


### FROM THE RECTOR

You may have heard by now that I am retiring at the end of November and moving away from Harbury soon afterwards. Retirement in the Church of England has to follow strict procedures, which may seem a little harsh and somewhat abrupt, but must be adhered to. Thus whilst plans and arrangements are being made, where to go and when to go, secrecy is observed and when the decision has been reached, the first step is to suddenly make an announcement to the congregation of what is going to happen. Once that has been done, then the Bishop sends me the retirement document, on which I undertake to 'irrevocably' resign the living and this has to be witnessed. Then the official procedures begin not only for my departure, but also for the appointment of my successor. It is not a very pleasant exercise, but retirement now in the Church of England is obligatory and it has to be faced at some time or other. At one time there was no set age and a priest could go on, if he so desired, until he died. He could not forcibly be removed as long as he continued to provide the statutory services or was not immoral. Nowadays normally you retire round about the age of 65 if you are a priest, and if a bishop, you are permitted to go on to 70. I suppose it makes good sense, whether you like it or not, and here at Harbury and Ladbroke, the time has come when the Rector should be a younger man. 7

At the time of writing I have just completed 37 years since my Ordination. I have been extremely fortunate in the parishes in which I have served and I have not been one for popping in and out of parishes for short periods. I happen to believe that provided you fit into a parish fairly well, it is better to stay a reasonable time and come to terms thoroughly with all the needs of ministry in that place and what is of prime importance get to know the people there. A large part of my ministry has been in Coventry, so that until I came to Harbury and Ladbroke all my experience was urban. First I was curate in a huge parish with an excellent and dedicated Parish Priest who believed in working me hard. It did me no harm and trained me well to later take over quite a sizeable parish of my own. There I remained for nearly a quarter of a century and prevented myself from getting stale by helping to train a succession of young men in their first curacies. Again I was most fortunate in them and all the people who worked with in that parish to make it a thriving and me progressive church. Eventually I decided that I needed a change and no doubt they did and I thought it would be wise to have a definite contrast in my ministry from urban to rural, and in that way I came to Harbury and Ladbroke. Of course the view in Coventry was that 'poor old chap' he had gone into the country to take life more easily in his declining years - in fact someone actually said 'Oh I thought you had retired'. Little did they know about Harbury and about Ladbroke and probably would have doubted that it has been for me just as vigorous and demanding as any other part of my ministry. What I would say is that I have been profoundly grateful for all I have learned and discovered in the years I have been here and I would not have missed it for the world. That is behind. We have been extremely happy in Harbury and in Ladbroke and we have the people of those two villages to thank for that.

However the time for a change has come and I am sure that there will be no difficulty in finding a new young Rector who will come in and with great enthusiasm and freshness do some of the things which I would have liked to have done, but not managed to do. He will be a fortunate man and I am sure you will welcome him with the same openness, generosity and friendship, which you afforded me when I came.

May God bless you all and further the work of the Gospel in thse two parishes.

### OUTLOOK WARM

The good news at the September meeting of Harbury Parochial Church Council was that the new boiler will be installed and commissioned by the beginning of October when church heating is normally restored for the winter. This is a £10,000 project forced on the PCC by total breakdown of the old boiler at a time when the church was already involved in a costly programme of restoration, still only half completed. The Rector expressed thanks to all who had made voluntary donations towards the cost of the new boiler.

It was a case of gain one, lose three, as the welcome to Deane Ingram was followed later by three resignations. Sadly Brian and Lesley Jones are leaving Harbury for Wakefield when Brian, still with the Probation Service, is to serve as welfare officer to the Civil Division Court. And we heard with regret that Bill Davies finds the demands of his job and PCC meetings incompatible.

The first £500 of the proceeds of this year's Christmas Fayre on Sat. Dec. 6th are to be donated to the relief of famine through the 'Africa in Crisis' Charity appeal. The balance will be used to continue the work of repairing the church roof.

It was heartening to hear that the Diocese has done some hard pruning in preparing next year's budget; even so, parishes still face a 10.15% increase, but this is 2.35% less than this year's increase.

'Faith in the Countryside', the report of the Archbishops' Commission on Rural Areas, is to be the main item on the agenda of the PCC half-day conference on Nov. 14th from 1.30pm to 5pm.

From the end of summer-time on Sun. Oct. 25th, Evensong will begin at 4pm, repeating the arrangement introduced last year.

