


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
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CHURCH WIRED FOR SECURITY

Harbury Church has saved £376 because the first company chosen by the Parochial Church Council to install a dual alarm and security lights system for the church and Tom Hauley Room could not do it within the required time-scale. Young Alarms, the company finally awarded the contract, put in a lower tender of £1,530. Installation work was completed in early November.

Because of the church's resident bat colony, the revised specification insisted on a 'bat-compatible' system to prevent false-alarms. However, complete security depends on the willingness of neighbours to alert keyholders in the event of an alarm.

The ROC (Roof, Organ, Clock) appeal committee, spearheaded by Harry and Joyce Windsor, was formally adopted by the PCC on November 2. This step regularises insurance cover under the church policy for ROC events, and provides for reclamation of income tax on four-year covenants or individual giftaid donations of £250 or more given specifically for the appeal.

The generosity of Canon Antony Rowe in leaving his piano in the care of the PCC for continued use in the church was recorded. The PCC will write to him expressing its appreciation. In his letter making the loan the former Rector added that he wished to retain an option to repossess the piano if required. Itwas agreed to keep the instrument in good condition and insured, and to have it tuned at regular intervals.

Crusaders continues to appeal and numbers remain high. More adult helpers are still required to enable the range of activities to be extended. There are plans for a special Crusaders' event at Christmas.

Southam Deanery, which embraces Harbury, has told the Diocese that it strongly opposes any further cuts in the number of parish clergy. The increased financial burden that will fall on parishes from next year is becoming clearer. This year Southam Deanery parishes were required to contribute £76,000 to the Diocese. In future, with 10 stipendiary clergymen, they could expect to have to find up to £200,000. John Algar Harbury Helpline - are needing more donations of clothes for young children, particularly for young babies and children up to 3 years. If you have any spare clothes to give us, and they are in good condition, would you please ring Mary Catt on 612864.

SATURDAY COFFEE MORNINGS

About 5 years ago we started fundraising to provide money for the building and furnishing of a Church room. The idea was formed that <u>perhaps</u> we could sell coffee and maybe cakes and jam in the Wight School every Saturday morning. It was viewed with suspicion by some and enthusiasm by others and before long we had a group of people who would be prepared to give up an occasional Saturday morning to this end. We thought we had done really well if we raised £30. At the end of 18 months the coffee mornings had raised about £2,000 and the Tom Hauley Room had been built - therefore our task was finished.

At this point it was decided to move it to the Tom Hauley Room and to allow people to raise money for charities or groups of their choice. I thought you would be interested to know that this year from April 24th to Nov. 6th £2,650.84p has been raised for many different causes including local groups -Play Groups, Scouts, W.I., Netball Club, Senior Citizens Support Group, Church Groups and other charities such as Myton Hospice, McGregor Ward at Warwick Hospital, Ratley Church, Ladbroke Church, British Heart Foundation, Guide Dogs for the Blind and many others.

The Society met on 4th November to hear a talk by John Lambert entitled "The Work of a Magistrate". John said he was always interested in law and

initially had a desire to join the police force. He gave a brief biography of his working life until he volunteered to take early retirement from the Waterboard in 1983 to become a magistrate.

He gave a brief history from the 13th Centuary when the first 600 magistrates were set up in the reign of Edward II. There are now 30,000 magistrates comprising of people from all walks of life, 60% are men, 40% are women. Of the 1.9 million cases per year 1.4 million are dealt with in the magistrate's courts.

The talk was extremely interesting, informative, humorous and prompted many questions.

MOTHERS' UNION

The work of the Young Homeless Project was the subject of our speaker, Ms Sue Wald, at our afternoon meeting in November. The Y.H.P. help young people by referring them to hostels or private accommodation. They also provide emergency overnight places with volunteer families (the "Nightstop" scheme) and more permanent help in supported accommodation. In their first year the YHP dealt with 120 young people who were either sleeping-out or moving from one friend's house to another, in addition to many other enquiries almost all from young people from the Leamington area. We found this a very interesting talk from a good speaker. Instead of an evening meeting, members visited the Body Shop where we saw slides of their work. This includes collecting ingredients, and helping workers in various countires. We then watched a make-up demonstration on a volunteer, and bought some Christmas presents.

