. A very plain and simple statement, yet one which most of us would cherish having said about us.

Barnabas was a Levite from Cyprus and he had been given his second name (his first was Joseph) by the Apostles - it meant 'Son of Consolation'. He had entered so enthusiastically into the spirit of the early Church, that he sold land he owned and gave the proceeds to further the Church's mission. He was recognised as a man of immense generosity both materially and spiritually. He, it was, who introduced converted Paul, a friend of longstanding to the others and taught them to overcome their suspicions of this one-time persecutor of Christians. In fact at first, as we read in Acts, it was Barnabas who headed the missionary journies, but later he and Paul disagreed sharply over taking with them John Mark and as a consequence went their separate ways. Barnabas went back to Cyprus and is regarded as the founder of the Cypriot Church and it is said that eventually he was martyred at Salamis. Whatever the true facts of his life and his death are, it was obvious that he loved the Lord so greatly that he gave himself wholeheartedly to Mission and left behind him a name for grace and generosity-'a good man, full of the Holy Spirit and of faith'.

No less today the Church needs such commitment and such dedication if the Mission is to succeed and the prayer we use on the day we commemorate Barnabas is very suitable for constant use.

'Lord God Almighty, whose Son Jesus Christ has taught us that it is more blessed to give than to receive: help us by the example of your apostle Barnabas to be generous in our judgements and unselfish in our service, through Jesus Christ our Lord, Amen'

BOILER COST SHOCK

Replacement of the beyond-repair oil-fired boiler in Harbury Parish Church is now expected to cost more than the figure of £7,000 originally mooted, it was revealed at the Parochial Church Council meeting on May 5.

The addition of VAT to the only estimate of E8,518 received by May 5 would bring a total bill of E10,008. Requests for heating schemes and estimates have also been made to the Gas Board and other heating engineers, including one in the parish. To get the work completed by the autumn an emergency meeting of the PCC will be convened as soon as all estimates are available to decide who will get the contract. The replacement boiler will be gas-fired.

The promised register of church-based organisations has now been produced by the Time and Talents coordinating committee and is being distributed to all who expressed a wish during last year's stewardship campaign to contribute something extra to church activities.

The finance committee was given the green-light for a policy of two-yearly stewardship campaigns concentrating especially on covenanted giving, beginning in February 1993. This has become imperative in the light of the effects of recession on the Church Commissioners' investment income, which in turn is increasing the financial pressures on parishes.

Deanery Synod has warned parishes that it may prove difficult to afford to maintain present levels of stipendiary clergy. This raised the spectre of possibly having to share a future incombent with more than just one parish and is to be an item on the agenda for discussion at the July meeting. Leaders of the Crusaders are having a series of prayer meetings in search of spiritual guidance on the question of greater involvement of the children in services in Church.

A draft constitution has been prepared for the proposed Friends of Harbury Church and will have had legal vetting before being presented to the steering committee for approval and subsequent submission to the Charity Commissioners.

Suppliers of the new hymn books have been acknowledged responsibility for and will replace those copies with pages that have come loose.

Betty Knappe volunteerd to take over from Joyce Windsor as organiser of the Tom Hauley Room Sat. Coffee mornings.

Appreciation of David Thistlethwaite's restoration of the two centre aisle benches was recorded.

Both youth groups were reported to be thriving.

RESULTS FROM THE MAY PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

Jersey "Dawn" was beaten close home in the Butt Lane Commemoration Stakes by Dr. Pirie, who, eloquently urged on by the Barrett/Lane team, came with a late run to gain a well-deserved win.

Themselves spurred on by residents support, the Cllrs galloped on towards the <u>Dovehouse Lane Lamp-</u> <u>post</u>, flicking over the fences Coursebuilder Ken put in their path.

They will lodge a strong complaint against the unannounced inclusion of extra obstacles in the Low-Cost Housing Sweepstake. If rumours are true that Severn Trent will ban building until the Southam Works is brought up to standard, then Harbury's runner will be out of the game until 1997!

