


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
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FROM THE RECTOR

There are many Christians, who fortunately still continue to take Lent seriously and consequently the devotional life of the Church is enriched as well as the devotional life of each individual Christian. It is a pity that most of us do not place the same importance upon Advent, but instead get caught up with all the hassle and the anticipation of Christmas. I think it was unwise of the Church, not intentionally of course, to muddle up Advent and Christmas and put wrong ideas into our heads before the time by referring to 'The Sundays before Christmas' in the A.S.B. The season of Advent has something particularly to offer - it teaches us our need to wait upon God patiently and expectantly, joy mounting in our hearts as with a mother (and father too) as the time draws near to the birth of a child. It is fine for us to think of Mary and the thoughts which no doubt ran through her mind as Shepherds came and the Kings came, to gaze on the Child Jesus, but what of her prayers and thoughts beforehand. Advent encourages us to wait for the Lord Jesus coming into our hearts and lives, and the difference it can make as we learn from him. I know very well that that should be happening all the time, but during those few short weeks of Advent, it does seem to have a particular significance.

A few weeks ago, some of us went to the Priory of St. Mary, Burford. Burford, as you may know, is a very attractive small country town and right in the midst of it is this peaceful haven of holiness. There monks and nuns live in community under the Rule of St. Benedict. On their literature stall I came across a calendar of meditations entitled 'Cries of Advent' based on the Advent Antiphons, for each day of December leading up to Christmas Day. All these cries begin with the exclamation 'O', expressing a great yearning for the Lord Jesus to come to us in so many different ways, to shower upon us his many gifts, to save us from ourselves, to make us more alive to him and nearer to his liking. Traditionally there are usually seven or eight of these antiphons, which are sung both before and after the Magnificat. You can find the usual ones in the New English Hymnal number

503, beginning with the following one:

'O Wisdom, which camest out of the mouth of the Most High, and reachest from one and to another mightily and sweetly ordering all things, come and teach us the way of prudence'.

In this new series the original ones have been added to imaginatively and sensitively by a group of people - David Denny, Tessa Bielecki, Mary Robins and Tim Cotter. Just to give you a flavour of the new ones, I have chosen three (always a sound ecclesiastical number). I think they are all so good, it is difficult to know which to choose.

'O Morning Star, Spendour of Light Eternal, O Radiant Dawn, O Dayspring from on High, shining with the glory of the rainbow, come and waken us from the greyness of our apathy and renew in us your gift of hope'.

'O Swallow, capering and darting through the heavens, ending our winter when you build beneath our eaves, come, bird from paradise, small and powerless, invincible as the phoenix'.

'O Bright Sun of Justice, Judge of all the world, seeking to straighten what is crooked and put right what is wrong, come with dread power and stark mercy to our reluctant hearts'.

Advent will soon be here. Try to save a little time each day for stillness and quietness, so that you may experience this waiting upon God, by which Jesus ruled his life and through which the Lord will come to us and bring us to his side.

He too is a talented organist and musician with many years experience of Church Choirs elsewhere. Gordon has also given us much help in bringing together the augmented Choir and with other special services and events. To Gordon too we are enormously grateful.

HARBURY PARISH COUNCIL MEETING FOR SEPTEMBER 1992

Haswell's explained progress on the Sewers, assuring Cllrs that despite the Press Notices, Station Road would not be closed although HGVs and Buses would be rerouted whilst the temporary traffic lights were in action. The daytime complaints number was 614154.

Ed Wilson would discuss with Severn Trent the delay to the Affordable Homes scheme lack of sewerage was causing. The Cllrs agreed to employ a solicitor to negotiate the use of the Parish owned sewer across the Pound. By law they could be individually surcharged if they failed to maximise benefit from this village asset or sterilised the future use of this land.

Stratford gave permission for the diseased Ash at Harbury House to be felled. The Parish had no objections to plans for a porch at 63 Mill Street, or the work at Baker Thornicroft's in Chapel St.

Following a site meeting with the county it has been agreed to extend the waiting restrictions on the eastern side of Chapel St. down to the Gamecock. The Planning Officer's attention would be drawn to

the inadequate plans submitted for extra rooms in the roof of a detached house on Tom Hauley's cottage garden in Mill St. The original application had been strongly opposed on the grounds that the access was dangerous and Sharon Hancock pointed out that a larger house was likely to generate even more traffic.

Cllrs would visit 16 Vicarage Lane to see for themselves the barn attached to the Listed No. 14. Mr. Gill, who lectured them on structural engineering, wants permission for demolition and the erection of a house.