Our next meeting is on December 1st, when Mrs. C.Reid will talk on "Countdown to Christmas". There is no evening meeting in December.


Thank you to all who helped and supported the annual Bonfire which raised £108. A very big and special thanks to Tom Sheasby for allowing us to use his field for the occasion.

LADBROKE HISTORY

At last after five years of collectiong information together, I have managed to produce the first of a series of history booklets on Ladbroke. The proceeds from sales to go towards All Saints Church and Ladbroke Village Hall.

Passing through the greedy hands of some of England's most famous men, Ladbroke had little chance of slumbering peacefully in its Medieval years.

The de Lqdbroke family, 300 years Lords of the Manor since Domesday, resided in the Manor House in Farmyard Field alongside All Saints Church. The lumps, bumps, mounds and hollows, still visible, remind us of the original Manor House, fishponds and surrounding cottages, grazed constantly by sheep and horses since their demolition in the 17th century by the Palmer family; the last Lords of the Manor.

Farmyard Field; one of many parcels of land used to secure power and politics at the expense of the village peasants.

"MEDIEVAL LADBROKE" is a 24 page booklet with photographs, the first in a series following the village from William the Conquerer to young Prince William.

LADBROKE PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

I wasn't able to attend personally the Nov. meeting, but have gleaned information about what went on, from those who were there on the night!

The Council had to anticipate its expenditure for the next financial year, and after some discussion it was agreed to request a total of £2,000 so that a considerable grant could be made to help maintain our Village Hall. Planning wise the alterations to the "school house" and to "21 Ladbroke Hall", had been approved. Mr. Peter Williamson was re-elected to serve on the Alibone Trust Committee as a noneclesiatical member for the next three years.

D.C. Mrs. Tressider said that the development in Hedges field was likely to be some years in the future, due to the slow movement of the various authorities. It was unlikely that plans would be available before the spring.

Pc Pete Perry said that changes in his beat were being considered and it seemed possible his area would become geographically smaller, giving him an opportunity to extend his duties locally.

The Clerk was asked to write expressing dismay and alarm at the proposed suggestion by W.C.C. to close the fire stations in Fenny Compton and Tysoe. The Parish Council were alerted to the possibility that our district area could change from Stratford to Rugby; they were to make their views known at the next meeting.

The left hand pavement on the dangerous bend had been listed for repairs; and the continuing bad state of Upper Radbourne Lane, was now in need of attention. W.C.C. had been contacted and had said that they would contact the E.M.I. who were responsible for some of the damage.

A complaint had been received concerning the state of the barn wall opposite the function of School Lane. The Clerk was asked to write to ask W.C.C. to inspect and if necessary repair it, as it was likely to collapse on to the road and pathway.

Councillor Mrs. Crainger reported the poor state of Harbury lane and it was agreed to put the matter on the next agenda.

There is no meeting in December, the next one will be held on the 19th January at 7.45pm in the V.Hall. If there is any matter you would like discussed, please let your Councillors or Parish Clerk know in plenty of time.

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HARBURY PARISH COUNCIL MEETING FOR OCTOBER DEFERRED TO NOVEMBER

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The PC has a £10,000 windfall from the sewer easement. If it is not used this year half has to be invested. They are buying a wordprocessor for the Clerk and inviting parishioners to suggest what else it could be spent on.

Vikki Holroyd recently masterminded the halfterm arts event with a West African Drumming Band. Although it attracted grant aid there was a deficit and she asked the PC to provide the final £200. Sharon Hancock thought the event very worthwhile, but John Hunt said the PC was being asked to contribute after the event. Much went on that was worthwhile but the PC should not be asked to pick up the pieces. There must be a policy on what would be supported.

