

At Evensong, the night before the Parish Holiday to Bavaria began, we considered several prayers which various people over the centuries have written about travelling. One of them was written by a bishop called Serapion in the first half of the 4th Century. He was the Bishop of Thmeis in the Nile delta and a close friend of St. Athanasius and St. Anthony. It is quite simple.

O Lord we beseech you for those who are travelling from home Grant them an angel of peace as their fellow traveller that they may receive no hurt from anyone - that they may finish their voyage and their travel with much cheerfulness.

Certainly our journey not only finished with cheer-fulness, but cheerfulness accompanied us all the way and not only that, we were blessed with a remarkable sense of peace and restfulness. The kilometres on some days seemed endless, yet each night found us calm and if tired, nonetheless content and happy. We passed many hours in beautiful surroundings amongst the mountains and beside gentle lakes, and visiting many attractive cities with majestic buildings and intriguing histories.

As we were away for two Sundays, we gave some thought worship and on two occasions we had the opportunity to hold a service together. The first was in a most attractive little church, just up the hill from the hotel in which we stayed at Berchtesgaden (I say just up the hill - it was either direct up 180 steps or round a steep winding road). A young German woman who acted as Sacristan opened up the church for us and went out of her way to make us welcome. She prepared the vessels, the chalice and paten they use at each service, providing wine and wafers. She not only put out all the vestments for me, but she put them on me. We could not have been better received. It was a very beautiful church, immaculately kept and dedicated to St. Maria au Berg (St. Mary on the mountain). The Reredos was quite splendid and very ornate, decked with masses and masses of fresh flowers. The second Sunday we were required to start the long trek home leaving Bremm in the Mosel at 5.30am and thus there was no possibility of a service that day. So we arranged a service the day before - It happed to be the day the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary was celebrated. On this occasion we had no church available to us, so the hotel allowed us to use part of the dining room. It was a very different setting to St. Maria au Berg, but as we gathered round the table, there was a wonderful atmosphere in its simplicity and a great sense of holiness as we celebrated the Communion.

As we look back on this holiday and recall the many thrilling places we have seen and remember the highlights of the days we enjoyed together, surely those two rich experiences of worship will stand out for us, as two of the most important and most inspiring. It reminds me as I think about it all, of the final prayer we heard before our travels began. This prayer of Boethius, a Roman statesman and philosopher.

O Father, give the spirit power to climb to the fountain of all light and be purified. Break through the mists of earth, the weight of the clod. Shine forth in splendour, thou that art calm weather and quiet resting place for faithful souls. To see thee is the end and the beginning. Thou carriest us and thou dost go before - thou art the journey and the journey's end.

From about Easter time a book was placed in the Library for everyone to write messages. If anyone missed it, please let me know, and I will make it available, though I would like to hand it over early in the new term.

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

LIBRARY SERVICES TO RURAL HOUSEBOUND ELDERLY/DISABLED

Warwickshire County Library and Age Concern Warwickshire have joined together to provide books, tapes and information to elderly and disabled people in rural areas of the county.

Through a regular van delivery service maintained by trained volunteers they will be able to provide a range of services direct to the reader. The new service will commence towards the end of September this year. It will be open to all elderly and disabled people who are unable to use traditional library services and do not have any friends or relations able or willing to help them.

"We have for many years provided housebound services through library staff and voluntary agencies but these have been mainly town based," said Desmond Heaps for the County Library Service. "This new and exciting project gives us the opportunity at last to visit elderly and disabled people in rural areas."

"I welcome the opportunity which this new partnership brings", said Elizabeth Phillips, Chief Officer for Age Concern Warwickshire.

BACK TO SCHOOL NEW TERM FOR HEAD LICE?

Is this a true statement? Head Lice are very common in children but also in adults. They love clean hair so what can be done to eliminate these small pests?

Regular head inspection of the whole family are a must. Hair should be brushed and combed at least twice a day. Combing damages the louse and then it cannot breed. Prevention detection and treatment should be carried out a home.