### HARBURY PARISH COUNCIL MEETING FOR AUGUST

A depleted Parish Council outnumbered by pensioners out to ensure they received their gift of travel tokens again this year was rocked by the news that Chris MacGowan was moving to Essex.

They had been goaded by Hopscotch to approach four contractors to quote for new Children's Play Equipment and were horrified to find that dog-proof fencing would cost almost £1,500.

Their National Association advised against giving away rights to use the sewer across the Pound without payment and a clear contract limiting its use.

They are under growing pressure from residents to address the problem of traffic calming and the poor state of the pavements but they refused to listen to any more representations about the positioning of the Dovehouse Lane lamp, having made a decision they would stick to it! Brian Teuton for Sewer Engineers Haswells explained that work was due to start on 7th Dec. and last 36 weeks. Work would begin at 7.30am and continue 5 days a week to 6pm with the possibility of extra time and Saturday working. His number is 0850 344654.

SDC gave permission for a Conservatory at Kingston House, a temporary Clubhouse at Bishop Bowl, remedial work on the trees off Butt lane and granted a new access to the land to the north. They refused a detached house behind Co-op terrace.

The Parish Council deleted the Old Bakery from their agenda but left on file Harbury Hall where enforcement action was pending. They will attempt to have the long-standing minerals permissions around the village revoked.

### NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

After many months of low incidence of crime in this village recent weeks have brought a very large and unwelcome increase.

There have been 4 attacks on pubs and 3 on the Rugby Club, the last a particularly vicious one when, as there was nothing available to steal, much wanton damage was done. Also a car and a caravan have been stolen and there have been several thefts from house and cars.

Most of my information comes from the Neighbourhood Watch Information Desk at Stratford - upon-Avon Police Station via their computer. I only get exact details when commercial premises are involved but not for private locations which makes it more difficul for us to provide any follow up advice.

But what advice can we give? Much of it is repetition but by no means universally observed.

- Do fit decent door locks and window locks and always lock your car;
- Do let your co-ordinator or near neighbour know when you are going away. If someone is then seen coming from your house with a TV or Video, it is not a service man but a thief;
- At home or in the car do keep portable valuables out of sight;
- 4. Do keep your car in a garage if you have one and do not leave valuables in a caravan.
- 5. Do consider <u>postal coding</u>. Pens giving marking under ultra violet light are not expensive and available from a good stationer. Where jewellery is too small for this take a photographic record. The police do find caches of stolen goods and keep a watch on boot sales which are the popular way of disposing of stolen goods.
- Do lock garden tools in a secure shed or garage. They are just what a thief wants to force open your patio doors.
- 7. Do phone the police if you see any suspicious actions. They would rather investigate some false alarms than miss an arrest.
- 8. And a new one! If you are between 18½ and 50 and of either sex, but with no crime record, and willing to give 4 hours per month, you could be a "special" and relieve the police of many

routine duties such as crowd or traffic control, leaving them free for more important duties. We all know that they are overstretched. At present the Southam area has only 2 but Alcester which is much the same size has 20!

The police tell us that 80% of crime is committed by teenagers and younger children. If parents want to avoid procreation becoming a social crime they should I suggest, try to ensure that their children have a useful and interesting hobby.

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

### THE GARDEN IN OCTOBER

If you need oxygenating plants for your pond, ring Mrs. Spindler 613880, and she can put you in touch with a local supply which will otherwise go to wast But do it quickly!

Cut down on water for house plants. Most cacti and succulents need very little during the winter. Plant prepared hyacinth bulbs now, if they are to flower in time for Christmas. Keep them in the dar until the shoots are at least 1½" clear of the bulb

Prune back climbing & rambler roses, lightly prune conifers and trim fast growing hedges.

Plant up tubs with bulbs and spring bedding such as primroses and polyanthus. Rake and spike the lawn to airate it. Use a moss killer if necessary. Giv it a final mow.

Underlay alpines with a thick layer of grit for winter protection, and cover silver leaved varieties with a pane of glass. They hate too much wet.

Clear away vegetables which have finished cropping, but leave in the ground pea and bean roots, they

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add nitrogen to the soil. Plant early cropping broad beans such as 'Sutton' also onion sets. Pick and store late apples. Keep in a cool place, watch out for mice!

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