The new lighting column is up in Dovehouse Lane but is not yet lit. The contract for maintenance of village lights has transferred to the County and the Car Park lighting is now included. Work would be undertaken in the Car Park to tidy up or turf over the shrub beds. The grass area would be added to the Contractor's schedule.

Keith Thompson affirmed that the Club highly recommended the contractor who resurfaced the Tennis Courts.

Keith's survey into the state of the village footpaths was highly commended and Cllrs agreed to inspect their own area prior to recommendations to the County on action. Conducting the survey from the saddle Keith became painfully aware of a number of potholes in the road and reported them to the Clerk.

She would write to the County Highways for advice on traffic calming and ask the Police if someone was available to go into the school and give the children a talk on road safety. Cllr Hancock remembered the village once supported a Tufty Club. Someone mentioned the Jolly Green Giant but Midge Keen pointed out that was a vegetable!

Keith Thompson warned that the School Roll, now 218, was continuing to fall, but what could Cllrs do about that?

At the last month's Parish Council Meeting the recommendations of the Finance Working Party were discussed. In addition to normal increases in expenditure we wish to provide substantial funds towards the provision of Play Equipment in conjunction with Hopscotch. As this would involve a sizeable increase in the part of the Community Charge paid to the Parish Council (although there has been no increase for the last 5 years), it was felt that the parishioners ought to be given the opportunity to make their views known. Therefore a Parish Meeting has been called for WEDNESDAY 25 NOVEMBER 1992 AT 7.30 PM to be held in the TOM HAULEY ROOM behind the Church.

Our next meeting is on Tuesday 17th November 7.30pm in the Tom Hauley Room when there will be an illustrated talk on Badgers, which everyone is welcome to attend.

Now it may appear that the Society has not been busy since the Windmill Opening, which was our last public event, but in fact rather a lot has been going on, especially in the Planning sphere.

Incredibly the Parish Council did not take up the opportunity the District Council gave them, to object to the proposed removal of THE TOP TWENTY FEET of the Yew Tree at the Mill Street/Back Lane corner.

The Society has objected on the grounds that this tree is in a prominent position, and makes an important contribution to the street scene. We have recently lost trees in a similar way at Binswood End and in Farm Street. It seems that whenever a house changes hands surveyors treat trees as a threat and order their removal. Or where new houses are built the Road Planners demand so many existing trees and shrubs are cut down, as has happened on the Pirie Close development, that the new has no chance to lend with the old.

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

The Parish Council seems stumped for ideas to produce Traffic Calming and so prevent accidents. The Harbury Society will be researching the problem in the next few months, but if you have any ideas please let me know.

HARBURY HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY

The first gathering for the new season was well attended. Brian Cook from Moreton Morrell gave a talk on colour in the autumn garden. He not only used the usual orange and red colours, but broadened the scope of colours with greens and purples of plants and flowers as a foil for the autumn shades. Plants turn colour because of the lower temperatures and lower light levels which autumn brings. Where a plant is sited will determine the intensity of the colour.

Many of the autumn coloured plants do not like wind, but like to be protected. Acers are associated with autumn colour and display magnificent colours when set against a backdrop of greens.

Instead of visiting the garden centres in spring Mr Cook suggested that now is the time to look for your plants and shrubs in the garden in order to see the autumn colours, which we tend to forget to do. Mr Cook displayed an abundance of plants, tree and shrub cuttings all with autumn colour, and the autumn fruits.

Our November meeting will be the A.G.M. Please think about joining the Committee. The annual subscription of £1 is now due for eight talks, one party and discounts for seeds and at garden centres. This is excellent value. If you haven't already received a seed catalogue and would like one, ring Ann Glaze (613287)

NOVEMBER IN THE GARDEN

Beds and borders should now have been tidied up or forked over. Remove dead leaves which have collected in the crowns of perennial plants such as paeonies, they attract slugs. They should also be removed from troughs and raised beds which should be given a fresh mulch of rough grit.

Plant bare rooted roses in large well prepared holes, laying the roots and stems against one side to give the roots plenty of room. Prune back tall roses by half to prevent wind rock. Water house plants sparingly using rain water for azaleas and other lime haters.

Pep up your used Grow bags with a general fertiliser and sew with winter lettuce. Keep in the greenhouse. Plant up some parsley or keep a pot on the kitchen window sill to use during the winter.

Start winter pruning of apples and pears - and if you can get onto the soggy mass, winter digging!

To encourage the tits to seek our over-wintering pests, hang up plenty of fat for them, apparently after eating that, they need the protein which aphids etc. provide - it's worth a try!

If your pond is near trees you must clean it out thoroughly after leaf fall. The debris is toxic to fish if the pond freezes over.

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
