



We are delighted to announce that, at long last, we are to have a new Rector in these parishes. The Rev. Roy Brown is at present Vicar of Tysoe with Oxhill and Whatcote. His wife, Pam, is a Hospital Social Worker and they have three children, Claire (who is to be married in October), Helen and David.

Father Brown will, we hope, be able to take up his ministry here soon after mid-October, having given a suitable period of notice to his present parishes. The date of his Collation and Induction service is yet to be arranged.

This, of course is excellent news after what has been a long interregnum and we look forward to welcoming Father Brown and his family into the community.

We would like here to pay tribute to the wonderful help given to us during the interregnum so far by Father Peter Snow, without whom things would have been a great deal more difficult. Father Snow will continue to take services and give pastoral care to the villages during the remainder of the interregnum and we are tremendously grateful to him.

The builders are planning to start work very soon on the next phase of the roof repairs whilst, hopefully, the weather is suitable.

The report is enthusiastic about the instrument but advises that some immediate work is necessary and that over the next few years some $\pounds 20,000$ needs to be spent on it to return it to good order and to prevent further deterioration.

PRACTICAL HELP FOR THOSE IN NEED.

In Harbury there are several people who, without any fuss, take on the task of helping people abroad who are in great need. These efforts are not linked to each other but are individual commitments to a Christian concern for their 'neighbours'; each does what they can in their own way.

It is not intended to highlight all those involved in such endeavours here (inevitably, the most deserving of mention would be missed) but I would draw attention to a diary recently prepared - after some pestering from me - by John Eld. John has made a number of trips to Romania driving a truck (although neither trained nor until recently, experienced in such work) loaded with the various commodities which we take for granted but which are still virtually unobtainable in that country, on behalf of Siloam Christian Ministries of Learnington and I reproduce here just a few snippets from that diary:

"In the queue at Austrian customs (surly and unhelpful) we are behind ar Englishman who has been living in Cluj for a year and is importing a truck to help with his work (his sweater bore the legend:

"Special offer - eternal life - apply within").

By 4.30 we are sitting in the queue of trucks in no-man's-land. Here we are accosted by a Romanian begging food - it appears he has no visa to enter Austria and cannot return to Hungary. (Who will resolve the problem of such people?)......

At 3.40 we change drivers again but by 5.00 we are experiencing fuel flow problems and stop in a small lay-by. At this point it becomes apparent that neither of us are great mechanics and the truck seems strangely devoid of spanners etc. Nevertheless, we tilt the cab for a look. We are now praying hard and I ask if it is possible for a British truck to come and help. Some two minutes later, I sense someone walking round the rear of the trailer and when he speaks, I hear an Irish voice saying "do you fellers want some help?" Unseen by us, an Irish truck returning to the U.K. had seen us and drawn up on the opposite side. Mervyn Coulson and friend from Newtownards had a tool kit and knew what to do with it; changing the fuel filters for us. Two hours later we were on our way We then return to the children's hospital in Bucharest...once we are in, the director is at first afraid to let us unload without a ticket from customs. We telephone a contact, Adriana, for help; She'll be there in an hour. We are given coffee and then shown around the wards - there are children who suffer respiratory diseases, leukemia and other cancer related disorders. Some have been receiving treatment for six years or so. The Hospital although lacking facilities, seems clean and well run....." John's diary is on the table in church if you would like to see it. The object of

this piece is to convey that if you are in any way interested in such voluntary work there are a number of people around us who will give advice and encouragement. There may well be others who can illustrate far better than I similar 'adventures': please do.

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
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from Coventry's Salvation Army led the service and they were really a great credit, both to the Salvation Army and Coventry.

Ladbroke Parish Council Report

Concern had been expressed over areas of the village where the verges had not yet been cut back, this situation was particularly bad at the end of lower Windmill Lane and the Parish Council decided to write once again and request that this should be done. Planning wise, Mrs Kelsall at the Hall had been given permission to convert her garage, more details had been received for the planned extension at "Attwood Cottage" and plans had once again been submitted to convert the barns on Brian Moore's farm. The main item for consideration this month was undoubtedly the charming, if wayward goat Nelly, who has been tethered on the side of Lower Radbourne Lane for some months, thereby causing an obstruction, nuisance and hazard. Nelly has eaten her way through her surrounding vegetation, leaving the lane looking as it had been contaminated by Nuclear fallout. She has scratched and dented cars, prevented access to "Bell View Cottages", and dog walkers have to be brave indeed to try and make their way through the Radbourne Lane gate. What's going on in Village Farm field?