Off the course for some months herself, Mrs. Waddell needed updating on the form in the <u>Travel Token</u> <u>Handicap</u>. "Prince Monalulu" MacGowan promised to tip her the wink if A & M Cars was to run in this sponsored event.

Sharon Hancock congratulated the Chapel Street Gang who sprinted into the lead in the recent <u>CWR Street</u> <u>Challenge</u>. She praised the efforts of the trainers and apprentices from the Youth Club who tidied up the Village Hall hedge and the Ventures who will maintain the footpaths.

There was a Walkover for the <u>Chairman's Prize</u>, taken for the fourth year by Bill Middleton, but an intriguing contest is in prospect for 1993 as Scouts report that in Vice-Chair winner Ed Wilson, Sharon Hancock has an outstanding two-year old.

Steve Norman, the only entry from <u>Deppers Bridge</u>, made a promising start to the season revealing the existence of a hitherto unsuspected microlite landing facility out there in the country. Stratford approved plans for two detached houses next to the flats and extensions to 10 the Beeches, Waterways Deppers Bridge and Butchers in High Street. Plans for Woodside in Hall Lane and Hillside Farm were withdrawn.

The Parish Council supported Mr. Nakkars 21 Fishing Lodges at the Quarries as long as they were not permanent homes. They did not comment on the Tennants Conservatory in Binswood End but wanted assurances the tree in the stable courtyard of Harbury Hall would be protected if a new house was built. They thought the West Latham's plot for a three bedroomed house on the corner of Sutcliffe Pastures was too small.

The authorities are taking action to ease the traffic problems at the Airfield corner and Clerk Alison Hodge confirmed news of enforcement action at the Old Bakery, Chapel Street from the District's Mr. Caley - came straight from the horse's mouth.

HARBURY ANNUAL PARISH MEETING 1992

Noel Hunter, head of Trading Standards at the County Council was the guest speaker and he painted a picture of the range of activities that his Department had to watch over and some of their horror stories:- A sponsored testing of Electric blankets had discovered that of those brought in for the free test, 60% were unsafe and of those 30% were in such a bad state that they were beyond repair; the widespread clocking of cars; and the major international bank which had pushed low-start mortgages (deferred interest) and was now repossessing 200 homes a month!

The function of the Trading Standards Department was to help people and like the rest of the CC the Department struggled because of capping but in the last three years there had been a 20% increase per year in the number of complaints they received, yet the Department only cost .5p in the pound on the rates or £2 for everyone in the County.

The meeting then had the opportunity to quiz County Cllr Mrs. Patricia Bidwell on matters of consequence such as the effects of Capping on Education, Libraries mathematics of the Standard Spending Assessment, which she admitted she did not understand (and here she was backed up by Rugby's Deputy Treasurer who maintained that no-one in local government truly understood the formula).

Mr. Ayer's-Hunt also demanded free car parking space at Shire Hall.

Bill Middleton, Chairman of the PC, gave his report of the year's progress and thanked his colleagues and the new clerk for their support.

A substantial demand for low-cost homes had been revealed by the Second-stage Housing Survey and a site was being sought. The PC would be considering an alternative to the Travel Token Scheme which might give better value for money. Hopscotch, formed to improve the play equipment at the Recreation Grounds had been phenomenally successful in raising funds. The Council waited with trepidation the commencement of the Sewer renewal scheme.

Chris Macgowan stressed that the Council was not like a commercial business - out to make a profit, they should spend the Parish money carefully and wisely and balance the books. He believed the parishioners wanted to continue to see the trees and grass well maintained and the lighting improved and if the Parish was to undertake projects such as making the play equipment safer then there would have to be an increase in the precept which had remained at £13,000 for five years.

The Highways Committee was pleased with the quality of the greens maintenance provided by the contractors Wattisons. There was concern about the danger and unsightly appearance of the Scrapyard area on Harbury Lane and the Council pressed for improvements.

