

Some years ago, a critical survey was carried out upon church magazines and one point made was that so many of them contained far too much retrospective material all about things which had already happened. They had the merit of being good historical recording, but failed to achieve effective communication. Now I realise that the 'Harbury & Ladbroke News' is a village and community-centred publication and has proved its effectiveness over and over again, but in the material I have been responsible for, I have always been conscious of the danger of mentioning things over and done with. This time however, I want to do a bit of both, recording and communicating.

First I want to express my thanks to those who responded to my invitation to give the addresses at the Mid-Week Lenten Services at Harbury and at Ladbroke. The services were well attended and the addresses, based on set sections of St. Gospel, were delivered with great originality and freshness. The services as a whole were simple and straightforward, and consequently I believe most effective and telling. Of course what one always dreads most is the heating system breaking down at an important time such as Holy Week and Easter, and that's what happened to Harbury. I am delighted to say that attendances did not suffer. In spite of a very chilly church, the Gethsemane Watch was well maintained and at midnight there were still six people kneeling in prayer. By Easter Day, Harbury did have a little background heat from gas heaters and at both churches attendances were very good. At Ladbroke the Children's Church Easter Day Service in the afternoon was delightful and at Harbury, the augmented choir assisted us to sing Evensong beautifully and powerfully. When people respond well the Easter 'Alleluias' are all that more significant and joyful.

Having said, that we must not rest on our laurels and casually think that perhaps later in the year, there will be the Flower Festival to look forward to in July, the Harvest in autumn and before we know where we are, Christmas will be on the way again. In May (actually Thursday 28th May) comes another major

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
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celebration, Ascension Day, when we recognise Our Lord's rightful place in the kingdom of heaven and in our hearts, and pray that 'as we believe Our Lord Jesus Christ to have ascended into the heaven, so we may also in heart and mind thither ascend and with him continually dwell'. On that day there will be a service at Harbury at 9.45am, but in the evening both Ladbroke and Harbury are invited to worship together at Ladbroke at 8 o'clock. After that service to emphasise our fellowship and the happiness of the occasion, we shall have some simple refreshment. Not many days after that comes Pentecost (Whitsunday), when we rejoice in the Coming of the Holy Spirit. This Festival is of equal importance to the Church as are Easter and Christmas, but sadly sometimes is not kept with the enthusiasm or the prominence it ought to receive. After all, it is the fulfilment of what Our Lord promised to his disciples - 'You receive power when the Holy Spirit comes upon you and you will bear witness for me in Jerusalem, and all over Jordan and Samaria, and away to the ends of the earth' - Acts 1 v 8. It was this fulfilment which turned timid and cowering disciples, meeting together in secret and behind closed doors, into bold and courageous preachers of the Gospel. What a splendid opportunity it is for us then on that day (Sunday 7th June) to have our Confirmation at 6.30pm and from Harbury and Ladbroke twenty candidates. I am sure that everyone will want to be there to pray for the candidates and to welcome them.

In the meantime, our Sunday and Weekday worship continues without pause and should never be neglected.

REACHING OUT

Despite heavy calls on its financial resources made by essential repairs and restoration work - for example the roof, the Lychgate, and replacement of the heating-system boiler - Harbury Parish Church is determinedly continuing its traditional outreach role.

At the annual meeting on April 5 parishioners were told that the Parochial Church Council, influenced particularly by the Decade of Evangelism had given £200 to the Church Army, and had made donations of £100 each to the Church Missionary Society, the United Society for Propagation of the Gospel, St. Luke's Home for the Clergy; the Society for the Propagation of Christian Knowledge, Missions to Seamen and Christian Outreach.

Additionally a figure in excess of £1200 had been dispersed as a result of direct fund-raising activities, held under the auspices of the church, and retiring collections. These donations included £605 to the Nehemiah Trust (supporting Dr Joanna Watson's voluntary work in Romania), £300 to the Church of England Children's Society, £260 to the British Legion, and £58 to the Additional Curates Society.