Tell-tale signs

Has anyone in your family been scratching their hearecently? Head Lice and "Nits", as the white egg cases ar often called, can be found at home by vigilent parents Lice droppings like a fine black powder and dead louse skin can be found on pillows and shirt collars. Like most

insects the louse sheds its skin as it grows.

You may notice the eggs which are laid and glued onto the hair shaft near the scalp. Use a fine detector comb. Lice will then drop onto a piece of white paper so then you can see them. They are tiny brown creatures as big as a pin head. They DO NOT HOP OR FLY they SIMPLY WALK FROM HEAD TO HEAD. In order to kill both lice and eggs the correct lotion must be applied to the dry hair and remain on the hair for 12 hours. Then the hair can be combed and shampooed.

STRATEGY FOR HEAD LICE

1. Regular home head inspections of the whole family.

2. Comb hair at least twice a day.

- 3. If infected treat your whole family immediately with appropriate lotion.
- 4. Inform school and school friends so that lice can be prevented from spreading further.

SEVERN TRENT AND THE SEWER SAGA

To deal with problems in the sewerage system Severn Trent is to install larger pipes and reline some of the old ones. A resident engineer for the Contractors, Haswells, will be based at offices to the rear of the Great Western (0850 344654).

Close examination of the plans displayed by Severn Trent at the recent exhibition revealed that Vicarage Lane and Constance Drive have been added to the Sewer Refurbishment Scheme.

Severn Trent now hope that the work will start in the autumn, but they also acknowledge that the treatment works at Deppers Bridge is at capacity. Planning applications for Harbury, Ladbroke and Bishops Itchington are being opposed by the company on the grounds that any more development would overload the system.

The Southam Scheme, to improve the Treatment Works there, is planned to go ahead in 1997, when it will "relieve" the Deppers Bridge plant. In the meanwhile it appears that low-cost homes for locals will be delayed. All the young people can do is to expess their fingers, and everything else

Saturday 12th September will see many people busy in the Village Hall. Will you be amongst them?

Why?

Because it's the Village Show.

Here are a few guide lines as to what the judges look for.

Vegetables, Flowers, Fruit - fresh, flawless, even.

Unless the schedule specifies otherwise, simply clean them, leave the stalks on and arrange your entry neatly on a plate, or in a vase or on the show bench. Make sure you have the correct number and/or size. For example pickling shallots should pass through a 1" ring. Roses should not be fully blown nor in tight bud. There are novice classes for vegetables and flower arranging so why not make a start there.

Cookery, Preserves, Wine - flavour, colour, shape, uniformity. No cooling rack marks on top surfaces. Small cakes can be baked in bun tins or paper cases. A Victoria sandwich has raspberry jam filling and the top sprinkled with caster sugar. The family cake should have a slightly domed top and a crack is acceptable. Savoury scones are cut with a plain cutter and glazed. Jars and bottles should be clear polished glass and the labels state contents and date of making. Jams should be sealed with twist tops, absolutely plain, or cellophane. Craft - technique and workmanship scores majority of the points with design and colour use next. Canvas work is any stitchery or applied work on canvas. Mounted and glazed is acceptable. A piece of embroidery will have the back looked at. Yarns must be appropriate for the pattern and seams neat and flat with ends worked in.

SEPTEMBER IN THE GARDEN

Cuttings of bedding fuchsias can be taken now, potted in compost and put in a garden frame. Reduce the height of herbaceous plants which have finished flowering but not too drastically. Clean away and compost spent annuals. Protect later blooming chrysanthemums. Any indoor plants which have been "summering" out of doors must be brought in before there is danger of frost. Delicate alpines should be shielded from Winter damp. By the end of the month cyclamen

gloxinia dried off. Lift and store gladioli.

Ripen onions, feed leeks, lift and store carrots and beetroots, lift maincrop potatoes. Earth up celery, gradually pick all outdoor tomatoes. Clear out greenhouse variety.