John Drinkwater revealed that Severn Trent had indicated that new building in Harbury would not be possible until they had upgraded the local sewage works in 1997, although applications for development kept coming in and he was concerned about the effect the sewers would have on plans for affordable housing.

For the Village Hall Chairman Alan Barr a review of the years achievements, including the kitchen

improvements and the installation of the external lighting. There had been some vandalism but the majority of the public treated the Hall with care and he thanked them for their consideration. He thanked the volunteers who had painted the outside of the Hall, praised the efforts of Mrs. Pratt the caretaker. The Hall was financially stable but still needed careful management.

At our last meeting Colin Drayton explained the change over of Harbury Telephone Exchange to an up-to-date Digital System and all the benefits that brings.

Modernisation cost a quarter of a million pounds in equipment alone, that is over £100 a line. The most obvious improvement has been the reduction of congestion, especially in the evenings, but now we also have access to the Star System, for a fee.

The Star services allow you to programme your own alarm calls, hold threeway conversations and gives warning of incoming calls whilst you are on the line, but you can only use these if you have a suitable instrument connected via a jack-plug. Old connections to a bakelite junction box have to be converted, again at a fee, although if your old phone gives up the ghost BT replaces it with a more modern one and puts in a jack-plug for you.

Whatever type of phone and wiring you have, now that we are on a digital exchange you can opt for callbarring which protects you from running up debts on the Premium Rate Services like Chat lines. You ring BT and request the Call-barring and they send you a form to confirm this. There is a fund raising Coffee Morning in the Tom Hauley Room from 10am to noon on Saturday 27th June for the Parish Maps Group followed at 2.30pm by a guided tour of the Lunt Fort at Baginton. Entrance to the Fort is £1 per adult and 50p for children.

HARBURY C.E. COMBINED SCHOOL - HERB GARDEN

The garden was first started about 4 years ago when the 12 year olds planted a group of herbs as part of their work linked with the Kenilworth Castle Elizabethan Project. from cuttings, and a few are donated. There are now 40 or 50 different culinary, medicinal or purely interesting plants. Each one is recorded on computer, so that each month a work programme can be carried out.

Some of the herbs have been used by the children, for example the angelica was candied last autumn, and various ones have been tried out as soup flavouring

Amongst the unusal ones grown this year are soapwort, which was used for making soap from Roman Times, toothache plant, which the Aborigines used for tooth problems, flax, rocket, Good King Henry, Woad and Madder. The latter two are ancient dye plants which next year's class will attempt to use.

A sale of cuttings and plants grown from seed was held in early May, which raised £67 for Enterprise, the class's fund-raising organisation.

We still have many plants for sale which are available during school hours, all price 50p, many of them the more unusual ones.



JUNE IN THE GARDEN

28

If the weather is dry and sunny, all plants growing in containers will need watering every day. Hanging baskets twice a day. Do this in the early morning or evening, never in full sun. A strong jet directed at the roots is far more efficient than sprinkle watering over the top. This applies to all watering. Your lawn will stay green longer if you mow it less and allow it to grow longer than the usual cricket pitch length.

To keep flowers blooming apply Phostrogen regularly to the root areas. Dead head Petunias, Sweet Peas, and pansies but not Busy Lizzies. Fuchsias and Geraniums may be put outside and their spring cuttings potted up. Plant out bedding plants after they have been hardened off.

Divide overlarge clumps of Primroses and Polyanthus when the flowers have died down. Give a feed of bonemeal. Prune back Aubretia brutally! It shoots like mad later. Plant Marrow, Courgette and Cucumber seeds. All should be planted vertically. Start Cucumbers off under cloches.

Thin out Carrots and Lettuces planted earlier. Plant Runner Bean seeds straight into the soil. Carrots and Beetroot can be sown now for winter use.

LADBROKE PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

This was the AGM of the Council and Mr. Francis Badman was once again elected as Chairman, to be assisted by Mr. Peter Williamson as Vice Chairman.