Beryl Checkley and John Moore were unanimously re-elected wardens; also re-elected were Ruth Dodds (secretary), Liz McBride (treasurer), and Frank Bunting (auditor). The Rector, Canon Antony Rowe, paid tribute to the outstanding contribution each had made to the efficient and harmonious running of the church. He also thanked the Revd. Peter Snow for his support since retiring to Harbury.

Newly elected to the PCC are Vanda Ball, Betty Knappe, Sue Dormer, Lesley and Brian Jones, Tony Brunton and Bill Davies.

HARBURY PARISH COUNCIL MEETING FOR MARCH 1992

Someone has been picking the daffodils on the verge at Treen Hill again much to Ed Wilson's disgust, but the new Hors Chestnut at Binswood End has been planted and a Bench has bee ordered at a cost of about £500. Work on the trees wa proceeding, and the Car Park weeds would be sprayed off.

Ed reported over 90 responses to the Housing Needs Survey an hoped up to 20 dwellings could be built. He thought the Parish Council ought to let people know what was happening an tell the Rural Housing Trust that they wanted to proceed. He thanked everyone who helped with the survey.

At the Area Meeting in Long Itchington, Harbury and it neighbouring Parish Councils had expressed their great disquiet at the disbanding of the Youth Service. Sharon Hancock was concerned about the impact on Harbury's Youth Club. Youth Work was one of the hardest sectors to which to attract volunteers and the Club's funds would not stretch to paying workers. It was all a dreadful muddle and the only message the youth got was that they were bottom of the list. James Turner seemed to think that redundant Youth Workers would get other jobs and County Cllr Mrs Bidwell believed that more information about how Youth would be helped would come out eventually.

District Cllr Crouch tried to enlist Harbury's support in a local campaign against the pressures for development at Bishops Itchington which he said Blue Circle wanted to be designated a Growth Village.

Stratford District Council granted permission for the extensions to Walnut Tree Cottage, 33 Manor Orchard and Threeways. Dave Andrews land at Harbury House got the go ahead for nine detached homes and the Parish Council agreed his request for access across the Pound to the sewer. Listed Building consent was granted at the Manor to block off windows in the stable court with shutters, and consent was given to Manor Cottage for loft conversion subject to conditions. SDC refused a bungalow converted from a barn at Bull Ring Farm. The Parish Council objected to the Hillside Farm application on the grounds that it was premature, that the access was bad, that it was on an elevated site and visible from a distance, that it was outside the development area and that the homes were included only to justify permission affordable being granted. They insisted that if the District was minted to grant permission there must be a site visit.

Stratford District Council has served an enforcement notice on the owner of the lower part of Harbury Hall to cease the storage of derelict cars and caravans on the site. The owner of the Old Bakery has similarly been given 28 days to remove the tyres and enforcement has been taken out to reinstate the work done on the Listed Building without consent.

Warwick District's Environmental Health Officer was taking action to abate the nuisance caused by refuse burning at the Airfield Site. The County Accident Reduction Unit was exploring ways of reducing the hazards at the Scrapyard.

The Parish considered an application for a Garage and Store at Watersway Deppers Bridge and the reapplication by Blue Circle for the Hotel and Industrial site at the Quarry works.

There was much concern about the traffic hazard posed by the skip located outside Tom Hauley's Cottage and the likelihood of similar disruption when the adjacent site was developed.

Once again Ken Stephenson was absent and no progress was made in siting the Fido Bin, but there was heartening news that Paulin Quarterman had been appointed as SDC Dog Warden.

Cllrs agreed to meet the Hopscotch group to give them their full support on Saturday morning when Ken would be available. Keith Thompson cried off saying that he was involved in the Tennis Club Jumble Sale and it was essential he attended as he needed "some more clothes".

The Playing Fields will be closed on June 13th for the annual Carnival and it had been suggested that this year the procession assembled in Bush Heath Lane.

John Moore of Deppers Bridge tendered his resignation and h good work for the settlement was acknowledged by Kei Thompson. the Chairman suggested that Cllrs should canvass for a replacement, but it was pointed out to him that the vacance had to be advertised.