There has been a lot of activity in Village Farm field this week. The developers who plan to develop the site have paid for the Oxfor-Archeological Unit to spend a week in the field searching for evidence of ancient occupation. I went along, announced I was Press! and asked to see what they were up to. The diggers had dug four long trenches, gaps in the bedrock showed evidence of occupation on the site dating back t pre-Doomsday. There was evidence of Medieval quarrying for stone, bits of Medieval pottery had been found and several property boundaries, provin that centuries ago there were structures of some sort in the field. The un have now gone back to Oxford with their findings, but while they were in the village, they were interested to see the Medieval Fish ponds in farm yard fiel and may well be back one day to take a closer look at the ponds. Harbury Parish Council Meeting for May 1993

May was the time for the Parish Council's Annual Meeting, where the new Chairman is elected and this year the new Chairman elected was Eco Wilson.Retiring Chairman Bill Middleton wished him well and thanked his colleagues for their help during his four years in the position and was in his turn praised for his dedication to the job. Seats on the various sub-committees were allocated amongst the councillors and Ken Stephenson was elected Vice-Chairman to Ed.

The National Rivers Authority would not oppose six affordable homes to be connected to the mains when the Sewage Works at Southam was upgraded. Ec Wilson explained that the County Council was offering to sell the Parish some of the land used for Allotments. It was a very sensitive Matter. People who had allotments did not want to give them up.

Stratford District Council granted permission for conservatories on plots one and six of the Berkeley Homes development at Pirie Close, extensions a Shenley, Deppers Bridge and 71 Mill Street, work to trees at Victoria House Farm Street; and a replacement dwelling at Meadow Farm.

The Parish made no comment on extensions at 8 South Parade, 5 Constance Drive and 30 Temple End; a replacement dwelling at Harbury Heath House renewal of overhead lines for EMEB; erection of an agricultural building at Burnside, Deppers Bridge and the conversion of a farm building at Westfield House, Middle Road to form a Cattery. Chairman Ed Wilson thought the Finance Committee ought to decide how many new lights the Parish could afford. Butt Lane, Mill Street and Farm Street were agreed priorities. Keith Thompson thought that it was worth paying the extra for Mercury because many people did not like Sodium Lighting.

The Netball Club was reluctant to contribute to a Sinking Fund before their requests for improvements were granted. Bill Middleton 'did not want to have a gun held to their head' but Sharon Hancock said the ditch was dangerous and should be piped as a matter of urgency.

The Parish had considered how it could contribute to pensioners travel. Ed Wilson was conscious that there was some abuse of the token system which had been intended to help pensioners make essential journeys into town. He proposed this year to offer the Village Taxibus a sum in line with the Subsidy Bishops Itchington gave and to continue with tokens but only at a level of £12 15

per person. This focused more subsidy towards the Village but left pensioners with some flexibility. Sharon Hancock agreed that a system was needed that subsidised journeys taken but Mrs Waddell claimed that pensioners held on to tokens to pay for train tickets.

Parish Council Meeting for June 1993

Thinking of recent events in the village, your scribe thinks that arrangements for policing are crazy. So does your parish council - they are to send a very strong letter, why don't you join them? The Parish Council would like you to write - try the Chief Constable or your County Councillor, or even your MP.

The next meaty matter was affordable housing. Mr Phelps of the Rural Housing Trust was there to bring the Parish Council up to date. He confirmed that the need for affordable housing has been proved and that the problem is the sewage works at Deppers Bridge.

District Council planners are prepared to support building on part of the allotments site as an exception to normal planning policies. The N.R.A. might accept up to 6 houses now on 3/4 acre using cesspits. Using cesspits could add £2,500 to the price of each house. Any connection from the allotments site could be through Pineham Avenue - but did you know that Pineham Avenue sewers will cost £20,000 to bring up to adoptable standard? More expense falling on development of the allotments site. Mrs Towler from Warwickshire County Council told the Parish Council that there will be no problem in releasing the allotments site for affordable housing. The Parish Council and the Rural Housing Trust are to continue discussions to see if the allotments site can proceed further.

What was described as the "Severn Trent Saga" came next on the agenda, Bruce Teuten had returned from holiday to find the sewer scheme was 1 week behind schedule. Mill Lane is to be re-lined and when that happens a generator will be running overnight and there may be a slight smell from the resin to be used. In a letter, Mr Ayers Hunt expressed concern about the potential effect of the works on the water table. Bruce Teuten said there had been no effect on water levels but the Parish Council is to write to Severn Trent seeking assurance. Thanks were given to the contractor for getting the carnival route ready in time.

Bill Middleton reported that more than 100 villagers are interested in having a bowling club and the favoured site is the Paddock. Agents acting for the Paddock's owners want the Bowling Club to support their planning applications for building on the allotments next to the Club and on the field next to the Spinney. The Parish Council is completely opposed to building on either site, and is prepared to consider alternatives for a bowling green.

The Parish Council also decided to make up £100 of grant aid to the summer playscheme that had been cut by the District Council.

They agonised long and hard over a planning application to demolish workshops and offices at Dovehouse Autos and erect 8 one-bedroon flats. Eventually, the decision was to object to this particular scheme as over-intensive development, but they would support a more sympathetic scheme.

Playground improvements are taking place. The fence might be dog-proof, but it certainly isn't vandal-proof. Following discussions with their auditors, the Parish Council will ask the owners of houses in Butt Lane and Queens Close to contribute towards legal expenses for a deed of grant for connecting to the Pound sewer.