He recommended the PC did not make a donation to the Hereburgh Morris trip to Germany or to the Church Organ, Roof and Clock Fund, and took as a compliment the jest that he would have to answer to St. Michael.

Midland Red were asked to accept a voucher scheme for pensioners travel. The PC did not want to restrict the choice of carrier but they did not want to issue tokens that were not used.

Steve Norman's Bus Shelter design for Deppers would cost £200 compared to £2,500 quoted by manufacturers. Pc Pete Perry and the Highways Department would discuss ways of preventing dangerous overtaking in the hamlet.

Stratford granted renewal of permission for a temporary dwelling at the Quarries; change of use to offices for the upper storey of the Co-Op; and a pitched roof to a storeroom at 11 South Parade. They refused a double garage and extension at 26 Ivy Lane.

The PC had no observation to make on an application for a Conservatory to the rear of 15 Farm Street; conversion of a guest house at Sharmer Farm; an extension to 3 Vicarage Lane, or retrospective permission for a garden wall to the rear of 23 Mill St. They were concerned about access problems at 11 Farm St.; and plans to fell trees in the garden of 4 Pirie Close. They discussed the design brief for the Local Plan development behind of South Parade. Stratford District had taken Enforcement at Flax Hill Farm over the erection of earth bunding. The Enforcement Officer would investigate complaints about development at 4 Park Lane.

Ken Stephenson complained about the reinstatement of roads following the sewer scheme. He believed the County made a commitment to resurfacing them at the public meeting, but his colleagues reminded him the meeting was held by Severn Trent. It was their commitment not the County's.

Ken's colleagues were concerned that the erection of a public seat in memory of Tim Percival was being held up by the delay in deciding where the access to the Play Area should go.

Ken Stephenson wanted Low-Cost housing to remain on the Council's agenda but someone else should work on the project.

There was much discussion on possible sites for a Bowling Green. The Chairman Ed Wilson had been very active, engineering a meeting with landowner Mr.Price but to no avail. Ivy Lane, the Wight School, the Rugby Club and the Playing Fields were all suggested and rejected.

Schools re-organisation and the change in age of transfer would mean that Harbury School would lose a class and £15,000 from its budget. A public meeting in February would discuss the proposals. County Cllr Mrs. Bidwell (now Mrs. Collett) said the money saved would be ploughed back into education. John Hunt welcomed the proposals on economic grounds.

At the Area Parish Councils' meeting at Ufton on policing John Drinkwater argued that Harbury should have its own resident officer. Police houses in Harbury, Bishops and Long Itchington were standing empty.

Pc Pete Perry said it was likely the Southam area would be serviced from Leamington to cut down on response times and it would be officially acknowledged that his beat was too bit!

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£10,000 to spend on the village - Any Ideas ???

Many parishioners will already be aware that early this year the PC had a £10,000 "windfall", by way of a payment from Berkeley Homes for permission to cross PC land to make a sewerage connection. Government rules define this payment as a capital receipt. That's a bit of jargon meaning the receipt must either be used to repay debt, (the PC hasn't got any), invested or applied to defray expenditure of a capital nature; broadly that means the acquisition, replacement or improvement of its assets.

It CANNOT be used to meet the Council's day to day expenses, NOR to reduce future years Council Tax precepts.

It is unlikely that there will be too many similar windfalls so the Council felt that is possible it should be used to finance a project which would be of lasting benefit to the whole community. Attempts to acquire for recreational purposes all or part of the Paddock next to the Church have unfortunately proved unsuccessful. Before considering alternative uses, the PC decided to invite suggestions from parishioners for spending this money provided it is within the Council's legal powers.

So, if you have any bright (and practical) ideas on how amenities could be improved please in writing let Alison Hodge, Clerk to the Council, 36 Binswood End, know by no later than 31 December 1993. If there is nothing that the PC believes would command immediate general support, the money will remain invested until such time as a suitable opportunity presents itself.

HARBURY SOCIETY

Let's talk trees. Tree week has just finished and the planting season extends, weather permitting until the spring. We need more trees to replace the losses we have suffered over the last ten to 20 years.