Next meeting 25th June changed from 18th June.

HARBURY PARISH COUNCIL MEETING FOR APRIL 1992

I could be wrong but I think I detect slight air of pandamongst Cllrs who Precepted for only £13,000 again this year. There has been no increase in revenue for five years year reimbursements through Section 136 are down and donations to bodies like the Youth Club and for the Lychgate are increasing, they have yet to broach the subject of a Sinking Fund for the Netball Court with Harbury Ladies and seem to backed themselves into a corner over subsidising transport for Harbury's OAPs.

Mike Thompson has come up with a scheme for a taxi-bus which could pick up passengers daily, from anywhere in the village and take them to town and to ASDA shopping for less that Midland Red charges, but he would like the Parish Council to subsidise it for OAPs, to make it even cheaper. At present the Council gives every OAP who applies tokens sufficient for about 5 journeys a year to Leamington and back. It costs upover £1,500 and there is no way of knowing how these token are spent, or even if they are spent, yet we pay for the anyway!

It was always the PC's intention that the tokens would hell Harbury OAPs get into town for the items they cannot purchas in the village and the new scheme seems to be tailored for this purpose. It would be much better value, charge-payer could be assured that all the subsidy was used for OAPS travel, and the pensioners would get more free trips. However the PC would have to convince OAPs that these benefits were

greater than the present hand-out!

Having heard from Sue Ingram that the Volunteer Bureau Southam had transported over 150 Harbury residents this Year

the Council agreed to donate £100 to Stratford CVS, the parent body and having heard from Cllr Crouch of Bishops Itchington's satisfaction with the maintenance contract with the County Harbury decided to change from MEB in the hope of saving money.

Ken Stephenson doesn't want a new light put up his end of the village, arguing that residents of Dovehouse Lane were not in favour of it, but he was told the improvements were for the benefit of all Harbury's pedestrians. He reported that the older children wanted a "bus shelter" on the Playing Fields and reported on the meeting with Hopscotch which has already raised over £2,700 towards stimulating play for the 0-11 year olds. Chris Magowan did not want the previous Recreation Grounds Committee's efforts with "those Sewerage Pipes" rubbished and Distict Cllr Sharpe confirmed they were considered useful and vandal-proof by other parishes who had seen them.

Sharon Hancock raised the problem caused by thoughtless parents dropping children off at School by car, who endangered not only their own but also other people's children by driving up Back Lane, and she asked that the School write to them.

Planning permission has been granted for a porch at 45 Mill Street. The Parish Council had no representations to give about plans for a Garage for Mr Reeves in Deppers Bridge, a utility room at 10 The Beeches or minor ammendments to Berkley Homes development in Butt Lane, and the bungalow at Station Road, or changes to Woodside, Hall Lane or the redevelopment at Sussex Cottages, which involves demolition of the extension, amalgamation of Nos 22 & 24 and the erection of two new dwellings.

James Turner gave news of enforcement action at Harbury Hall and Mr Hunt of Chapel Street took exception to the Parish Council pressing for similar action at the Old Bakery in Chapel Street. It was explained to him that Chapel St residents had protested to the PC about the deterioration of the building. Cllrs had not entered the Bakery but District Cllr Sharpe said that the Enforcement Officer, who had, was appalled at what he found. The owner had been difficult to contact and had not responded to the District Council's demands that Listed Building permission be applied for.

The Cllrs will cogitate for a month on a suitable name for the new development off Butt Lane in the field where Cecil Bloxham's Jersey Dawn used to graze. Sharon Hancock 14.

insists that Bonzo came to vote riding on his tractor with the cow hitched behind.

It is all change at the next meeting where a new Chairman and Sub-Committee have to be elected.

HARBURY SOCIETY

The next event is the Telephone Exchange visit on Tuesday 19th May. Anyone who is interested in seeing the improvements and hearing what services are now available can come along at 7pm.