Some of the offending overgrown hedges in the village had been cut, as had the verges in lower Windmill lane. The drain blockages outside the Old Rectory had been dealt with but had not yet been tested by severe weather conditions. Plans had been received and passed for a garage and porch at No.2 School Lane, and for an agricultural dwelling at Barn Farm.

A complaint concerning the state of Lower Windmill Lane had been received and noted. The Parish has been asked to produce a new village appraisal book. Is there anyone in the village interested to taking on such a task?

There will be a Thanksgiving service for the South Warwickshire Scanner Appeal at Warwick Castle on Sunday 21st June 7pm. Everybody would be most welcome. The next meeting will be held on Wednesday 17th June at 7.45pm in the Village Hall.

THE LADBROKE ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

The Chairman of the meeting Mr. Francis Badman, very much regretted to report that although Warwickshire County Council were still actively pursueing the matters, there was no real progress to report on the access problem across Windmill Lane, unless the landowner involved had a change of heart about letting the grass verges be trodden on, those unable to climb high fences would have to be patient.

Eleven planning applications were received during the last year, to which the Council made no objections, but had requested some amendments. The Council still support the application for a golf course as it felt it would be a green buffer between the village and Southam Industrial Estate.

Gas had been satisfactorily installed in the village and the offending double white lines had been removed. The Council had supported the campaign to save the Tysoe and Fenny Compton Fire Stations. There was to be a small increase in the community charge to enable the parish to have a surplus for election costs. Mr. Badman concluded by thanking his Council for their support and the Parish Clerk Mrs. Elsa Greenway, for all her hard work throughout the year.

Mr. Peter Williamson reported on the Alibone Trust, who this year changed their land usage from sheep grazing to turf. Some of this years profit was to be used to pay for the new street light needed in Church Road. If anyone in the village has another proposal for the good of the village, the Trust is always ready to listen.

At the moment the suggested development plans for the village are all hearsay. Nothing will be decided until after the consulation period ends in September.

The Best Kept Village Competition will no doubt soon be judged. Personally I didn't feel that much effort had been made this year, though since the meeting the Village Hall frontage has been tidied up, as has the verge around Farmyard Field, it's not too late to sort out your own bit of Ladbroke, who knows, we may even get on honourable mention.

Our Neighbourhood Watch Co-ordinator reports that Ladbroke is now a target area, particularly for car thefts and power tools from outbuildings. Be vigilan take down suspicious car registrations, install lights and alarms.

Canon Rowe reported on the affairs of our Parish Church. Attendences had been reasonable and he was especially pleased with the Family Services and Children's Church. Attention had been taken with the restoration work, which began in September and went on almost continuously until Easter. It was felt that the recession had affected the result of the Appeal, although they received some generous response It was good to have the bells back in operation by Easter, it is hoped that work on the tower will be able to continue in the Autumn.

Mrs. Jill Moore reported on the Women's Institute, it had been another successful and busy year for the thirty two members. She hoped that some of the younger members would this year serve on the committe

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

LADBROKE VILLAGE HALL

I have lived in this village for 26 years, and have often served on the Village Hall Committee and helped at various functions.

I am now very concerned that the V.Hall has been allowed to deteriorate to such an extent that unless the village of Ladbroke works together to invest in its Hall, it may not survive into the next decade. I don't think villagers realise that the running costs of the Hall are approx. £1,000 per annum. The revenue from lettings does not even cover the electricity bills for the year, let alone the running costs. Apart from that, the kitchen area is in such a poor condition, that it is possible that the Hall could be forcibly closed down for being sub-standard.

Fund raising events in recent years have been very poorly attended, and working parties pass by unnoticed. What has happened to the legendary Ladbroke Village Spirit to allow such a thing to happen? Did you realise that even the famous Ladbroke Bonfire Night ran at a tremendous loss last year? I do not know what the answer is, but I do know that unless Ladbroke organises fund raising in aid of its Village Hall, and people take the trouble to support organised events, our Hall will not always be there as the only meeting place in the Village. Without our Village Hall, where would we go to vote, where would the Parish Council conduct their meetings? Where would the W.I. and other organisations meet?

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
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
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