The most devastating losses were through Dutch Elm Disease because so many mature trees died in such a short time, but we are continuing to lose important specimens one at a time, and the cumulative effect is just as bad.

A very worrying development is the insistance of Building Societies and Insurers that new occupiers remove trees which are close to their property, even when there is no evidence that they are damaging the building. We have lost several important trees through this over-cautious attitude, most notable the espaliered pear in South Parade and a Centuries old Yew Tree in Farm Street. Now the Old Yew at Fairview House, Vicarage Lane is under threat.

The tree is covered by a Tree Preservation Order and permission has to be sought before any work is undertaken. All trees within the Conservation Area are similarly protected. Go out and look about you. It is surprising quite how many trees we still have within the village and what an important contribution they make to the feeling that this is a rural village and not a suburb.

Trees add height and greenery, they soften the view, give movement and a constant reminder of the changing seasons. Many of those we still have once stood in the fields and along the lanes and record Harbury's agricultural past. They have a cultural as well as a landscape significance. When the existing oaks, beeches, ashes, sycamores, hawthorns, hollies, limes, chestnuts, yews, larches, willows and walnuts have gone we will still have trees but they will be the smaller, ornamental exotics common in town gardens everywhere, not the towering giants of the past.

You can help by planting some of the smaller British native trees like Field Maple, Wild Cherry, Hazel, Crab Apple, Silver Birch, Goat Willow, Guelder Rose, Dogwood, Spindle, Wayfaring Tree and Elder. They are suitable for the average garden and support a wide variety of wildlife. (Purists would grow their Own saplings from the seeds of local specimens.) Forest trees are best for public open spaces where they get the room they need.



RURAL REMINISCENCE IN WARWICKSHIRE

Throughout the winter of 1993/94, older people will be able to participate in a project which will record and preserve memories and experiences of past rural life in the county.

The project is being run as part of Warwickshire Libraries, "Celebration of Rural Life", arts activities for 1993-94 and the "European Year for Older People". From October the professional reminiscence worker, Grahame Edwards, will be interviewing older people in Warwickshire and compiling oral history tapes on a number of themes such as "Trade and Craft" and "Village Life". This material and similar material gathered by Shaun McCarthy, Writer in Residence, will be interpreted for use in reminiscence packs and thematic exhibitions using photographs, text mounted on boards and possibly artefacts. The exhibitions will tour the region's libaries, museums, hospitals, schools and care homes. The use of the packs will be promoted through a number of training sessions organised by Grahame for library staff, care workers and teachers. Co-operation between Warwickshire Libraries, the Museum Service and the County Records Office will ensure that the material forms a useful archive contributing to the social history of Warwickshire. A leaflet promoting the project and encouraging older people to share their memories of rural life will be available from early September.

DECEMBER IN THE GARDEN

Late summer flowering clematis, jackmanii & viticella hybrids, can be pruned this month. Cut back long shoots of roses to reduce windrock, but leave general pruning until March. Rake or sweep the lawn lightly, when dry, to spread worm casts and remove the last fallen leaves from flower beds, particularly from any rock plants.

Give thought to Christmas decorations from the garden in good time. Christmas roses, Helleborus Niger, are spoilt by bad weather so cover with Cloches while still in bud. Cut honesty before the 'silver' is exposed and winter jasmine and winter flowering viburnum several days in advance.

Bring bowls of bulbs into lighter conditions, a few at a time, but keep them cool until the buds are showing well. Christmas present plants also do not like hot dry conditions. Plenty of light and a cool place suits them best. Continue digging if conditions permit so as to get the maximum benefit from frost. Put cloches over hardy winter lettuce and some of the spring cabbage to get early crops.

Pick off and burn blackcurrant buds infested with big bud mite. By now bird feeding in the garden should be well established. Birds, like gardeners, have had a difficult year and need food badly. They will repay you amply by removing pests as well as providing constant interest.

When nothing can be done out of doors there is always the tidying of the garden shed!