It has been suggested that we show the extent of the Conservation Areas in Harbury and the map (see facing page) shows the one based on Farm Street.

Conservation Areas are designated because the buildings within them are considered to have innate architectural merit or historical association important to the village. All buildings within a Conservation Area are protected and changes to them or work on any trees within the area require prior notice. This gives everyone a chance to know why work is planned and to object if it is unreasonable. Permission is readily given to undertake work on trees that are dangerous and for other emergencies.

In the next few weeks you will be receiving details of where you can leave any donations of records, tapes and other musical items for our Carnival Stall. It is a novel idea and we hope to have plenty on offer on Carnival Day.

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

Keith has now probably reached the half-way stage, and it's thanks to the kind people who supported the fund raising events that treatment can be continued.

MAY IN THE GARDEN

Now, before they need it, put in the stakes which will be needed to support tall and untidy herbaceous plants later on. Stake, when you plant them, tall dahlias.

Sow half-hardy annuals out of doors, thin out already sown annuals. Remove all suckers from roses and lilacs; from below soil level; if possible tear them away rather than cut. Tie in all climbers and wall shrubs as soon as they make new shoots. Do not forget to prune back spring flowering shrubs and plants as soon as they have finished flowering. Encourage new shoots on indoor plants by pinching out any straggly growth.

Sow sweetcorn, mutual the end of the month, and already grown on, but not until the end of the month, and then protect against late frosts. Potatoes should also be protected, as soon as the shoots come through the plants should be earthed up. Also sow dwarf beans outside.

Sow annual herbs. Lighly clip back established clumps. Remember sages like sun. Pansies do not and Busy Lizzies flower better in a shady place.

PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

There was still nothing to report on the bypass from Windmill Lane. Mrs Greenway had been in touch, with the Council regarding the street lighting in Church Lane. It appears that Ladbroke will have to foot the bill for a tubular steel lamp, even if we supply our own wooden pole, as this incurs extra work for the electricians. Discussions continue.

Press admitted liability for the leakage opposite Ladbroke Church. A land drain had been severed. Press has repaired and improved the drain and road.

Workmen in an unmarked van were witnessed grass cutting on April 1st. It was assumed that this was the Council's annual cut. However, there is now some mystery as to who carried out the work, as the Council do not mow until mid season. Elsa Greenway is investigating.

The accounts were presented, signed and accepted, and have been forwarded for auditing. Ladbroke Parish Council has never budgeted for a surplus, but will have to reconsider this now, to allow for unforseen circumstances, street lighting, elections etc.

A letter was received from Lloyds Bank Southam, notifying a change in its status as from July 13. Counter facilities will still be available, but all administrative and accounting work will be done in Leamington.

Permission was granted for the pruning of Yew trees at The Cottage, but the Parish Council advised that this is undertaken by a professional tree surgeon. Bishops Itchington Parish Council wrote, expressing concern at the amount of new housing and asking for support. This was discussed, but no action taken. Permission was granted for a new bottle store at the Bell Inn.

The Area Meeting of the Association of Town & Parish Councils on April 1st was well attended and worthwhile. Warwickshire County Council had put in a team of officers and councillors to field questions. Mrs Grainger questioned the Youth & Community worker. Could Ladbroke Youth County became affiliated and thereby receive extra

funds? This raised discussion as to the continued existence of the Youth Group when Linda Doyle finishes in September, particularly as Southam now no longer has its own Youth Worker.

A letter was received from Mrs Winkfield expressing concern about the grass erosion in front of Hall Farm. This was referred to Warwickshire County Council. The footpath volunteer group were reported to be working well. The ground outside the pumping station in Bridge Lane is continually flooded. Mr Timms is taking action. Mr Timms is also keeping a watchful eye on the areas of road repaired and improved by Press. New roof slates are required at the new pumping station. It was noted that the signpost on the new roundabout at Southam had been corrected to read LADBROKE, not LADBROOKE.

The next Parish Council Meeting will be held on May 20th at 7pm. The Annual Parish Meeting will be at 8pm.

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
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