There is concern about the standard of grasscutting and the surface of the tennis courts. Both matters will be taken up with the respective contractors. More prominent speed limit signs are to be put up at entrances to the Village, but the County Council will not carry out any other traffic calming measures. There is an urgent need to replace 13 concrete lighting columns with the tubular steel variety at a cost of about £600 each. Good job the Parish Council had that £10,000 windfall recently.

Under "finance", Ken Stephenson wants a sinking fund for the recreation ground, Bill Middleton will talk to the Netball Club about a sinking fund for the Netball Court, and bus tokens will be discussed earlier on the agenda in future so that interested parties don't have to sit through the whole meeting. Mrs Waddell and a number of others had complained about a grudging attitude on the part of the Parish Council towards bus tokens for old age pensioners

Mrs Waddell will have had a reply to her letter by now, but the Parish Council must make best use of its limited resources. See you at the next meeting on 22nd July.

At last we have a date for the Chesterton Windmill Opening! It will be on the weekend of 25 & 26 September and the Avoncroft Miller, Max Sinclaire will be in attendance.

Chesterton is one of the oldest surviving Windmills in the country. It was built in 1632 for Sir Edward Peyto who was Lord of the Manor at Chesterton. The style is unique and was influenced by Inigo Jones if not actually built to his design. There is hardly any metal used in its construction, even the cap rotates on wooden teeth! And the lantern pinion wallower is a miracle of ingenuity (or so I am told). But for those interested in people rather than buildings (or engineering) the Mill has many secrets to reveal. Over three hundred years of graffiti record work on the Mill, including the names of the craftsmen, drawings of it, and the activities of local people who visited it. You can tell at a glance the age of the inscriptions for they are all carved with great skill and style - hardly vandalism at all.

So put the date in your diary - September 25 & 26th and make sure you take the opportunity to visit this unique contribution to the Warwickshire Landscape. And if you would like to get to know the Mill better why not volunteer to help with the opening? We need men and women to help for an hour or so on either or both of the days, just contact the Secretary on 612792. It is fun and it cannot possibly rain like it did last year.

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




Harbury - High Street/Hall Lane Releif Sewer

- 1. Church Terrace re-opened to one way traffic system Thursday 24th June 1993.
- 2. Works continue in both highstreet and Vicarage Lane and is 1 week behind schedule to the revised programme issued by the contractor on the 9th March 1993 due to expensive service crossings in the High Street.

3. Work will commence in Chapel Street towards the latter part of week commencing 28th June 1993 after completion of the works in the fairly busy junction of High Street/Mill Street/Chapel Street.

Work in Constance Drive will commence with a camera survey, week commencing 28th June 1993 with remedials commencing week 5th July 1993. It is expected that the operations in Constance Drive, Penelope Close and Margaret Close will be 8 weeks duration.
 Sewer re-lining works to the existing sewer behind the shops and Library passing under The Bull Ring Garage will commence week starting 5th July 1993 and should be completed within 3 to 4 days. Because of the need to partially interfere with access in and out of Mill Lane details will be sent to house owners direct.

Introduction to Work Experience

At the moment Y10 of Southam School are on work experience. This is whe students go out to work on their own for two weeks experiencing practicalitie of work. Basically, this involves an introduction to work for when we leav school or when we have finished exams or training courses and lasts for tw weeks. For two weeks I have been at Intercity (British Rail) in Coventry. have enjoyed the experience of work there and I hope when I have finished all my exams at School, I may find employment at Intercity. The two weeks at Intercity has given me an insight into what I could do later. One thing I never realised was that all the handles on train doors must be lead. If they are not you have to open the doors and shut them hard, when the train comes in it has to be checked from top to bottom to make sure all the doors are shut. If the doors were not shut correctly and one door came open while it was moving, there would have to be a big enquiry as to why the door wasn't shut properly. Also if you have a train with about 5-8 carriages which is about average, you only have two minutes to check every single door. This must be done properly. These are just two of many examples of highly responsible work that Intercity employees carry out and that work experience has made me aware of. It's not just the station side of Intercity which is important but the maintenance of track is equally important. July in the Garden

After so much rain in June it's hard to think of watering but containers will certainly need regular attention this month and a weekly boost of milfertiliser. Cuttings of Geraniums and Fuchsias can be taken and border Carnations layered late in the month - Cut mature Delphinium right down after flowering to encourage further flowers in September.

Lift Tulips and Ranundilus, dry off and store. Divide, or do a first planting, o Bearded Iris. Sow Sweet Williams for next year and prick out wallflowers Check plant supports against likely thunderstorms. Dry herbs for storage - jun before flowering is the best time, spray potatoes against blight every thre weeks. Continue planting out leeks and winter brassicas. Earth up Celer, guarding against slugs and dust with soot against leaf miner. Cut Courgett regularly to ensure continuance of crop. given some warm dry weather Shallots should be ready to lift this month. Tidy up the Strawberry bed after fruiting and remove all runners, unless you want to layer some for new plants Keep removing the hoots on Tomatoes and stop the plants after five trusses have set. Sow Mustard, Phacelia or Clover on any vacant plots in the vegetable garden to be dug in later as green manure.

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
